US Deficit in 1991 was \$270 billion, an all time record. Now where is the press coverage and handwringing?

WARNING: Watching the National Debt increase every second can increase blood pressure and stress.

It has been two years since the release of version 2 of the US National Debt DA. Quite a lot has happened in the interim, including the October 1990 budget deal. This deal would supposedly reduce the deficit in 1991 to \$63 billion and in 1992 to \$25 billion and, eventually, balance the budget. Now, based on recent O.M.B. statistics, instead of decreasing, the <u>deficit</u> has increased to about \$270 billion for 1991 and \$390-\$430 billion for 1992 and **\$1,000** billion over a 4 year period. This will increase the <u>US National Debt</u> to well over \$4 trillion by 1994. Washington has done it again, selling the country a bill of goods.

This update reflects the present situation for deficit forecast. As developments warrant, I will update this program further.

Choose the "About USDebt 5.1..." menu item to see more information about the program. From that window you can use the <u>Configure</u> button to specify what combination of items you want displayed:

- 1. US National Debt
- 2. Your share of the debt
- 3. The World Population
- 4. The US Population
- 5. The Time

All five or any combination can be displayed at once. Your configuration is remembered between launches. [You can also change the value that US Debt uses to increase the world population and national debt per second. -- Sorry, next version.] The "Set Default" button will return the DA to the pre-programmed values as described below.

1992: \$390-430 Billion (depending upon forecast)

1991: \$270 billion (Total Federal outlays \$1.323 trillion, up 5.7%)

1990: \$221 billion

1989: \$152 billion 1988: \$154 billion 1987: \$150 billion 1986: \$225 billion 1985: \$210 billion 1984: \$180 billion

- The Rising Sun BBS is no longer on-line due to the death of one of the three Sysops (was on-line April 1984 January 1990), thus the phone number for the Rising Sun mentioned in versions 1 and 2 should not be used.
