






Safe Outdoor Enclosure

Cats Indoors!

An Educator's Guide for Grades K-6



Dear Teacher:

Cats are the most popular pets in the United States. Their fascinating behavior and physical beauty endear them to their owners. But inside every cat are the genes of an efficient, prolific, and non-native predator. Scientists estimate that free-roaming cats kill hundreds of millions of birds and probably more than a billion other small wild animals in the United States yearly.

Recognizing that cat predation is both a local concern and a national issue, American Bird Conservancy has created this educator's guide to help you acquaint your students with this pervasive problem. Use the information on the back of the coloring page included with this guide as background for you and as an introduction for any of the activities you plan to use. The activities cross the curriculum and will fit into your lesson plans neatly. With your help, future generations of wild animals will be safer, and cats will live longer, healthier lives. Plus your students will gain valuable skills by participating in the activities suggested here. Thank you for your help.—American Bird Conservancy

1. The Great Outdoors Is No Place for Cats

Cats allowed outdoors face a host of hazards ranging from automobile accidents to poisoning to disease. After learning of the many dangers that threaten outdoor cats, it's easy to conclude that the best place for a cat is safe indoors. And



dent and give kids time to color the page. Ask kids not to turn the pages over until you tell them to do so. Then ask them to circle the things shown in the picture that are dangerous to the cat. After everyone has finished, use the information on the back of the coloring page to go over the answers. Your kids may notice that the cat isn't the only one in danger in the picture. Outdoor cats pose a serious threat to birds and other wildlife. What's an easy solution to protect cats and wildlife? Keep cats indoors, of course!

Now that your students know how important it is to keep cats indoors, help them pass the word on to their families. Send the finished coloring pages home with the kids to share. Add a personal note of your own if you like. You might also consider ordering copies of the brochure "Keeping Cats Indoors Isn't Just for the Birds" to accompany them. 
Grades: K-3





The Truth About Cats and Wildlife

- 1. Well-fed cats do kill wildlife and can impact wildlife populations
- 2. Cats with bells on their collars do kill wildlife
- 3. Wildlife that escapes injured from a cat will die, unless taken to a rehabber immediately
- 4. De-clawed cats still kill wildlife







Outdoor cats suffer and die from disease, starvation, bad weather, injury or death by cars or other animals, getting lost, stolen, or poisoned.




