The Purpose And Use Of This Help File

The purpose of this Help file is to permit the use and viewing of the new Windows 3.1 ANSI Plus character set. This character set adds characters in positions between 130 and 159. The problem is that different font formats (TrueType, PostScript, and CorelDraw! WFN) and fonts in a given format map these character slots differently. This Help file contains samples of each font format. Click on the sample or the name of the typeface and the font format will display. To use the <u>ANSI Plus Text</u> in this Help file in your favorite Windows application navigate to this page and click the Copy Topic button on the Toolbar. Paste this text into your application and specify your typeface to determine exactly how these character slots are mapped for the typefaces you use. CorelDRAW! users will discover that Version 2.x WFN fonts, Version 3.0 WFN fonts, Corels bundled TrueType and PostScript fonts, and third party fonts map these characters differently. Use your print out to determine exactly what numbers to enter with your specified font to produce a desired character.

This Help file contains special buttons on the Toolbar to make your life easier. You can use the Notepad or Write Button to launch these applications. A custom Icon for your desktop is also included. If you need Help on how to use Windows Help files click the Help On Help Button.

You can re-size this Help Window so it is tall (vertical) and narrow. Position CorelDRAW! or your favorite Windows application next to it. You can also select Always on Top from the Help menu. Navigate to the page in this Help file that contains the type of fonts you are using (<u>TrueType</u>, <u>PostScript</u>, or <u>WFN</u>) and you can determine how the character slots are mapped before you enter text.

Thus, subscribing to this disk service provides readers with automatic updates. In addition, each issue will contain one or more discount coupons for a service or product of value to CorelDRAW users, such as hardware, software, training materials, books, organization membership, etc. These will be run on an unpaid basis as a service to readers. Note that no paid advertising whatsoever will be accepted, to ensure that readers receive completely unbiased editorial coverage.

Editor and publisher Chris Dickman will also make his personal CompuServe number available to subscribers, so they can send support questions directly to him if desired. In addition to being a CorelDRAW specialist, Chris is well known for his years as editor

of Electronic Composition & Imaging magazine, and for a six-year focus on publishing and graphics in the Windows environment. He is the technical editor of Desktop Publishing in Color (Bantam), co-author of ScanJet Unlimited (Peachpit Press) and a contributor to Real World PageMaker: Windows Edition (Bantam).

While the regular subscription rate is \$75 per year (in US dollars for Americans, Canadian dollars for Canadians), charter subscriptions to the Mastering CorelDRAW newsletter are available for a limited time at \$60 (add \$30 U.S. for overseas).
