

The Note-To-Guitar drill presents random notes selected on the treble clef staff ranging from low E below the staff (open 6th string) to the G above the staff (1st string - 3rd fret), and is limited to the notes in the first position of the guitar fingerboard. You must respond by clicking the whole note pointer on the appropriate fret position on the fingerboard.

The selections on the Options pages are described below:

General Page

Toolbar Alignment		
Top:	Align the toolbar on the top border of the main window frame.	
Bottom:	Align the toolbar on the bottom border of the main window frame.	
Left:	Align the toolbar on the left border of the main window frame.	
Right:	Align the toolbar on the right border of the main window frame.	

Show Wallpaper

Select a bitmap logo or color as a background wallpaper in the main window frame.

Display Notes

This option is normally enabled but it may be disabled for aural training which is the identifying of notes by pitches alone. Usually just the note name must be identified for a correct answer, but in the Note-To-Keyboard and Note-To-Guitar drills the exact key or fret must be selected making these the most challenging of the aural training drills.

Large Key Letters

Displays the key letters A through G in appropriate drills in a larger, more visible font size.

Confirm Exit

Displays a dialog box to confirm KeyNote program exit.

Drill Page

Clef	Drill	Range	
	Full:		For the clef drills (treble, bass, and grand staff) this option expands the range of notes to two leger lines above and below the staff for a total of 17 notes. For the guitar and keyboard, the entire displayed range is included in the drill.
	In-Sta	aff:	For the clef drills (treble, bass, and grand staff) this option limits the range of notes to those notes within the staff for a total of 9 notes. For the Guitar-To-Note drill, the range is limited to the notes in the first position of the guitar fingerboard.

Show Note Letter

This option causes KeyNote to display the correct note for the most recent drill item. If a response was correct the background will be green. If a correct response was made the background will be green, otherwise it will be red. If Set Pause Seconds option is active then the note will flash for the selected amount of seconds.

Disable Stop Button

This option causes KeyNote to disable the Stop button during the course of a drill. This feature forces the completion a drill once it has started.

Drill Items

This option sets the number of items to present for each drill.

Timer Page

Set Time Limit

Setting this option causes KeyNote to limit the time on any particular drill, stopping the drill when the time limit is reached. The number of correct and incorrect notes is displayed in their appropriate boxes along with the remaining notes of the drill if any.

Time All Drills

This option resets and initiates the timer for all drills regardless of the Set Time Limit setting. Setting this option displays the amount of time to complete each drill.

Show Progress Bar

Setting this option causes KeyNote to display a horizontal progress indicator bar just below the Drill Display Frame to graphically represent the elapsed time. The color of the bar is green but changes to indicate the amount of time left with yellow indicating 50% or less, magenta indicating 25% or less, and red indicating 10% or less. This bar is also displayed for each drill item if Flash Pause is enabled.

Error Pause

Set the desired amount of time, in seconds, that is given to allow the review of any incorrect selection. If an incorrect selection is made, the correct note name is flashed in the Note window for the set amount of seconds. In the Note-To-Keyboard and Note-To-Guitar drills the correct key or fret is also highlighted for further feedback.

Setting this option always enables the Show Note Letter feature on the Drill options page and disables any timer selections. Also if sounds are enabled, a bonk sound is played while the note name is flashed.

Flash Pause

Set the desired amount of time, in seconds, that is given to respond to each drill item. This feature presents a flash card like drill by limiting the amount of time to respond by the selected amount of seconds. If a selection is not made within the set time, the drill continues by displaying the next item. If the Error Pause feature is enabled then the correct note is flashed before progressing to the next item.

Sound Page

Play Sounds

Play all sounds corresponding to the displayed note, key, or fret position. Also enables playing of the bonk sound for incorrect selections.

Sound Type

Select between WAVE form or MIDI audio output. For MIDI output, KeyNote sends all sounds to the current Windows MIDI Mapper setup to provide device-independent MIDI support.

MIDI Volume

Select the preferred MIDI output volume.

MIDI Bonk Sound

Select between a high or low bonk sound to be played during the Error Pause for incorrect selections.

Messages Page

100% Message that is displayed for perfect scores.

- 90%–99% Message that is displayed for scores in the upper 90%.
- 80%-89% Message that is displayed for scores in the upper 80%.
- 70%-79%Message that is displayed for scores in the upper 70%.
- 60\$-69\$ Message that is displayed for scores in the upper 60%.
- 0%-59% Message that is displayed for scores below 60%.



General Overview

GETTING STARTED

Using KeyNote Music Drills is simple and intuitive even to the beginner! To select a drill, simply click on the appropriate drill icon on the toolbar or select it from the Drill menu. Each drill utilizes its own panel and each are similarly laid out much like a typical video game:



The drill display area is located at the top-center of each panel with the prompt bar just below. To the left are the drill status indicators for the correct/incorrect responses, remaining drill items, elapsed time, and the previous item note name. To the right are the control buttons to start/stop the drill, change drill options, and to exit the drill. The response area is located at the bottom of the panel. Depending on the drill selected there will either be seven buttons, one for each note name (A to G), a guitar fingerboard, or a 4-octave keyboard to input responses. The drill panel layout is explained in more detail below:

PANEL AREAS

Drill Display Frame:

This is the main viewing area where all drills are displayed. Depending on the selected drill it will show either a staff with various clefs (treble, bass, or grand

	staff), a guitar fingerboard, or a 4-octave keyboard.
Prompt Bar(s):	Indicates some simple instructions to start and stop the drill. In the keyboard drills a second prompt bar provides feedback for correct or incorrect responses. If
	Show Progress Bar is enabled this bar turns into the Progress Bar indicating the relative amount of time the drill has elapsed.
Input Keys or Area:	Depending on the selected drill it will show either a set of seven buttons for the note names or a 4-octave keyboard.

DRILL STATUS INDICATORS

Correct:	Number of correct responses.
Incorrect:	Number of incorrect responses.
Remaining:	Number of drill items left.
Time:	Elapsed time since the press of the Start button.
Note:	The correct letter name of the note of the last response. If a correct response was made the background will be green, otherwise it will be red. If the <u>Set Pause</u> <u>Seconds</u> option is active then the note letter will be flashed for the selected amount of seconds.

CONTROL BUTTONS

Done:	Exit the drill. This button is disabled during a drill.
Options:	Allows the selection or change of various KeyNote options. This button is disabled during a drill.
Start:	Start a drill sequence. This button is disabled during a drill.
Stop:	Stop the current drill. There is an option to disable this during a drill sequence.

What Is Shareware

Shareware is a distribution method, not a type of software. You should find software that suits your needs and pocketbook, whether it's commercial or Shareware.
