Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges

GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH AGREEMENT WITH USSR. In April 1989, the Commission on Archival Cooperation of the American Council of Learned Societies and the Main Archival Administration of the USSR Council of Ministers, meeting in Moscow, signed an agreement concerning joint archival projects for 1989-90 that includes the first agreements on cooperation in genealogical research between the two countries.

FUNERAL HOMES are great places to look for records, especially the more recent deaths. They have a deceased's death date, place of death, the birth date and place, the internment date, location of gravesite. They will also have a copy of the obituary, or if not, they possibly will have the name and date of a newspaper where the obit can be found. One may also find military record notices, back history and any organizations to which the deceased may have belonged. Mortuaries and/or the State Board of Funeral Directors have books with lists of funeral homes all over the United States.

GERMAN TERRITORIES--HELPFUL HINT. The Evangelical Lutheran Church Archive of the City of Hannover, Germany indicates that the genealogical origin "Hannover" almost always refers to the kingdom or province of Hannover, not the city of Hannover. Requests are being received to assemble family trees from the classical emigration lands of the 19th century. In over 99% of all cases in which the place of origin of "Hannover" is given, it pertains to the former kingdom, namely some place out of the 4,352 localities in this huge region. They can begin genealogical research there only if the exact name of the place of birth is previously determined, inasmuch as all the church books are found in local churches.

Also, note that the same holds true for other cities whose names correspond to the territory, such as Baden-Baden, Luxembourg, Posen, Braunschweig (Brunswick,) Darmstadt (Hessen-Darmstadt,) Oldenburg, Kassel (Hessen-Kassel,) Nassau, Waldeck and Zweibruecken.

HOMESTEADING BY CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS. Have you wondered why your ancestor who fought in the Civil War acquired his homestead land by living on the land less than five years? A Union soldier or sailor was entitled to a deduction for the five years of length of time (not exceeding four years) of his military service. But he or his widow had to actually reside on the land at least one year before final proof could be made. Riley Co, KS GenSoc Vol 27-4, Nov 1989.

MISSOURI PROBATE RECORDS. Missouri's early probate records were not filmed by LDS because they were in packets. The Missouri State Archives is in the process of microfilming them. If your ancestor died around 1890 when there is no existing census, they are especially useful.

OKLAHOMA LAND SURVEYS. The federal government has turned over the official land surveys of Oklahoma to the Oklahoma State Department of Libraries, which maintains the State Archives. The surveys had been in storage for 100 years; Oklahoma was the only state that did not receive its own land survey records. The original 2,000 plats and 235 volumes have been put on 8,000 microfiche.

PROBING YOUR ANCESTORS' PROBATE RECORDS. Myra Vanderpool Gormley, C.G., gives useful research tools. Know the county because most states organize their probate records by county. States have different names for the courts that handle these records: circuit, county, district, orphans, probate, superior, or surrogate. These courts have county jurisdiction. In Rhode Island, however, the records are kept by town, and the state is divided into probate districts.

Deakins Family -- Colonial to 20th Century

The Town of University Park, Prince George's County, Maryland, is substantially the former Deakins farm. Acquired from the last Deakins in 1920 (284 acres for \$71,000), it was initially purchased by William Deakins in 1758 for 89 British pounds sterling, 15 shillings. William also paid the Lord Proprietor, Frederick Calvert, an alienation fee of 9 shillings. Prior to the Revolution all Marylanders paid annual rents and fees on sales of real property to the Lord Proprietor since they held their properties from him by the feudal tenure of "free and common soccage." (Thus, as many a modern Marylander would wish, at the Revolution the struggle was to oust the landlord as well as for political independence.)

The Deakins property was owned by four generations of that family. The land was part of a vacant tract called "Edminston's Pasture" granted by the Lord Proprietor to Archibald Edminston in 1720. After 1868 the farm was known as "Bloomfield." The house, erected before 1758, is still standing, with much remodeling and adding of a Greek column portico in the 1920s, in the 6400 block of Queens Chapel Road. The house is presently the residence of Maxie D. Phillips, President of PGCGS and her husband Willie. (I have a photograph of the simple straight line farm house before the remodeling.) The Deakins family cemetery, behind the house, now on 41st Avenue, is maintained by the Town.

Confusing to researchers is the record of a "Deakins Hall". This was a separate property, not the Deakins homestead considered in this article. One proof that it was a different property is of a separate chain of title back to Francis Deakins, originally purchased in 1772. A second proof is that, in connection with the life estate of the homestead given to the widow of Leonard Deakins, she was granted the right to obtain wood from "Deakins Hall" if the wood of the homestead was insufficient. This grant also indicates that in the early 19 century the homestead was not well wooded.

The tax and census records reveal that, at one time, about 20 slaves were on the homestead property. (I would like to know where the slaves were buried.) The probate records tell a story of two slaves rented by the Deakins to a person in the District of Columbia. They didn't return at the end of the lease, so Deakins drove into the District, visited them and invited them to return to Bloomfield. There was a most friendly talk but the slaves, then free in the District, adamantly refused to return to slavery. This story is authenticated by written

statements taken of the slaves and filed in the probate papers allowing Deakins an estate deduction for the loss thereof. After general freedom in 1864, some of the former slaves remained to work Bloomfield. According to the Census none of them could read or write. The last survivor of the slaves was Jennie Scott (of whom I have a photograph in 1910.) Another tract of 30 acres, "College Heights", now Ward 5 of the Town, was purchased from the Nesbit-Montgomery families at the same time that the reality developers obtained the Deakins farm but was not incorporated into the Town until 1945. This latter land was derived from the estate of Charles Benedict Calvert now represented by the "Calvert Mansion" or "Riversdale" in Riverdale, Maryland.

The father of the William Deakins (1720-1800) who purchased the farm was John Deakins. There is no record of his coming to Maryland. We do know that in 1698 he bought 32 acres of land for 1200 pounds of tobacco and one ear of indian corn yearly for 99 years. The land was at Mount Calvert, a part of a 1,000 acre tract granted by the Lord Proprietor, Cecil Calvert, to his younger brother, Philip in 1650 on the west side of the Patuxent River below present Upper Marlboro. Philip was the Lord Proprietor's "right hand man" in the early days protecting the Proprietor's interests in many ways, especially against the Cromwellian rebels. Deakins was a planter (farmer) and carpenter (made coffins). He appears in the records of St. Pauls in old Charles Town as an active Church of England man. In 1696, Deakins joined with others in a Declaration opposing the Catholic doctrine of transubstantion. He was a member of the "Rangers of the Frontiers" who fought hostile indians north of present Upper Marlboro. John Deakins died in 1744. His widow, Phyllis, distributed his few assets.

Francis (1739-1804), William Jr. (1743-1798), and Leonard (1748-1824), sons of William Deakins, the purchaser of the homestead, were active and military officers in the American Revolution. Leonard was a Colonel in the "Flying Camp" (1st Maryland Batallion). It was a sort of early Marine Corps which was expected to respond quickly to military emergencies. William Jr. engaged in obtaining military supplies for Washington's army. Later, William Jr. was a member of the Maryland Convention which ratified the United States Constitution — his signature appears on the ratification.

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During the creation of the City of Washington as the nation's capital, the Deakins brothers were into much land speculation. The land records of the District of Columbia show 198 land transactions to which they were parties. William Jr. was one of a committee employed by President George Washington to buy up secretly properties needed for the new Capitol and streets under the L'Enfant plan for the City. Previously, William Jr. had opposed the present location of the Capitol -preferring Georgetown where he had extensive properties. Francis, however, proposed the mouth of the Monocacy River for the capital. (The Library of Congress has an elaborate sketch drawn by him of his proposed site.) William Jr. was President of the Columbia Bank and was instrumental in the erection of a bridge over Rock Creek, now "M Street". He may have been the careless type for there is a record that he lost a winning lottery ticket to some valuable real estate.

Francis is well known for his land surveys in western Maryland. The Maryland legislature employed him to survey the scarcely inhabited lands west of Cumberland into 50 acre lots awarded as "bounty" to the veterans of the Revolution. In 1787-1788 Francis surveyed and laid out 4,165 lots. In so doing he set out the 36.5 mile western boundary of Maryland from the "Fairfax Stone" north to the Pennsylvania border. Seventy years later the U.S. Army Engineers found that the Deakins Line was erroneously turned East, by 3/4 mile at the Pennsylvania terminus. The United States Supreme Court, in 1910, upheld the "Deakins Line", although wrong, because many landowners had relied on it over many years. Thus, the erroneous "Deakins Line" is now the official boundary.

The Deakins brothers acquired large land holdings in western Maryland and Virginia, now West Virginia, the details of which are largely lost because the Preston County, West Virginia courthouse burned in 1868. We do know that one grant was of 6,000 acres in present West Virginia. After Leonard's death, a trustee was appointed to sell the western properties and divide the proceeds among the children in accordance with Leonard's will. Francis and William Jr. are buried side by side in Rock Creek Cemetery, District of Columbia, under flowery epitaphs. Leonard is buried in the family cemetery marked with a D.A.R. standard.

The homestead descended on Leonard Deakins' death in 1824, after a life estate to wife, Deborah (1778-1846), to son, William Francis (1799-1884), and on the latter's

death in 1884 to his children, James (1840-1923) and Elizabeth (1834-1929), the last survivors, who sold it to a reality developer in 1920. (Leonard and Deborah also had eight daughters who settled nearby - a field day for genealogists.) The farm was of a general type -- livestock and crops. A large part was swampland, filled in recent years, known as "Cattail Swamp". James, like his great uncle, Francis, was a surveyor. The Prince George's land records contain many surveys and maps done by him. James' full name was James Richard Heath Deakins, or "J.R.H." as he often signed it. His wife was Mary (1833-1915). They had no children. Around 1910 James and Elizabeth left the farm in the care of several former slaves and their descendants and moved to Alexandria, Virginia. where James died in 1923 after a long illness, and Elizabeth in 1929. Both were brought back for burial in the family cemetery at Bloomfield.

At the Civil War James Deakins evaded the Northern troops and enlisted September 11, 1862, at Charlottesville, Virginia, in the Confederate calvary. He became a Corporal, Company B, First Maryland Battalion, which is proudly noted on his tombstone, followed by C.S.A. On enlisting he furnished a "brown mare" horse which the Confederates valued at \$825. For reasons unknown he was recruited into the Battalion under the name "A.O.S. Lownde". (James' military records are at the National Archives.) The horse was shot from under James at South Mountain while assisting the defense of General Richard Ewell's wagon trains on the Confederate retreat from Gettysburg. He volunteered on the battlefield and was given 20 days leave to find a replacement horse. Shortly thereafter he was captured at Monterey, Pennsylvania. Exchanged on Christmas Eve, 1863, he rejoined his calvary unit and served around Richmond where he was discharged May 5, 1865 at the end of the war. Previously he was reimbursed for the loss of his horse. The records show long stays in military hospitals, both North and South. Apparently he had serious health problems which are not indicated.

Endorsed 28 Mar. 1732, proved by oaths of Thomas EVANS, Mark MCALLOM & Mary EVANS. Pet: DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: An earlier William TENAHILL was executor of David DUNCAN, 1663, in Md [MCW 1:25]. The will of William TENAHILL, 1666, mentions sons William and John, wife Alice, daughter Mary, and an unborn child [MCW 1:84]. He may be the same as William TUNHILL who was a servant transported to Maryland in 1651 [Skordas, <u>Early Settlers of Maryland</u>, p. 472].

Andrew TENNEHILL made a will in Calvert Co, Md, 1693, in which he makes his brother William TENNEHILL an overseer. His other brother John lives in Charles Co, Md [NCW 2:78]. Andrew is probably the posthumous child of William TENAHILL (d. 1666).

William TANNEHILL was a witness in Charles Co, Md, 1697 [MCW 2:152]. William TANYHILL was a legatee of the will of William Hutchison, PG Co, 1708 [MCW 3:212]. William TANNEHILL was a magistrate in PG Co, 1714 [WB 1:73, will of Ralfe WARNALL]. Eupham TANIHILL appears as executrix on the inventory of William TANIHILL, 31 June 1732 [IPR p.179]. She is probably his widow.

A Sarah TANNIHILL (will 1725, PG Co, MCW 5:198), was a daughter of Robert ORME Sr. (will 1722, MCW 4:28). Her husband seems to have

been separated from her by 1713; don't know how she relates to this William. [See PGCGS Bulletin 19:49,51 (1987)].

William TANYHILL (the son) was taxed in Rock Creek Hundred, 1733 [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books (BB):273] James TANYHILL appears as a taxable in Mount Calvert and Eastern Branch Hundreds that year [BB:269,271]. William TANNEHILL a petitioner in Frederick Co, Md, 1751 [BB:706]. James TANNEHILL's will was proved 1780 in PG Co [IPR p. 179].

Pages 206-207. [MCW 6:213] Will of Samuel WARNER of PG Co, planter, being very sick and weak in body. Date: 21 Nov. 1731. To my well beloved son Samuel WARNER one feather bed and furniture, one cow and claf one young mare and my gun to be delivered to him att Item: To my well beloved daughter Sarah WARNER the age of 16 years. one feather bed one cow and [page 207] calf and one young delivered to hir at the age of 16 years. WARNER and Eliza PERSON were married in Queen NOTES: Samuel Anne's Parish, PG Co, 1715 [Barnes, Maryland Marriages 1634-1777, p. The bride was perhaps the same as Elizabeth, administratrix of Francis PERSON in 1714 [IPR p. 147]. Samuell WARNER was taxed in Branch Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:161]. Elizabeth WARNER was taxed there in 1733 [BB:263]. Samuel WARNER witnessed the will of George PASCALL, PG Co, 1711 [MCW 3:195]. Samuel WARNER witnessed the will of Elinor CROSS, Anne Arundel Co, 1719 [MCW 4:22]. WARNER witnessed the will of Anne BARRETT, PG Co, 1722 [MCW 5:106].

The will of James WARNER, Anne Arundel Co, 1673, mentions wife Eliza., sons Samuel, Howard, and Philip WARNER, and dau. Johanna (wife of Henry SEWELL) [MCW 1:81]. James WARNER patented land in Warners Neck, near the Seavern River, Anne Arundel Co, as early as 1651 [Maryland Rent Rolls: Baltimore and Anne Arundel Counties, 1976, p. 193].

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



The Evidence for Royal Ancestry

Past Program Notes - Milton Rubincam, Speaker

The craze for royal ancestry began in the 19th century when many impoverished noblemen abroad married the daughters of very wealthy American businessmen and philanthropists. They needed American money as much as anything to get along. As a result many American daughters went abroad as the wife of a duke or a count, or an earl or other nobleman. The great British statesmen, Sir Winston Churchill descends from one such marriage. In fact he once remarked as a visitor to Congress that if the nationality of his parents had been reversed, he might have gotten to Congress all on his own.

There are numerous pre-colonial hereditary societies in this country. Often the early genealogists for these societies did not really check out the applications they got. As a result some of these applications, which contained horrible errors, were approved for membership. It is the work of the current genealogists to correct these mistakes.

As genealogist for several years of two precolonial hereditary societies, Mr. Rubincam was appalled by the references submitted on the applications he reviewed. He had to turn down the applications of a great many people and made several individuals extremely unhappy with him. They tended to write very sharp letters which accused him of not knowing anything about genealogy.

Indeed Mr. Rubincam acknowledged that he has knocked down several claims of royal ancestry, including those of his own family. However as he has worked and written genealogies about various families he has also built up several claims. Along the way he corrected numerous misconceptions, and various people have also written to him thanking him. That was because now they could began the search for their true line.

Indeed there are numerous books that have been printed purporting to expound on royal descendants that are little better than myth, with absolutely ludicrous lineages included in them. Some

genealogists have been so bold as to trace their lines back to divine ancestors, especially nordic gods, egyptian kings, and fictional characters as well as the more usual nobleman. Unfortunately these claims are enthusiastically accepted by many people who do not know how to do real genealogical research.

Of course, many of our immigrant ancestors have been proven to be of royal descent. Current registrars of most hereditary societies are very strict. They will review the applications and accept or reject on the basis of printed evidence. (One good definition of evidence is 'information that may be accurate, false, or questionable; written or hearsay'). If a registrar returns an application as questionable, but lacking adequate proof to support or reject, further effort is often worthwhile. However these final proofs may be elusive and require researching by hired specialists.

There are some compiled genealogies printed in this century that are fairly reliable. They will list their documentation for each generation. Some are even edited versions of earlier works. However even the best compiled books should not be used as a reference but rather as a guide for further research.

Everyone ought to do their own research on their family line, Mr. Rubincam admonished, and not rely on the questionable work of others. You should endeavor to get all the printed documentation you can on your family, remembering that chronology is something you must always check in any pedigree, as well as historical fact.

Immerse yourself in the time period and location using authoritative histories. And don't be afraid to debunk the work of anyone because undocumented myths serve only to cloud the issues. You must sift through the stupid statements, tear away the falsehoods, and work from the little bits of truth that you laboriously discover where ever they may lead. That is the real work of a genealogist.

VEITCH Family Cemetery

CEMETERY RECORDS OF PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY MARYLAND

Jean A. Sargent, Editor

Located on old National Training (Reform) School property in D.C. next to Ft. Lincoln Cemetery, John VEITCH of Scotland got the property, known as Barbadoes, in the 3rd quarter of 18th Century, and the cemetery was part of the Veitch farm. In 1975 at least 24 graves were moved to Ft. Lincoln in front of chapel - no markers. Frederick S. De Marr, Historian, reported this, and indicated that Dr. VEITCH of St. Mary's County has volumes of family data.

ADAMS Family Cemetery

Known as the Cherry Hill Cemetery in Beacon Heights, this vacant lot on Ingraham Street holds 50 unmarked graves, probably many of them of the ADAMS family. A Josiah ADAMS bought three parcels between 1871 and 1883. He was from a family of free blacks who lived and operated businesses in the Bladensburg, Hyattsville and Riverdale area from 1794 to the early 20th century. The County took over the land in 1978 from a developer for back taxes. The County was unaware of the graves and sold the lot for more than \$20,000 in 1988. Beacon Hgts residents complained so strongly, that the County arranged to buy the land back so that Beacon Heights could maintain it as a park. The cemetery is referred to in an 1884 will; now the only markers are crumbled sandstone.

WHITE MARSH PRIESTS

On the northwest exterior side of the sacristy of old Sacred Heart Chapel in Bowie, there is evidence of the last resting places of two of the priests who served White Marsh in the 19th century. Roughly chiseled on the stone of the church wall is one inscription which reads Edward McCarthy, June 16---. The other reads: Petrus McDermott, S.J. Sacerdos. -- Natus July 27, 1831. Obit July 26, 1877. R.I.P. In the clergy listings of the 1975 church monograph the following info is given:

Father Edward McCarthy, S.J. (died at White Marsh 2/13/1842) Father Peter McDermott, S.J. (died at White Marsh 7/26/1877)

The Boyds of Prince George's County, Maryland

- I) John BOYD, emigrant, first patented 60 acres on the Severn River above Annapolis in 1684. In 1694 he obtained 1,000 acres on the Patuxent River in what is currently Prince George's County. John died in 1704, and his wife Mary followed in 1722, both leaving recorded wills. Their children were: Charles m Elizabeth RAY; John, Jr. m Eleanor FTTZREDMUNDS (28 Mar 1706), Abraham m Mary GREY (16 Oct 1705), Isaac m Susannah NOBLE (18 Mar 1727), Mary m Ishmael BATEMAN, and Martha m Thomas WELLS.
- II) John BOYD, Jr. married once more before dying about 1756. His children of the first marriage were: Benjamin b 13 Jan 1707; and John III b 25 Sept 1709 who m Susanna BALDWIN and moved to Montgomery County with family in Fredrick and Hagerstown. Children of John, Jr. from a second marriage with Susanna were Abraham, William, Eleanor, Mary, Margaret, Marcella, Ann, and Sarah.
- III) Benjamin BOYD who retained the Prince George's property m 30 Oct 1733 to Elizabeth HARWOOD. He died 10 July 1762 leaving a will. His children were: Thomas b 14 Sept 1734, Abraham b May 1736, Eleanor m Stephen WATKINS, Sarah m _____ HARRIS, Peggy m Nicholas WATKINS.
- IV) Thomas BOYD first married 24 MAR 1757 to Charity DUCKETT. He died in the spring of

1797 without leaving a will. His second wife died shortly before 7 Feb 1803. The children of his first marriage were: Edward Duckett m Matilda DUVALL (whose descendants settled in nearby St. Mary's County), Benjamin, Charity Duckett, Washington, Thomas Duckett m Mary MAGRUDER (and moved to Albemarle County, VA), Eleanor G. m Nicholas L. QUEEN (of Washington D.C.), Elizabeth Duckett, and Sarah. The children of Thomas BOYD's second marriage were: Dennis, Jeremiah Lansdale (whose descendants settled in Queen Anne County, MD), William Lansdale, and Henrietta.

[MCW 6:2201 [Nuncupative will of Hickford LEMMON.] about Anno 1706 [I] was familiarly acquainted w't Mr. Hickford LEMMON who departed this life on Sunday 14th May instant 1732. manifold afflictions sent for me. and of late yeares pass his Lodgings particularly five years past enjoined me not to vears past was sent for to visit him under his great affliction and after some discourse of Spirituall matters admonish'd him that if he had not disposed of his temporall Estate he ought now while of sound memory, that his Creditors might know what he owes & to him since he frequently ingaged himself in Law oweing Suits &ca, and that I did not care t.o admit the Sacram't first setled his worldly affairs. In the interim we sent for Neighbors to receive the Sacrament next Morning with him & over Night Lying in the same Rome [=room] I insisted that it would be a great use to himself & executors to declare his Will he beg'd of me insist on that particular of his Will & that next morning he intended to make a Verball Will since he had no Estate worthy to Will & recompense Mr. HAWKINS['] Family trouble, but next morning all Will & all promises vanished altho renewed by me again particularly in or ab't July 1729. William HAWKINS came for me and finding him then in a very low & weak condition I insisted as formerly first on spr'all [= spiritual?] affairs then insisted on a Written or verball will at w'ch he seemed displeased and begg'd of me not to insist upon his making of a will & now being of sound & perfect memory give you according to former promises my reason for delaying of it (says he) that if I make a will I may outlive these two Negroes one of which is not worth much and what else I have is have I must be beholden to mention'd and if I little I spend what lean[?] upon the charity ofMaster John HAWKINS family choose to be silent & be Mister[?] while I live & when He dyes let Mr. HAWKINS take all & little enough for his trouble that if ever I enjov me estate in England shall not be ungrateful to this family for than great trouble renewed the several types to me lately & withall told me that since Jon HAWKINS Junior alter his condition he would do well by him but he would take Geoffrey home with him if he ever lived to enjoy his right Estate & recompense my trouble by taking care of him. [Signed:] Jn'o FRASIER.

[Page 208] May 22, 1732. Then came the Reverend John FRASER and Mr. Joseph NOBLE & made oath on the holy Evangelists that they have heard Mr. Hickford LEMMON (who is now Dec'd) when he was of perfect memory declaird it was his will that when it should please God to



take him hence that Mr. John HAWKINS Senr shou'd have what Estate it should plese God he left behind him. Sworn before Pet. DENT. The Revr'd John FRASER declairs on the oath he has taken that the substance of what is written on the inside of this paper & signd by him is true. Pet. DENT. (5-1/2 sides) [Note: In MCW John HAWKINS Sr. is the only legatee mentioned.]

As early as 1699. Hickford LEMAN was involved in court suits in PG Co [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, 1696-1699, p. 515]. In June 1706, Eliz: LINZEE, aged 21, was registered as a servant to Mr. LEMAN [Smith, Orphans and Infants of FG Co, p.67]. LEMAN was associated with the HAWKINS family as early as 1707 when he administered the estate of John HAWKINS. PG Co [IPR p.92]. Hickford LEMAN administered the estate of Joseph VETTOUR [IPR p.188]. Hickford LEMAN and Robert FRASER were witnesses to the will of Robert WADE, PG Co. 1713 [Will Book 1:72, MCW 3:255]. In 1719, Hickford LEMMON was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred. PG Co. along with John John FRASER was taxed in New Scotland Hundred HAWKINS [BB:164]. Hickford LEMMAN's inventory was filed 28 Aug. 1732. John [BB:157]. HAWKINS as administrator (IPR p.117). Apparently he made his home with the HAWKINS family, but their relationship is unclear to me. 1732 probate on the estate of Hickford LEMAN of Piscatua. Maryland, bachelor, was granted to Daniel COOPER at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, England [Coldham, English Estates of American Colonists, 1700-1799, p.691.

Pages 208-209. [MCW 6:224] Will of Edward DAWSON Senr. of PG Co. planter, being of a sound & perfect mind and memory. Date: 1729. Item: To my dear and loving wife Mary DAWSON during her natural life all that my plantation whereon I now dwell & all the land belonging to the same, if she doth marry to enjoy the third part Also two Negros the one named Sarah the other Peter but if either of them dies I will that she have a Negro Man called Jack in the stead. Item: To my son Edward DAWSON and to his heirs all that plantation whereon he now lives and the land belonging to the same called "Mill Land" containing 214 acres except 50 acres which I give to my grandson John CASH son of John CASH dece'd to him & heirs, to be laid out of the afores'd tract as my said son Edward shall direct and after the decease of my sd wife my sd son Edward to enjoy all the land so left to her or if she mary to enjoy the same, to him and to his heires, except her third part, and also I give to my son Edward three Negroes namely Jack. Peter and Maria to him and his heirs and the future children of the said Maria,

Item: To Mary HARR the wife of William HARR & her heirs lawfully begotten a Negro girl called Sarah and all her future children but if my sd granddaughter Mary HARR should dye without such heres the sd Negro girl and her future children I give to my sd son Edward DAWSON & to his heires the sd Negroes not to be conveyed out of Maryland. Item: To my grandson Edward PERRY son of John PERRY two cows & calves to be delivered to him at the time of my decease. Item: To Mary TRAQUEER the wife of Alexander TRAQUEER the sum of five shillings currency to be paid at the time of my decease by my executrix hereafter named.



Item: To my grandson John CASH son of John deed'd fifty acres out of a tract of land called "Mill Land" to be laid out as before exprest to him and his heires, and two cows and calves to be delivered at the time of my decease by my executrix. Lastly: After my debts & funeral charges shall be paid I give [Page 209] all the remainder of my personal estate whatsoever unto my sd dear and loving wife Mary DAWSON during her life, but if she maries to enjoy the third part of my estate only the remainder to my sd son Edward DAWSON and also after her death to enjoy the whole in case she doth not marry. I make my sd wife my full whole and sole executrix, & in case of her death my said son Edward my executor. Signed: Edw:d DAWSON. Wit: Richard DAINTRY, Nathan WARD, Rich'd DUCKETT.

Proved 28 June 1732 by the oaths of Richard [sic] and Nathan WARD and Richard DUCKETT. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (8-1/2 sides)

NOTES: An Edward DAWSON was transported to Maryland in 1677 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md., p.127]. An Edward DAWSON was an overseer of the will of John WELSH of Anne Arundel County, 1683 [MCW 1:130]. Edward DAWSON's livestock mark was recorded in PG Co, 1696 [Smith, Court Records, p.11]. He was an overseer for the highways, Collington Hundred, 1698 [ibid., p.375]. An Edward DAWSON d. 1704 in Dorchester Co, leaving no son [MCW 5:238]. Edward DOSSON and John PEREY were taxed in Collington Hundred, 1719 [BB:163]. Edward DAWSON [Jr.] and Widow DAWSON were taxed in Collin. Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:265].

Edward DAWSON Junr. and Margaret ALLUM were m. 24 Jan. 1720/1 in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co. The register also shows the births of their children James (1721/2), Mary (1723/4), Edward (1726?), John (1728), Edward (1730), and Margaret (1732). Edward DOSON was a resident of the back part of PG Co, 1739, petitioning that the county be divided [BB:394]. An Edward DAWSON signed a petition in Frederick Co, Md, ca. 1760 [BB:966].

Edward DAWSON Sr.'s daughter Mary m.(1st) John CASH (d. 1726, PG Co. [See his will in MCW 5:231, and PGCGS Bulletin (Dec. 1987) for notes on their children which include Mary CASH wife of William HARR (m. 1727), and six others b. 1712-23.] Mary (DAWSON) CASH m. 2nd (1727) Alexander FRAQUEAR [="TRAQUEER"], Queen Anne's Parish. There was an Allen FARQUHAR in Monocosie Hundred, 1733 [BB:272], but he was probably not the same as Alexander. When Allen d. 1738, PG Co, he left a widow Catren [Catherine], and sons William and Allen Jr. [MCW 8:4; Tracey and Dern, Pioneers of Old Monocacy, p.124].

John and Ann PERRY had the following children registered in Queen Anne's Parish: John (1711), Robert (1713), Mary (1715), Jennet (1722). Edward PERRY was apparently an elder son.

Pages 209-210. [MCW 6:231] Will of Clement BROOKE Junior of PG Co, Gentleman, otherwise said Clement BROOKE of London, Mariner, being at this time of sound and perfect memory and now (by Gods Grace) bound out on a voyage for the City of London aforesaid and calling to mind the incertainty of life as well by sea as land... Date: 31 Aug. 1731. Impr'is I recommend my soul to God and (if I dye on shore) I desire my body may have such decent Interment as my executrix or executor hereeafter named shall think proper. Item: To my dear and



loving wife Mary BROOKE and my well beloved daughter Rachel BROOKE all and singular my real and personal estate consisting of what kind or nature soever to them their heirs & assigns forever, that is to sav I will that my said wife have one moiety of all my land and personal estate afsd to her forever and that my sd daughter have the other part of all my said land and persoanl estate forever without joyntenancy and hereby direct that my Honoured Father Mr. T Clement BROOKE make an equal division between my said wife and daughter in some reasonable time after my decease. Item: Whereas my wife is now bound out with me for London in case of her death before her return to Maryland. I do then give and bequeath all my real & personall esate afsd to my said daughter forever. Lastly I do constitute my loving wife executrix, but in case of her death before her return to Maryland then I make my Honoured Father Executor and to him comit the guardianship and education of my daughter. Clem't BROOKE, Wit: Mary BROOKE, Ann BROOKE, Walter BROOKE, John (I) ORCHARD.

Prerogative Office, 30 Aug. 1732. Then Mrs. Mary BROOKE the exeutr'x within mentioned exhibited this will, that it is the will of her dec'd husband. Before Cha: CALVERT, Com'ry Gen'll.

Prerogative Office, PG Co, 28 Nov. 1732. Then came Mary BROOKE Jun'r, Ann BROOKE, Walt'r BROOKE and John ORCHARD and made oath that they saw & heard Capt'n Clem't BROOKE sign the will. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: For a history of the BROOKE family. see Maryland 1980), v.1, p.91-131. Genealogies (GPC. Clement BROOKE Jr. was the son of Clement BROOKE (1676-1737) and his wife Jane dau. Mary's Co. Md. Nicholas SEWALL of St. Clement Sr. was the son of Maj. Thomas BROOKE (1632-1676) of Calvert Co. (son of Robert [3]. 121. Richard [1]), and of Eleanor, dau. of Richard and origin of Mary, widow of Clement Margaret HATTON. The Jr. is not traced, but she m.(2nd) Dr. Charles NEALE of Frederick, where they lived in 1769 (They lived in Charles Co. in 1750). Rachel BROOKE m. (by 1750) Henry DARNALL of PG Co., and their dau. Mary m. (1768?) Charles CARROLL of Carrollton (ibid. p.105). Rachel (BROOKE) DARNALL in her 50th year [Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, p.242]. Mary BROOKE (widow of Clement Jr?) was taxed in Mattapany Hundred, PG Co. 1733 [BB:276].

identifying them and making the connections in Ireland.

Ms. McConnell has taken many courses at the National Archives, is a teacher for the Montgomery County Adult Education system, and was a guest lecturer at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. She has been a counselor at the Washington, D.C. Temple Family History Center since 1980 (she's there Wednesday afternoons).

Maryland: Crossroads of a New Nation

Past Program Notes - Mary K. Meyer, Speaker

One question fundamental to genealogists is Why did our ancestors move, especially in times when travel was so difficult. If we can decipher that answer we can bridge gaps in our research. Each man had his reason for moving: the grass was greener, or the water was deeper, or the land was cheaper. Perhaps he was seeking religious or political freedom, or he fled from family, crimes, or a depression. As such there were several early migration paths that crossed Maryland:

Eastern Shore - Settlers from England or other colonies in the second quarter of the 1600s first settled on the tip of Virginia's Eastern Shore. As time passed some of these settlers worked their way north across the "border" into Maryland. Circle Path - From the northern part of the Eastern Shore these early settlers rounded the Chesapeake Bay and often continued along the coast down thru mainland Maryland, Virginia, and the Carolinas.

First Religious - Unhappy protestants in Virginia received permission in the later 1600s to settle in Maryland where for a time they were in open rebellion against the king's agent - the Calverts. Second Religious - In the very late 1600s the catholics then in southern Maryland were forced to flee the harsh rule of the Puritans. Disenfranchised, they fled triple taxation north and west into the Frederick area.

Shenandoah Valley - Early settlers from this area of Virginia sometimes moved north thru Harpers Ferry up to Elizabeth Town (Hagerstown) and on into Pennsylvania. There they squatted on Indian lands where they were warned off. Still they remained. Their children later drifted south or west.

Germans, early - The first german immigrants (late 1600s) made their way directly to German Town (later called Philadelphia). As the population there increased (1st quarter of the 1700s) the german farmers and craftsmen moved west seeking open lands. They traveled along the trading path (Rt 30)

into Lancaster, York, and Hanover. Since the border with Maryland wasn't formidable, these settlers also moved south which the Calverts encouraged with offers of free western land and years without taxes.

Germans, late - As this area of central/western Pennsylvania/Maryland also filled up (2nd quarter of the 1700s) more than 100 families from German Town had to continue on down into western Virginia. Traveling south thru the Monocacy River Valley, they forded the Potomac and traveled up river to Harpers Ferry. Entering the Shenandoah Valley, these families and others moved into Virginia and on to more free land. Their descendants later settled in Tennessee, Kentucky, and Ohio.

French, Swedish, and Dutch - Scattered among the Germans in western Maryland are quite a few French descendants who also traveled from Germany. Be imaginative with names to detect this possibility since they were altered to appear first german then american as these families changed nationalities. As the Delaware colony changed hands from Swedish to Dutch to English, expatriots were also offered free land in southern Maryland from Lord Baltimore.

Scotch-Irish - This group traveled the same path as the German immigrants. Unfortunately they were British subjects so no oath of allegiance was required. They usually moved to the extreme frontier where they went years without a church. Devoid of basic records, they are very difficult to trace - more so than any other group.

Quakers & Cecil County - Quakers in the south refused to use slaves. Needing workers one such man advertized in Cecil County, resulting in some movement into western North Carolina. North American Land Company - This British firm obtained extensive land holdings in Genesee County, New York in the very early 1800s. Several western Maryland (Hagerstown) families resettled there.

Over the years Pat assisted our library patrons

with genealogical problems and encouraged new member's participation. She helped type and proof the birth, death and marriage records from *The Prince George's Journal* that we maintained for four and a half years, and she helped pack and unpack the library when we moved from the Belair Mansion to the stables. She gave us four bible records for our collection and worked our Bible Copy Day in May 1989. Still she found the time to share her research experiences with us in a couple of articles in the *Bulletin*.

Now, Pat is leaving the area and the Society but not anytime soon we hope. However she has left the library staff. Her last day was September 19th. We considered having a going away party for her then, but Ivan had a meeting to attend and a number of our regular patrons were not going to be in that day. We thought recognition at the meeting might be a nice way of saying THANKS, PAT.

Some of you haven't met Pat because you can't get to the Library on Wednesdays, but I encourage you to thank her and think of her when you do use the library. You've missed knowing a wonderful person. Pat has been a valued friend and an invaluable asset to the PGCGS library and we will all miss her on Wednesdays. Again THANKS, PAT, from all of us.

Genie Jaunts

Because of our interest in genealogy, we have all gone to many interesting places in the area. We thought others might enjoy them, so we will give them to you as suggestions for day trips (Genie Jaunts) or longer trips (Genie Journeys). Because of Eileen McConnell's talk on Ireland this month, we suggest Brookland, Washington, D.C., formerly Prince George's County, Maryland. The first stop is the beautiful

1. Franciscan Monastery and Gardens, 1400 Quincy Street, N.E. (202-526-6800), a replica of Hagia Sophia in Constantinople built by Emperor Justinian in 537. Don't miss the catacomb tour underneath every hour. Genie: the tablets on the wall just inside the gates contain "Hail Mary" in various languages. The donors' names are inscribed on the tablets. Third opening from the left I found my husband's Irish immigrant's name! [2 hours here]

A five minute drive up Michigan Avenue to a beautiful landmark:

2. The National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, 4th and Michigan Avenue, N.E. (202-526-8300). Go to the office in the crypt church underneath and ask the staff to check for surnames you are looking for. Names of the donors contributing to the building of the Shrine are carved on the walls. Here I found Bob's grandmother's parents' names. They lived in Ireland but donations were made in their names. [2 hours here]

Next door:

3. Library of the Catholic University of America, 620 Michigan Avenue, N.E. (202-319-5488). CU has a center for Irish Studies. There is nothing specifically on genealogy (and they do not answer genealogical questions!), but they have many many books on Irish life, history, politics, etc. It is a huge collection, old old to new, marvelous collection. Ask at the desk for the card file. Credit courses on Irish Studies are also available.

Directions:

Route 50 to South Dakota Avenue North; South Dakota Avenue across Bladensburg Road, across Rhode Island Avenue, past school to Taylor Street; left on Taylor to 14th Street; left on 14th to the top of the hill at Quincy Street; park in the Monastery lot.

Back down 14th Street past Taylor Street to Michigan Avenue; left on Michigan until it blends with Monroe Street. On the right is Catholic University and just past CU is the Shrine. This takes five minutes.

Come out of the Shrine and the entrance to Catholic University is the driveway next door on the left. The library is a big old gray stone building about one block from the entrance.



Book Reviews

Abstracts of Wills, Montgomery County, Maryland, 1776-1825 by Mary Gordon Malloy, Jane C. Sween and Janet D. Manuel. Westminister, Md. Family Line Publications. 1977. 195pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Although Montgomery County was formed September 1776 from Frederick County, the first probated will was 11 June 1777. The 695 wills in this volume have been arranged in alphabetical order and an every name index allows one to easily find others mentioned in the documents. When land was mentioned in the will, the authors have included the pertinent details. Relatively few source records have been published for Montgomery County, and this volume is a welcome addition.

Marriage Licenses Montgomery County, Maryland, 1798-1898 by Jane Thompson Manuel. Silver Spring, Md. Family Line Publications. 1987. 355pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The first book of marriage licenses for this county is missing, so this publication represents the first available licenses for the county. About 8,725 licenses were issued during the hundred year coverage of this volume. The author has arranged the licenses in alphabetical order with double entries so that the names are alphabetized under both the bride and the groom, followed by the date of the In some cases there is also entry for "colored" or "white". The spelling of surnames was often phonetical and the author has greatly helped the reader by providing numerous cross-index references. In the introduction the author points out that beginning in 1865 some marriage returns are available with more complete data and which sometimes include marriages performed by church banns for which no license was issued. The marriage returns are not included in this volume, and are a source that researchers may want to pursue.

History and Roster of Maryland Volunteers, War of 1861-5 by L. Allison Wilmer, J. H. Jarrett, and Geo. W. F. Vernon. 2 Volumes. Baltimore, MD. Press

History and Roster of Maryland Volunteers, War of 1861-6, Index by Martha and Bill Reamy. Westminister, Md. Family Line Publications. 1990. 153pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

This is a compilation of Maryland Union troops, in Volume 1, and the Sailors and Marines, in Volume 2, and is arranged by regiment and company. Most entries show the name of the participant, his rank, date of enlistment and discharge, and pertinent remarks. Detailed histories of the various regiments give some idea of battles in which they participated and the hardships they endured.

The newly compiled index greatly increases the usability of these reprinted volumes.

Inventory of Maryland Bible Records, Volume One by The Genealogical Council of Maryland. Westminister, Md. Family Line Publications. 1989. 131pp. A gift of Evelyn J. Miner.

This inventory includes Bibles that are found in twenty-four different repositories and forty-five publications. Bibles are listed alphabetically under the surname of the principal family or families. This is followed by the date of publication, the year of the earliest birth and marriage, other surnames mentioned, residence of the family and current location of the record. Surnames shown in the Bible, but not listed as the title family, have a separate index. When an entry of interest is found, it will be necessary to contact the depository or secure a copy of the published work, to get transcriptions of the original record. Since early vital records do not exist for many states, Bibles can often provide records not available elsewhere.

Maryland Eastern Shore Vital Records, 1648-1725, Second Edition by F. Edward Wright. Silver Spring, Md. Family Line Publications. 1982. 206pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The vital records contained in these compilations come from a variety of sources. The records vary by county and time period. Some of the records were created at the county level such as court depositions, judgments, proceedings, land and livestock records. Other records were created by religious groups such as the Episcopal parish registers, the Quaker minutes and the Nicholite and Presbyterian records. All provide excellent records to use when official vital records are not available. Each book is indexed and the index notes when duplicate entries appear on a page.

Roster of the Soldiers and Sailors Who Served in Organizations from Maryland During the Spanish-American War by Hugh Ridgely Riley and Charles S. Carrington. Westminister, Md. Family Line Publications. 1990. 72pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The records are arranged by entries of participants in the First Regiment, Fifth Regiment and Naval Militia. Many entries contain only the names of the persons, other entries show muster, discharge, desertion or death dates. All the names have been indexed

Alexandria City and County, Virginia, Deed Book Extracts, Volume 1, 1801-1818 by Patrick G. Wardell. Bowie, Md. Heritage Books, Inc. 1989. 476pp. Purchased by the Society.

Deeds are often one of the best genealogical sources in proving a lineage. When working with original deed books, indexes to grantors and grantees are usually the only finding aids. Sometimes the clues to unlocking a family puzzle can be found in a deed where an ancestor is neither grantor nor grantee.

Transcriptions such as this are extremely helpful because the authors include the names of all persons mentioned within the deed, and then these other names are included in the index. Such is the case with this volume of abstracts, although readers should read the foreword which explains that witnesses are listed in the index only for the first deed in which their name appears. Females are listed in the index both under their maiden and married names, when this information is known.

Quaker Marriage Certificates, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Piney Woods, and Suttons Creek Monthly Meetings, North Carolina, 1677-1800 by Gwen Boyer Bjorkman. Bowie, Md. Heritage Books, Inc. 1988. 185pp. Purchased by the Society.

Although William Wade Hinshaw published these marriages in his first volume of the Encyclopedia of American Genealogy, only the names of the bride and groom were given. Ms. Bjorkman in her compilation, has chosen to include the names of the witnesses who signed the marriage certificates. The original records are available on interlibrary loan from the North Carolina Friends Historical Collection at Guilford College, Greensboro, NC, and the page numbers cited in this transcription refer to the microfilmed page numbers. All names have been indexed allowing the researcher to sometimes locate ancestors that lived in the area, but were never shown as a bride or groom.

Baltimore County Families, 1659-1759 by Robert W. Barnes. Baltimore, Md. Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1989. 924pp. Purchased by the Society.

This volume contains a vast amount of information on numerous families that settled in Baltimore County, Maryland within a hundred year time span. The entries are alphabetical and contain abbreviated data followed by a list of reference sources that can be found in the bibliography. The index contains personal names and land tract names making it a very handy reference tool.

Putting Genealogy to Practical Use

The Maryland State Bar Association is going to Barbados for its winter meeting in January, 1991.

Most Marylanders know about the Arc and Dove and Maryland's settlement in 1634, and some are aware that the two ships were separated shortly after embarking from England but were reunited in Barbados. Very few, however, have heard of the fact that Theodore Roosevelt Island in the Potomac was once called "Barbados".

Admittedly, had I not been researching an immigrant ancestor, Randolph Brandt, I would not have known this either. From the records, we know that Randolph Brandt, a merchant, settled in Charles County from Barbados where he lived for many years and may have been born. In 1681 he acquired a tract of land previously named "My Lords Island" and renamed it "Barbados Island" after his former home. It was sold to George Mason in 1717.

At a recent Maryland State Bar meeting, then President-Elect Seymour B. Stern of Frederick County was discussing a forthcoming meeting with the Ambassador of Barbados regarding arrangements for the reception of Maryland's lawyers in his Country. I learned that no one from the State Bar Planning Committee was aware of the early connection between Barbados and colonial Maryland, nor that Theodore Roosevelt Island had once been called "Barbados".

As would any true lover of Maryland history and genealogy, I took advantage of the opportunity to share my limited knowledge with President-Elect Stern who, being a good lawyer, said "Can you prove that?" I was able to provide him with documents from my personal library to establish these facts which he, in turn, gave to the Ambassador. Interestingly, the Ambassador did not know the early history of the little island in the Potomac, although he was certainly well aware of the ties between his Country and our State in the Seventeenth Century.

At my request the Embassy sent me some pamphlets on Barbados which included a brief history of the early connection between the Island and colonial Maryland. Included was the statement that the Arc and Dove upon replenishing sailed from Barbados to Annapolis! I immediately wrote making the necessary correction, and in turn received a letter of thanks from the embassy.

For those interested in researching records in Barbados, there is a book entitled <u>A Guide to Records in Barbados</u> by M. J. Chandler which is at McKelden Library. The <u>Monumental Inscriptions in the Churches and Churchyards of the Island of Barbados</u>. <u>British West Indies</u> by Vere Langford Oliver has been reprinted giving the explorer a wonderful selection of tombstones to investigate.



Pages 210-212. [MCW 6:233] Will of Marham WARING of PG Co, Gent., being sick of body. Date: 12 March 1730 [1731]. Item: To my dear and loving wife Eleanor WARRING eleven Negros as hereafter mentioned: one Negro Man named Ellick, one Negro Man named Caesar, one Negro Man named Dick, one Negro Woman named Bess, one Negro Woman named Sue, one Negro Woman named Beck, one Negro girl named Nan, one Negro girl named Sue and one Negro girl Mary, to her and her heirs, also my aforesaid wife shall continue on my Dwelling Plantation for the space of one whole year after my Decease and have liberty to work the aforesaid Negros in order to make a cropp thereon for her sole use and benefit and that my Executor shall not trouble or molest her therein.

To my said loving wife liberty after the expiration of the aforesaid twelve months to live on my now Plantation called "Mount Pleasant" and to make use $\circ f$ one half of the Land during her Widowhood with the 48 acres of land I formerly bought of William SMITH and thar [=there] my Negro Carpenters shall build for the said 48 acres one fifty foot Tobacco House and one fifty foot Quarter she finding nails, Dyett [=diet] and attendance and farther that during her widowhood my two Negro Carpenters Hercules and Leander shall at their trade work for her six weeks each every year where she shall appoint them and farther that my Intent and will is that the aforesaid Bequest to her shall not be taken or deemed to be in full for her right of Dower or thirds during her life in those three Tracts of Land now belonging to me the [one] on the Western Branch [Page 211] of Patuxent the other two lying on Zachia [Swamp] in Charles County. Item: To my said loving wife one third part of my Houshold Stuff, Cattle, Horses, Mares, sheep and Hogs which shall be remaining after my decease, also one third of the Plate.

Item: To my Daughter Sarah WARING one Negro Man named Sambry, one Negro Man named Zachby [Zachry?], one Negro Girl named Jane to her and her heirs, also one third part of the remainder of my personal Estate with her share of the Plate after deducting ten head of Cattle old and young fifteen Hogs and Six Ewes which I shall hereafter bequeath.

Item: To my Daughter Ann WARING one Negro Man named Will, one Negro Man named Pompie, one negro boy named Luke and one Negro Girl named Frank, also her proportion of my personal estate and plate after the Deduction made aforesaid which after division my will is that the Negro's, Stock and Houshold Stuff hereby be given to my said



Daughter shall be delivered to Mr. Clement HILL in trust for Her untill she shall arrive at age sixteen years.

Item: To my son Basil WARING and heirs all that tract and parcell of land lying on the Western Branch of Patuxent which I formerly bought of Mr. Thomas BROOKE and is part of "Hearts Delight" Containing 300 acres, and whereas in the aforesaid Deed from said Thomas BROOKE the lines Contains more than 300 acres which I bought, my said son Basil WARING do reconvey to said Thomas BROOKE and heirs the overplus of said land. Item: To my said son Basil WARING and heirs one other parcell which I bought of said Thomas BROOKE not yet conveyed and contains 38 acres, adjoining the aforesaid land and is called "Brooke Land." [Signed:] Marsham WARING.

Item: To my said son Basil WARING one other tract lying near Zachia Swamp in Charles County called "the Indian Field" or part of "Bryan Daley" containing 300 acres, also one other tract adjoining to the same containing 96 acres called "Bryan Daley", to him and heirs. Item: To said son Basil WARING one Negro man named Caceour, one Negro man named Hercules, one Negro man named George, one Negro woman named Moll, one Malatto Boy named Charles, one Malatto boy called Roibin, one Mulatto Boy named Will BULGER, one Malatto girl named Sarah, one Malatto Girl named Cate, one Negro girl named Lucy them and their Increase also one third part of the Houshold goods Plate Cattle Horses Mares Sheep and Hogs except as before excepted.

Item: To my son Richard Marsham WARING and his heirs after the decease or widowhood of his mother that 48 acres of land which I purchased from William SMITH. Item: To my said son Richard Marsham WARING an Negro Man named Philip, one Negro man named Leander, on[e] Negro Woman named Betty, one Negro Woman named Temperance, one Malatto Girl named Margery, one old Negro Woman named Pegg, also the ten head of cattle, fifteen Hoggs and six Ewes which I reserved for him, also his part of the Houshold Stuff and plate Horses and Mares not including any of the Cattle Sheep or Hoggs more than which I have already given him by this my will, but if my said son Richard shall refuse or deny my wife living on the Lands as I have before directed my will is that he shall have no benefit by the bequest before given him but in that case his part of the personal Estate shall be Equally divided between his Brother and Sisters.

Item: To Mr. Peter DAVIS five pounds sterling. Item: To old Negro Sarah at "Mount Pleasant" ten pounds [Page 212] Currency and do hereby order my Executor to set free and discharge her from any further Servitude. Item: This present cropp of tobacco be shipt to Great Brittain on the Risk of my Estate to pay and discharge my debts then and if there remains any overplus when my said Debts are discharged there that the money be equally divided between my wife and children and further my will is that the Negroes remain on the Several Plantations they now are on untill the next Cropp of Corn and tobacco be finished and then to be equally Divided as also the houshold Stuff Plate Cattle Horses Sheep and Hoggs at the same time according to the intent and true meaning of this my will, and I further desire my good friends Mr. Clement HILL and Mr. Charles SEWELL to take up on them the trouble to see the same performed.

Lastly I appoint my said son Richard Marsham WARING whole and sole Executor. [Signed:] Marsham WARRING. Wit: Ann WATTON [WALTON?], Ja: HADDOCK, Clement HILL Junior, Ja: H. WARING.

Prerogative Office, 20 Oct. 1732, came Ann WATTON, Clement HILL Junior and James Haddock WARING and made oath that they saw Marsham WARRING sign & seal the will. Before Cha: CALVERT, Com[missa]ry Gen[era]ll. (14-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The WARING family is outlined in Effie Bowie, Across the Years in Prince George's County (1946), p. 597-616. Marsham WARING (ca. 1680-1732) was the eldest son of Basil WARING and his second wife Sarah MARSHAM. Sarah MARSHAM was the daughter of Richard MARSHAM of PG Co (d. 1713). Basil WARING (ca. 1650-1688) of Calvert Co, Md, was the only son of Capt. Sampson WARING (1617/18-1668) who came from Shropshire, England, to Maryland ca. 1646.

Marsham WARING m. (1st) ca. 1705, Henrietta BOARMAN, dau. of William BOARMAN and Jane NEALE. He m. (2nd) Eleanor, dau. of Clement HILL Jr. (1670-1743) and his wife Ann, dau. of Henry DARNALL. The widow Eleanor (HILL) WARING m. (2nd) Col. Leonard HOLLYDAY who d. 1741 in PG Co [MCW 8:135]; she m. (3rd) Dr. MURRAY of Cambridge, Md. In 1946 a portrait of Eleanor (HILL, WARING, HOLLYDAY) MURRAY was in the possession of Miss May Hill at "Pleasant Hills," PG Co.

The children of Marsham and Henrietta WARING: Richard Marsham WARING (ca. 1706-1743) m. Elizabeth HAWKINS and had issue; Sarah WARING [living 1743, unmarried]; Basil WARING (1711-1793) m. twice and had issue. Marsham and Eleanor WARING had: Ann WARING (b. ca. 1723) m. (1st) Thomas HOLLYDAY and (2nd) William COOKE, had one son by second husband [Bowie, p. 599-601].

Marsham WAREING was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred and Patuxent Hundred in 1719 [BB:160, 162]. In 1733, Eleanor WARING was taxed in Mattapany and Western Branch Hundreds [BB:263,276]; Richard Marsham WARING was taxed in Patuxent and Mattapany [BB:266,276]; Basil WARING was taxed in Western Branch [BB:263].

Pages 212-213. [MCW 7:18] Will of Thomas CLAGETT of PG Co, being very sick and weak. Date: 26 Jan. 1732 [1733]. Item: To my son Richard CLAGETT and heirs all that tract of land called "Huntington" lying near Rock Creek in the County aforesaid containing about 300 acres which said land I purchased of Thomas FLETCHALL deceased. daughter Elizabeth PRATHER and heirs 150 acres lying Item: near the Beaver Dam Branch in PG County. Item: [Page 2131 Sarah CLAGETT and heirs the remainder part of the tract aforesaid lying near the Bever Dam aforesaid being 150 acres in case the tract aforesd. Lying near the Bever Dam aforesaid should not contain 300 acres it to be equally devided between my Daughter Elizabeth PRATHER & Sarah CLAGETT, their heirs or assigns, be the quantity more or less.

Item: To my two sons John CLAGETT and Charles CLAGETT and their heirs the remaining part of a tract of land called "Clagetts Purchase" after my son Thomas CLAGETT has 200 acres laid out for him according to my deed of gift lately executed, to be equallly divided between the aforesaid John CLAGETT & Charles CLAGETT and heirs, being about 570 acres.

Item: To my loving wife, her heirs and assigns, all that tract called "Strife" containing about 300 acres, which I purchased of Hugh

RILEY, the said land to be sold by my said wife & the purchase money to be added to the creditt of my personal estate. Item: To my loving wife Mary CLAGETT one third part of all my personal Estate of what kind soever after my just debts are fully satisfied and paid and the legacy hereafter bequeathed.

Item: To my daughter Sarah CLAGETT one feather bed & furniture. Item: To my three daughters the remaining part of my personal estate after satisfaction made as aforesaid & my funeral charges paid & their mothers thirds & my daughter Sarahs Legacy taken our (vizt:) my daughters Martha CLAGETT, Margarett CLAGETT & Ann CLAGETT. Lastly my loving wife Mary CLAGETT to be whole and sole executrix. [Signed:] Tho: CLAGETT. Wit: Charles BEVAN [MCW: BEAVAN, BEAVIN], John CLAGETT, Jeremiah BERRY, Richard KEENE.

Proved 27 March 1733 by the oaths of Charles BEAVAN, John CLEGETT, Jeremiah BERRY and Richard KEENE that they saw Capt. CLEGGIT the deceased testator sign. Before Pet. DENT, Dty. Com'ry of PG Co. (7 sides)

NOTES: Bowie [op.cit., p. 118-150] also presents the CLAGETT genealogy. Capt. Thomas CLAGETT (ca. 1677-1733) lived at "Weston," near Upper Marlborough (the mansion destroyed by fire after the Revolution). He was the son of an earlier Capt. Thomas CLAGETT (ca. 1644-1703) who came to Calvert Co, Md, from England ca. 1670, and married ca. 1674 Mary, widow of Richard HOOPER. The son (the testator) m. Mary KEENE (d. 1759). They are both buried at "Weston." Their children: Thomas CLAGETT Jr. (ca. 1702-1737) had issue

[MCW 7:230, his wives and issue are confused in Bowie].

Elizabeth CLAGETT apparently m. Thomas PRATHER and had children registered in Queen Anne's Parish including Thomas Clagett (1726), Richard (1727), Margaret (1728), Mary (1729/30), Basil (1731), Henry (1732), James (1735/6), Sarah (1739). [There was a contemporary Thomas PRATHER Jr. with wife Elizabeth, and a John Smith PRATHER also with wife Elizabeth.]

Sarah CLAGETT d. 1737, unmarried [MCW 7:221]. Martha was unmarried in 1737 [ibid.]. I don't have later record of the other daughters.

I have not traced Richard CLAGETT, the second son. He is apparently not the Richard CLAGETT whose estate was inventoried in Nov. 1753 in PG Co, with Lucy CLAGETT as administratrix. Bowie says that man was a son of an uncle Richard CLAGETT Sr. of "Croome," (ca. 1681-1752) whose executor was a son named Samuel [Bowie, op.cit., p. 130; IPR p.41].

John CLAGETT, third son (1713-1790) m. (1739) Sarah MAGRUDER; their children are registered in Rock Creek (Prince George's) Parish [Bowie p. 123]. Charles CLAGETT, fourth son, is not traced by Bowie, other than being mentioned, 1741, as a bondsman with John CLAGETT for Ann CLAGETT (executrix of Thomas CLAGETT Jr.) [Bowie, p. 122]. He may be the Charles CLAGETT in upper PG Co. in 1742 [BB:454] and in Frederick Co. 1751 [BB:705-706].

Treasurer: Josephine Beagle. Audit of Financial Records, FY 89-90, completed by Mrs. Louise Reep; report submitted to President Maxie Phillips, and published in October *Bulletin*. A new Auditor is needed for next year. Corr. Secretary asked to write letter thanking Mrs. Reep.

Newsletter expenses will be at least \$550 higher to pay for assembling newsletters, previously done by Walt Silvester. Council voted for using balance in publishing reserve (\$514) toward that expense. Records Chairman has already used \$46.36 more than the budgeted \$150 for our new project (paid out of publishing reserve). Membership approval of publishing costs of Gasch Funeral Records only needed after we actually have an estimate from a company.

Programs: the budgeted \$400 is being spent by Program Chairman to pay for speakers. Money will be collected at meetings to pay for refreshments, rather than using Program Committee funds. Discussion of refreshment monies and how to handle them. Membership: Elise Jennings. Discussion of membership vs subscriber status following letter from a former member. Special Publications: All remaining fragments of Probate Records passed on to Virginia Heyerdahl by Jim Reep.

Records: Diane Stultz. There are some restrictions on amount of information that can be used for the Gasch Funeral Records project. And it must have low-impact on the normal business operations of the company when Diane and a minimum number of assistants schedule (in advance) work sessions. Diane is also researching possibilities for designing and having pins (lapel) made for members; subject will be brought up at a meeting to sound out general interest, if any.

Education: Dorothy Rainwater. Beginning November 1, the PG Co Memorial Library will accept scheduling requests for 1991. Dorothy will plan our next Beginners' Seminar WHERE a room is available, possibly in southern county. Our own meetings are booked through December.

Library: Ivan Rainwater. Our Society Library continues to be busy on Wednesdays and will need a new volunteer to replace super-helper, Pat Curran. The Society occasionally receives donations, sometimes for specific uses, sometimes not. Handled accordingly.

Queries: Jean Sargent. We accept queries from non-members also - perhaps they will later join; if published, they may be useful to others researching PG Co. Corresponding Secretary: Carole Begenwald. We have 1 or 2 *Bulletins* returned by Post Office each month, NOT READDRESSABLE but billed to us. Discussion of best and/or least expensive ways to handle.

The 27 October meeting of the Genealogical Council of Maryland features afternoon talk on society newsletters by George E. and Donna Valley Russell; if neither of our Co-Editors can attend, perhaps another representative of our Society can. Regarding Bible Records. They already have enough for a second volume. Churches/Ministers Project, by Edna Kanely, will still gladly accept more contributions, any time frame, even after cut-off date.

Past President: James Reep. He will begin "Tailgate Genealogy"/Beginners' Table sessions before the next 3 membership meetings, and will appreciate helpers. He will jot down some questions brought up to forward to Barbara O'Neill for possible use at December Question & Answer program.

Other items of Council business brought up at 3 October regular meeting and published in those minutes.

Treasurer Josephine Beagle announced that the 1989 Financial Statement and Audit were published. September disbursements of \$947.71 exceeded receipts of \$661.20 by \$286.51. Balances: checking account \$3108.57, savings account \$9509.31; total \$12,617.88.

Barbara O'Neill, 1VP/Programs. Anne Arundel Co Gen/Soc welcomed us to attend their Tour/Research Day at the Peabody Library in Baltimore next Saturday. Our December program is Answers to Genealogical Questions by Experts: Milton Rubincam, Mary K. Meyer, and Eileen McConnell. Barbara requests written questions before the meeting to make best use of their time. In November Eileen McConnell will speak on Irish research through LDS resources.

Elise Jennings, 2VP/Membrshp, notes that including our newest members tonight, we have a total of 433. However, we must remain current. Names of anyone who has not paid their dues for this year will be dropped next month. Virginia Heyerdahl brought copies of all our Special Publications to the meeting. Diane Stultz, Records, reported that work on the first four books of the Gasch Funeral Records is progressing slowly. She needs one or two more volunteer readers to work mainly in the afternoons.

Dorothy Rainwater, Education announced coming events. She has some information sheets and schedules for viewing. Co-Editor Rose White checked to see if everyone had received their *Bulletin*, which Walt Silvester mailed. Meade Hanger, Computer Interest Group, invited everyone to the first meeting of this PGCGS self-help group on Thursday, October 11 at the library.

Pat Cramer reported that our Bible records (184) are kept at the Society Library along with their every name index, except for a few records she is working on at home. These files also contain some associated miscellaneous items. The names in our Bible records have been included in the Genealogical Council of MD's publication.

Past President James Reep, our delegate to the Genealogical Council of MD, has revised their by-laws and presented them to our society for our approval. The biggest changes concerned committees: identification and description of their jobs and responsibilities. Approval voted. The GCM serves as a clearing house for all genealogical organizations in the state; anyone can attend meetings; and anyone becoming an associate member can receive their newsletter, "The Coordinator". Their Oct 27 meeting at Westminster, Carroll County was announced.

The Federation of Genealogical Societies, a nationwide organization to which we also belong, announced new and much higher dues for 1991 based on ability to pay: \$75 for us, up from \$20 since 1981. Karen Miles paid additional tribute to Pat and summarized her work. Karen also promised a new Accession List soon; she is still working on re-cataloging our books to the LC system. Visit the Library to see books by the night's speaker, including the 1990 supplement to Passenger Lists and the new "Who's Who".

Before closing the business meeting, Maxie Phillips thanked those who signed up for committees and those who brought tonight's refreshments. We have a new Hospitality Chairman, Leola Kyle, and she has a committee. Attendance: 98.

The speaker, Mary K. Meyer, prefaced her talk with a few announcements and invited us to the new Anne Arundel Co Gen/Soc Library near Linthicum, on the corner of Hammonds Ferry Road and Poplar Avenue, at the NE corner of BWI Airport, and also to their meetings the first Thursday of each month. Mrs. Meyer spoke on "Maryland: Crossroads of the New Nation."

Using Mormon Resources For Successful Irish Research

To do any successful research in Irish Records you must know the name of your immigrant ancestor, you must know his or her parents' names (so you can identify them when you get into the records), you must have some idea of when the immigrant was born or married (or when some other notable event was left on a record) and most important, you must know the place where your immigrant ancestor lived.

Most Americans (with Irish ancestors) have some family tradition as to the county in Ireland but that is not enough information to get you into local records. Even if someone in the family has a letter from Ireland it has been a problem to identify the place name at the top of the letter. The 1851 *Index to Townlands of Ireland* identifies and will help you locate any of the 6200 "townlands" (the smallest administrative taxing units) in Ireland. By using Mormon Records you can pinpoint on a map, the location (in the Irish County) of the townland where your ancestors lived. Once you have that, you can search local records.

For religious reasons the Mormon Church has microfilmed public records all over the world. In 1950 records were copied at the Public Records offices in Dublin and in Belfast. (Belfast records start 1922/23. Prior to that all records were held in Dublin). The Family History Library Catalog (FHLC) records are catalogued starting with the major administrative unit - Ireland - and then proceed alphabetically so that records are broken down in each county into civil parishes.

There are 9 fiche sheets for Ireland alone in the FHLC. Browse through the entire set but be certain to stop at **Bibliographies:** Mayers, Richard J. *Manuscript Sources of Ireland* (published family histories - also at the Library of Congress), Land and

Property: Appitoment Books (major census substitute indexed by Griffiths Valuation), 1708 Registration of Deeds (and leases), and Estate Books (annual tenant lists for big estates) and Military Records: (physically these are in England but you can find them with Ireland in the FHLC).

Ireland's census records (starting 1821) were badly damaged by a fire at the Dublin Records office in 1922. Therefore substitute records must be used to locate family names and to pinpoint the townland for your immigrant family. Griffiths Valuation, completed 1848-1862 to provide tithing lists for the Church of Ireland shows all persons living on the land in each townland and county. This listing will help locate the family in the townland and the researcher can then move to civil and church parish registers. Civil registration of births, deaths, and marriages started in 1864. In Catholic parish churches, records started about 1830; Protestant churches started in 1845. The Morman Library, Kensington MD has many Irish records - including Griffiths Valuations in their permanent collection. Other records can be ordered from Salt Lake.

It is fun to stand at a desk in the office of the Register of Deeds on Henrietta Street in Dublin and research your Irish ancestors. But you can be a lot more comfortable using a microfiche reader at the Kensington Mormon Library - just off the Beltway here at home. And tour time is expensive time so plan well and do as much research as you can before heading for Ireland.

SCOTTISH RITE TEMPLE OF FREEMASONRY
HOUSE OF THE TEMPLE OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL
LIBRARY OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL

This beautiful building is a John Russell Pope copy of one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World - the Temple at Halicarnassus. Built as a tomb in 350 B.C. by the wife of King Mausolus, its fame became so widespread that his name became associated with tombs giving us the word "mausoleum."

The temple is housed inside the thirty-three columns, thirty-three feet tall, that are seen from outside, with a ceiling 100 feet high.

Two large sphinxes guard the entrance to this center of Freemasonry with a series of 3-5-7-9 steps leading to the massive bronze doors which open into a marble atrium. The chairs and lights are copies of those used in 300 B.C. The wide marble staircase ascends in a great sweep to the temple above.

A guide will answer the door and take you on a grand tour ending with the library of the Supreme Council with over 175,000 volumes. GENIE - I turned in two names of my ancestors who were Grand Masters for information on them, but I haven't heard anything yet.

Here you will find everything you ever wanted to know about Free-masonry with separate libraries of Robert Burns (poet), Abraham Lincoln and Goethe.

You will also find a life mask of Lincoln and an embroidered flag of the Supreme Council that Buzz Aldrin took to the moon. Presidents George Washington, Lyndon Johnson and Harry Truman were all 33° Masons.

The Archives accessions, maintains, preserves, and makes available for use state and selected local government records. It has no nongovernmental records. Military records are subject to confidentiality restrictions for seventy-five years from termination of service.

1900 CENSUS INDEX TO MILITARY. Along with the 1900 Federal Census, a census was taken of all US military personnel, including those stationed overseas and those on US naval vessels. If you have been unable to locate someone on the 1900 census, try using the Soundex to National Archives Microfilm T-1081, rolls 1 through 32.

<u>OLD HOTELS OF MECHANISVILLE, MD</u>. Articles and pictures of Hayden Hotel (closed in 1941 & now a private home;) Allen Hotel in service from 1928 to 1954; Burroughs Hotel (closed down about 1915;) and Ark and Dove Inn which ceased operation in 1942. Three of these buldings remain and can be seen traviling Old Route 5 through Mechanicsville. St. Mary's Co. HistSuc Qurly, Vol 38-3, Fall 1990.

HOMESTEAD PAPERS. Secure the legal description of the land from the recorder of the county in which the land is located. Send description to Bureau of Land Management office for the state in question, requesting a copy of the patent (a charge will be made.) To obtain the Homestead papers, write the National Archives & Records Service, 8th & PA, NW, Wash., DC 20408. Include name of person filing patent, legal description of land, patent number and date, and land office of issuance. You will be billed when the record is found & upon receipt of payment, your papers will be sent. These papers often include a copy of a naturalization record, names of witnesses to the homestead proofs, occupation, address, and other interesting information. Book Reviews

Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland 1774-1777 by V. L. Skinner, Jr. Westminster, Md. Family Line Publications. 1988. 121pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Maryland's Prerogative Court records contain information on the testamentary proceedings, wills, administration accounts, and inventories for the whole state. For the purposes of this book, the author has apparently abstracted only those items that were inventories. The entries are arranged as they appear in Libers 119-126, and include the name of the decedent, a code for the county, the value of the goods listed, the date of the inventory and date of it's approval, and the names of appraisers, creditors, next of kin, executor/administrator, and other names of interest. All of the names have been indexed.

Eastern Shore Mortality Schedule 1870 by Janet Wilson Riley. Silver Spring, Md. Family Line Publications. 1985. 59pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Mortality Schedule of the Eastern Shore of Maryland by Janet Wilson Riley. Silver Spring, Md. Family Line Publications. 1986. 53pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Most genealogists are aware that mortality schedules were taken with the census in the years 1850-1880. Since the National Archives made a decision at one time, not to keep these records, the originals, where they exist, have ended up in numerous depositories. Locating the records and accessing them has been a problem, so researchers are always happy to see abstracts appear. Both of these volumes have been indexed, but only to the surname, making them slightly tedious to use.

Maryland Eastern Shore Vital Records 1801-1825, Book 5 by F. Edward Wright. Silver Spring, Md. Family Line Publications. 1986. 126pp. A gift of Robert Stewart. The author has used the religious records of twenty different sources to compile this volume. The majority of the records were parish records of the Episcopal Church or Monthly Meeting Records of the Quakers. Because these are religious records and not civil, they may also contain information on residents of the surrounding states. These records help fill the gap in the period before vital records were kept. Both first and last names have been indexed.

Registrations of Free Negroes 1806-1863, Prince George's County, Maryland by Dorothy S. Provine. Washington, D.C. Columbian Harmony Society. 1990. 216pp. A gift of the Columbian Harmony Society.

As noted in previous book reviews, this non-profit organization, distributes its publications to selected research facilities and copies are not available for sale to individuals. Three different sources were used to compile this volume, the county clerk's freedom registry, 1806-1829, the freedom registry kept by the Register of Wills 1820-1852 and the loose "affidavits of freedom" that were received by the Register of Wills 1810-1863. Many of the free blacks of Prince George's County are tied to families also found in the records of the District of Columbia. Most entries include the name of the person, date of registry, age, and physical description. Some entries contain considerably more information of a very helpful nature. The index is not to page numbers. but instead to part and registration number. Entries are underlined if they are to the registrant, not others mentioned in the document, which can be a helpful feature.

Presbyterian Cemetery Records (Georgetown), Washington, DC, 1856-1897 by Paul E. Sluby, Sr. and Stanton L. Wormley. Columbian Harmony Society. 1990. 213pp. A gift of the Columbian Harmony Society. Publication is not available for sale.

The District of Columbia's Register of Deaths begins

in 1855, and then was discontinued 1861-65 during the Civil War. Cemetery records such as these, can fill in some of this gap. According to the introductory material, there is indication that some persons, not members of the congregation, were buried on the cemetery grounds. The last interment was in March 1887, and as the condition of the cemetery began to decline, a few years later in 1891 advertisements were placed in a local newspaper advising families they could remove remains to other burial grounds if they so wished. The records in this volume are photocopies, not abstracts, of the original book, and include interments and notices of disinterment, often with a notation as to the cemetery where the remains were to be placed. Some pages contain blots, faint areas, or torn Following this, there are some portions. miscellaneous records and also typed pages showing lot and grave owners taken from a plat of the cemetery. The index contains surnames only.

The Maryland Gazette 1727-1761 by Karen Maurer Green. Galveston, TX. The Frontier Press. 1990. 324pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

A good genealogist knows that important information can often be found in newspapers, however they are very time consuming to check, so abstracts such as this are extremely welcome. During the time period covered in this book of abstracts, the Maryland Gazette was the only newspaper in the state, and Annapolis was the activity hub. During 1734-45 the paper ceased publication and a few other issues are missing, so the reader should take this into consideration. As with all abstracts, it is important to read the foreword, in this case a page called "Important Information", to know just what guidelines were used. All personal names, places and subjects have been indexed so one can easily make use of the vast amount of useful information in this book.

Genealogical Abstracts From Tennessee Newspapers 1791-1808 by Sherida K. Eddlemon. Bowie, Md. Heritage Books, Inc. 1988. 380pp. A gift of Dorothy Rainwater.

Genealogical Abstracts From Tennessee Newspapers 1803-1812 by Sherida K. Eddlemon. Bowie, Md. Heritage Books, Inc. 1989. 239pp. A gift of Dorothy Rainwater.

Newspapers are an especially important source in Tennessee research because there is no census record for the state until 1830, thirty-four years after its establishment. The author has abstracted material from eight different Tennessee newspapers in her first volume, and from seven different Tennessee newspapers in her second volume. Although the material has been indexed, it is an index to surnames only, making it less useful than the volume, previously mentioned, compiled for Maryland newspapers.

Davidson County, Tennessee County Court Minutes 1783-1792 by Carol Wells. Bowie, Md. Heritage Books, Inc. 1990. 257pp. A gift of Dorothy Rainwater.

County court minutes contain a wealth of information but they are often an under used source because the originals contain little or nothing in the way of indexing. It is therefore very exciting to find an abstract of the records. Court records are often one of the few records where mention can be found of ancestors who did not own land and did not have enough in the way of worldly goods to leave a will. The author cautions the reader that names are often spelled in many ways and that handwriting was often difficult to decipher, so that it is important to be on the look out for many different possible spelling combinations when using the index that includes both first and last names.

Notice posted in the Eastland County Courthouse, TX: "No chewing or dipping of tobacco while working with records." (Seen within the last decade.)

[&]quot;A while ago, a party of Lynchers down South, postponed the hanging five minutes to allow the victim time to finish smoking a cigar. This proves that the use of tobacco prolongs life." Staunton Spectator and General Advertiser, VA, 11 Dec 1877.

Item: The estate of my disceased husband Mr. Date: left sole executrix of as much of y't [=that] ROZER whereof I was Estate as shall remain after all just debts are comply'd with be kept apply'd by executor hereafter named to the sole use & 2141 dearest children Catherine, benefit of mv [Page Elizabeth ROZER as their Father's will orders & appoints but in consideration that by Mr. ROZERs will nothing certain is left my daughters Catherine and Elizabeth but only a share of personal estate after debts pay'd therefore I do order that out of my thirds & the profits of my administration on the said estate a certain malatto woman named Nancy & her son Jack be given unto my daughter Catherine w[he]n my said daughter [comes] of age or on the day of ROZER marriage as also I do order that out of the aforesaid profits a Negro woman Bess & her son Bob be given unto my daughter Elizabeth ROZER w'n the said Elizabeth comes of age or on the day of her marriage. I do further order that in case of death of either of my daughters before they are of age or marriage then the surviving daughter shall enjoy her sisters legacy given by y's [=this] article.

Item: I desire that my son Henry ROZER be sent to Europe there to be educated as my executor hereafter named shall think proper and that 100 pound for his school &ca be allotted out of his part of the personal estate my legacy to his sisters only being first deducted. Item: If any part of this estate be taken for debt due from it Betty COOK and her five sons Charley Tom Peter Ned & Robin as allso the malatto woman Nanny & her son Jack & Bess & her son Bob be last reserved & kept on the plantation until my children Catharine Henry & Elizabeth ROZER come of age or marry as aforesaid. Lastly I appoint my loveing brother John WHETENHALL of St. Marys County, phisician, executor of this will & trustee & guardian to my beloved children Catharine Henry & Elizabeth ROZER. Signed: Elizabeth ROZER. Wit: Henry WHETENHALL, Jane (IC) CRAYCROFT.

Proved 3 May 1733 by oath of the Reverend Henry WHETENHALL, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com[missa]ry, PG Co. (6 sides)

NOTES: Mrs. Elizabeth ROZER was the widow of Notley ROZER of PG Co. (1673-1727). For a discussion of Notley ROZER's parentage and marriages, see my notes following his will in the <u>BULLETIN</u> v.20, no. 2 (Oct. 1988), p. 20-21. His family is also described in Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, p.571-574. In his will [MCW 6:36], Notley



ROZER does not mention daughters Catherine and Elizabeth by name. Elizabeth is probably the "unborn chld" referred to in his will. She m. by 1750, George SLYE [Margaret Fresco, Marriages and Deaths of St. Mary's Co. Md, p.256]. Catherine was apparently born shortly before Aug. 1725 when she was named a goddaughter in the will of William CHANDLER of Charles Co. Md. [MCW 6:167]. Henry was born ca. 1722, as he was about 6 in Sept. 1728 [Bowie p. 572].

As shown in the above will, Elizabeth ROZER the testator was the sister of Dr. John WHETENHALL of St. Mary's County. I have not found a record of her ancestry, but a "very accurate WHETENHALL pedigree in Harleian MSS 1548, fol. 121," might be worth examining. It concerns a family of Hextall's Court, East Peckham, Kent [Maryland Genealogies, G.P.C., 1980, 2:444]. In the 1733 tax lists of PG Co, Dr. John WHITENHALL and Henry WHITENHALL are shown in Upper Piscattaway Hundred [BB:268].

Henry ROZER lived in Piscataway Parish, 1776, aged 51; his wife Eleanor was 42. She was the daughter of Edward NEALE (1704-1760) of Queen Anne's Co. Among their children was a son Thomas Whetenhall ROZER, whose forenames may be a clue to the name of Elizabeth (WHETENHALL) ROZER's father [Bowie, p.572]. Father Henry WHETENHALL, S.J., a witness to the will of Elizabeth ROZER, must also be close kin. He was stationed at St. Inigoes in St. Mary's County in 1734; he later returned to England, where he died 27 May 1745 [Edwin Beitzell, The Jesuit Missions of St. Mary's County, Md., 1976, p.57].

Pages 214-215. [MCW 7:18] Will of William HARBIN of PG Co, yeoman, being sick in body. Date 25 March 1733. [Page 215] Item: To my son John HARBIN one sixt part of a parcel of land being part of a tract of land called "the Gleaning" lyeing on Goose Creek content 300 acres (viz) fifty acres to him and his heirs for ever. Item: To my second son William HARBIN one sixth part of [same]. Item: To my third son Elisha HARBIN one sixth part of [same]. Item: To my fourth son James HARBEN one sixth part of [same]. Item: To my fifth son Joshua HARBEN one sixth part of [same]. Item: To my fifth son Joshua HARBEN one sixth part of [same]. Item: To my sixth and last son Edward Willias HARBIN one sixth part of [same]. In case any of them should die without children eather one or more then his or their parts to be divided equall amongst the other that survyes [ssurvives] them.

rest of Allmy moveable goods and chattles to be Item: the equally divided amongst them my six sons and three daughters [daughters not named] for to have one ninth part (viz.) everyone to have one equall part of them. Item: My well beloved wife may have dwelling plantation dureing her naturall life and I further desire that my bodey may be buried at the church as nere as possably to the seat or pew where I used to sett in without unnecessary charges. I further appoint Mary HARBIN my well beloved wife my whole Signed: William (and sole executrix.) HARBIN. ALLISON, Ann (+) YOUNG, John FLINT.

Proved 14 May 1733 by oaths of John ALLISON and Ann YOUNG. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (8-1/2 sides)

NOTES: William HARBIN witnessed the will of Eliza. BLANDFORD, PG Co, 1709 [MCW 3:167]. In 1733 Mary HARBIN and John HARBIN were taxed in Rock Creek Hundred, PG Co. [BB:274].

The following children of William and Alice HARBEN were registered in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co: John 1711, Margaret 1713, Johanna 171 $\underline{6}$, William 171 $\underline{8}$. William and Alice HARBIN had the following children registered in Prince George's Parish (including some re-registered): John 1711, Margaret 1713, Johanna 1715, William Jr. 1717, Elisabeth 1720, Elisha 1722. William and Mary HARBIN's Joshua 1726, James 1727 [Edward not children registered there: registered]. William HARBIN was elected a church warden 1726 when the Prince George's Parish was formally established [Louise Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, p.84].

In 1758/9, petitioners from Prince George's Parish, Frederick Co, included Edw'd HARBIN and John HARBIN [BB:942]. About 1760, John HARBIN and Elisha HARBIN were residents of Trinity Parish, Charles Co, Md. [BB:1010]. A census of Bryan Town Hundred, Charles Co, 1775-78 includes John, Allen, William and Elisha HARBIN [Gaius Brumbaugh, Md. Records, 1:311].

James HARBIN was a juror in Frederick Co, 1762 [BB:1242]. His will in Montgomery Co, Md, 1778, names wife Eleanor, sons Joshua, Gerrard, Elias, William, and daughters Mary, Dorcas, and Ann ELLIS [Malloy, Abstracts of Wills, Montgomery Co, Md, p.59].

Joshua HARBIN m. 1753 Elizabeth RAY in Prince George's Parish and had: Elizabeth 1761, John 1765. Edward and Lidia HARBIN had Virlinder 1765. John and Elisabeth HARBIN had William 1763. Edw'd Villers HARBIN signed an oath of fidelity in PG Co, ca. 1778 [Brumbaugh, 2:258].

A Johannah JONES d. 1743 in PG Co. Her will dated 1738 mentions grandsons John and Lisha sons of Johannah HARBEN [MCW 8:197]. John and Elisha HARBIN are probably meant, but their mother's name was an error in transcription; perhaps their sister Alice. Possibly was referred to. Johannah JONES also mentions son Johanna HARBIN George, perhaps the George JONES who was administrator for George JONES Sr. in PG Co, 1729 [IPR 109]; Johannah possibly widow of George A Joanna HARBEN witnessed the will of Thomas ALLEN, JONES Sr. Charles Co, 1729, but had died by 1735 when the will was probated [MCW 7:154].

A Capt. Francis HARBIN witnessed the will of Andrew ABINGTON, 1691, county not stated (possibly Calvert Co.) [MCW 4:234]. Francis HARBIN sued Thomas EDMONSON in PG Court, 1697 [Joseph Smith, Court Records of PG Co. Md, 1696-1699, p.161,167,247,258]. A Will HARBURNE was transported to Maryland in 1665 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md, p. 207]. These may be related to William HARBIN.

Pages 215-216. [MCW 7:26] Will of Frances HOYE [MCW: also HAY] being sick and weak of body. Date: Dec. [blank] 1732 [MCW: 8 Dec. 1732]. Item: To my three children (viz) Dorsett, Isaac & Margaret niece Ann BUCHANNON or to the surviver or survivors of either of them one moiety [=half] of all the meat that shall be found killed in the house after my decease also twelve nbarrels of corn and half the wheat and three bushels of salt. And I desire that my son in law Char<u>ls</u> BEVAN take under [Page 216] his care the aforesaid four children for w'ch service I give and bequath to the sd Charles BEVAN one Hogs[hea]d of good tobacco q't [=containing] six hund[re]d w[eigh]t and six bushels of corn beans ye sd tobacco to be apply'd towards cloathing ye sd children. Item: To my daughter Margarett



and to my niece Ann BUCHANNAN and to the survivor of either of them one negro man called Sambo. Item: To my daughter Margarett and my niece Ann BUCHANAN one feather bed with an oznaburgs cover. To my daughter Mary one bay horse now in my possession hav'g but one To my daughter Ann one new feather bed the tick bound Item: round together with new rugg, 1 new pair of blanketts, one pair of new sheets and two pillows. Also I give one new black trunk to my aforesd daughter Ann. Item: All my geese to the sd Ann and Mary To my sd son Isaac a large iron being about forty in number. Item: grey mare ab't three years old branded with IH. Item: To my daughter Martha eight barrels of sheld [=shelled] corn and fourteen crape [=crepe] now in my house as well as all the feathers now in my house and those Likewise on the geese at time of my death. residue of the personall estate accord'g to the purport and design of my late Husb[an]d Paul HOYE dece'd his will and I do hereby nominate my son in law Charles BEVAN sole executor. Signed: Tho's HODGKIN, Tho's DORSETT, Ann () HARRIS. (FH) HOYE. Wit:

Proved 2 June 1733 by oaths of Thomas HODGKIN, Thomas DORSETT and Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Paul HAYE was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co, 1719 The will of Paul HOYE was made and proved 1727/8 in PG Co, naming eldest son James, sons Dorset and Isaac, and daughters Mary, Margrett, Anne and Martha, and an unnamed wife [MCW 6:56].

Frances HOY was the daughter of John and Ann DORSETT was proved 1711, naming daughter John DOSSETT] [as Frances HOY [MCW 3:204-205]. Will of Ann DORSET of PG Co, 1721, mentions grandsons Dorset HOEY and James HOEY [MCW 5:57].

James HOYE was taxed in Mattapany Hundred, 1733 [BB:276]. inventory of James HOYE deceased was filed by Thomas DORSET, 1739. Dorset HOYE's inventory was filed by Cephas HOYE in 1786. [IPR p.101]

Charles BEVAN must be the husband of either Mary or Anne HOYE, probably Mary, the daughter most likely to be old enough; they were apparently married between 1728 and 1732. He was taxedCalvert Hundred in 1733 [BB:269]. The inventory of Charles BEVIN was filed in PG Co, 1762, with Rebecca BEVIN as executrix [IPR p.18]. The Ann HARRIS who witnessed the will may perhaps be the testator's other daughter; or she might be the same as Ann (DORSETT) HARRISON, sister of the testator. Thomas DORSETT was the testator's brother. Niece Ann BUCHANAN is probably the daughter of a sister of Frances The only sister whose marriage I have not accounted (DORSETT) HOY. for is Mary DORSETT, unmarried in 1721.

Maryland Tax Records of the late 1790s and early 1800s. What exists varies by county with the 1783 records being the most complete. In particular check two resources: the book *The Manuscript Collection of the Maryland Historical Society* (which holds numerous tax records) and the publications of the Maryland State Archives that list their complete holdings by county (two books for each, one listing original papers, the other listing microfilm copies).

Legal procedures for a bachelor with real property and debts dying intestate after the Revolution in Maryland. No one can force probate except an heir or a creditor of the estate. One of these usually wants to administer the estate and, in

agreement with the family, they would go down and petition the court. The court definitely looks to the family (a brother, sister, or other close relative) for an administrator. Only if there was no family willing to serve would the court look elsewhere for an administrator. — There is no formal law whereby Maryland as a state would takeover the property if there were no heirs. However under British colonial rule the entire situation would be different.

Locate information on a Baptist minister. [This answer also applies to other unique groups.] There are several (Baptist) Historical Societies in various states and regions. Refer to The Directory of Historical Societies and Like Agencies in the United States and Canada published by the American Association for State and Local History.



Genealogical Forum

[Our December meeting featured a panel of experts answering questions posed by our members. Our special thanks go to Milton Rubincam, Mary K. Meyer, and Joyce Candland for being our ready references. A summary sampling of the evening's discussion follows.]

How can we help the family of genealogists as a whole? Join a genealogy (or historical) society in your area. Support their efforts in publishing and education. Volunteer at their library indexing, compiling, or keeping it open another day. Visit your county courthouse and state archives, and abstract an original work there - even a small one would help. Compile your own family records and history. Deposit them in a library. This may seem overwhelming but just do one family unit at a time until you are finished. Follow the example of other good genealogies if you need help.

What is the minimum amount of acceptable proof? There is no minimum. Check all sources possible, then document and cite each one, especially if they are contradictory. Don't feel you must decide the correct one and ignore the others. Always go back to the actual primary source - you just can't rely on abstracted records. Certainly continue to work until you feel confident you won't be unpleasantly surprised later by someone else.

Cross cultural research. Remember that in some countries mail is not guaranteed delivery, and mail from the United States may be mistrusted or purposely lost. However there are genealogical societies in most countries that you can contact for assistance. Check with the LDS to see what records they have already copied in that location. That country's embassy can explain procedures and suggest a translator or even a researcher in that county. Contact a University language department for translating assistance. Buy your own dictionary and a grammar text for the language involved.

Loose Papers. Every courthouse, indeed every area therein, has papers that have been received and not recorded. Accumulated over the years there may

be several boxes of them. They are always hidden in an obscure corner or shelf, safely out of the way of the workers. The custodians of these records will discount their importance because of their unknown content. Be polite but insistent and go through these papers piece by piece after searching the standard collections. You may find Wills, or Guardianship papers -- who knows what! In fact make a point of familiarizing yourself with everything a depository holds before beginning your research. You may learn of unique offices, series of records, or special indexes. Remember to look into the nooks and crannies, the attic and the basement. Be patient, let the custodians get to know you, and learn their rules. Eventually you will get the privilege of searching out records others might not realize exist.

Identify the original source of the IGI entry from its batch number. With every entry on the LDS's International Genealogical Index is a batch number which tells how that name got into the The batch numbers have a separate microfiche index where you will find their input source number which is the microfilm number of the actual material entered. If the batch number is all digits, an individual submitted that information and you will be led to their name and address. (Generally the first two digits indicate the year the information entered the system starting with '69.) If the batch number begins with a letter like C for christening or M for marriage you will be led to the original primary source document. Now if you search the IGI using the computer and its new Compact Disk - Read Only Memory (come to the January PGCGS meeting for more on this) the source will be given to you by pushing one extra button.

Social Security Death Index. LDS has gotten this and placed it on computer CD ROM. The system is being tested at the library in Salt Lake and will be at our LDS center sometime next year. If one of your ancestors received a social security number you may be able to get quite a bit of genealogical information using this system.

Genie Jaunt

Provincial Prince George's County, Route 450

Marietta - on Bell Station Road off Rt 193 (Greenbelt Road/Glenn Dale Blvd/Enterprise), just north of Rt 450. Built in 1812 Marietta was home to Comptroller of the Treasury and US Supreme Court Justice, Gabriel Duvall - a descendant of the Mareen Duvall family of PG and AA counties. Take the tour of the house, see the gravestones, then GENIE visit the library of the PG County Historical Society that is housed there. The library is only open 10-4 on Saturdays.

Belair Mansion - on Tulip Grove Drive in Bowie. This National Historic Landmark built in 1740 has been home to four governors. It is currently closed for renovation but park your car and walk around the building to the true front side and admire the view of Washington. Walk down to visit the family graves in the far right corner. GENIE - This is the regular home of the Prince George's Genealogical Society Library.

Belair Stables and Museum - on Belair Drive in Bowie. Called the "Cradle of American Racing" this National Historic Landmark was also built in 1740. Go through the archway and then right. The temporary home of the Prince George's Genealogical Society Library is behind that door. Before you go in the library walk down and look at the stables. Two Triple Crown Winners lived here. The door at the end is the Museum Shop. Browse, then back to GENIE - the library which is open Wednesdays 10-1.

Old Sacred Heart Church - on Rt 450 just west of Rt 3 (Crain Hwy/301). Built in 1740 "Whitemarsh" was the church home of John Carroll, first Catholic bishop of the US, who had been born in PG Co. (Thomas Clagget, first Episcopalian bishop was also a native of PG Co.) Go in the church, visit the back (oldest) graveyard, and take the Stations of the Cross walk through the woods. ["Priest's Bridge" is on Rt 3 just north of Rt 450.]

RIP's Restaurant - Rt 301 and Rt 197. Time to break for some good food. As you go in, check the names of the horses above the booths/"stables". They are all winning champions from Belair.

Directions: From the Beltway, take Greenbelt Road (Rt 193) east.

From Rt 50 take 197 north to Rt 450. West on Rt 450, then north on Rt 193.

Marietta - Look for the brown signs. Bell Station is a tiny but well marked road about 200 yards north of the juncture of Rts 193 and 450. Turn west on Bell Station and the entrance to Marietta is almost immediate. As you leave turn right on 193 to 450, then left on 450 and go into Bowie. Continue on Rt 450 across Rt 197 until you come to the light at Belair Drive. (There is a big parking lot on the left for the Bowie High School and Library.) Turn right onto Belair Drive. Go about 0.8 miles. Turn right onto Tulip Grove Drive which is just before the large parking lot on the right. Up the hill on the left is Belair Mansion. Then it's back down to stop at that parking lot you saw on Belair Drive. The Belair Stables are across the street. Now back to Rt 450 and turn right. Go a little more than a mile and Sacred Heart Church is on the right. Drive back into the woods to get to the old church. Lastly, take a right on Rt 450 to 3/301, and right on 3/301 to RIP's down at Rt 197.

Ponderings

So your going to put your genealogy on your computer. For the Computer Minded Here's Something To Think About.

If you own a computer or you are thinking about buying one then you should be concern about what type of insurance protection is provided under your household insurance policy. Is your entire computer system covered or just certain equipment?

Some policies cover your computer equipment up to a certain dollar amount automatically but it is best to check and see just what is exactly covered. Your coverage may be just for the PC equipment or personal computer and in many cases it will not cover your peripheral equipment i.e. printer, expanded memory board, mouse, scanner, etc. A policy should clearly state what is covered. Some policies do not cover commercial software and will pay only for the replacement of the disk and not the program.

If it's not in writing, it is not covered. Make sure you understand your policy. Because what's written will take precedence over what your agent promises. Remember even on policies that have built in protection you may need additional coverage. You will need an endorsement setting forth the items covered, amount of coverage and the deductible. Make a list of your complete system and attach your receipts so you can determined the full cost of your system. You will also want to make a complete list of all the commercial software you have purchased and attach the receipts.

Questions to ask about your coverage:

Full Replacement - will it pay for replacement value of my entire system or a depreciated figure based on time of ownership.?

Is there a deductible?

Most policies only pay for the present value of your system with no substitutes allowed. Example the system that cost you \$3,000 in 1984 can be purchased today for \$900. Thus, you would only be allowed the \$900.

All risk policy will pay for damage caused by anything except for events that are specifically stated in the policy. All risk may cover losses from power surge or equipment malfunction but excludes damage caused by "Act of God".

What is the companies definition of "Act of God"? Is a power surge which is caused by lightening an "Act of God"? These are questions you need to ask of your insurance agent. So don't plow alone blindly thinking that everything in your system is covered, ask questions, find out and get it in writing. Don't forget to check with your agent each time you upgrade your system. It's bad enough to lose the information that is stored in your computer. You don't need the additional shock of inadequate coverage to replace your system.



CEMETERY FOLLY AND FACTS

Never, Never, take tombstone inscription books as complete and correct records when searching for ancestors in cemeteries. I learned this fact first hand on a recent trip to Wilmington, Ohio.

My Nathan and Patience Hines were Quakers who eventually became Hicksite. The Genealogical Committee of Clinton County Historical Society, published a book, "Cemetery Records of Clinton Co., Ohio." Nathan and Patience Hines were not listed in this book so I felt they must have been buried elsewhere.

Since I had other ancestors buried at Center Meeting Cemetery, just outside of Wilmington, Ohio, my husband and I drove out to take a picture of that place. Quite by accident while walking through the cemetery I spotted my Patience Hines buried next to her son Jesse Hines, who was listed in the book on cemeteries of Clinton County. Further searching paid off when we discovered Nathan Hines stone leaning up against a tree and still in good condition. Finding these stones was very exciting, now I wanted a record of them.

At this point I learned another lesson the hard way. The stones were not easy to read and since they were so old we were afraid the camera wouldn't be able to pick up on all the printing. What to do? We went back to town and purchased chalk. It was surprising how much the chalk enhanced the writing on those two stones. We took pictures using a flash, but to make sure I would get all the information from the stones we improvised, using an old archery target, luckily we had stored in our truck, and using a pencil we were able to make rubbings of those old stones.

An interesting problem arose as a result of finding those stones. My family bible states that Nathan Hines died in 1853 at the age of 98 years. But his headstone says he died, 25 da 3 mo 1858 at age 88 years. The camera leaves no doubt that the year was 1858. It did pay off to take pictures but the rubbings paid off as well as the rubbings were able to pick up some of the letters and numbers better than the camera on parts of those old headstones.

The lesson learned from all of this--never take books that publish cemetery records as complete fact. Always check those cemeteries out personally. Second, always take a camera with a flash and a kit with chalk, paper and pencil. Because I had left my camera in our trailer one day, I missed getting pictures of another cemetery where some of my ancestors were buried in Warren County, Ohio. That left me the only alternative of writing all the information on paper. I hope I didn't miss anything. A picture would have been a better record of my visit.

The information that should have been on Roll 477 was never microfilmed and all the original source material was destroyed after microfilming.

TRANSLATION HELP AVAILABLE. Michael Larusso of the Chicago-Europe Language Center, 180 N. LaSalle St., Chicago, IL (312-276-6683 states that the Center can translate any language for a minimum fee. If one has old letters written in another language, the Center can translate them at a cost per page. If planning a trip abroad to visit a long lost relative, the Center can also assist in making a telephone call to the non-English speaking relative to set up the final details of the trip. Pages 216-217. [MCW 7:26] Will of William WELCH of Rotherhithe in the County of Surry, Marriner belonging to the Ship the Thomas & Margaret. Date: 12 Oct. 1716 and in the third year of our Sovereign Lord George. Item: All such pay, wages, sum and sums of money, goods, chattels and estate due to me I give to Martha my loving wife and her assigns. She to be sole executrix. Signed: William WELCH. Wit: Tho. MITCHELL, J. KNELL [MCW: T. KNELL], Sam. CHANDLER, N.Pub:

[Page 217] Endorsed 26 June 1733. Martha WELCH delivered the within will of William WELCH of PG Co, decd, and made oath that she never knew of any other will. The will being executed in Ingland there is no evidence [=witness] to be had here to prove the same. Sworn before Pet. DENT, D[epu]ty Com[missa]ry. (3 sides)

NOTES: Will. WELCH was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:160]. Judging from his will, William WELCH was an immigrant who left no children (though an heir might have been born after 1716). In 1733, Widow WELCH was taxed in Mattapany Hundred [BB:276]. The inventory of William WELSH was filed 2 July 1734 by Martha WELSH [IPR p.197].

Page 217. [MCW 7:26] William YOUNG of PG Co, very sick and weak in 11 May 1733. To be buried in such like decent order Date: and manner as my beloved wife shall think to be convenient. The 500 [MCW: 300] acres lying at the Eastern Branch of Potowmack to be divided equally between my 2 sons William and James YOUNG. My dwelling plantation whereon I now live to my beloved wife Mary YOUNG during her naturall life and after her decease to my son Peter YOUNG. Item: To my son Peter one Negro boy called Pompey and one girl called Pegg. Item: To my beloved wife Mary YOUNG all the rest of my personall estate to be disposed of as she sees convenient and make my beloved wife Mary YOUNG the whole executrix. (W) YOUNG Sr. Wit: David ROSS, Christopher (CT) THOMPSON, Abigaill (%) TENT.

Proved 27 June 1733 by oaths of David ROSS, Christopher THOMPSON and Abigall TENT. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'r of PG Co. (4 sides)

NOTES: William YOUNG was taxed in Patuxent Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:266]. He may be the William ---- shown on that hundred's list for 1719 [BB:162]. In 1696, William YOUNG of St. Mary's Co, planter, late of the "sherifdum of Drumfrees [=Dumfries] in the parish of Wester Kirk of Eakdaile" in Scotland, bought 300 acres in PG Co. from George and Margrett PLOWDEN: Two tracts formerly in Calvert Co, in the freshes of Patuxent River on the main branch of western branch, were called "Thorpland" and "Perry Hills," but are now called "St. David" [PG Deeds A:161]. This is roughly the same area in which the testator lived. William YOUNG appears in PG Co. court several times 1696-98 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699].

The will of Mary YOUNG, 10 Apr. 1742, was probated 25 Aug. 1742, in PG Co, mentioning daughters Jane and Elizabeth, son Peter, grand-daughter Mary (daughter of son William), and daughters Eleanor and Sarah LEMAR. Son William was executor. [MCW 8:178]

The will of a William YOUNG was proved in PG Co, 1760 [IPR p. 209]. (Wills of other William YOUNGS were filed in 1779 and 1792.) The will of Peter YOUNG was proved in 1776 in PG Co [IPR p.208]. The inventory of a James YOUNG was filed 29 Nov. 1733 by William YOUNG. Another James YOUNG's will was proved in 1757 [ibid.]. Sarah LAMAR was appointed administratrix of John LAMAR Jr. in 1758 [IPR p.113].

St. James' Parish register, Anne Arundel Co, Md, shows the marriage of William YOUNG and Mary BISHOP, 8 Jan. 1706 [1707 N.S.], which may be the same couple. No children are recorded there, an indication they may have gone to live in a different parish.

Page 217. [MCW 7:31] 26 June 1733. Andrew TANNEHILL made oath on the holy Evangelists that a certain John STREET late of Prince Georges County dec'd did when he the said STREET lay on his death bed send for him the sd. TANNEHILL & when present with the sd. STREET told him the sd TANNEHILL that he desired that Mr. George BRAL [MCW: BEALE] might have the care of his the sd STREET's son Francis STREET & the said STREET falling a sleep soon after he the sd TANNEHILL was resolved to wait his waking to inquire further & when he the said STREET waked out of his sleep the said TANNEHILL asked him what he meant by what he had told him before he fell a sleep weither Mr. George BEAL should have his son & his effects as adm'r & be a guardian to his son or otherways or words to that purpose & the sd STREET made answer it was his desire that he the said BEAL should be his adm'r & have his son a guardian. Sworn before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry.

NOTES: Ninian TANNIHILL and George BEALL were taxed in Rock Hundred. PG Co. 1719 [BB:158]. BEALL and Andrew George TANYHILL were taxed in in Potowmack Hundred, 1733 [BB:2731. STREET was not found in the tax lists. In 1703, John STREET and his son John received legacies from the will of John SUMERS of PG Co [MCW The younger John STREET would be about the age to be our testator. SUMERS' will implies he is a grandson. Perhaps he was still under age in 1719; if so, probably b. between 1698 and 1703. No probate has been found for the elder John STREET (d. 1703/19?).

They are probably related to a Francis STREET, a resident of Patuxent River, whose will was proved 1677 in Calvert Co, Md, in

which he mentions no one but a wife [MCW 1:191]. Francis STREET was transported to Maryland in 1664 and 1672. A John STREET was transported in 1673 (from Va.), 1674 and 1677 [Skordas, <u>Early</u> Settlers of Maryland, p.445].

In June 1733, Mary STREET, widow, bound her son Francis STREET, aged 10 on 20 Feb. next [b. 20 Feb. 1723/4] unto George BEALL until age 21, to be taught to read [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co. 1696-1750, p. 100].

Francis and ---- STREET had dau. Priscilla 1760; Francis and Mary STREET had sons William Beel [sic] 1763, and Jonas Lewis 1764, registered in Prince George's Parish (lay in PG Co. and Frederick/Montgomery Co). Francis STREET presented a bill to Frederick County court, 1764, for burying an Indian found dead in Capt. George BEALL's wheatfield [Rice, This Was the Life: Excerpts from the Judgment Records of Frederick Co, Md, 1748-1765, p. 263]. Francis STREET and family can be found in the 1790 census of Montgomery Co, Md, p.89: 3 males over 16, 2 under 16, and 3 females.

Col. George BEALL (1695-1780) m. Elizabeth BROOKE, dau. of Col. Thomas BROOKE (c.1659-1730/1) and his first wife Anne [Maryland Genealogies, 1:99-100]. George BEALL, captain of a troop of horse, Md. militia, 1738-1752, was a son of Col. Ninian BEALL (d. 1717) [Compendium of American Genealogy, 5:203]. George BEALL d. March 1780 in Montgomery Co, leaving sons George and Thomas BEALL, and a daughter Elizabeth EVANS [Malloy, Abstracts of Wills, Montgomery Co, Md, 1776-1825, p. 7].

George BEALL is too young to be Mary STREET's father. George's father Ninian BEALL (b. ca. 1625?) in his will, 1717 [1718 N.S.] does mention a granddaughter Mary BEALL, dau. of deceased son Ninian, who would receive part of "Bacon Hall" at her marriage. Mary STREET was married shortly before 1724. Could she be the same person?

Pages 218-219. [MCW 7:26-27] Will of William SRLBY of PG Co, planter, being sick and weak in body. Date: 18 Oct. 1732. To my son William Magruder SRLBY 200 acres part of the tract I bought of Mr. Joseph CHEW called "Chews Folly" lying on the fork of the Easter Branch in PG Co. aforesaid to him and heirs.

Item: To my son Samuel SELBY 200 acres part of the tract I now live on called "Leith" to be laid out at the west part thereof by a line drawn cross ye land so as to include the improvements that have been made on that part thereof to him and his heirs. In case of his decease without issue the same to be equally divided between my sons Joseph[,] Thomas and John SELBY and to remain to them and their heirs, and in case of either of their decease the same to be divided between the survivors.

Item: To my son Joseph SELBY 100 acres part of the aforesaid tract called "Leith" to be laid out between the upper and lower parts thereof by a line drawn cross the land to him and his heirs. But in case of his decease without issue the same to be equally divided



between my sons Thomas and John SELBY and their heirs.

Item: To my son John SELBY 200 acres the remaining part of "Leith" lyeing next Patuxent River being that part whereon I now dwell, to him and heirs, he permitting his mother my dear and loving wife Elizabeth SELBY peaceably & quietly to possess and enjoy the same during her naturall life with the improvements thereon provided there be no waste or destruction by her or her order made of any part thereof but in case of his decease without issue the same to be divided between my sons Joseph and Thomas SELBY and heirs, they permitting their mother the liberty aforementioned.

Item: To my son Thomas SELBY all that tract called "Essex Lodge" adjoining to the land I now live on and containing 150 acres, to him and heirs, but in case of his decease without issue to be equally divided between my sons Joseph and John SELBY and heirs.

Item: To my son Nathan SELBY all that tract called "Toogood" lying on the west side of Patuxent River in the woods the same which I formerly bought of my brother Samuel SELBY, to Nathan and heirs.

To my son Samuel SELBY one feather bed and furniture and one iron pott to be delivered to him when my execu'x shall be I appoint my loving wife Elizabeth SELBY requested thereto. Item: full and sole executrix. Lastly I appoint my friends John MAGRUDER and Thomas HODGKIN trustes to see this will executed according to the tenor and effect thereof desireing of them to suffer no waste of my childrens or dividend of my estate on the contrary to take them and the same into their possession for the benefit of my said children. Signed: William SELBY. Wit: Henry BOTELER, Charles [Page 219] BOTELER, Thomas HODGKIN.

Proved 1 Aug. 1733 by oaths of Henry BUTLER & Tho's HODGKIN. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (9-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The will of William SELBY, 1698, PG Co, gives 500 acres called "Leeth" and 150 acres, part of "Groome's Lodge," to sons William and Charles. Children Susanna and Samuel were to receive "Towgood." Son William to inherit "The Farm," after the death of testator's wife Mary [MCW 2:169]. William SELBE witnessed the will of Jonathan PEARCE in Calvert Co, 1685 [MCW 2:51]. William SELBY was transported to Maryland in 1659 [Skordas, op.cit., p.410].

Samuel and William SELBY were taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:159]. In 1734, an inventory on William SELBY's estate was filed by William MAGRUDER [IPR p.163].

In 1733, Thomas SELBY was taxed in Western Branch Hundred [BB:263]; Nathan SELBY was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred [BB:269]. In 1745 an inventory was taken on the estate of Nathan SELBY, deceased, PG Co, administrator being Charles DUREY (or DRURY) [IPR p.163].

The birth of Samuel, son of William Magruder and Martha SELBY was registered in 1734 in St. James' Parish, Anne Arundel Co. William Magruder SELBY signed a petition 1742 as a resident of upper PG Co. [BB:454]. William M. SELBY's middle name, Magruder, suggests his mother may have been a MAGRUDER, perhaps daughter or sister of the William MAGRUDER who filed William SELBY's inventory in 1734.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE FAMILY HISTORY CENTER by Joyce Candland

Over the past decade at the Family History Library researchers, as well as casual visitors, have asked the same question - "Can't I just type my name into your computer and have my geneology come out?" The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has been developing computer tools to simplify genealogical research and they are closer than ever to saying "Yes" to that question.

The new system called Family Search consists of three files with the information stored on compact discs similar to the CDs sold in record stores. They can store large amounts of information - the equivalent of 1500 conventional floppy disketts or about 320,000 pages of text on each disc. They are read by computers equiped with a special CD player. The three files are: The Family History Library Catalog (FHIC), The International Genealogical Index (IGI) and The Ancestral File.

The FHL Catalog describes the contents of the Church Library's 1.6 million microfilms and 200,000 books. In the 1980s the catalog was published on 2000 microfiche and is still available for sale. The catalog has now been published on a single compact disc which may be read by computers equipped with a special compact disc drive and Family Search software. The information on the compact disc edition of the catalog is basically the same as that in the microfiche edition but the two are updated at different times. The current FHL Catalog on compact disc is not yet available for sale. At present the compact disc edition can be searched for records of a locality or surname but it does not allow searches by subject, author or title.

The IGI includes the names of 147 million diseased persons and can save you many hours of research by helping you find birth, christening or marriage information from the early 1500s to about 1895. The names are not limited to LDS Church members or their ancestors. The IGI does not include records of living persons. The current microfiche edition of the IGI is published on 9200 microfiche and is available at Family History Centers and other libraries worldwide. It is available for sale. The compact disc edition is on 56 discs and is not yet for sale. It provides many features not available on the microfiche - for example, it lists all names alphabetically within an entire country or region. You do not need to know the county, state or province your ancestor came from to see if his name is in the compact disc file. Twenty million names are on the list for the US and Canada. Sixty million are available in a combined index for England, Scotland and Wales.

The Ancestral File is a computer file of seven million names linked into families and pedigrees. Ancestral File displays information by individuals, family group record, pedigree chart or decendants chart. As part of the Family Search system, Ancestral File includes the ability to print your own discoveries on paper or to copy data on your own disketts. The Ancestral File depends exclusively on contributions from families and family organizations. It contains genealogical information for deceased persons only. For LDS Church members, ancestors who are not members and are still living are identified only as "living". Included are names of individuals, their family relationships and pedigrees, dates and places of birth, marriages and deaths. It also contains names and addresses of contributors and the film number of source documents. The Ancestral File is a user file and for information depends totally on those who use the file. It contains errors and discrepancies and everyone who uses it has the opportunity and responsibility to improve its accuracy. In the next release of the file an edit function will be added. All are encouraged to share family research by reviewing Ancestral File to see what



may already be done and then compiling the new information and sending it to the Family History Library in Salt Lake on disketts created using a genealogical seftware program that can produce files compatable with Ancestral File. If you do not have access to a computer or softwear, ask the local Center or Library for help.

FAMILY SEARCH is available at the Family History Center in Kensington. Information from the FHIC may be printed. Information from the IGI and the Ancestral File may be printed or downloaded (copied) to a floppy disc. (Provide your own formatted discs before coming to the Library.) There is no charge for the use of the computers. If you make paper printouts from the computer there is a charge of 10¢ per page. Reservations to use FAMILY SEARCH are not required but are recommended and can be made as much as two weeks in advance. There is a two-hour per day limit on use of FAMILY SEARCH and printing and downloading count as part of your two-hour limit.

CHRISTIAN HEURICH MANSION

This 31 room red brick mansion was built in the 1890's by the German brewmaster for his family. The interior and furnishings basically remain unchanged. There are 13 hand carved wooden fireplaces inset with marble, nymphs are painted on the ceiling, a rathskeller is in the basement, and GENIE - a Washingtoniana Library on the 4th floor, formerly the playroom for the children. This is the headquarters of The Historical Society of Washington, D.C., formerly called the Columbia Historical Society.

The Christian Heurich Brewery was located where the Kennedy Center is now and produced Senate Beer and Old Georgetown Beer.

Anderson House was the beautiful white limestone private residence of Cincinnati member Larz Anderson, career diplomat, who presented the house to the Society as its permanent headquarters. It is an historic house museum listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a national museum of the American Revolution. GENIE - the Stuart Memorial Library houses a 20,000 volume reference collection on the American Revolution and its times. The second floor is still furnished largely as it was when the Andersons lived there, beautiful furniture, Flemish tapestries, jade trees and oriental art objects.

SOCIETY OF THE CINCINNATI

The Society was organized in 1783 by Continental Officers who didn't want to lose track of each other. Within 12 months State Societies were established in the 13 Original States and the 14th State Society in France. George Washington was President of the Society from 1783 to his death in 1799.

Original members were only those officers who had served a three year minimum period with the Regular (Line) American Army and Navy or with the French forces under General Rochambeau or Admiral de Grasse.

Membership is hereditary. General Arthur St. Clair named Cincinnati, Ohio, both to honor the Society and because many Cincinnati members had already settled there.

GENIE - anyone seeking exact information regarding membership should send the name of the officer from which he is descended, together with his relationship to this officer and the state from which the officer served to the Office of the Secretary General at the above address. Applications for membership are available there.

DATING AND PRESERVING PHOTOGRAPHS.

WHITES WHO MARRIED INDIANS were not listed on the US census records if the marriage took place in Illinois, Arkansas or Missouri before 1880 as they were considered part of the Indian nation into which they married. Starting in 1906, all Indians had to fill out a claim which asked for children's names, parents, grandparents, birth/death dates, places of residence and birth, English and Indian names. USING STATE CENSUS RECORDS. List of state census records in this publication was reprinted with permission from UNPUZZLING YOUR PAST by Emily Anne Croom, White Hall, VA, 1983 and is a valuable guide in determining what census years are available for each state. Once you know the years the state cnsus was taken, trying to find where it is available is tricky. They are not indexed, and are usually available in the state in which they were taken. For the particular state in which you are interested, write to the state library for that state and ask: (1) Are they in book form? (2) Are they in microfilm? (3) Is the film available through interlibrary loan? (4) Will the state library do a search? If you cannot borrow the film, you will have to hire a researcher to check it. You will need to know at least the county in which the family was living and would be more helpful if the city or township is known. Not all states are the same. California only did one in the year 1852. Ohio apparently did none. Arizona State GenSoc, Vol. 24-4, Winter 1989.

Born in Freehold NJ, John married Rebekah Flowers and fathered nine children in Berks Co PA before relocating to the Shenandoah. Abraham Lincoln, grandfather of the president, had his youngest son Thomas born there, but moved his family to Kentucky in 1781. Abraham was killed by Indians a few years afterwards but Thomas lived thru that ambush, married Nancy Hanks, and went on to name his first son after his father, Abraham. Prince George's County Will Book 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson (Continued from vol. 22, no. 5 [January 1991])

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

BB = Calendar of Maryland State Papers, No. 1: The Black Books.

IPR = Index to the Probate Records of Prince George's County, Maryland, 1696-1900, by PGCGS, (1988).

Page 219. [MCW 7:45] 9 Oct. 1733. Then came Gabriel SWAIN, Thomas WAREING & John TANNEHILL & made oath that they heard James HALL late of PG Co. deceased declair (in his lifetime) that it was his will & desire that Peter KNIT [sic] of the County afsd should have what Estate he the said HALL left in case the said KNIGHT out lived him & at the time of his saying so they believe he the said HALL was of sound & perfect memory. Sworn before Pet. DENT Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (1-1/2 sides)

NOTES: James HALL was taxed in Mattapany Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:276]. Peter KNIGHT, John TANYHILL, Gabriel SWAIN Jr. and Gabriel SWAIN Sr. were taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred that year [BB:269]. Thomas WARING was taxed in Western Branch, Mount Calvert, and New Scotland Hundreds [BB:263, 269, 275].

The history of a HALL family of Calvert and PG Counties is described in Maryland Genealogies [from the Md. Historical Magazine], v. 2, p.26-38: descendants of Richard and Elizabeth HALL, who arrived in Maryland ca. 1663. This James is not identified as a descendant. His nuncupative will, above, suggests he had no relatives in this country, unless Peter KNIGHT was kin.

Peter KNIGHT was recognized as administrator of James HALL's estate when its inventory was filed, 29 Nov. 1733 [IPR p.85]. The inventory of Peter KNIGHT, deceased, was filed 20 Aug. 1736 in PG Co, with William BEANS as administrator [IPR p.113].

Pages 219-220. [MCW 7:32] Will of William HOOK of PG Co, planter, being sick in body. Date: 26 Jan. 1732/3. To be buried at the discretion of my executrix. Item: One tract called "Good Will" laid out for 100 acres in PG Co. to my Daughter in Law Elizabeth HARGES and the heirs of her body forever. If she should die without an heir of her body, then the land to George NAILOR Junior and heirs. Likewise, to my said Daughter in Law one cow called Heart and her yearling with all their increase forever the cow marked with a crop and two slits in the right ear.

Item: To my wife Sarah HOOK my Negro man named Stepney and all my houshold stuf goods and chattles whatever, to me in this world belonging, not before in this will given. I appoint my said wife Sarah HOOK sole executor. Signed: William HOOK. Wit: Robert SKINNER, Jno. DAVIS, Robart RICHARDS.

[Page 220] Proved 29 Aug. 1733 by oaths of Richard SKINNER, Robert RICHARDS & John DAVIS. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The wife, Sarah HOOK, was apparently the widow of Hollyday HARGEST, whose inventory was filed 25 Aug. 1727 in PG Co. by Sarah H. HOOK, administratrix [IPR p.89]. Holliday HARGIS was taxed in 1719 in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co [BB:160]. (William HOOK is not found that year.) Widow HOOK was taxed in the lower precinct of Mattapany Hundred, 1733 [BB:267].

George NAILOR Jr. is identified as a son of George NAILOR of Charles Co, Md, in the latter's will (1729, proved 1734). George Jr. had a daughter Priscilla born before 1729 [MCW 7:93].

A tract called "Goodwill" was granted in 1680 to Thomas LARRAMORE in that part of Calvert County which became PG Co. in 1696 [Louise Hineton, Prince George's Heritage, land grant map].

Page 220. [MCW 7:45] Will of James BEALL Senior of PG Co. Date: 3 May 1733. Imprimiss: To my daughter Jane 240 acres being part of my part of a tract called "Labyrinth" to be laid out contigious or near as may be to the now dwelling plantation of Samuel BEALL to her and her [heirs] forever. Item: To James RDMONSTON the one half of a tract called "Brothers Content" excepting that part which I have sold of which the said James is to have no part, but of the remainder only and to be laid out contigious or as near as may be to the now dwelling plantation of Mich'l CRAVEN [MCW: Michael CRANEN] to him the same James & to his heirs forever.

And whereas I owe several debts & have several small children which are illiterate and unlearned I do therefore give to my well belov'd wife Mary all the remaining part of my estate real and personal for & during her natural life for the maintaining & educating your [sic] children. After the death Item: belov'd wife I give that part of my aforesd estate both personall & real devised as aforesaid to my well belov'd wife to be equally divided between my son Allex'r, my daughter Rachel, my son Robert, my son Arch'b'd, my son James, my son Allen. my son Thomas and my daughter Cathern [MCW: given name left blank] and their heirs forever. And if any of my children should die before they come of full age their estate to be equally divided amongst their brothers [sic, but not their sisters].

Item: I appoint my well beloved wife Mary executrix. And whereas I am intituled to a part of three tracts of land lying on or near the branch of Rock Creek the one called "Labyrinth" the other called "Prevention," and the other called "Batchelors Forrest," and whereas 1 part of the sd lands lyes in older surveys, & there is some vacant land contigious to the sd lands I do hereby request and impower James EDMONSTON and William BEALL Sen'r to resurvey the sd land called "Labyrinth," "Prevention," and "Batchelors Forrest" and to make such additions & alterations in the sd lands as they shall think proper. Signed: James BEALL. Wit: Jane EDMONSTON, Arch'b'd EDMONSTON Junr, Ann (o) SIMSON.

Proved 29 Nov. 1733 by oaths of Archabald EDMUNSON and Ann SIMSON, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (4-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The BEALL family is well-known in Prince George's County, but was so prolific that it is difficult to sort the members out. Men named James BEALL were taxed in 1719 in New Scotland and in Rock Creek Hundred, PG Co [BB:157,158]. In 1733, two James BEALLs were taxed in Eastern Branch Hundred [BB:271], one of them presumably our testator. The other is unlikely to be his son, as the testator's children were all minors in 1733.

Our testator is identified in <u>Compendium of American Genealogy</u>, v.6, p.127, as James BEALL (1690-1734) son of Alexander BEALL and Elizabeth DICK. James BEALL m. ca. 1716, Mary EDMONSTON (b. 1703, dau. of Col. Archibald EDMONSTON who m. Jane, dau. of Col. Ninian BEALL). (Thus, although James himself is not a descendant of Ninian BEALL, his children are.)

Alexander BEALL (1649-1744, son of John BEALL and Margaret RAMSAY), came from Scotland, settled in Montgomery Co, Md; owned "Friendship Enlarged," which extended from (now) Washington, D.C. to Burnt Mills, on Sligo Creek [ibid., p.756]. Alexander BEALL was taxed in West Branch Hundred in 1719 [BB:161].

James BEALL (1728-1804, son of James and Mary (EDMONSTON) BEALL) of Montgomery Co, m. 1752, his cousin Elizabeth EDMONSTON [C.A.G., v.6, p.127].

Page 221. [MCW 7:32] Will of Sarah ANDREW of PG Co. Date: 3 Aug. 1733. Item: To my daughter Ann PERRIE all that tract on which I now dwell (lyeing on Swansons Creek) to her and her heirs forever. Item: To my daughters Sarah and Mary PERRIE (and to their heirs forever) all that tract lying in Charles County as also all other lands and tenements (not before named) to which I have any right and title, to be equally divided between them. Lastly: After my debts, legacys and funerall charges shall be paid I give all the remainder of my estate to my Hon'd Mother Sarah HADDOCK her heirs and assigns forever, and appoint her my full whole and sole executrix. Signed: Sarah () ANDREW. Wit: Margarett () BELT, Ann (o) YOUNG, Ja's Hadd'k WARING.

Proved 19 Aug. 1733 by the oaths of Margarett BELT, Ann YOUNG & James Hadock WARING. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

<u>MOTES</u>: The testator's mother, Sarah HADDOCK, was the widow of James HADDOCK, gent., of PG Co., whose will dated 1726 was probated in 1731 [MCW 6:188]. James HADDOCK in that will mentions a son [in law]. Samuel PERRIE and wife [not named] who were to get mourning rings. James Haddock WARING is named as HADDOCK's grandson. Samuell PERRIE and Capt. HADDOCK were taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:160].

The estate of Samuel PERRIE, deceased, was probated in 1729 by administratrix Sarah PERRIE, but by 1734 his administratrix was Sarah HADDOCK (his mother-in-law) [IPR p.146]. Sarah ANDREW's second husband is probably Patrick ANDREW, who was taxed in Mattapany Hundred in 1733, the only person in the county of that surname [BB:267]. A Patrick ANDREW was m. 1715, in Christ Church Parish, Calvert Co, to Mrs. Ann BIGGER [Barnes, Md. Marriages, 1634-1777, p.4].

Plantations to Parks. Speaker Jane W. North, Executive Director of the Historical Society of Washington, D.C.

The location the nation's capital was the result of a difficult political compromise reached at a dinner given by Alexander Hamilton and Thomas Jefferson. After seven years of discussion, the northerners reluctantly agreed to a southern site and the southerners finally agreed to let the federal government take on the remaining debt of the individual states from the Revolutionary War.

It was early in 1791 that President Washington chose the exact site at the confluence of the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers. The District of Columbia was a 10 mile square carved out of Maryland and Virginia. It included the small ports of Georgetown and Alexandria and lands sparsely settled by tobacco farmers. The landowners gave one half of their land to the Federal Government and were allowed to subdivide the rest themselves.

President Washington appointed three commissioners and hired Charles Pierre L'Enfant, a French engineer who had worked for him in the Revolutionary War, to do the design. L'Enfant moved quickly to complete his plans for the city with broad radial avenues overlying a grid of streets. Problems erupted when Commissioner Daniel Carroll of Duddington, built his house where one of the avenues was planned and L'Enfant ordered it torn down. L'Enfant was fired in January of 1792.

In 1800 Congress moved to Washington with 131 Federal employees. Then during the War of 1812, British troops marched down Maryland Avenue. After receiving sniper fire they burned all the Federal Buildings except the Patent office. Until 1817 Congress met in the old Brick Capitol which later became a jail.

Unfortunately for Washington the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad headed west from Baltimore at the same time that the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal started from Washington in 1828. The rails won and the canal was never completed. Baltimore became a great center for commerce and Washington didn't.

In 1800 only 25% of the residents of the District were black - some slave and some free. But because of transportation difficulties and the increasing pressure from the Abolition movement the separate part of the District originally cut from Virginia was retroceded in 1846. 1850 saw an end to the slave trade and in 1862 slavery was abolished in the District.

During the Civil War Washington D.C.'s population suddenly increased from 60,000 to 250,000. By the end of the Civil War the city was in a shambles and serious attempts were made to move the capital to St. Louis. Instead the three separate governments left in the District - Georgetown City, Washington City and Washington County were discontinued. From 1871 to 1874 the District was named a territory and Alexander Sheppard was appointed governor. For 3 years he operated a massive public works program that used L'Enfant's plan to build Washington into a modern city with water and sewer systems, gas lights, paved streets, wide sidewalks, and a variety of landscaping. He exceeded his 6 million dollar budget by 16 million and was fired. After that a three commissioner system for governing the District was enacted. It survived until 1974 when once again, residents were allowed to elect a mayor as they had done in the pre-Civil War period.

In 1880, when the Cairo Hotel was built, there were so many objections to its height that laws were passed restricting heights for commercial buildings to 100 feet and for residential buildings to 90 feet. As a result, Washington has become a low-rise city filled with space and sunlight. As part of a "City Beautiful" movement inspired by the Columbian Exposition celebrating District's 100th birthday, major changes were made on the mall. The MacMillan Companyusing L'Enfant's 1791 plan - filled and paved the shipping canal thus creating Constitution Avenue, relocated the trains that had crossed in front of the Capitol and turned the entire Mall into a park.

Book Reviews

The Land Records of Prince George's County, Maryland 1702 to 1709, by Elise Greenup Jourdan. Westminster, Maryland. Family Line Publications. 1990. 78pp. A gift of the publisher. Soft cover copies are available for \$8.00 plus \$1.50 postage from Family Line Publications, Rear 63 E. Main St., Westminster, MD 21157.

The records in this volume are from Microfilm CR 495142, Prince George's County Court Records, Liber C, at the Maryland Archives. Prince George's County, during the time period covered by these deeds, included all of western Maryland, and it was not until 1748 that a portion of the county was

broken off to become Frederick County. Therefore, many early Maryland families trace back to Prince George's County.

The author has abstracted the important information in the deeds, including occupations, water courses, residences, adjoining land owners and tract names. Personal names have been printed in bold type and tract names are in italics, making it easy to locate information within the abstracts. There are two indexes, one to plantations, plats and town lotts and another to persons. This volume is a nice companion to the first volume of deeds (1692-1702) previously published by the Prince George's County Genealogical Society.

Extracts from Genealogical Exchanges

<u>USING INDEXES IN CIVIL COURT CASES.</u> Since there is probably no master index which lists all names of individuals involved in civil or criminal court cases, you may have to search other indexes. Ask the clerk of the court what different kinds of indexes exist in the office of the court. Use both Plaintiff and Defendant indexes. If the index gives a case number, you will be able to find the case file. Ask for the clerk's or judge's journal as well as the case file folder or packet if your name search has referred you to a particular civil or criminal lawsuit. This group of records handles a variety of records ORPHAN'S COURTS. which can be very profitable. First, it must be understood that the legal definition of an orphan is one who has lost his natural father. It is not tied to the mother or to any specific age. Orphan Court records, called dockets, are used to appoint or change the appointments of guardians for orphans, incompetents and sometimes indigents. They also record administrators for estates and frequently for trustees. Many property transfers, inventories of estates, marriages, births and deaths are to be found in these dockets. You might even uncover an elusive maiden name, for when a widow asks that an individual be appointed guardian of her son, it is possible that the person she suggests may be her relative. If the areas you are researching maintain Orphan's Courts, add those courts to your list of sources. Arizona State GenSoc Bulletin, Vol. 25-1, Spring 1990.

<u>FREE TOMBSTONES FOR VETERANS</u>. The federal government provides a free tombstone for any <u>unmarked</u> grave of a deceased veteran, including Confederate veterans. Anyone having knowledge of a deceased veteran may apply; no need to be a direct descendant. A memorial headstone or marker is also provided free for veterans whose remains have not been recovered or identified or were buried at sea. In this case, a relative recognized as next of kin must apply. There is also a provision for a crypt marker if a veteran is entombed in a columbarium or mausoleum.

For information and application, request Form 40-1330, "Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private or Local Cemetery." Your local VA office may have this form, or it can be obtained from Monument Service (42), Veterans Administration, 810 Vermont Ave, N.W., Washington, DC, 20420. This form explains the required information for applying for the headstone and the required information which must be on the headstone as well as information which may be added at your own expense.

Fighting gnats mosquitoes, over shaded stones and glaring sun and tormenting that bounces off the stones at every possible angle, along with aged, worn and buried stones that refuse to give up there secrets, hours later I am still searching. I recognize names I've seen on census records from months of winter research at a microfilm reader, as I rolled through roll after roll until my eyes would keep rolling when the film had stopped.

At days end, I pause to review the fruits of my labor -- mosquito bites, mosquitoes stuck to my glasses, perspiration stained clothes, grass stained tennis shoes, broken finger nails filled with chalk and dirt, accompanied by minor cuts and bruises. One wrinkled tablet filled with names and dates of people I never knew, and a badly wrinkled and dog-eared cemetery plan. A heat induced headache from 6 hours in the sun, topped by a beet red complexion to match my throbbing head, don't seem to be important as I pour over my wrinkled notes which add to the building blocks of a valuable family history. Six rolls of film shot with not a living soul in the pictures. A car with that lived in look -notes, folders, briefcase, rolls of paper, water jugs, bruised fruit, hats, towels, camera, jackets, chalk, cans of shaving cream, etc., which are tossed everywhere. This seems unimportant at the moment as the fruits of my labor start to grew in my mind. And to think, I drove over 100 miles for all this fun! drive back to the motel my mind keeps spinning with all the names and dates I have found. Back at the motel I empty out the car and drag everything into my room and deposit it on the floor. collapse on the bed with a cold wash cloth over my forehead.

What craze is this that causes this unnatural habit to grow stronger even when left unattended for months on end? Is it my souls quest pulling me to discover the past and the roots I spring from or is it just the beginning of insanity? God, how I love GENEALOGY!



SIMPLE TELEGRAM YIELDS FACTS

Recently I made a trip to Ohio and was able to follow up on clues gleaned from an old telegram, dated 19 April 1872, which had been in the family Bible these many years. The telegram had been sent from Wilmington, Ohio to Loveland, from A.W. Doan to Rachel Shields, in care of Mr. Thompson, and read, "Clifton Hines died today."

Earlier I wrote an article about this telegram, titled, "Clues - Leave No Stone Unturned, Vol. 21, #8, April 1990, and cited some of the clues the telegram had afforded me. By checking the Library of Congress I had learned Loveland was in Warren County, Ohio. In reading a book on the history of Warren County I was able to approximate the time Rachel (Doan) Hines had married her second husband, George Shields, and which township in Warren County they were living.

Now that I was in Warren County, it was time to see what other items of information might be ferreted out of court records. I was not disappointed. A will, written by George Shields, along with several other interesting documents filed by his son, Daniel H. Shields, in order to settle his fathers estate, were most helpful in answering questions.

George Shields had died, 28 July 1880, his wife Rachel (Doan-Hines), my great great grandmother, died just 12 days later, 8 August 1880, aged 76 yr 9 mo and 20 days. They were living with his daughter, Mary J. and his son-in-law, John E. Thompson. That explained who the Mr. Thompson in the telegram was and also his relationship to my Rachel.

Vital statistics showed that George Shields died of dysentery and that he was a farmer. Rachel had died of paralysis and was listed as housekeeper. They had been married for 30 years at the time of their death.

At the Lebanan Historical Society I made an interesting discovery. Daniel H. Shields, son of George Shields, had married Martha Belle McKinnie, daughter of Richard Bard McKinnie. The McKinnie's were another branch of my family line. Martha Belle McKinnie was a first cousin to my great grandmother Rachel McKinnie who married Jesse Vestal Hines, son of Rachel (Doan-Hines) Shields.

Next, I located the Murdock Presbyterian Cemetery in Hamilton township and picked up a few more facts. George Shields tombstone showed his death date and age, 28 July 1880, 78 yr 8 mo 14 days. His first wife, Hannah, was buried by his side and her tombstone read, died 21 March 1840, age 41. Rachel was buried there also and next to her was Frank Hines, her grandson, who was the son of Jonathan D. and Alice Hines. Frank was 6 months old when he died 4 December 1853.

Checking the Wilmington, Clinton County, Ohio court records I was able to copy the marriage records for both Rachel Doan's husbands. She had married Isaac Hines, my great great grandfather, 31 May 1825, and she married George Shields 14 May 1850. Isaac Hines died 1 June 1845.

Clifton Hines, of the above mentioned telegram, died of brain fever at the age of 17, while residing at the Wilmington College boarding house. Clifton Hines was the grandson of Rachel (Doan-Hines) Shields and son of Jonathan D. and Alice Hines. All this information has come to light as a result of this simple telegram reposing in my family Bible.

Item: To the aforesaid she shall like and Eleanor (my wife) all my hoggs and horses (except as To my aforementioned hereafter in this my will excepted). Item: wife all my houshold furniture of what kind soever, saving one bed and bed cloath which I bequeath to my daughter Eleanor CLARY. To my said wife a servant man called William HARE and one Negro man called Jack during her natural life and afterwards to return to my daughters Eleanor and Mary CLARY to be equally divided between them. and slave not named in MCW.1

To my son in law John CLARY a young horse called Dragon and one gun which two things are now in his keeping likewise one grey mare known by the name of Dutchess alsoe one horse called by the name Item: To my sons in law John CLARY and Daniel of King and one sow. CLARY all my cattle (my wife first taking her [Page 222] choice as above mentioned) to be equally divided between them. son in law Daniel CLARY one mare and colt the mare known by the name of Jewell and one sow. Item: If there be any farther effects or money due to this my estate (besides what I here bequeath) in may closeing account with the commissary it be equally divided between my wife and children. I appoint my dearly wife Eleanor DEVERON to be the sole executrix. Signed: William () DEVERON. Wit: Thomas Butler, James Smith [name circled], Thomas () BURK, Daniel (C) CHANDLER.

Proved 11 Oct. 1733 by oaths of Thomas BUTTLER, James SMITH and Thomas BURK. Sworn to by virtue of a commission issued out of the Prerogative Office before me, John BEAL. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: William DEVERAN was taxed in Rock Creek Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:158]. In 1733, Eleanor DEVRONS was taxed there, along with Daniel CANLAR [=CHANDLER?], Thomas BURK, James SMITH and Thomas BUTLER. John and Daniel CLARY are not found there [BB:274].

The will of Eleanor DEVERAN was probated 19 Nov. 1744 in PG Co [IPR p.56]. The will of John CLARY of Baltimore Co, Md, 1740, mentions wife Mary; son William Devorn to inherit land on Rock Creek,



PG Co; son Vachel, daughter Ruth, an unborn child, and brother William [MCW 8:93; Magruder's Index of Maryland Colonial Wills gives the county as Anne Arundel]. The register of Christ Church, Queen Caroline Parish [now Howard County] shows John and Mary CLARY as the parents of William Devern CLARY b. 1 Feb. 1733 [1734 N.S.], Vachel 1735, Ruth 1737/8, John 1739/40 [F. Edward Wright, Anne Arundel Co. Church Records, p. 142].

William Devern CLARY and wife Ann had son Vachel b. 1765, registered in Frince George's Parish (PG/Frederick Co). Daniell and Eleanor CLARY had a dau. Linney 1761 in the same parish [unless the year is in error, this Eleanor is unlikely to be William DEVERAN's daughter, who was married prior to 1733].

Manus DEVORIN was transported to Maryland as a servant in 1675-80 [Skordas, <u>Early Settlers of Maryland</u>, p. 133]. Manus DEVORING d. 14 Dec. 1700, Westminster Parish, A.A. Co. [Wright, <u>op. cit.</u>, p. i36]. Dianagh DEVERIN was m. 28 Apr. 1701 to Sabasting OLLEY in Westminster Par. [ibid., p.129]. Sebastin and Dinah OLEY's children: Sebastin 1704, Marget 1706 [ibid. p. 108-9]. The will of Sebastian OLLEY, probated 1707, A.A. Co, names wife Dinah, children Sebastian and Margarett, and daughter-in-law Susanna MATHEACE [MCW 3:85].

Dinah was probably married to ____MATHIS/MATHEWS before her marriage to [Manus?] DEVERIN. Manus DEVORIN is a likely candidate for father of William DEVERON who was b. ca. 1680/90 and who also had ties to Anne Arundel Co. Manus apparently died intestate.

Pages 222-223. [MCW 7:51] Will of Christopher THOMPSON of PG Co, Date: 20 Nov. 1731. Item: To my dear and loving wife Grace THOMPSON all that my plantation whereon I now dwell and the land belonging to the same being part of a tract called "Chelsy", tract called "Asdell" and also 100 acres called "White Lackington" to enjoy all the sd several tract as aforesd, and the rents issues and profitts thereof during the term of her natural life & from & after her decease I give my said dwelling plantation & the land belonging to the same unto my nephew John THOMPSON [surname not given in MCW] & to his heirs forever & a Negro man called Jack & one called Hercules. Item: To my nephew Robert RIDDELL and to his heirs forever that tract called "Asdell" as also a Negro man called [Page 223] Sam & a Negro man called Kit after the decease of my said wife. To my cosen Wm. SHAW all that tract called "White Lackington" Item: to him and his heires forever as also a Negro man called after the decease of my sd wife. Item: To Christopher BROWN the sum of ten pounds sterling to be paid by my executrix hereafter named. All the remainder of my estate to my wife Grace THOMPSON & to her heires. Signed: Christopher (CT) THOMPSON. Wit: PERRY, Rich'd DUCKETT, Edw'd () GRIMES.

Proved 21 Jan. 1733/4 by oaths of John PERRY & Edw'd GRIMES. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Christyfer TOMSON served on a jury trying Richard PILES, 1706/7, PG Co [BB:48]. Christopher THOMPSON served as administrator of the estate of William ARMSTRONG, 1713-14 [IPR p.4]. Christopher THOMSON was taxed in Collington Hundred, 1719 [BB:163]. Christopher THOMPSON/TOMSONS was taxed in Western Branch and Collin. Hundred, 1733 [BB:263,265]. Robert RIDDLE was also taxed in Western Branch



Hundred, 1733 [BB:263]; a John THOMPSON appears in the tax lists of Upper Piscattaway Hundred and Potowmack Hundred, 1733 [BB:268,273].

Christopher THOMPSON served as one of the first officers of the Presbyterian Church in Upper Marlboro, 1704. He later gave 100 acres of "Whitlaintin" to Rev. Hugh CONN, minister of the Presbyterian Church on the Eastern Branch [Louise Hienton, <u>Prince George's Heritage</u>, p.91,98].

The inventory of Christopher THOMPSON was filed 29 Mar. 1724, [sic, probably 1734] with Grace THOMPSON as executrix [IPR p.181]. The will of Grace THOMPSON, widow, PG Co, 1739, was proved 1741. She mentions children of William, viz. John THOMPSON, Margaret SHAW and Mary PERRY; also Christopher BROWN; Mary HALL, dau. of Col. Joseph BELT; Mary YOUNG, Alice RAY, Col. Joseph BELT. Pompey YOUNG to receive residue [MCW 8:189]. The will of a John THOMPSON was proved in 1754 in PG Co [ibid.].

Christopher BROWNE is shown as a base-born child, the son of Jane BROWNE. He was bound to Christopher THOMPSON in 1697, his mother being a servant to THOMPSON who had apparently recently arrived in the colony [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.15-16].

The will of Lawrence ROWLAND, Calvert Co, 1694, was proved 18 May 1695, naming wife Grace as executrix and sole legatee [MCW 2:93]. In Prince George's Court, Nov. 1696, Christopher THOMPSON appeared with Grace his wife, exectrix of Lawrence ROWLAND, deceased, to submit security for the two-thirds of the estate due to ROWLAND's next of blood kin [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.61].

In Jan. 1699 [1700], Christopher THOMPSON gave 100 acres, part of 300 acres "White Lackington" to "my brother" William THOMPSON of PG Co [PG Deeds A:199]. In Nov. 1695, James THOMSON of Shaftsbury, Dorsett Co, sailorman, sold 500 acres "Yarow" in Charles Co. [now PG Co], on the north side of Eastern Branch of Potomac River, bounded by land laid out to William THOMPSON [PG Deeds A:18]. In Jan. 1700 [1701] William THOMPSON of PG Co, and wife Ann, sold 300 acres "Scottland" on west side of Eastern Branch [PG Deeds A:352].

"Whitelaintine" [="White Lackington"] was granted to Christopher THOMPSON, "Yarow" to James THOMPSON, and "Scotland" to William THOMPSON, all in 1685, all close together [Hienton, <u>PG Heritage</u>, map]. It is likely these three men are close kin, at least two are brothers. They probably originated in Scotland. Yarrow is a parish there in the County of Selkirk. They may have lived in southwest England before migrating to America. White Lackington is a parish in Somerset County, England, not far from Dorset.

The will of James SHAW, PG Co, 1718, mentions two elder sons William and Christopher, committed to the care of "my loving uncle Christopher THOMPSON" (also called "their uncle"); youngest son James to be cared for by his mother, the deceased's wife Margaret [MCW 4:162; PGCGS Bulletin, Dec. 1986, p.68-69]. Margaret SHAW appears to be the person named in Grace THOMPSON's will as a daughter of William THOMPSON (Christopher's brother).

"Cousin William SHAW" is apparently Christopher's grandnephew, whom he had raised since 1718, the son of niece Margaret SHAW. William, John and James SHAW were taxed, 1733, in Upper Piscattaway Hundred [BB:268], William also taxed in New Scotland Hundred [BB:275]. William SHAW Jr. left will in PG Co, 1759, with а executrix Henriatta SHAW. SHAW's will, filed 1775, Another William



with Charles SHAW executor [IPR p.164-165].

Pages 223-224. [MCW 7:70] Will of John CLARVO of PG Co, being sick 28 Feb. 1733/4. Imprimis: To my eldest beloved son of body. Date: Francis all that tract called "Maiden Bradley" allso all that tract called "London Pleasure" allso all that tract called "the Addition" to him his heirs and assigns reserving to my beloved wife Elizabeth her life time the use & profits of that tract whereon I now live. To my beloved sons John & Henry all that part of a tract called "Market Overton" lying near Pamonkie to them their heirs & assigns to be equally divided betwixt them by a line drawn from the south east line of the said parcel till it intersect the north west line of the same., the first choice to be my said son John. Item: To my dear mother Bridget CLARVO a Negro man named Ned for & during her natural [life] if the sd Negro man shall be alive at the decease of my sd mother I will that he fall and belong to my forementioned son Henry. Item: To Mr. Henry WHITNALL Priest one hhd. of tobacco weighing 700 pounds weight. Lastly: I appoint my said beloved wife Elizabeth and my Brother in Law John HOWELL to be executors & administrators of this my last will. After my said wife has deducted her lawfull third part of the residue of my estate the rest be equally divided among my forenamed three sons or the survivors of them. Signed: John CLARVO. Wit: Richard (R) LANHAM. Matthew (+) SPARROW, James KENDALL.

20 March 1733/4, the widow is determined to the devise of the will. Pet. DENT, D[eputy] C[ommissa]ry.

[Codicil, no date] Whereas by my will herewithin written I have made no mention of my daughter Bridget I will that she have her proportionable share of the division of my personal estate. Signed: John CLARVO. Wit: Jn'o WHETENHALL, W. DIGGES Jun'r.

Proved 21st March 1733/4, by oaths of Rich'd LANHAM, Matthew SPARROW & James KENDALL. They subscribed their names in the presence of the said testator & at his request which oath was taken before Bridget CLARVO, Mother of the dec'd which said Bridgett CLARVO did not object to the probate of the said will. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry, PG Co. [Probate of codicil not mentioned.] (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Francis CLARVO's will, 1721, PG Co, names wife and son John, daughter Patt wife of John HOWELL, daughters Francis DICKISON and Ann JENKINS (wife of Enoch JENKINS) [MCW 5:79]. Francis CLARVO was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, 1719 [BB:164]. John CLARVO was taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. By 28 Sep. 1734, the administrator of John CLARVO's estate was Nicholas DOWNING, perhaps the new husband of CLARVO's widow Elizabeth [IPR p.44]. Henry CLARVO chose Edward PEARSON as his guardian, 1748, indicating Henry was now aged over 14, so born shortly before 1734 [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.23]. Edward PEARSON/PERSON's will was filed 1749 in PG Co [IPR p.147; Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.366]. The will of Bridget CLARVOE was filed 1754, PG Co, with Henry CLARVO as executor. The children's estates are on file: will of Henry CLARVOE, 1760; inventory of Francis CLARVOE, 1757. Also the will of a John CLARVOE, 1807, possibly the son [IPR p.44].

Past Program Notes by Nada D. Poole

The National Archives in the District of Columbia opened in 1934. Before that, Federal Records were stored (poorly) by the individual Federal Agencies. The main building contains 700,000 cubic feet of storage for records of value to the Federal Government. In addition to the main Archives, there are 11 (approximately) Record Centers for storage that are located throughout the 50 states in regional centers. About 2% of government records work their way into permanent storage. The Presidential Libraries are also part of the National Archives system.

In 1968 the Suitland Facility opened to store records and part of the Permanent Collection. It has over 500,000 cubic feet of storage. The building, located in downtown Suitland, has 20 stack areas each as large as a football field. Five stacks hold permanent records. The other stacks are for storage of government records. The research room is open Monday through Saturday from 8:00-4:15. For Saturday research, you must call ahead to request materials because no staff is available to pull records.

A few of the records at Suitland are from 19th century but most are after 1900. Records of special interest to genealogists include the records of the US District Court - (Maryland Court Records are stored at the regional center in Philadelphia). Specifically these District Court Records include:

Probate records (created when estates are settled)
Transcripts of Wills 1801-1878. Indexed
Case Files for Administration of Estates

Guardianship Case Files 1802-1878. (Records after 1878 have not been released by the D.C. Courts.)

Adoption Case files 1907-1938 open and available to researchers. Not indexed, but the docket books show names of persons adopted and adopting.

Naturalization Records 1802-1906. Indexed. Records include 1) Declaration of Intention, 2) Petition to be Naturalized, and 3) Naturalization Record. Many pieces have not survived but the three types of records contain the same information. Most naturalizations took place in

Federal Courts altho' some are in state and local records.

Civil Dockets and Case files, Criminal Dockets and Case files,

Divorce Records are filed with Equity Courts. There is a little information on births and marriages.

Bankruptcy Records up to 1972

The remaining 15 stacks are used by the Records Group and include such things as Records of Agricultural Research Service of the US Department of Agriculture, Department of State Records of Immigration and Naturalization, and Department of Justice Records for 1) American Citizens in War Relocation Camps (Americans of Japanese descent in WW II) and 2) Internment Camps (POW) WW II.

Most of the Immigration and Naturalization records are at the main Archives. So are Military records for the Spanish American and World War I. Personnel records for WW II Veterans stored in the St. Louis, Missouri Records Center were destroyed by fire in 1978. Passport and Visa office records are indexed for US Citizens born and/or married overseas. Passport applications 1789-1906 are in Main Archives, 1906-1925 are at Suitland. The Land Entry Records for the 30 Public Domain States (not Maryland or any of the 13 original Colonies, Texas, West Virginia, and Kentucky) are stored at Suitland. There are 17 million land transfer records there, however these do not include the records of the Bureau of Land Management [in Silver Springs].

The Archives II at College Park will be a second "main" Archive for Federal Records. At that time the facility at Suitland will become a regional storage center.

Directions to the Suitland Branch: Take the Capital Beltway Exit 11 B (Pennsylvania Avenue towards Washington, D.C.). Left on Silver Hill Road; 4 traffic lights to Gate 5. Right into Gate 5 entrance; enter and check in. Follow signs to the Washington National Records Center.

Carrick heritage is not easy to come by. As hard working folks, mostly farmers, not much in the way of wills or other public information is written to gather information from. The Carrick roots are rumored to have originated in Ireland, but I have not reached that connection yet. The Irish connection more than likely came from the heavy Carrick immigration in the mid-1800s during the Potato famine. I believe research will prove that John Carrick's ancestors actually came from Scotland, not Ireland.

John Francis Carrick is the first confirmed Carrick in PG county. I don't know when the first Carrick, in the PG county line, set foot in America, where they came from, or where they settled —perhaps in Southern Maryland or Virginia. From John on, the names and dates fall in place with a little help. Still, there is not an abundance of information to gather. A few Carrick's immigrated into the U.S. during the 1600s and early 1700s, but have not found a connection to John F. Carrick Sr yet.

The first record of John Carrick is found in 1729, when he married Anne Duvall, daughter of Mareen Duvall, a prominent farmer and land owner in Anne Arundel County. The site of Mareen Duvall's home place is marked by a historical marker on MD #424, between Crofton and Davidsonville.

Early land records show John Carrick purchasing Moore's Industry on 25 August 1742, from Thomas Lancaster, Gent, for 3000 pounds of tobacco. Moore's Industry was originally granted to George Moore, on 21 October 1718, by the Lord Proprietor of Baltimore. Moore's Industry was located between the old town of Bowie and the city of Laurel, Prince George's County, Maryland. On September 29, 1762, he added 500 acres to this holding by petioning for and getting unclaimed land that joined Moore's Industry. This track of land was to be known as 'Carrick's Industry.' John's will was probated on December 15, 1792, in PG county. He bequested slaves, land, and live stock to various family members and also freed certain slaves.

Numerous land records, orphan court proceeding, and admini- trative accounts are found from PG and AA counties, at the Hall of Records, Annapolis, starting in the late 1700s and running throughout the 1800s.



The land was held by the Carrick's for only a few generations. It was passed on to Carrick heirs through wills or personal gifts. But, by the middle of the 1800's, most of the land had been sold by the heirs of John F. Carrick Sr.. Today, none of the original land is held by any Carrick descendant that I am aware of. Yet according to U.S. census records, auction inventories, appraisals. and sales, and family history passed on by the older Carrick generation, indicate that most Carricks continued farming. Perhaps, good farmers, but poor businessmen.

So far two Carrick lines are found in Maryland. One with primary roots in Anne Arundel and Frince George's Counties of Maryland and descending from John Francis Carrick Sr, and another one in the city of Baltimore, that descends from one James Carrick of Pennsylvania.

Allied families to the earilest Carrick's include; Brasseur, Cheyney, Clarke, Duvall, and Jacob.

Two of Johns sons, Mareen and John Jr, signed the Oath of Fidelity in Upper Marlboro in 1776. Grandson's are noted serving in the War of 1812, and numerous Carrick's served during the Civil War. About the turn of the nineteenth century, Carricks in the PG county line started moving out of state. Decendants are found in; western Pennsylvania, Ohio, North Carolina, Missouri, Michigan, and Indiana, and eventually Washington and California.

Carrick is not a common name beyond the Maryland area, but decendants are found throughout the country now. In a New York city telephone directory for example, only one Carrick is found, yet in the greater Washington area, many are found. Some moved, some stayed.

Roper's CrossRoads - Edgefield County

The roads are mostly quiet these days through the rolling hills now covered again with young growing pines - pines that hide the red clay and its rich heritage of one hundred and fifty years of cotton and this community's people whose lives revolved around their farms, churches, and families. Only a few piles of broken stones remain of the pillars that supported Chrisco's Store and Miles' Cotton Gin. Across the road the untamed growth of privet hedge, wisteria vines and sassafras bushes hide the decaying remains of the one-room school, standing only because a sturdy oak nearby gives it a leaning place. The five converging roads are still here- and they lead to the same places as they have for two One leads north to Edgefield Court House, one east to Horn's Creek Church, one south to Sweetwater Church and on to Augusta, one northwest up the Five Notch Road to Antioch Church, and one west to Republican Church. But even though the roads are still there, they are quiet, just as the community is quiet.

Down the road leading west about two miles, and then off the road just a way, is a very restful and secluded family cemetery. A rusty wrought-iron fence placed there more than a century ago continues its duty of guarding the graves of the loved ones as best it can. Heavy vines and fallen trees have broken the fence in some places, but its vigil remains. Inside the enclosed area are tombstones marking four graves. One is the grave of a young wife and mother and the other three mark the graves of her very young children; two daughters and one son. All died within the span of just a few years in the early 1800s. The mother and two daughters were buried during one month's time in the fall of 1822.

But this particular account is not about those lying within the iron fence of that cemetery. There is yet another grave located about thirty paces beyond the enclosed portion, but nevertheless protected by location and by the fence so that one realizes at once that it is intended to be an integral part of the family plot. The marker on this grave,

unlike those standing up-right inside the fence, is horizontal with the gravebox beneath. It honors one who diligently and faithfully served his Lord and his fellowman for many years while in this community.

Though the grey, moss-encrusted stone covering the grave is cracked, all pieces are still there and the inscription is legible. The lettering reads:

> SACRED to the memory of HARRY

He was born in Maryland in the year 1878 and he died on the 26th day of November in 1860, at the residence of his master JOSIAS LANHAM Edgefield District, S.C.

He emigrated to the District with his master in early youth and continued true and faithful to the end of his life

He was worthy of and possessed the confidence of his master

It is ghostly calm here on this morning; only a wisp of light wind presses the hanging honeysuckle vine to these stones which sentinel the family so closely. The dry leaves rustle gently around the base of the markers as if to warm them until spring sunshine returns in a few weeks.

As one stands here one can sense the family ties that bind the mother and her children; but what about Harry? How did his life tie in with the Lanham family for more than seven decades: The inscription on his tombstone gives only a brief note into a life that was surely surrounded by 73 years of fascinating events and social history.

We know that Harry was born in 1878 to a slave family who lived on the plantation of Solomon and

Charity Lanham in Prince George's County, Maryland. Tobacco was the main crop grown but there were other interests also in Livestock, particularly horses. Time was passed in carpentry and sharing in the many day to day activities that supported the plantation way of life. As Harry was growing up he found himself growing ever closer to the three Lanham boys. All were a little older than he but they became fast friends, sharing adventures in both work and play.

The plantation was near the Potomac River opposite Alexandria, Virginia. Occasionally Harry would ride with the Lanham boys on the wagon as tobacco was transported toward the river loading ramps. It is recounted how, on such trips they sometimes saw George Washington traveling in his coach drawn by four matched horses. They noticed that invariably the first president wore the dress of a plain citizen.

In the late 1790s word was coming back to Maryland from travelers to the southeast that productive new lands were plentiful there, and at reasonable prices. Such news was welcome to many in the tobacco growing areas of Maryland. Their lands were not nearly as productive since continuous tobacco plantings caused yields to fall. Even more alarming, tobacco prices had dropped to extremely low levels. There was little hope held of their going back up again.

Solomon Lanham and his family viewed this longterm economic situation with particular concern since the three sons were rapidly becoming of age when they would be seeking farmlands of their own. During long winter evenings there was much talk around the open fire about this situation and also about promising possibilities and opportunities the Southeast offered. Several of their friends from the Maryland area had successfully made the move to South Carolina and had sent encouragement to others interested to follow. The call of adventure and opportunity excited the Lanham boys to the point that they wanted to make effort to go south after the 1800 fall crop was gathered in Maryland. Harry was just as involved in the excitement as the others and he wanted to be included with his three

lifelong friends. Finally the decision was made to go and everyone helped the four young men make preparations for the journey and the somewhat unknown life in a new area. Information and encouragement was already coming from close friends who were already located and farming in the Meriwether section of Edgefield District. This appealed as an ideal place to settle since it held fertile land suitable to production of cotton and lay close to the major cotton market in Augusta, Georgia. Although cotton was a relatively new crop, glowing reports were that it was the best income producing crop ever! The young men with strength and determination could handle clearing their fields of trees!

So, with blessings of the family and other loved ones back home, the young adventurers set out. Walter was age 18; Josias 15; Rezin 14, and Harry 13 when they loaded their wagon and horses to start for South Carolina in the fall of 1800, hoping to reach their destination before the end of the year. Very quickly they found the roads were bad, days were short, nights were cold, and the way stretched out long before them. As often as possible they tried to reach a house along the way as nightfall approached, where they could get food for themselves and the horses and a place to rest. Many time they found themselves nearing sundown with no place to stay except along the side of the road. There they ate rations from the wagon and measured out feed for horses from the reserve grain carried for them. Of course, it was helpful to join others traveling the same route, to make new acquaintances to talk with, to share experiences and pass long winter evenings on the road.

This was a seven hundred mile journey by wagon, cart or horseback. The overnight stops that were required for sleep, to rest the horses, to secure food and feed, and supply other necessities; and to make repairs for traveling made this an experience of probably six weeks to two months. We realize also that these were farm people who had to finish and harvest a crop year, move in the fall or winter; then get set up in time to plant in the new location in the spring.

After this long journey the now experienced young travelers finally reached the Meriwether section of Edgefield District that they had talked and dreamed about. Here friends that had helped them locate the land they would settle on began immediately to help arrange to clear land and get some crops planted. It was a race against time, as they knew that their livelihood depended on their own effort and production. All three of the young Lanhams were eager to get their own farming operations underway as soon as possible; and Harry felt that he could be happy in the household of any one of them. As it turned out, Walter the oldest soon married and started his own family. Josias started his own farm, but more importantly for him, at that particular time he became associated with Eli Whitney in Augusta where he helped in the manufacture of cotton gins. Rezin, the youngest, stayed and worked with Walter for a few years before beginning to farm his own lands. Thus it appeared that most appropriate thing for Harry was help Josias with the farm work while Josias was away working in Augusta.

The association of Harry with Josias Lanham continued a lifetime for them, with many good times and some bad years. Probably the most heartrending for both was the tragic loss of Josias' young wife and

their three very young children in early 1820s. At that time Harry was a very impressionable young man in his mid-thirties. This loss was indelibly imprinted in his mind and on his heart. All the better years that followed could not erase his feelings. In later years Harry confided in "Mister Si", as he called Josias Lanham that when he passed on he wanted to be buried at the site of their first home in Edgefield District near the graves of those young ones he grew to love so much in the early 1800s.

Josias Lanham would fully honor his faithful companion's request. After they had gone on after the sorrowful 1820s to the best of times, Josias had greatly increased his farming operations. In the early 1850s he built his "big house", still aware of the deep feeling that burned in Harry's heart. Thus, when Harry died in November 1850, Josias followed the remains back to that place where they both had settled sixty years earlier. This monument in this quiet spot in the hills of Edgefield County is indeed "SACRED to the Memory of HARRY."

The Library of the Historical Society of Washington, D.C. can offer the following information to researchers:
-100 churches have been surveyed by "Collections: DC" and are on line. HSW library aides will search database and tell which churches returned the survey, will print out a records of the holdings of that church with a brief description of contents and time period, and give a contact person at the church.

Hungry for More on the Civil War? Then find William B. Styple's video "Echoes of the Blue & Gray." It is a documentary collection of films gleaned from archives in Washington, Los Angeles, New Orleans and other places. The video presents parades and reunions where former soldiers tell stories about campaigns they experienced. It was produced and distributed by Belle Grove Publishing Company. The commentary on the war and its effect on American history was co-authored by Brian Pohanka. The video features some of the earliest film available - 1890s. That clip was shot by Thomas Edison - inventor of the motion picture machine. The video contains footage of both the 50th and 75th anniversaries of the Battle of Gettysburg. It ends in 1959 when the last veteran of the war died. A second volume of "Echoes of the Blue & Gray" is in the making. More footage of black union soldiers is included there along with a profile of the last black veteran to die. (Insight, Feb 19, 1990, p 60-61)

[MCW 7:70] Will of Samuel QUEEN of PG Co, now being Pages 224-225. sick and weak of body. Date: 27 Dec. 1733. Item: To my loving son Samuell QUEEN all that track belonging to me called "the Inclosure" lying on the north side of the Eastern Branch to him and his heirs loving son Edward QUEEN all that track Item: To my "Underwood" lying in St. Mary's County to me called begining att a bounded white oake standing on the east side of the main branch of Choptico to him and his heirs forever.

To that child that I doe soepose my wife is now with child in case it shall prove a male child all that track called "the New Design" to him and his heirs forever, but in case it is a feamale then my desire is that the said track shall be sold at the descretion of my executrix the money to be equally devided and daughter Catherine QUEEN and the feamale child above mentioned the above said track lying in St. Mary's County. In case that the child that we sopose my wife is with child shall dye then the money to goe [w]holy to my daughter Catherine QUEEN. make my dearly beloved wife [not named] my whole and sole exctrix and my brother Marsham QUEEN and my brother in Law James EDELEN to be assistant in case of mortality. Remainder of my worldly goods an[d] chattles to be equally devided between my wife and children. Edward EDELEN, George () ALDER, Tho:s EDELEN Samell QUEEN. Wit: Jun'r.

21 March 1733/4. The widow is determined to have her thirds of the deceased's estate. Pet. DENT, D.C.

Proved 21 Mar. 1733/4 by oaths of Edward EDELEN, George ALDER and Thomas EDELEN Junr., taken before Sarah QUEEN widow & ex'x of the dec'd who made no objection to the probat. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (5 sides)

NOTES: The will of Samuel QUEEN of St. Mary's Co, Md, dated 10 Jan. 1711 [1712], probated 18 Mar. 1711-12, mentions sons Samuel, Marsham, William, daughters Katherine and Margret, wife Katherine, son-in-law Baker BROOKE, and father-in-law Richard MARSHAM [MCW 3:222]. Son Samuel received 300 acres "Underwood." Samuel QUEEN was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:270], not found 1719.

Marsham QUEEN d. 1771 in Charles Co, Md. His family is shown in Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, p.72. Samuel QUEEN (d. 1711) came from England to Md. about 1685 [ibid.]. The will of Richard MARSHAM,

1713, PG Co, mentions grandchildren Samuel, Marsham, William, Catherine, and Margrett QUEEN, children of Samuel QUEEN, decd. They jointly inherited "The Inclosure." [MCW 3:240]. Margaret QUEEN m. 1727, in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co, John BELT.

Samuel QUEEN m. Sarah EDELEN, 17 Feb. 1723 [1724], in King George's Parish, PG Co. [Barnes, Maryland Marriages, p.146; Newman, Charles County Gentry, p.172. Published register says 27 Feb.] She was b. there 18 Feb. 1705 [1706], dau. of Edward EDELEN (c.1676-1756) of "Dublin," PG Co, and his wife Elizabeth (JENKINS) JONES, daughter of Thomas and Anne JENKINS of Charles Co, and widow of Moses JONES (d. 1704/5, PG Co). Edward EDELEN was a son of Richard and Elizabeth EDELEN, immigrants to Md. ca. 1664. [Newman, op.cit., pp.126,172ff. The EDELEN family is well covered there.]

The children of Samuel and Sarah QUEEN were registered in King George's (Piscataway) Parish: Samuel 1724/5, Edward 1726/7, Henry 1729, Katherine 1731, Sarah 1734. Sarah, widow of Samuel QUEEN, m. 25 Feb. 1735/6, Edward PYE. They had children Elizabeth, Walter, Margaret [K.Geo. register; Newman, op.cit., p.172].

The will of Edward PYE was proved 1750, Charles Co, Md; that of Sarah PYE in 1773 [Magruder, <u>Index of Md. Colonial Wills</u>, p.389]. The will of Sarah PYE names her daughter Catherine EDELEN, grandchildren Elizabeth and Henry EDELEN, and son-in-law Joseph EDELEN whom she appointed executor [Newman, <u>op.cit.</u>, p.143].

Note that Samuel QUEEN's will omits son Henry, as does Newman, p.172, but he is found in the register and is otherwise proved. Henry QUEEN, who inherited "Pinner" in PG Co. from the will of his grandfather Edward EDLEN, d. without issue in 1768, St. Mary's Co, devising "Pinner" to his sisters Catherine EDELEN and Sarah JAMESON as per the provisions of his grandfather's will [Newman, p.174]. Henry QUEEN (1729-1768) m. after 1755, Monica (GARDINER) BROOKE, widow of Richard BROOKE of St. Mary's Co. [Fresco, Marriages and Deaths of St. Mary's County, p.245].

Catherine (QUEEN) EDELEN (b. 1731) was the wife of Joseph EDELEN, her second cousin (he d. 1775, Charles Co.). Her will was proved 1776 in PG Co., naming "brother" Benjamin JAMESON, apparently Sarah's husband, as guardian of her children. Walter PYE was named another executor [Newman, p.143-46]. Sarah (QUEEN) JAMESON, b. 9 Oct. 1734, is the posthumous child referred to in Samuel QUEEN's will.

Samuel QUEEN (b. 1724/5) apparently died 1758, P.G. leaving a will [Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.389; shown in IPR as 1858]. His representative in 1763 was Henry QUEEN [IPR, p.152].

The estate of Edward QUEEN (b. 1726/7) was appraised 1768 in PG Co, his administrator being Walter PYE [his half brother], his next of kin being Richard QUEEN and Henerite JEMSON [Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland, 1766-1769, p70; not found in IPR].

Pages 225-226. [MCW 7:66] Will of Ralph CRABB of PG Co, being sick & weak in body. Date: 14 Dec. 1733. My body to be decently buried by my exe'x hereafter named. Imprimis: To my three daughters Sarah, Margaret & Eleanor CRABB 100 pounds sterling money to each to be paid by my Ex'x when they arrive to the age of 16 or day of marriage.

Item: To my son Thomas CRABB all that tract called "Dear Park" containing about 470 acres, to him his heirs & assigns forever. Item: To my four sonns Henry Right, Ralph Jeremiah & John CRABB all those three tracts of land, vizt: "Valentines Garden enlarged" containing about 950 acres, "the Boleing Green" containing about 120 acres, [and 100 acres] which my brother Edward CRABB is to make over to me out of his land next adjacent to mine, the whole amounting to about 1170 acres. [In this will book only two tracts are named, and their total is shy 100 acres. Some words have been left out. MCW says brother Edward to make over 100 acres, not named.] The three tracts to be equally divided as near as may be into four parts, & each child to make choice of his part as soon as he shall come to age 21 or before if their mother shall think proper, to them & their heirs forever.

Item: To my beloved wife Priscilla CRABB all my right of a parcell, being part of a tract of land called "Essington," which I bought of Abraham CLARKE & James WILLIAMS, the whole containing about 400 acres, dureing her natural life in consideration of her right of dower in all my other lands. And whereas I believe my wife to be now with child, I give the said 400 acres called "Essington," after my wife's decease to the said child if it should be a boy, to him and his heirs forever. But if it should be a girl, then I give her 100 pounds sterling to be paid her at age 16 or day of marriage by my ex'x hereafter mentioned.

Item: To my dear & loving wife Priscilla CRABB & my five sons Thomas, Henry Right Ralph Jeremiah & John, and the child unborn if it should be a boy which my wife now goes with all the remaining part of my estate to be equally divided between them. [Page 226] And lastly, I appoint my said dear wife Prissilla CRABB ex'x of this will. The afores'd 15 Dec. 1733 [sic]. Signed: Ralph CRABB. Wit: Ninian MARIATE, John Smith PRATHER, William (WG) GOE, Eliz'a WILLSON, Edw'd SPRIGG.

Proved 8 March 1733/4, sworn by Maj'r Edw'd SPRIGG, Wm. GOE & Ninian MARIATE and John Smith PRATHER. Oath taken before Thomas CRABB heir at law, eldest son of the said testator, wh'ch sd. Thomas CRABB did not object to the probat of the said will. Before Pet. DENT, Dep'ty Com'ry of PG Co. (8-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Ralph CRABB was taxed in Patuxent Hundred, 1719 [BB:162, next to Henry WRIGHT] and 1733 [BB:266]. Ralph CRABB witnessed will of Reuben ROSS, PG Co, 1722 [MCW 5:120]. Ralph CRABB was a justice of PG County Court, a delegate to the General Assembly, and a visitor for the free school [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, p.18,20,150].

Ralph CRABB m. 22 Aug. 1716, in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co, to Priscilla SPRIGG. Their children registered in that parish: Sarah 1717, Thomas 1719, Margaret 1720, Henry Wright 1722/3, Ralph 1724, Ellinor 1726, Jeremiah 1728, John 1731.

Priscilla CRABB's father was Col. Thomas SPRIGG, who d. intestate 1736/9, PG Co.; her mother was Margaret (d. 1739), dau. of Edward and Honor MARIARTE of Anne Arundel Co. Her sister Eleanor SPRIGG m. Henry WRIGHT, Gent., ca. 1716 [Md. Genealogies, 2:389-390].

The inventory of Priscilla CRABB, deceased, was filed 1763, PG Co, with Henry W. CRABB as her administrator [IPR p.49]. Next of kin signing the inventory were Edward and Jeremiah CRABB [V.L. Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland, 1763-1766, p.11].

Thomas CRABB (probably the son) was appointed lieutenant of a PG Company of foot soldiers 1740 [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, p.156]. Henry Wright CRABB's will was proved in Frederick Co, Md, 1764. The will of Jeremiah CRABB was proved in Anne Arundel Co, Md, 1777 [Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.108].

An earlier Thomas CRABB witnessed a deed from David SMALL to Joshua CECELL, for land at "Mount Callvert Mannor," PG Co, 1700 [Deeds A:228]. Thomas CRABB, perhaps the same one, witnessed the will of William SMITH, Charles Co, Md, Feb. 1717 [1718] [MCW 4:136]. The will of Thomas CRABB, Charles Co, Jan. 1719 [1720] mentions daughters Eliza. and Margt., dau. Jane (wife of Charles Sommersett SMITH), wife Eliza. No sons are mentioned [MCW 5:3]. His given name and age make him a prime candidate to be Ralph and Edward's father; were the sons already provided for?

. A Henry CRAB was transported to Maryland 1665. In 1672 he was of Kent County, claiming a land grant for service [Skordas, <u>Early Settlers of Maryland</u>, p.114].

Edward CRABB (probably Ralph's brother) was administrator of the estate of Edmond TURNER, PG Co, 1725 [IPR p.185].

Genealogical Research of Military Records

Past Program Notes

by Nada D. Poole

Military records for the early wars [Colonial, Revolutionary, 1812, and Civil] may be located in the Maryland State Archives, at the Maryland Historical Society or at the National Archives. Military records for other states are located similarly.

Although many records have been published, they do not cover all who served. For example, Marylanders in the Confederacy by D. Hartzler covers only 1/3 to 1/2 of those who served. And in 1913, when L.H. Dielman edited Maryland Roster, War of 1812 there was no access to the War Dept. Records as there is now.

Two separate types of military records must be searched - those for the "regulars" and those for the "volunteer militia." Very few of the militia went into the regular army. Note: there are no records for the volunteer militia in Archives of Maryland Vol 18 - Muster Rolls ... of Maryland Troops in the American Revolution 1775-1783."

In addition, for each of the two classifications there are two types of records - 1) service records like muster rolls, and 2) benefit records like pension or bounty land. The applications and records of widows and minor children are especially good sources of genealogical information.

When searching, go for pension records first and you may get very lucky. Service and pension records are indexed but not bounty land records. The National Archives has records for Union soldiers during the Civil War but for Confederate pension records the searcher must go to state archives.

During the Civil War, Maryland was occupied by Union troops. However many Marylanders (up to 25,000) went south and their Confederate records are in those state archives.

Please take a few days from your summer research trips to organize your own work. Divide it by surnames into file folders (or groups of folders) and label them clearly. Then chart the relationships of these surnames very simply.

Now think about who will care for your work when you are finished with it. If there is no interested family member, list the surnames by location and add a brief summary. Send this list to genealogical and historical societies in those areas until a future home is found. If the material is organized, any society would welcome the opportunity to be the final repository of your selected research. Finally leave clear guidelines for your executors. Otherwise your life's work might end up in the trash can when you are gone - all for the want of a few file folders and instructions.

Revised Fee Schedules for Reproduction of Records. Fees for self-service microfilm to paper copies have been reduced, as have fees for duplication of microfilm, aerial contact prints, and electrostatic copies. However fees will be increased for reproduction and handling of specific types of records like military service files and passenger arrival lists (\$10), and Federal population census records (\$6). The minimum charge for all mail orders for reproductions will increase to \$6. Ask what the new fees are before you request a service.

<u>PITFALLS</u>. Some of the pitfalls to watch for in doing genealogical research include:

NEPHEW - Comes from Latin word for "GRANDCHILD."

CRAZY - In old terms meant "feeble health."

INMATE - Meant living in someone else's household.

SCOTCH IRISHMAN. The "History of North Carolina" by Lefler Newsome describes the Scotch Irishman as "Clannish, Contentious and Hard to get along with. Usually set in his ways as illustrated by the prayer attributed to him: 'Lord, grant that I may always be right, for Thou knowest that I am hard to turn'!"

IN RE--"IN REGARDS TO" may refer to ADOPTIONS in COURT RECORDS. You can often find adoptions listed in court records of many counties where divorce and probate records are filed. However, instead of listing adoption records alphabetically under the alpha character of "A" for adoptions, they are often listed under the alpha character of "I" which is where you will find "In Re" filings. Under this general heading, will be listed petitions for change of name and adoptions, among others. You are advised to approach these records with tact, since many courts will deny access to this information if they know you are looking for adoption records that are listed in the Probate Records under the "In Re" filings.

Enoch JENKINS of PG Co, being Pages 226-228. FMCW. 7:701 Will of sick & weak of body. Date: 19 Feb. 1733/4. Imprimis: well beloved wife all that part of a tract called "Gods Gift" whereon I now live which is comprehended within a line drawn from the end of a west line of the said tract & running to the head of the spring branch & down & with the said branch till it intersect the south line of the said land being on the north east end of the tract, including the improvements excepting the lower orchard to hold the said part only so long as she remaineth my widow as also two Negroes viz: man named commonly Nacey & one woman named Kate on the same condition as also her first choice of a feather bed & pompleat furniture viz. bolster, pillow, blanketts & coverlit & her choice of three cowes & calves, three pewter dishes six plates and a pot these last to her forever.

Item: To my eldest & well beloved son Francis all the remaining part of the said land called "Gods Gift" to be possessed thereof at the age of 16 years & the former bequeathed at the death or marriage of his mother also one [Page 227] Negroe woman called Jean & her increase, three cows and their increase, ten ewes & a ram, one feather bed with furniture, one pot, three dishes, six plates & two basons, tenn hoggs.

Item: To my second beloved son John a tract called "Rome" one Negroe girl called Loco [Saco?], a feather bed & furniture, six ews, one ram, two cows with their increase, one pot, three dishes, six plates, two basons.

Item: To my beloved son Daniel one Negro girl called Moll, two cows with their increase, six ewes & a ram, one feather bed & furniture, two sow & piggs.

Item: To my beloved son Zachariah one Negroe girl called Rachell & one half of a tract called "the Persimmon Tree branch" containing 121 acres, the other half to remain to Richard LANHAM & his heirs provided the sd tract be found clear of older surveys but if so incumbered then so much as shall be found clear to be equally devided between them.

Item: To my said son Zachariah a pot & two cows with their increase.

Item: To my son Bartholomew one Negro boy called Bob, one pot.

Item: To my son Josias which ready money I have at the date hereof in Great Britain to be laid out in the purchase of a young Negro at the discretion of my executors hereafter named.

Item: To my daughter Ann the produce of four h{ogs}heads of tobacco to be sent home this present season consigned to such merchant as my said ex'rs shall think fit the said produce to be laid out in purchase of a young Negroe for my said daughters use & the foreaid four hheads to contain each 750 pounds of tobacco.

Item: To Mr. Henry WHITNALL, Priest one hhead of tobacco containing 700 pounds weight.

Item: All the remaining part of my goods & chattles be disposed of as follows, viz: one third part to my forsaid wife & the other two thirds to be equally divided among my above named children. [Note: Children in MCW are not listed in same order.]

Lastly: I appoint Francis GOODRICK of Charles County and Richard LANHAM of PG Co. to be executors of this will. Signed: Enoch JENKINS. Wit: Zach'a WADE, Thomas EDELIN Jun'r, Jn'o HAWKINS Jun'r.

23 March 1733/4 the widow determined to have her thirds of the dec'd estate. Pet. DENT, D[eputy] C[commissary].

Proved 25 March 1733/4 [sic, 25 Mar. is New Year's Day 1734 Old Style, and same year New Style], by oaths of Zachariah WADE, Thomas Edelen & John HAWKINS Jun'r, before Daniel JENKINS, bro'r [=brother] of the dec'd who made no objection to the said probat. Sworn before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

17 Feb. 1733/4. The came William THOMAS & Richard LANHAM and made oath that they heard Enoch JENKINS of PG Co, deceased, declair on his death bead that his son Francis JENKINS shoud have & possess after decease a Negro man called Dick then in possession of the said Enoch JENKINS & allso that his son John JENKINGS should have & possess a Negro man called Charles then in the possession of said Enoch JENKINS. [Page 228] Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (9-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Daniel JENKINSON of Charles Co, planter, bought "Gods Guift" on Piscattaway Creek, in 1696, from William HERBERT [PG Deeds A:372]. An administrative account was filed on the estate of Daniel JENKINS, deceased, 12 Aug. 1706, PG Co, by Thomas CHESICK [IPR p.106]. "Gods Gift," which was the home property of Enoch JENKINS, was apparently inherited from Daniel. Daniel JENKINS is probably the father of Enoch JENKINS and his brother Daniel. "Rome" is now located within Washington, D.C. It was granted in 1663 to Francis POPE [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, folding map].

William, Enock, Daniell, Thomas and Elizabeth JENKINS were taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. Enoch JENKINS was m. 26 Jan. 1718 [1719] to Anne CLARVO, King George's Parish, PG Co. Their child registered there: Francis 1721. Ann was the daughter of Francis CLARVO (d. 1721/2) and his wife Bridget (d. 1754) [MCW 5:79, IPR p.44]. In 1734, Christopher EDELEN and John DICKINSON were sureties for the widow's bond [Newman, Charles County Gentry, p.190]. John DICKINSON is apparently the husband of Frances (CLARVO) DICKISON, sister of Ann (CLARVO) JENKINS [MCW 5:79]. When Enoch JENKINS' inventory was filed, 29 Oct. 1734, his representative was John PHILIPS, perhaps the new husband of his widow Ann [IPR p.106].

Francis JENKINS (apparently the one b. 1721) is shown in the 1776 census of PG Co. as aged 57, with wife Ann aged 46, and males aged 14, 14 (twins?), and 12, and females 25 and 10. Nearby lived William JENKINS aged 33 [Brumbaugh, Md. Records, 1:38].

John and Rachel JENKINS had the following child registered in King George's Parish: Lucy 1751. John and <u>Frances</u> JENKINS had the following children: Joseph 1755, James 1761, Ann 1764, William 1768.

Zachariah and Sarah JENKINS had (also in King George's Parish): Mary 1755, Susanah 1762. Zachariah and Martha JENKINS had: Sarah Ann 1765. The will of Zachariah JENKINS was proved 1792, PG Co; Martha A. JENKINS was his executrix in 1796 [IPR p.107].

Bartholemew and Mary JENKINS had the following children in King George's Parish: Catherine 1752, Daniel 1761, Enock 1764, Bartholemew 1766, Margaret 1772, Amelia 1774.

Anne dau. of Enoch JENKINS received personalty from the will of John DICKINSON of PG Co (apparently her uncle), 1742 [MCW 8:280]. Ann JENKINS was m. to Joseph HUMPHREY, 25 Sep. 1748, in King George's Parish.

Josias JENKINS chose John JENKINS as his guardian, Aug. 1749, indicating Josias was between 14 and 21 years of age, was probably the youngest child, and was probably b. ca. 1733 [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.57].

The will of Francis GOODRICK was probated 1745 in Charles County [Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.184].

An Enoch and Bartholomew JENKINS were living in Monongalia Co, (W) Va. in 1787 [Schreiner-Yantis, 1787 Census of Va., p.1317]

Pages 228-229. [MCW 7:69] Will of Nathaniel MAGRUDER of PG Co, planter, being sick and weak of body. Date: 13 March 1731 [1732]. To be decently buried in such manner as shall seem fit to my executrix hereafter named. Imps: To my dear and well beloved wife Mary all that part of a tract called "Anchovies Hills" (where I now live) that lyes eastward of the main Branch and the fork that comes from William MILES his Spring for and during her natural life and after her decease to be equally divided between my two daughters Mary and Susannah and their heirs forever.

Item: To my son George all that tract called the [blank; MCW: "The Venture"] scituate at Mattawoman in Prince Georges County to him and his heirs forever. To my afores'd son George all that part of a tract called "Anchovie Hills" that lyes westward of the main Branch and the fork that comes from William MILES his spring to him and his heirs forever.

Item: To my son Nathaniel my lott at Mill Town to him and heirs. Item: To my daughter Elizabeth all that tract called "the Level \underline{s} " scituate at Mattawoman in Prince Georges County being 100 acres to her and heirs.

Item: All my goods and chattles as Negroes, horses, cattle, hoggs and household goods &ca. to be equally divided among my five children namely George, Ann, Elizabeth, Mary and Susannah. I appoint my dear and well beloved wife Mary MAGRUDER my sole executrix. Signed: Nathaniel () MAGRUDER. Wit: John ADAMS, Alex'r MGRUDER, James NAILOR.

27 Mar. 1734. The widow is determined to have her thirds of the deced's estate. Pet. DENT, D.C. Endorsed 27 Mar. 1734 by John ADAMS, Alex'r MAGRUDER and James NAILOR who depose & say they saw Nathaniel MAGRUDER sign. [Page 229] Which oath was taken before the ex'x of the deceased who made no objection to the probat of the said will. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)



NOTES: According to Effie Bowie, the immigrant, Alexander MAGRUDER, was b. in Perthshire, Scotland, in 1610. He is thought to have been taken prisoner at the Battle of Worcester, 1651, which led to his being brought to America. (The birthplace may be correct, but his date of birth seems rather early.) He was in Maryland by 1653, and in 1668 patented 400 acres called "Anchovie Hills," along the west side of the Patuxent, where he died in 1677. He left that property in his will to his sons Alexander and Nathaniel or the survivor of them. They were sons of his third wife Elizabeth, whom he married after 1670. Son Alexander lived 1671-1746 [Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, p.534-536].

Alexander and Nathaniel MAGRUDER registered their livestock marks at PG Court, Nov. 1696 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.60]. Nathaniell MAGRUDER was appointed an overseer for the highways in Mattapony Hundred, 1698 [ibid., p.365].

It seems to me that our testator, Nathaniel MAGRUDER (d. 1734), must be the same as the immigrant's son, due to his ownership of "Anchovies Hills." Nathaniel (mark) MAGRUDER (b. ca. 1674) was unmarried in 1701 when he sold a 28 acre piece of "Anchovis Hills" without release of a wife's dower [PG Deeds A:383].

In Apr. 1703, Nathaniell MAGRUDER petitioned for a resurvey of "St. Elizabeth" in PG Co, to define land left to MAGRUDER's wife from the will of Geiles BLIZARD of Charles Co. called "Bero Plains," which was taken away by Col. John ADDISON in a survey of "St. Elizabeth" In Oct. 1704, Nathaniel (mark) MAGRUDER and [PG Deeds C:95]. Alexander MAGRUDER were among a jury approving a survey [C:121b]. Aug. 1707, Nathaniell (mark) MAGRUDER and Susan MAGRUDER of PG Co. part of "Bero Plaine" [C:198a, abstracts by Elise sold 93 acres, Jourdan. The tract name should be read "Blue Plains", now in southern D.C.1.

The will of Gyles BLYZARD of Charles Co, 1678, probated 1688, left part of "Buplaine" and all of "Cane's Purchase" to his daughter Susanna [MCW 2:35]. She must be the Susan who m. Nathaniel MAGRUDER 1701/3.

In 1719, Nath. MAGRUDER and Alexander MAGRUDER were taxed in Mattapeny Hundred [BB:160]. In 1733 Alexander and Nathl. MAGRUDER were still there [BB:276].

George MAGRUDER, aged about 15, chose Robert WHITAKER, Gent., of PG Co, as his guardian, June 1737. Susanah MAGRUDER chose George MAGRUDER as her guardian, March 1745. Thus George was b. ca. 1722, and the youngest child, Susannah, was b. ca. 1730 [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.73]. Nathaniel Jr. seems to be older, perhaps the son of the first wife (Susanna BLIZARD).

One George MAGRUDER is shown in PG Co. in the 1790 census: I white male over 16, 2 white females, and 6 slaves [Heads of Families, 1790, p.96]. Near him are two households headed by women, Mary and Elisabeth MAGRUDER. Two other George MAGRUDERS lived in Montgomery Co, Md, that year [ibid., p.86,90].

The will of George MAGRUDER was proved in PG Co. 1800 [IPR p.124]. Men named Nathaniel MAGRUDER died in PG Co. ca. 1776, 1786, 1790 [IPR p.125]. Men named Nathaniel MAGRUDER were buried in PG Parish in 1798 and 1803 [published par. reg., p.268].

The George Peabody Library of the Johns Hopkins University has operated under a variety of parent organizations. It originated in 1857 as part of the Peabody Institute associated with a conservatory of music and an art collection. Currently a division of the Johns Hopkins University, the Library functions separately from the Conservatory of Music (which has its own new library). Now designated a component of the Special Collections Department of the Eisenhower Library of Johns Hopkins, from 1966-1982 the Peabody Library was part of the City of Baltimore's Enoch Pratt Free Library.

The Peabody Library building is renown for its striking architectural interior with five tiers of ornamental cast-iron balconies. The general reference collection consists of about 250,000 items which are generally non-circulating. The stacks above the first floor are closed to the public. However most genealogies, local histories, and other source books and periodicals are kept on the first floor in open stacks in both the Reading Room and in the Main Library. The genealogical collection comprises about 30,000 volumes with an emphasis in British and Mid-Atlantic genealogies and nice New England, Southern, and German collections.

Of particular note are the Baltimore City Directories (1797 to present with gaps when not published), the New England Register (complete series), the American Genealogical Index, the British Public Record Office Series, the Victoria County History Series, some British Pedigrees, and a series of British Parish Registers. (Only 25% of the existing Parish Registers of the Church of England dating from 1538-1837 have been published. The Peabody Library has only a small fraction of these, however they have more than anyone else around, even the Library of Congress. Several record societies are involved in publishing these. There are some finding aids available and a guide for using them but no whole name index exists. If you know what you need, call to see if they have it.)

If you are planning a trip to Great Britain, be sure to check what records are available stateside first. That way you can search the remote parish and county agency records when you are overseas instead of wasting your time on the published items that you could have seen here or among the LDS records.

If you need extensive help with specifics in your genealogy work, you might call first to see if the two staffers who are more expert will be on duty when you visit. Mr. Robert Bartram specializes in British Records, while Mr. Gary Meyer can be more helpful with the German records. There are many finding aids in the library, however you should try at least two approaches to the Peabody Collection. One is to just browse the shelves first to familiarize yourself with their holdings, and again later as you find yourself working in certain areas. However good the other finding aids are, it always seems you'll find something interesting on the shelf that you never find in a card file.

The other approach is to search the "card files." There are three of them. One is the general library-wide regular card file. Another is the genealogy card file which may contain additional entries not in the other (those acquired since 1966). The third is the on-line computerized card file which contains the acquisitions after 1989 which the other card files won't. However this also lists the holdings of the other libraries of Johns Hopkins.

There are some microform resources at the library with a single reader and printer for each type available. There is a regular copier in the reading room. Generally you won't find the Peabody Library very crowded despite its extensive collection. The librarians are helpful and will even try to respond to specific letters or phone calls about their holdings. There are parking lots and a garage in the area if you drive up for the day or there is a Comfort Inn very close by as well as an Elder Hostel if you want to make a longer visit.

In January we received a letter from S.Sgt James D. DeVille, USMC. He was writing from Saudi Arabia, requesting some help in finding out who his ancestors were. After reading a book about genealogy, he realized how little he knew about his own Afro-American family.

her some Family Sheets, filled in with information James had sent. Although I have had no response from his aunt, I have had several letters from James. His last letter was written on the *USS Nassau*, on his way back to his base in Cherry Point, NC where his wife and 3 children are waiting. I don't know if his ship has come home yet or not.

I'm not sure how much genealogy we can find for him, but we have enjoyed corresponding with each other. He even sent a Marine desert hat to me for my Husband, who is an ex-Marine. I feel we will be hearing more from this Marine.



Free Black Clandestinely Abducted in Maryland Taken to Virginia

George, a free black man detained in slavery by William Ray in Virginia, petitioned his case to "a court held for Bedford County (VA) at the Courthouse the 22d day of October in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ten."

After perusing many pages of petitions and depositions, the submitter of this article learned that petitioner George "was born of a certain negro woman of the name of Betty who is at present in possession of Luke Ray Senr. and claimed by him as a slave." Betty, the petitioner's mother was the child of "a certain negro or mulattoe woman Lettice, who formerly resided in the State of Maryland." Lettice was either born free or emancipated previous to the birth of Betty, so that the petitioner descending in the maternal line was entitled to his freedom.

Edward Watts was appointed by the court to give an opinion on George's petition. He learned that indeed a "mulattoe woman named Lettice" had a child named Betty who was taken to Virginia by a "certain Tabethay Tracy about the year 1765" and that Tabethay later married Luke Ray Senr. who then gained possession of Betty. Depositions relative to this matter were taken from Benjamin Willett and Mary Litton et al in the State of Maryland (primarily Prince George's and Montgomery Counties).

It seems Lettice had resided in Maryland with "a certain Ezabel Willett & that the said negro or

molatto woman Lettice was either born free or emancipated previous to the birth of ... first named petitioner ... and was clandestinely brought to this State (VA) by a certain Tabatha Tracy, the Daughter of the aforesaid Ezabel Willot ..."

Depositions were subsequently taken from Michael Litton, Mary Litton & Benjamin Willett and other witnesses residing in the State of Maryland. "Benjamin Willett deposeth and sayeth that his sister Tabitha Tracy then a widow left the State of Maryland about forty two years ago & took with her a negro girl between seven & nine years of age named Betty, that the Mother of Betty was named Lettice Grymes who was considered to be a free born woman ...".

Michael Letton "saith that he knew a certain yellow woman named Leticia Grimes who lived in the family of Thomas Willett ...".

The entire court case, too lengthy for more than a summary here, was shared by Willett descendant Delores Pederson. Researchers wishing to exchange information about any person named above may contact Mrs. Pederson

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The Berlin Documents Center, located in the West Berlin suburb of Zehlendorf, contains 100 million pieces of paper in 30 million files. It is possibly the world's largest collection of materials documenting the Third Reich. (The Nazis were obsessed with documentation. For example, applicants for citizenship were evaluated physically, their possessions catalogued, and family interviewed. Members of the elite military submitted 6 generation pedigrees before they were allowed to marry.) Party membership records and personnel dossiers are included in these files. Indeed the records are so extensive that many have not yet been examined.

While the center has been in American hands, it is destined to be released soon to the unified German government. As a prelude, microfilming proceeds at the rate of 40,000 sheets per day which the Americans are expected to keep. This is in response to prosecutors and Jewish groups that have expressed concern over the planned change. In the past, under the US Freedom of Information Act, virtually anyone could gain access to these files, which have been used in every single war crimes trial. However under German laws only governments and scholars may see the files. In fact, German privacy rights extend even beyond death. (*The Washington Post*, July 9, 1990, A 14).

Pages 229-230. [MCW 7:71] Will of James GREENFIELD of PG Co, being sick and weak in body. Date: 21 Nov. 1733. Whereas some time past I made a deed to my two eldest daughters which I designed to be in full of their claims to my estate which their husbands and they are in full possession of it is my will they claim no more of my estate except where it be hereby otherwise appointed and whereas since I made a deed in trust to my wife and her two sons which I designed to be in full of all their claims to my estate real and personal and if her said two sons should notwithstanding hereafter claim any part of my estate then I will they receive no more than one shilling each out of my said estate and my wife be at her election according to law.

In order to provide for my two youngest daughters support and maintenance I hereby give and bequeath to my said daughters Sarah and Eliner one tract of land containing about fifty acres called "Pheasants Hills" called "Trumans together with a hundred acres Hills." to them and the heirs of their bodies lawfully begotten forever, and in case of the want of such heirs, said lands to be equally divided between my two eldest daughters (viz) Mary BROOKE and Elizabeth SKINNER and their heirs forever. Lastly I appoint my trusty & well beloved friends and kinsmen Colonel Leonard HOLLIDAY and Mr. Henry SKINNER to be executors. Signed: James GREENFIELD. Thos. ADDINGTON, Samuel KEECH, Simon RAINE.

Codicil dated 21 Nov. 1733: I appoint my trusty and well beloved friends and kinsmen Colonel Leonard HOLLIDAY and Mr. Thos. GANTT of Prince George County, Gent., Major Adderton SKINNER and Mr. Henry SKINNER of Calvert County or any one of them to convey and make all title and interest of my right in and to a tract lying in PG Co. called "Bealls Gift" unto Leonard COVINGTON and Elizabeth COVINGTON same county legatees and devisees of the late Mr. Leving COVINGTON late of PG Co aforesaid deceased in as full and ample manner and at their charge in the law as myself might or could have said deed or done, were I personally present, and provided the conveyance shall not prejudiced the estate I have or have had in any other land in this province. [Page 230] Signed: James GREENFIELD. Thomas ADDINGTON, Samuel KEECH, Simon RAINE.

Endorsed 26 Mar. 1734 by Thomas ADDINGTON, Samuel KEECH & Simon RAINE, oath taken in presence of Col'l Leonard HOLLYDAY who is left one of the ex'rs which said Leonard HOLLYDAY did not object to the said probat. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)



NOTES: James GREENFIELD inherited 52 acres, "Pheasant Hills," from his father Thomas GREENFIELD of PG Co. (d. 1715). He was executor of his father's will [MCW 4:39; PGCGS Bulletin, Apr. 1986, p.119]. His mother was Martha (TRUMAN) GREENFIELD (d. 1739), daughter of Dr. James and Ann (STORER) TRUMAN [Md. Genealogies 2:91].

James GREENFIELD and T. Truman GREENFIELD witnessed a deed from Thomas GREENFIELD, 1700 [PG Deeds A:348]. James GREENFIELD witnessed a deed from Clarke SKINNER of Calvert Co, 1707 [PG Deeds C:189].

James GREENFIELD was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:160], and (as Capt. James GREENFIELD) 1733 [B:276]. Inventories of the estate of James GREENFIELD were filed in 1734 and 1735, with Elinor GREENFIELD signing as legal representative [IPR p.82].

His daughter Mary Ashcom GREENFIELD was the wife of Walter BROOKE of PG Co (1707-1740/1), son of Thomas and Lucy (SMITH) BROOKE, and had five children. Winifred ASHCOM, spinster, names nieces Mary Ashcom GREENFIELD and Elizabeth GREENFIELD in her will, St. Mary's Co, 1717 [Md. Genealogies 1:109-110; MCW 4:127].

James GREENFIELD's first wife, probably dead by 1716, was apparently Martha ASHCOM, a daughter of Charles ASHCOM of St. Mary's Co. (d. 1702) who m. 1687 Martha EARLE (1667-1724). ASHCOM's children: Samuel (d. 1721), Charles (d. 1727), Winifred (d. 1718), John (18 in 1702), and Martha (16 in 1702). Martha ASHCOM, the widow m.(2nd) 1702/05, John DANSEY of St. Mary's Co. [Fresco, Marriages and Deaths of St. Mary's Co, p. 11, 332]. In his will, John DANSEY (d. 1716) mentions Mary GREENFIELD [MCW 4:51]. Mary Ashcom GREENFIELD and Elizabeth GREENFIELD are called granddaughters, under age 16, in the will of Martha DANSEY, St. Mary's Co, 1724 [MCW 5:165].

James GREENFIELD m.(2nd) Eleanor, dau. of Thomas and Mary SMITH of Calvert Co. The will of Thomas SMITH, gent., 1734, names daughters Eleanor GREENFIELD and Sarah HOLLIDAY [MCW 7:100]. Sarah SMITH was the first wife of Col. Leonard HOLLYDAY. Margery, wife of Levin COVINGTON and Thomas GANTT, was a sister of Leonard HOLLIDAY [Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, p.737; Levin COVINGTON's will, 1725, MCW 5:212; Leonard HOLLYDAY's will, 1739/41, MCW 8:135].

The will of Mary SMITH of Calvert Co, 1739, makes a bequest to Walker [=Walter?] GREENFIELD, son of James GREENFIELD and her dau. Elinor. This son, not mentioned in James' will, would be his heirat-law [MCW 8:54]. Cf. Walter Smith GREENFIELD, aged 45, living in Frederick Co, Md, 1776 [Brumbaugh, Md. Records, 1:183].

[MCW 7:74] Will of Daniel CARROLL of Duddington Pages 230-232. Mannor in PG Co, at present in a low state of health. Date: 1734. To my loving wife Ann CARROLL all my houshold goods that shall be in use at my dwelling House on Duddington Mannor at the time of my death, my plate excepted which with the proportion of the plate which will be due to me by my father's will after my mother's death I give to my son Charles. I desire that the Articles of Intermarige between me and my said wife be duly executed and fullfilled. Whereas I have appointed my slaves and chattles & chattles [sic] to be sold and the proceeds thereof with all my personall of what nature or kind so ever be lodged at interest in such a manner as my Trustees herein after either of them shall think proper. To my wife Ann CARROLL one eighth part of the interest which shall accrue and be received on the Money to be lodged at interest to her during her widowhood and



this provision I make for my said wife in full satisfaction for her dower out of my real estate and also of her thirds out of my personal estate. It is my will that out of my outstanding debts and mortgages and the mortgages due to to [sic] my father of land &ca which he left to be sold to pay my sisters portions that my proportion or half of my sisters portion be paid and the she accept the sume due from me to her upon the securitys and in the state they now stand or that my part of the money be collected for her or mortgaged lands sold to make up my part of the money due to her as soon as possible so that my estate be not burthened with any interest for want of the payment of her portion.

I hereby authorize my Trustees or either of them hereafter named to sell all my Negroes & chattles not herein [Page 231] devised and the produce thereof with all my personal estate to lodge in some of the funds or stocks in England at interest or otherwise at interest as my trustees or either of them shall judge proper for the greater benefit & equal advantage of my three children. I desire my said trustees or either of them to sell all my lands which shall not in any one tract amount to above 500 acres be the said lands mine by mortgage orotherwise and the proceeds thereof to be lodged at interest as in the above paragraph as directed for the equal advantage of my three children.

Whereas I am intituled to 5000 acres of land laid on Toms Creek on Monoccasie being part of a warrant of twenty thousand acres granted my father there being also five thousand acres more laid out at a small distance from it, now I hereby give whatsover of the said tracts which shall fall to my share unto my daughters Eleanor and Mary and their heirs forever to be equally divided between them. I authorize my said trustees or either of them either to tenanat out the said land for my said daughters or sell the same for their sole use and advantage as they shall judge proper and if sold the money to lodge at interest as aforesaid for the use of my said daughters.

Whereas a pattent has passed to me and my brother and sisters for 10,000 acres of land at the Mouth of Monaccosie I devise, release and confirm unto my sister Mary all my interest in the said tract according to the intention of my father's will.

Whereas I am concerned in an Iron Work one fifth which is built on Charles Run nigh Gwinns falls in Baltimore County, it is my will that out of the monies or profits arrising from the said Iron work or out of the money ariseing by the sale of my said lands or mortgages (my intention not being that any monies may be so applyed whereby to lessen the interest coming to my wife as afs'd from the monies arising from the sale of the other parts of my persoanl estate) so much shall be applied from time to time as shall be thought necessary by my said trustees or either of them for carrying on the said work and it is my will that my proportion of the Negroes servants and chattles imployed in the said work be not sold among my other Negroes chattles and it is also my will that the proceeds of the said work go to and be applied to the capital advantage & benefit of my three children then I impower my trustees or either of them to sell my share of the said Works including the lands bought for the use of the said Works provided my trustees purchase not the said share for And the money arising by such sale I desire may be laid out by my said trustees or either of them in manner before mentioned



one half of the interest thereof to go and be equally divided between my two daughters untill my sone comes to the age of 21, the other half of the said interest with the whole principal I give to my said son. In case my share in the said work be not sold then I give and bequeath the same to my son Charles and his heirs forever with all the chattles imployed in the said Works when he shall attain the age of 21.

Whereas I am apprehensive that my brother Charles CARROLL one of my said trustees will be the only acting trustee under this my will and that the powers and authoritys given to my said trustees may not be fully executed or compleated before my said brothers death, now I do hereby give my said brother full power and authority by his last will and testament or any [Page 232] other writing by him duly signed and sealed to delegate and appoint after his death any person or persons to execute and perform any of the trusts or powers given him my said trustees or either of them. I appoint my son Charles CARROLL executor of this my will and whereas he is by reason of his age unfit to take the execution thereof on himself CARROLL and my friend Richard BENNETT Esqr. to be brother Charles overseers and trustees thereof to see the same punctually fulfilled executed. Signed: Dan CARROLL. Wit: MMacnamara, Nicholas BROOKE, Elis'a BROOKE, C: CARROLL.

11 May 1734. Michael Macnamara, Nicholas BROOKE, Elizabeth BROOKE and Charles CARROLL the witnesses depose they saw Daniel CARROLL sign the will. Before D. DULANY, Com[missa]ry Gen[era]ll.

Letters adm'n with the will annexed go to the trustees or either of them during the executor's minority. D. DULANY.

Mrs. Ann CARROLL the relict of the testator declared her assent to and acquiescence in the foregoing will & acceptance of the legacies & bequeats therein mentioned. 11 May 1734. D. DULANY. (15-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Charles CARROLL of Carrollton (1737-1832), Signer of the Declaration of Independence, was a nephew of the testator, as shown in a pedigree published in Tracey and Dern, <u>Pioneers of Old Monocacy</u>, p.26. Daniel Carroll of "Duddington" (1707-1734) was the son of Charles CARROLL, "the Settler" (1660-1720) and his second wife Mary DARNALL (1678-1742). His father immigrated to Maryland 1688 from Kings County, Ireland, was Proprietary Attorney General, Agent and Receiver General for Maryland. Mary DARNALL was a daughter of Col. Henry DARNALL of Anne Arundel Co. (1645-1711) and his wife Eleanor (HATTON) BROOKE [Bowie, Across the Years, p.238-240].

Daniel CARROLL's lands on the Monocacy are described in Tracey and Dern, op.cit. The pedigree chart there shows that of Daniel's children, Charles CARROLL (1729-1773) m. Mary HILL; Mary CARROLL (1730-1785) m. Ignatius DIGGES; and Eleanor CARROLL (1732-1763) m. Daniel CARROLL of Upper Marlborough (1730-1796).

Daniel CARROLL (the testator) was m. 1728 to Anne ROZER, [Bowie, p.274-275]. "Duddington," was bequeathed to her by her father Notley ROZER, 1727. Ann (ROZER) CARROLL (ca. 1711-after 1762) m.(2nd) Benjamin YOUNG (d. 1754) [Bowie, p.572, 618; see PGCGS Bulletin, Oct. 1988, p.19-21].

Germany: Hans Joachim Hinners, who does research in the Northern Region in his spare time, is employed at the courthouse in Bremerhaven as a secretary. He has collected a lot of information from churchbooks and can make available photostats for the following years: 1715-1726, 1746, 1751, 1752, 1759-1852. For some villages he has data after 1900 to nearly the present, or before the beginning of the churchbooks.

For the village of Misselwarden he has put together a village lineage book consisting of 334 pages, containing all families between 1689-1900. It is available for \$45.00, including postage (surface mail), plus \$1.00 in cash to cover the service charge for foreign checks.

The Case of the Methodist Headstone

Chapin. a 23-year-old employee of American University's Bender Library, moved into an apartment at 3700 Massachusetts Ave. NW at the end of May. isn't unusual for a previous tenant to leave something behind. either out of haste or out of But when Greg marched sloth. into his new digs for the first time, he discovered that his predecessors had left behind a hunk of the macabre: a headstone.

It's granite, and it weighs about 60 pounds. Greg guesses - and I concur - that it must have been stolen from a cemetery one raucous, drunken night by a bunch of college students, who then turned it into an indoor ornament and conversation piece. But the question is: Which cemetery?

Because Greg is a researcher by profession, he couldn't bring himself to lug the headstone down the hall to the trash room and wave goodbye. He began

calling around in his spare time to see if a local cemetery was missing the stone of John White, who departed this earth on March 3, 1851 (or perhaps it's 1854 - the last digit has been largely rubbed away).

The stone provides an excellent clue. It says that John White (who lived to be 84, by the way) was a Methodist. Grea tried several local Methodist churches. but he struck out. He got a little warmer when he spoke to the archivist at the Baltimore Methodist Conference, but that office had no record of where a John White from the 19th century was interred. Meanwhile, I've tried to chase down the previous occupants of Greg's apartment, without success.

Does anyone have a clue or a theory? If so, I'm at (202) 334-7276. If a certain bunch of thieves would like to call and make this easy, that'd be even better.
