
NuTest help contents.

The NuTest application is designed to help you prepare for all classes of amateur radio licenses. It presents you with on-screen tests using questions and answers taken from the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) question pools. Printed practice examinations can also be generated. These have a format very similar to the FCC examinations administered by the VEC (Volunteer Examiner Coordinator) system.

The NuTest About screen is where registration reminders ("Nag Screens") will be displayed for those people who might forget to register. If you are a registered user, then enjoy the view!

There are several buttons at the bottom of the NuTest window that appear on every page. The Exit and Help buttons are self explanatory. The Formula Button brings up a help topic giving some useful formulae for the selected license class. The Calculator Button gives you instant access to the Windows Calculator.

- This is the main testing page. The top window contains a question from the appropriate FCC question pool and three options are presented in the other text windows. To select an option use any one of the following methods:
- Click on one of the answers.
- Press keys 'A' 'C'
- Click on one of the options buttons.

Your current score and how well you answered the currently displayed question is shown in the white area at the bottom of the NuTest window.

There is a set of VCR style Navigation Buttons to allow movement backwards and forwards through the test. You can move to the start or end, or section by section.

Click on the Review Button to get feedback on questions you have already answered in the current test session.

The Explain Button brings up a help topic with some comments relevant to the correct answer for the currently displayed question. If the explanation has a reference to the FCC Part 97 regulations then click on this reference and the relevant Part 97 rule will be displayed.

The Generate Test button starts a new test if NuTest is in testing mode.



NuTest options page.

The options page is the 'control center' for NuTest. Here is the purpose of each option:

The Exam Class options select which question pool will be used to generate the next test. Some of the buttons may be grayed out if you are using an unregistered version.

The Question class options:

If Random Question Sequence is checked then the questions in the test will be presented in any order. If it is unchecked then the questions will be presented in the exact sequence as published in the FCC question pools.

Random Answer Sequence controls the sequence in which the options are displayed. If this box is checked then each set of options will be displayed in a random sequence. If it is unchecked then the options will be presented in the exact sequence as published in the FCC question pools.

The Move To Next Question box controls what happens when you select an option during a test. If it is checked then the next question is displayed when an option is selected, otherwise you must move to the next question manually.

By default, when you select an answer, you will be told if your choice was correct or not. If you would rather wait until the end of the test then leave the 'Give feedback' box unchecked.

The 'Show Score When' options.

You have the choice of a continuous display of your score during a test, or you may choose to see your score at the end of the test.

The 'Show Correct Option' options.

The correct option can be highlighted if you wish. This can be done During Question Display (OK, it is not really a test if you do this but it can be useful.) or momentarily After Question Display.

The 'Use Sound Effects' option allows encouraging sounds to play when you select a correct option.

The Show Hints option enables/disables the hint system for the entire program. Hints are those little yellow labels that pop up when the cursor remains over a control for more than a second or two.

The 'mode' options control how a test is generated. In Generate Tests mode a test resembling the FCC test in content and number of questions is generated. In Browse Question Pool mode **all** of the questions in the selected FCC question pool are displayed sequentially.

The 'Location of Calculator' button allows you to specify a path to the Windows Calculator. The default usually works fine. If you have moved or renamed the Calculator program, this button will aid you in defining the path.

The 'Number of Questions in each Section Topic' list displays the questions and topics that would be selected in a real FCC test. You can change these numbers if you wish to customize the tests that

NuTest generates by clicking and then editing in the 'number' column. For example, in the Novice test one question is selected from each topic. The Default Numbers button sets the section contents back to the FCC defaults.



On this page you can log and graph your progress in each exam class. Entries in the progress log are automatically saved to a log file. You may add a test result, remove a test result or clear the entire log by clicking on the buttons. The minimum passing grade for all levels is 75%.



The print page allows printing of FCC style tests. The buttons on this page allow selection of a logo for the cover page of the test booklet as well as a file containing text to be printed there. The answer sheet template file contains text intended to be read by the student as well as a form for student details and will appear above an answer grid. The Logo, Facing Sheet Text and Answer Sheet Text can all be customized to your own requirements by editing or replacing the files shown on this page. For example, you can easily modify NuTest to print the name and logo of your local Ham Radio Club!

The Use Serial Number feature allows printed tests to be reproducible. Normally, printed tests are generated using randomly selected questions from the FCC pool files. If the serial number feature is used, then previously printed tests can be duplicated by entering the serial number that appears on the printed test. The serial number of a test is always printed at the top of each page.

The Print button does just that. It starts the printing of a test.

The New Test button allows new tests to be generated for printing without leaving the print page.

Diagrams can be printed on the question sheets alongside the relevant questions or all together on a separate sheet. If they are printed on a separate sheet then only the diagrams needed for the current test are printed.

The Print Preview button allows a printed test to be examined on screen before committing it to hard copy. If this button is grayed out it is because a test is not currently available. Press the New Test button to generate one. During Print Preview there are several controls available:

A set of VCR style controls for moving around the printed test. And a set of Zoom controls. You may also zoom in and out using the left and right mouse buttons. You can select single page layout or double page layout.



Ohms Law for voltage.

E = IR

The voltage "E" across a circuit is equal to the resistance R (Ohms) multiplied by I the current flowing (Amps.).

Ohms Law for current.

$$I = \frac{E}{R}$$

 Π The current *I* (Amps) flowing in a circuit is equal to the voltage E (Volts) across the circuit divided by *R* the resistance of the circuit (Ohms).

Ohms Law for resistance.

$$R = \frac{E}{R}$$

L The resistance *R* (Ohms) of a circuit is equal to the voltage E (Volts) across the circuit divided by *I* the current flowing in the circuit (Amps.).

Power.

P = EIPower, the rate of doing work, is measured in watts. It is equal to the current "I" multiplied by the voltage "E".

Power and voltage.

$$E = \frac{P}{I}$$

Example: A resistor dissipating 10 watts of heat and passing a current of 1 Amp must have a voltage of 10 Volts across it.

Power and current.

$$I = \frac{P}{E}$$

Example: A power transistor consuming 20 watts at a collector voltage of 10 volts must have a collector current of 2 Amps.


Resistance calculations.

Resistors in series:

$$R = R1 + R2 + R3$$

$$R = R1 + R2 + R3$$

Resistors in parallel:




For the special case of 2 resistors in parallel: **R** = (**R1** x **R2**) / (**R1** + **R2**)


Capacitance calculations

The basic unit of capacitance is the Farad. In electronics, capacitance is usually given in microfarads (millionths of Farads) or picofarads (millionths of microfarads). A capacitor consists of two or more conductors (often called the plates) separated by an insulator (the dielectric).

Capacitors in series:



For the special case of two capacitors in series: C = (C1 x C2) / (C1 + C2)



Formula for calculating capacitance from physical characteristics:

$$C = 0.224 \frac{KA}{d} (n-1)$$

Where:

C is capacitance in picofarads.

K is a value that depends on the insulator between the plates. (The dielectric constant.) A is the area of one side of a plate, in square inches.

d is the plate separation, in inches.

n is the number of plates.

Inductance calculations.

The basic unit of inductance is the henry. In electronics, we use millihenrys (thousandths of a henry) or microhenrys (millionths of a henry).

To calculate inductance, use the same formula as in <u>resistance calculations</u>. Substitute millihenrys or microhenrys for ohms.

Physically an inductor is a coil of wire. The coil may be a single turn or part of a turn or it may have thousands of turns. The interior (core) may be air or it may contain iron or iron compounds.


Approximate formula for calculating inductance from physical characteristics:

$$L(\mathcal{A}H) = \frac{a^2n^2}{9a+10b}$$

Where: L is inductance in microhenrys. a is coil radius in inches. b is coil length in inches n is number of turns.

This formula assumes one layer and a core of air. Adding a ferrous core increases the inductance.

The resistor color code.



The resistor below has a nominal value of 4,700 ohms. The stated tolerance of 10% means that the actual value could lie between 4,230 and 5,170 ohms.

Second value digit Tolerance

First value digit.

Multiplier.

First value digit.

In the example shown, the yellow band signifies a "4" as the first digit in the resistor value.

Second value digit.

In the example shown, the violet band signifies a "7" as the second digit in the resistor value.

Value multiplier.

In this example, the red multiplier band means that the value digits have to be followed by two zeros, in other words multiplied by 100.

Tolerance band.

If no tolerance band is present, the stated value of the resistor is subject to a manufacturing tolerance of 20%. In this example the tolerance band is silver. This indicates a tolerance of 10%. The tolerance for this resistor is tighter than the 20% standard resistor. Therefore, it is usually more expensive.

Output peak envelope power.

Output PEP (Peak Envelope Power) of a linear amplifier (watts):

$$PEP = \frac{(PEV \times 0.707)^2}{Load}$$

Where: PEV is the peak envelope voltage (volts), Load is the load resistance (ohms).

Decibel calculations

One S-meter unit corresponds to a 6 dB change in signal strength.

The decibel is used as a measure of the ratio of two powers. It is a logarithmic unit and is used because the human ear has a logarithmic response. For example a one decibel change in loudness of a signal can just be discerned. A ten-fold increase in signal strength is perceived as twice as loud and the following formula is used to obtain a power ratio in decibels:

dB = $10 \times LOG (P2/P1)$ Where P2/P1 is the ratio of the power increase.

If voltages are being compared then the following formula is used instead: dB = 20 LOG (V2/V1)

Some common power ratios expressed in dB:

Ratio	dB
0.1	-10
1	0
2	3
4	6
10	10
100	20
1000	30

The formula shows that one S-meter unit of 6 dB corresponds to a fourfold change in signal strength.

Impedance and reactance.

Impedance is measured in Ohms and is the opposition to electrical flow in a circuit containing resistance and reactance.

$$z = \sqrt{R^2 + X^2}$$

Where: z is the impedance in ohms, R is the resistance in ohms, X is the reactance in ohms.

Reactance is the effect on electrical flow of a capacitor or inductor.

For a capacitor the reactance X (ohms) is given by:

$$X_c = \frac{1}{2 \pi f c}$$

For an inductor the reactance X (ohms) is obtained from:

$$X_i = 2\pi f L$$

Where:

f is the frequency, L and C are inductance and capacitance.

Transformers

To calculate the voltage changes through a transformer we use the turns ratio. The turns ratio is the ratio of turns of wire in the secondary windings compared to those in the primary windings.

Voltage ratio formula:

 $\frac{E2}{E1} = \frac{T2}{T1}$

Where: E2/E1 is the voltage ratio, T2/T1 is the turns ratio.

Transformers are often used for impedance matching.

The impedance ratio (Z1/Z2) of a transformer is given by:

<i>Z</i> 1	$\begin{bmatrix} T1 \end{bmatrix}$	2
$\overline{Z2}$ =	$\overline{T2}$	



RMS voltage

In an AC circuit, the voltage is continuously varying between two extremes (peak voltage). To find the average power over a time interval we must make a correction for the fact that the voltage is not permanently at the peak value. This corrected voltage is called the RMS (root mean square) voltage. The RMS value of an AC voltage is the DC voltage that would produce the same amount of heat across a purely resistive load.

RMS value = (Peak value) x 0.707

(This equation assumes that the AC voltage is a sine wave)

The peak value represents the maximum excursions from zero. It is half the peak to peak value as observed on an oscilloscope.

Antenna calculations.

Cubical quad driven element: Length of each side = (1005/f) / 4 ft. Cubical quad reflector: Length of each side = (1030/f) / 4 ft.

Delta loop driven element: Length of each side = (1005/f) / 3 ft. Delta loop reflector: Length of each side = (1030/f) / 3 ft.

Yagi driven element Length = 472 / f ft. Yagi director Length = 458 / f ft. Yagi reflector Length = 490 / f ft.

In the above formulae the frequency f is in MHz.

Characteristic impedance and standing wave ratio.

For maximum power transfer the characteristic impedances of the transmitter output, feedline and antenna must all be equal. This condition is known as a perfect match and the standing wave ratio (SWR) is 1:1.

SWR = Z1/Z2

Where Z1 is the larger impedance and Z2 is the smaller.

Characteristic impedance of air insulated parallel conductor feedline

$$=276Log\frac{b}{a}$$

Where: b is distance between conductor centers. a is conductor radius

For an air insulated coaxial line the characteristic impedance is given by:

$$138Log\frac{b}{a}$$

Resonance

Resonant frequency (theoretical version):

$$f = \frac{1}{2 \pi \sqrt{LC}}$$

Where:

L is inductance in Henrys, C is capacitance in Farads, f is the resonant frequency in Hertz.

Resonant frequency (practical version):

$$f = \frac{10^6}{2 \, m \sqrt{LC}}$$

Where:

L is inductance in microhenrys, C is capacitance in picofarads, f is the resonant frequency in kHz.

To obtain a value for C at resonance:

$$C = \frac{10^{12}}{4 \, r^2 f^2 L}$$

To obtain a value for L at resonance:

$$L = \frac{10^{12}}{4 \, r^2 \, f^2 C}$$


Half power bandwidth.

Half power bandwidth B:

B = f/Q

Where: f is the resonant frequency, Q is the quality or goodness of the resonant circuit.

Q factor for a Parallel resonant circuit:




Q = R/X

Where:

X is the reactance of the inductor or capacitor. (They are equal at resonance.) R is the effective resistance in parallel with the circuit.

Q Factor for a series Resonant circuit




Q = X/R

Where:

X is the reactance of the inductor or capacitor. (They are equal at resonance.) R is the effective resistance in series with the circuit.

Phase angle in a RLC circuit.



$$Tan\Phi = \frac{XL - XC}{R}$$

Where: Φ is the phase angle in degrees. XL is the inductive reactance. XC is the capacitive reactance. Note:

If XL-XC is positive then the voltage leads the current. If XL-XC is negative then the voltage lags the current.

Power factor

If we measure the true power (as heat) from a reactive circuit it is found to be less that the power calculated from voltage multiplied by current. This is due to the phase angle between the voltage and current. The ratio of true power to apparent power is called the power factor PF.

PF = Cosine (phase angle) = (True power) / (Apparent power)

Amplifier efficiency

Efficiency of RF power amplifiers:

Efficiency = $(RF \text{ power out})/(DC \text{ power in}) \times 100.$

For optimum efficiency in a vacuum tube amplifier:

R = V / (KI)

Where: R is the load resistance in ohms. V is the plate voltage in volts. I is the plate current in amps.

K is a constant:

- 2 for a class C amplifier.
- 1.57 for a class B amplifier.
- 1.5 for a class AB amplifier.
- 1.3 for a class A amplifier.

For optimum efficiency in a transistor amplifier:

$$R = \frac{V^2}{2P}$$

Where:

V is the collector voltage in volts. R is the load resistance in Ohms

P is the power output in watts.

Velocity factor

When constructing filters and impedance matching sections from transmission line, the slowing down of RF energy in the line needs to be taken into account. In parallel antenna feedline the energy typically travels at 80% of its speed in free space; the velocity factor is 0.8. The velocity factor for coaxial cable is around 0.7 and for twin lead it is 0.8. For a quarter wave line the length in feet would be:

L= (984 x velocity factor x wavelengths) / frequency

Where wavelengths in this case would be '0.25' for a quarter wave.

Frequency modulation and deviation.

Deviation ratio = [carrier maximum deviation (kHz)] / [Highest modulating frequency (kHz)]

Modulation index = (Deviation of carrier) / (Modulating frequency)


Time constant

Time constant is defined as the time in a RC circuit for the capacitor to charge to 63.2% of its maximum voltage.

(Or the time in a RL circuit for the current to reach 63.2% of its final value.)

For a RC circuit: T = RC

Impedance of an RC series circuit.



T = RC

Where C is the capacitance in Farads and R is the resistance in Ohms. T is the time constant in seconds.

The impedance Z (ohms) of the above circuit is given by:

$$Z = \sqrt{R^2 + X^2}$$


Where X is the capacitive reactance in ohms. The same formula can be used for a RL circuit, one containing resistance and inductance.

The phase angle of the above circuit is given by:

$$\tan \vartheta = \frac{R}{X}$$

For a capacitive reactance the angle \mathcal{S} will be negative and for an inductive reactance it will be positive.

Impedance of an RC parallel circuit.



$$Z = \frac{RX}{\sqrt{R + X^2}}$$

Where:

Z is the impedance in ohms.

X is the capacitive reactance in ohms.

R is the effective parallel resistance in ohms.

The same formula can be used for a RL circuit, one containing resistance and inductance.

The phase angle of the above circuit is given by:

$$\tan \vartheta = \frac{R}{X}$$

For a capacitive reactance the angle \mathcal{S} will be negative and for an inductive reactance it will be positive.

Polar and rectangular notation.

Polar to rectangular conversion

$$Z \angle \theta = Z \cos \theta + jZ \sin \theta$$

Where
Z is the impedance in ohms
♂
is the phase angle in degrees.
J is a vector operator signifying 90 degree phase shift.

Rectangular to polar conversion:

For a series circuit:


$$R + jX = \sqrt{R^2 + X^2} \angle \tan\left(\frac{X}{R}\right)$$

For a parallel circuit:

$$R + jX = \frac{RX}{\sqrt{R^2 + X^2}} \angle \tan\left(\frac{R}{X}\right)$$

Where X is the reactance in ohms.

Gain of an op-amp.



Gain = (R1+R2)/R1

Noise Power

P = KTB

Where: P is the noise power in watts. T is the absolute temperature. Room temperature is about 290K K is Boltzmanns constant, equal to 1.38 x 10e-23 B is the bandwidth.

Bandwidth and baud rates

T = 1/B where T is the duration of 1 bit and B is the bandwidth in Baud.

For a Baudot transmission: bandwidth = Baud rate + (1.2 x frequency shift) Hz

For a Morse code transmission: bandwidth = (4 x WPM) Hz Where WPM means words per minute.

Gain and beamwidth for a parabolic antenna.

The gain of a parabolic dish antenna is:

$$G = k \left(\frac{\pi D}{\lambda}\right)^2$$

Where:

G is power gain compared to an isotropic antenna.

k is an efficiency factor.

D is dish diameter in feet.

 $\boldsymbol{\lambda}$ is wavelength in feet.

Beamwidth of a symmetrical pattern antenna:

$$B = \frac{203}{\sqrt{10^{\frac{G}{10}}}}$$

Where: B is beamwidth in degrees. G is antenna gain in dB







On these bands the permitted emissions are CW, MCW, phone, image, RTTY, data, SS, test and pulse. Extra, Advanced, General and Technician classes all have privileges throughout these bands.

Extra Advanced and General Class privileges:

1.900-2.000 MHz are available on a secondary basis. Amateur transmissions must not cause harmful interference to other services and have no protection from other operations.

Extra, Advanced and General Class privileges:

CW, RTTY and data.

Maximum power output on 30 meters is 200 Watts PEP. Amateur transmissions must not cause interference to fixed services outside the US.


