What makes Championship Spades different?

Championship Spades specializes in Spades for the championship player who seriously enjoys the game, offering:

- =- Colorful, fast, non-cluttered, and polished interface.
- =- Selectable, customizable computer personalities with different styles.
- =- Expert computer players who will cover, sink, signal, etc..
- =- Many game variations and image/sound customization.
- =- Both 16-bit and 32-bit versions for Win 3.1, OS/2, Win 95, and NT.

General help

Bidding - To bid your hand, click on the appropriate card in the bid window corresponding to the number of tricks you can take when the arrow points to you. It also possible to bid by entering the number corresponding to your bid on the keyboard.

Playing - To play your hand, click on the appropriate card in your hand that you wish to play when the arrow points to you. It also possible to bid by entering the number corresponding to your card on the top row of keyboard (1-9,0, - for 11, and = for 12).

Options - To change the game options for various Spades variations, select them under the options menu. For more details on the game options available, click on the next button.

Players - To change the personalities of your computer opponents, select Player... under the Options menu. For more details on the personalities, click on the next button.

Tables and decks - To select a different table or deck pattern, select them under the Options menu. It is also possible to use the numeric keys to select a table or deck pattern.

Practice features - Various items under the Practice menu will allow you to take back a play, redeal, rebid, or replay a hand. You can also assign specific cards to players or let the computer play out an obvious hand for you. You can also view a play history window or all players cards if you want to analyze a hand in-depth.

Save/print/restore - Finally, you may save, restore, and print hands and play history under the File menu or via a button on the hand summary dialog. This will allow you to print or save particularly interesting hands and to load the hands described in the Mastering Spades advanced tutorial.

Picking your favorite game variation

Championship Spades offers extensive customization to support different game variations which affect both game play and scoring.

Game options

Name prompt on startup - Change this to No to disable the name prompt on game startup. You can still change your name at any time under Options menu and the previous name used will be restored the next time you play.

Game speed - Ranges from Slow to Fast affect how quickly the game play operates. Note that at the Fast level, many of the play sounds, indicator updates, and animations are disabled or abbreviated. Most people should be happy with the Normal speed.

Score w/hash marks - Change this to No if you prefer numbers instead of hash marks when recording tricks bid and taken on the trick card.

Confirm practice options - Change this to No if you want to use the Practice options (take back, hint, redeal, rebid, replay, and view history) without being prompted first.

Confirm bids and plays - Change this to Yes if you want every bid and play you make to be confirmed before it is made.

Personality for hints - Change this to the computer personality name that you wish to provide you hints for bidding and playing. If you are more recreational player, you should probably choose a strong intermediate player like ProfPlum, as an expert player (Red, LadyLuck, and Sparky) may suggest bids and plays that may confuse you. For more details, see [Selecting a Computer Personality](#)

Cutthroat (no partners) - Change this to yes if you wish to play cutthroat. In cutthroat, every player is for themselves and there are no partners. This can change play dramatically and makes it very difficult to get a Nil.

Overtricks count as bags - Change this to no if you do not want to play with sandbags. Most players play that overtricks count as sandbags. Once a certain number of bags are accumulated (usually 10), the player is penalized (usually 100 points). Sandbags help prevent players from consistently underbidding.

Count bags won by Nil - Change this to yes if you want bags to count against a Nil bid. Normally, if a player does not get their Nil bid, their tricks do not count as bags.

Who gets the first lead - Change this to High bidder if the highest bidder should get the first lead. Change this to Two of clubs if the player with the two of clubs should always get the lead. Note that choosing this option also forces all players to play their lowest club on the first trick. This variation is true to the original and official Spades rules. Finally, the most common is the Dealers left option which has the player to the dealers left leading for the first trick.

2S beats Ace of Spades - Change this to yes if you want the Two of Spades to be the highest Spade (over the Ace). Note that this option is currently under development and since I have not received any requests to provide it, I may never add it.

Play with high/low jokers - Change this to yes if you want to replace the Two of Hearts and Two of Diamonds with a high and low joker. These jokers will beat any other Spade

(including the Two or Ace, whichever is higher). Note that this option is currently under development and since I have not received any requests to provide it, I may never add it.

Scoring options

Minimum bid required - Set this to minimum bid required. This is usually 1 or 2. Note that the minimum bid applies only to each player, not to both partners as some variations play. If you want minimum bids based on partners combined bids, let me know.

10 trick bid/got bonus - Set this to the bonus amount if a team bids AND wins 10 or more tricks. Set this to 0 if you do not want a bonus. Set this to 100 for the common 10 for 200 variation (since the 10 tricks are already worth 100).

Slam (all 13) bonus - Set this to the bonus amount if a team wins all 13 tricks (regardless of their bid). Set this to 0 if you do not want a bonus. 200 is usually a fair bonus which will usually assure the players a win in the current game.

10 bags total penalty - Set this to the penalty when a player or team accumulates 10 bags. Note that penalties have a minus in them. This is usually -100.

Overtrick penalty after - Set this to the number of overtricks after which a penalty is charged. This less common method of addressing consistent underbidding is usually an alternative to playing with bags. Set this to 13 to assure that no overtrick penalty is used.

Overtrick penalty - Set this to the penalty charged when the number of overtricks set in the last option are won. Generally this is -40.

Game played until - Set this to the game ending score. Partnership games usually are played to 500 and cutthroat games to 300.

Trick bid and won - Set this to the number of points a bid and won trick is worth. This is almost always 10.

Trick bid and lost - Set this to the number of points a bid and lost trick is worth. This is almost always -10.

Nil bid and won - Set this to the number of points a bid and won trick is worth. This is almost always 100.

Nil bid and lost - Set this to the number of points a bid and won trick is worth. This is almost always -100.

Overtricks are worth - Set this to the number of points an overtrick is worth (trick won over the bid). This is almost always 1.



Different computer play styles

One of the unique strengths of Championship Spades is the variety of computer play styles you can play against. Each computer personality bids and plays differently. You may select which players you wish to play with under the Players... option on the Options menu. In this dialog you may right-click on any players face to get details on the that players play style. You can then select the player by clicking on the player. The positions at the bottom of the dialog indicate which position each player will be in. In particular, note that the North position will be your partner in Partnership Spades so this player should probably play with a similar skill level and aggressiveness to yourself. Specifically, each computer player has four attributes which affect their bidding and game play:

Skill - This central attribute assesses the players skill level in Spades. For example, beginners will generally bid by just counting Aces and Kings. Expert players will look at distribution and take into account what other players may have bid or the current game score. Note that expert players will go Nil with more challenging hands and will also try for finesses and signal preferred suits to their partner. This expert style of play may be confusing to recreational players. For an explanation of how expert players play, see [Mastering Spades: A tutorial for advanced players.](#)

Memory - This attribute assesses the players skill at remembering what cards have been played so far. Card-counters will be able to take more chances guessing what the opponents cards are based on what they have played so far. Expert card-counters will also remember better what suits their partner indicated a preference for and will try for the finesse more often.

Predictability - This attribute assesses the players predictability. Near-random players will catch other players off-guard with unexpected plays sometimes.

Aggressiveness - This attribute assesses the players aggressiveness. Aggressive players will generally bid Nil with tough hands, bid more tricks, try to go for the set more often, and may even set themselves in an effort to set an opponents Nil bid.

Customizing your own styles

You may also customize any of the computer players by selecting details on the player and clicking the Edit... button. You may then change the name, bitmap, and/or all of the player attributes for the given player. This means you can rename the players to your friends names, change their styles so you have a host of expert players, or even include a custom bitmap for yourself or another player. To provide your own bitmap, include a 256-color BMP file the same size (and, ideally, the same palette) as the other face bitmaps in the Spades FACES subdirectory. Then, include the name in the picture field provided in the edit box. If successful, you will see the picture change to your custom face and it will automatically be saved for future games.



Customizing images and sounds

Championship Spades will allow you customize almost all the images and sounds used in the game. You may select from one of the several supplied images or sounds under the appropriate item under the Options menu. For the more adventurous, you may also supply your own images or sounds by following the instructions below:

Adding your own custom table background

- 1) Create your own table background and save it as a 256-color Windows BMP. Note that if you are on a 256-color system, your background may not look good if you don't use the same palette as the other backgrounds provided with the game. Backgrounds can be any size although 64x64 is usually a good size.
- 2) Copy your Windows BMP file over to the TABLES subdirectory.
- 3) Restart Championship Spades and select the Tables... option. The game will automatically detect your bitmap in the directory and show it along with the other bitmaps for selection. Select your bitmap from the dialog.

Adding your own custom deck pattern

- 1) Create your own deck pattern and save it as a 16-color (or 256-color) Windows BMP. Note that if you are on a 256-color system, your deck may not look good if you don't use the same palette as the other decks provided with the game.
- 2) Resize the deck back to the same size as the other decks provided with the game.
- 3) Copy your Windows BMP file over to the DECKS subdirectory.
- 4) Restart Championship Spades and select the Decks... option. The game will automatically detect your bitmap in the directory and show it along with the other bitmaps for selection. Select your bitmap from the dialog.

Adding your own custom player face

- 1) Create your own player face and save it as a 256-color Windows BMP. Note that if you are on a 256-color system, your face may not look good if you don't use the same palette as the other faces provided with the game.
- 2) Resize the face to the same size as the other faces provided with the game.
- 3) Copy your Windows BMP file over to the FACES subdirectory.
- 4) Select the details dialog for the player you wish to replace, and then select the Edit... button. After the edit dialog appears, enter the picture name (no path) in the field provided.
- 5) Click OK and the player's face will change immediately and be saved for future games.

Adding your own custom sounds for events

- 1) Create or copy your favorite WAV files over to the SOUNDS subdirectory. You may also reference sounds in another directory by entering the full path in for the given sound.
- 2) Make sure WAV files on Windows 3.1 are less than 64,000 bytes in size.
- 3) Choose the Sounds... option and enter the filename under the appropriate events entry field. If you do not give the full path, the sound must be in the SOUNDS subdirectory. The .WAV extension is optional.

Adding your own custom soundtracks

- 1) Create or copy your favorite MIDI files (with a .MID extension) over to the SOUNDS subdirectory. You may also reference sounds in another directory by entering the full path in for the given sound. You probably already have several in your C:\WINDOWS directory. You can also simply disable the soundtrack by un-checking the box.
- 2) Choose the Sounds... option and enter the filename under the soundtrack entry field. If you do not give the full path, the file must be in the SOUNDS subdirectory. The .MID

extension is optional.



Will there be a multi-player network version?

The author DOES wish to produce a multi-player network version. My goal for the first official release was to make an AWESOME standalone game with a solid, fun interface first. Now that that is mostly complete, I can address supporting multiple players.

Supporting network play is not that difficult and the game has already been architected with multiple players in mind. However, there are numerous competing technologies right now for supporting network play so the author wishes to investigate and evaluate these. You can help by letting the author know (at spades@dq.com):

- 1) Do you have Windows 95 or NT? Do you expect to be getting it soon?
- 2) Would you prefer a DirectPlay (95 and NT only) version which would support modem, LAN, and Internet play on Microsofts free Internet game servers?
- 3) Would you prefer some other network protocol? If so, which one?
- 4) Is modem play important to you? Is local LAN play important to you?
- 5) How should players meet to form games? IRC? BBS Door? An online service?

It would depend on which method is supported for network play, but it likely that a network-enabled version will be ready sometime early next year. **Registering and sending email are the best ways to convince me to hurry up with the network version...**



Registering

This game is NOT freeware. The author has spent a great deal of time making a quality Spades game. If you have enjoyed playing this, please register so you can help fund network play and other game variations. You have 15 days to evaluate this game, after which you must either register it or uninstall it. To uninstall, simply remove the icon from your Games group and the SPADES directory. The program is completely self-contained.

If you register, you will receive a key to disable the nag screens (on both the 16-bit and 32-bit versions) and a code to download the Mastering Spades advanced tutorial off the Web site. If you provided your email address you will also be automatically notified of upgrade releases and your key will also work in these future versions. If you want diskettes, you can also pay \$9 more and I will ship you either the 16-bit or 32-bit version on diskette. The Web site always has the latest version (and allows you to switch between 16-bit and 32-bit versions) and making the diskettes is a pain for me, so only order diskettes if you REALLY need them.

You may conveniently register this product with any major credit card through the Public Software Library (PSL) for \$39. Ask to register Championship Spades, product #14669. You may contact PSL to order via several means:

PSL notifies me within a week of your registration. As soon as I receive notification, I will send the registration key to you immediately via email or postal mail. If you requested diskettes, please allow 4-6 weeks for delivery. Once you receive your registration key, simply press the Enter key... button on the Register dialog under the Help menu. Enter your name and key EXACTLY as (including upper and lower-case) as they appear on your registration sheet. All the nag screens will then be disabled and the registration dialog will show your name.

Please note that PSL is a registration service and shareware author organization and they have nothing to do with the author or the game itself. Known bugs and possible workarounds

The current release only has three known bugs and issues:

1) Table selection dialog does not display images with the proper palette on a 256-color display. Workaround: Simply ignore the images and select by the names. After the selection, the table will be displayed properly. There is really nothing I can do about this on 256-color systems since each background has its own 256-color palette...

2) The colors sometimes appear inverted or incorrect on 32-bit Windows 95 systems. Assuming you are using a 256-color or higher display (the game will look bad on a 16-color display), you should see nice faces on a wooden table background with a yellow notepad with dark blue writing for recording tricks bid and taken. Note that previous versions also demonstrated this bug on many systems. Now, it only appears on a few using outdated Win95 video drivers, usually in conjunction with DirectX (a Microsoft library supplied with several Windows 95 games and multimedia applications). Luckily, it appears that one of two things has cured the problem for other users that have reported this:

- Try switching to a hi-color (32,000 colors or more) mode. Do this using the Display option in the control panel. You may also wish to get the QuickRes powertoy from Microsoft that makes resolution changing easy without a reboot from <http://www.dq.com/musthave.htm>.

- Obtain and install the latest video drivers for your particular video card from the manufacturer (most have web pages with the drivers available for free download). Many of the drivers that come already installed with the computer are older than DirectX and most have made some recent upgrades to correct problems like this. Since the driver depends on your video card, I can't direct you to a specific site.

3) The game sometimes crashes or has memory or resource problems on older 16-bit systems with 8MB or less. Workaround: Increase your Windows swap file (see Windows Help), disable the sounds, or avoid player selection dialog, help file, and other extras to reduce memory usage.

4) On some systems running Microsoft Plus and using the Show window contents while dragging option, you may be unable to resize Championship Spades. Workarounds: Disable this option under the Plus! tab in the Display settings dialog box or simply maximize Championship Spades using the icon or menu item.

Please, if the game crashes, or an expert computer plays poorly, please use the Report bug or bad play... option under the Help menu on the hand that caused the error or bad play. This will dump the player hands and play history out to C:\BADHAND.TXT. You can then email that file to spades@dq.com ALONG WITH A SHORT EXPLANATION and I will have almost all the information I need to hopefully correct the error. Do not forget to include which player made the mistake, what the mistake was, and either the round # or the misplayed card. Please report bugs even if you are not registered. I cannot improve the game without your feedback. Particularly, since I would like to take pride in the computers ability...



Spades Basics: Cards

Spades is a very exciting and challenging card game, less complex than Bridge, but more so than Hearts.

There are four players for a game of Spades, and each player is dealt 13 cards. Each turn, they play one card. The four cards that are played each turn are called a "TRICK". That means there are 13 "TRICKS" each time a hand of Spades is played.

The first card played in each trick is called the LEAD card & the suit of that card is the LEAD SUIT. Players must always match the LEAD SUIT if they can.

The high card in the suit played wins that given trick. The winner of the trick gets to lead the next card, which may be of any suit (except Spades, until they are broken, more on this later).



Spades Basics: Trump

If a player does not have any cards of the LEAD SUIT then they can play any card in their hand; they do not have to play TRUMP if they do not want to (unless that is the LEAD SUIT). Spades are always TRUMP in the game of Spades.

Any spade (the TRUMP suit) ranks higher than any non-Spade. So, the highest Spade played on a non-Spade lead will take that trick.

For example: if the AH was led and you have no hearts, you may win the trick by playing the 2 of Spades.

You can not lead Spades until they are "broken"; that is until they are played on a non-Spade lead. Once that happens, you can lead with a Spade.



Spades Basics: Bidding

Thirteen cards are dealt to each of the four players. You must decide how many of the thirteen possible TRICKS you think you can take.

To do this, look at how many high-ranking cards you have. An Ace will usually take a TRICK. If you also have the King in that suit, you can usually count on taking that TRICK, too. Also check to see if you have any short suits (only a few of any one suit). As soon as those cards are gone from your hand you can start to play TRUMP (Spades) on those tricks.

When it is your turn, a window appears on your screen that has NIL and 1 through 13 Spades on it. Click on the card that equals the number of TRICKS you think you can take (NIL being zero).

If you want some guidance, you can use the hint function (under the Practice menu or press Ctrl-H). The computer will display what it would bid in the status bar.



Spades Basics: Playing

After the bidding is completed, the person to the left of the dealer leads the first card. Any card except a Spade may be led. Remember that spades cannot be led until "broken".

An arrow will always point to the current player. When it is your turn, simply click on the card you want to play. It will then be placed in the playfield in the center of your screen with the other players cards in the current TRICK.

Whoever wins the TRICK will lead for the next hand. Play continues until all 13 TRICKS are taken. As play progresses, the number of TRICKS taken by each player is shown in the trickcard in the lower right-hand corner. Remember in partnership Spades, both players tricks count together toward the team total.

You **MUST** follow suit, if you can. If you do not have any cards of that suit, and so cannot follow suit, you may play any card including TRUMP (Spades). You do not have to play trump if you do not wish to do so.

If you want some guidance, you can use the hint function (under the Practice menu or press Ctrl-H). The computer will display what it would play in the status bar.



Spades Basics: Scoring

Scoring in Spades is determined by how many TRICKS you take versus how many TRICKS you said you would take.

If you take as many TRICKS as you bid, then you score 10 points for each trick taken. So if 5 tricks are bid and 5 tricks taken, you would get 50 points.

If you do not make your bid, you lose 10 points for each one you bid, no matter how many tricks you actually end up taking. So, if you bid 5 and get 4, you lose all 50 points, not just 10.

If you bid NIL (zero tricks) and make it, you score 100 points. However, if you take any tricks at all, you lose 100 points! More on NILs later.

A game is typically played to 500. Note that all scoring amounts are adjustable under the Options...Scoring menu, the above numbers are the default score values.



Spades Basics: Game Variations and Sandbags

Championship Spades offers many game variations found under the Options...General menu. The default game variation is partnership spades with sandbags.

In PARTNERSHIP spades, you and your partner (the computer player across the table from you), bid and play together. This means that you will help one another, not take each others tricks, protect your partners NIL bids, etc. In CUTTHROAT spades, it is every man for themselves. This means that every player bids and plays separately. CUTTHROAT is also generally more competitive as players try to SET others bids more aggressively.

SANDBAGS were originally put into place to prevent people from always underbidding their hand. This is also used to make it difficult for people to deliberately bid low and make you bid too high.

Any trick over the ones you bid are called SANDBAGS. Once you have collected 10 sandbags, over several hands, 100 points are deducted from your score. In PARTNERSHIP spades, bags are counted together toward the team total.



Spades Basics: Going Nil

One of the aspects of Spades that make it unique is the ability to bid NIL. This means you will not take any tricks. This is harder than it might sound as your opponents will be deliberately trying to SINK you and force you to take a trick by playing 2's...

For beginners, a good NIL hand has no Aces or Kings, lots of low cards, and no more than 3 low Spades. Keep in mind that your partner can (and should) protect you, so if he bids high, you can go NIL with a tougher hand. Under CUTTHROAT, NIL is much harder to get since you have no partner to help prevent you from taking tricks.

BLIND NIL is a desperation bid if you are losing and your opponent could win the game next hand. Before you even SEE your cards, you can go BLIND NIL. If you make it, you gain 200 points, if not, you lose 200 points.
