About the Screens in the Night screensaver collection

The Screens in the Night screensaver collection consists of ten separate screensavers:

- Amoeba
- Beetles
- Data
- Fruit Flies *
- Hyphae
- Leaping Lemmings *
- Orbits
- Radiance *
- Ribbons *
- Shooting Stars *

Shareware versions of five of these screensavers (those marked above with *) have been made publicly available, to allow users to try out and evaluate them before choosing to purchase the full collection. The other five screensavers are available exclusively with the registered version of the *Screens in the Night* screensaver collection.

How to change the current screensaver

To change the screensaver that Windows uses...

• Bring up the "Desktop" section of Control Panel. (This can be done by right-clicking your desktop and selecting "Properties" from the pop-up menu.)

- Select the "Screen Saver" tab.
- Choose the screensaver that you want for the list.
- Click OK.

System Requirements

Windows 95/98, Windows 2000, or Windows NT 4.0+ (For technical reasons, two of the screensavers' advanced features - the 'mouse sensitivity' control and the 'password delay' option - are not available under NT-based operating systems.)

A 16-colour monitor (256-colour is recommended for most of the screensavers)

About 10 Mb of free RAM (the exact figure varies between the screensavers)

Required files

Like all standard Windows screensavers, the *Screens in the Night* screensavers are stored as .SCR files in the Windows\System folder.

To run the screensavers, the following files must also be installed in your Windows\System folder:

- Msvbvm60.dll
- Comdlg32.ocx
- Mscomctl.ocx

Known problems

When a clock, message, or timer is visible on the screensaver and is set to 'Bouncing', some monitors may fail to shut down automatically after the computer has been idle for the required amount of time. This is an unavoidable consequence of the way that the Windows operating system is designed.
