Queries are published free for non-members as space allows.

The meeting was called to order by President Donald Barnes. The minutes of the May meeting were approved as published in the BULLETIN. The Secretary reported, pursuant to a vote at the May 22 Council meeting, she had written letters to State Senator Meyer Emmanuel supporting repeal of the 1898 law which prohibits public access to vital records and to County Executive Winfield M. Kelly expressing concern over the relocation of historic landmarks without proper care being taken to preserve the original ambience as evidenced by the relocation of the Berry graves at the Brown Station Road landfill operation. Incoming mail was read. The Treasurer, Lorraine VanTassel reported the checking account balance of \$146.25, savings account balance of \$1,269.09, totaling \$1,415.34, and reminded members that dues are payable as of this date.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Program Committee Chairman Freeman Morgan announced the program of the evening.

Education Committee Chairman Sarah Fleming reported that 19 persons went on the tour of the Hall of Records, Annapolis, and that it was most interesting and informative. She pointed out the beginners kits and other material on display. Librarian Kathryn Newland announced that books may be borrowed for the summer months to be returned at the September meeting.

Records Committee Chairman Orville Russell reported that the 1850 County census project remains uncompleted with both abstracting and proofing being required, the microfilm being at the Bowie library. Olive Jones reported she submitted 42 Family Group Sheets to the Registrar, to make a total of 106.

Publications Committee Chairman Catherine Mayhew announced that the index to the first five volumes of the BULLETIN are for sale at \$1, and that material for the August BULLETIN must be received by July 10, and asked for assistance in making new arrangements for production of the BULLETIN.

Special Publications Editor Shirley Wilcox announced that Special Publication No. 2, Bibliography, will be ready for distribution by September.

Membership Committee Chairman Jeanne Bornefeld nominated the following people, all of whom were elected to membership: William James Taylor, Jr., LaVerne Patty Taylor, William Robert Bandy, Patricia Ann Bandy, Dorice R. UNFINISHED BUSINESS: The President Donald Barnes read the proposed slate of officers proposed by the Nominating Committee as printed in the BULLETIN. There were no nominations from the floor. Upon motion of Laird Towle which was seconded, the vote was taken electing the slate as read. Elected were: Shirley Wilcox, President; Calvin Jones, 1st Vice Pres.(Program); James McCafferty, 2nd Vice Pres.(Membership); Cleo Ludeman, Secretary; Lorraine VanTassel, reasurer; Paul MacInnis, Records Comm. hrmn.; Catherine Mayhew, Publications Comm. Chrm; Sarah Fleming, Education Comm. Chairman; and Kathryn Newland, Auditor.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: The President reported on action taken at the May 22 Council meeting; he requested members to fill out committee survey sheets. Shirley Wilcox presented to the Society An Index to Illinois Newspapers and a packet from a National Archives Seminar on Land Records. Laird Powle suggested a round of applause for the outgoing officers which was heartily given.

SHOW AND TELL: Laird Towle reported further on his investigation of Theophilus Smith and his itinerant capers through New Hampshire Court Records between 1805 and 1816. Barbara Dash reported on the seminar in Boston on New England families which she found very informative and upon a review she witnessed on Boston Common of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, the background of which was related. Emerald Miner told that a history is being prepared of Washington County, Indiana, of which Salem is the county seat, and can be ordered for \$20. Eleanor Short related experiences of visiting Shortsville, New York. Robert Ward displayed an impressive genealogy of the descendants of William Ward of Sudbury. Pricia Paulkovich displayed a microfilm catalog from Bell and Howell Company and presented a gift to retiring president Donald Barnes from the Program Committee. Program Chairman Freeman Morgan expressed appreciation to the members serving on the Program Committee for the furnishing of refreshments and then introduced the speaker, Pricia Paulkovich, who rendered an instructive talk on research at the Library of Congress. The meeting was adjourned.

Located on Brown Station Road, Upper Marlboro, Maryland

These two graves were located in the Prince George's County Land Fill on Brown Station Road, Upper Marlboro, Prince George's County, Maryland. In April 1975 they were opened and moved to a cemetery on Sheriff Road.

Nothing was found in the graves, so a handful of dirt was taken to the new grave site and buried. The large flat stone broke in several pieces and was replaced by a bronze marker.

A week or so later, two skulls and large bones were dug up. If the stone was placed correctly over the grave, then there were other people buried there. The men with Public Works seem to think that the graves shifted.

(Editor's Note: A letter in response to Society inquiry on this matter from Winfield M. Kelly, Jr. dated June 23, 1975, states in part:

"When the bones were discovered a week after the initial digging, Mount Harmony cemetery personnel were contacted. They removed and buried the remains; a plaque was used because of a cemetery ordinance forbidding headstones." See also minutes on p.2.)

FACILITIES OF THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

Talk by Pricia Burk Paulkovich, June 4, 1975, at the Society

(These notes taken by Phyllis Cox with additional data supplied by Pricia Paulkovich.)

The Library of Congress, set up especially for the use of Congress, is probably the world's largest library with a collection of 74 million items. However, it does not have every book printed.

One of the best times to visit the Library of Congress is when Congress is not in session, as well as Saturday and Sunday. Then you can park around the Capitol. Other parking is on the streets around the Library, some free and some metered. It is not always easy to get a parking place.

The Library is open Monday through Friday 8:30 - 9:30, Saturday 8:30 - 5, and Sunday 1 - 5. There are two buildings--the main building and the annex, with two general reading rooms; the Main Reading Room is on the first floor of the Main Building and the Thomas Jefferson Room is on the fifth floor of the Annex.

Some of the rooms of special interest for genealogical research are:

Law Library - 2nd floor, Main building. There are 35,000 volumes and you can go into the stacks. It houses all the state statutes.

Geography and Map Reading Room - 845 So. Pickett St., Alexandria VA. This section has an excellent collection of maps, some showing landowners.

Manuscript Reading Room - Third floor, Annex. Closed Sunday. Do not go to this room first. Go to the Thomas Jefferson Room to complete your research there first. You must have a specific purpose to use this room and an I.D. card. You must check your notebooks. Manuscripts are primarily personal papers and much harder to research and index. Get a handout entitled "Catalogs, Indexes, Finding Aids" from the reference librarian. Example of materials here: papers of six Presidents, military leaders, loyalists, oral histories, civil war journals, and account books of Northern Neck of Virginia.

Microfilm Reading Room - First floor, Main building. Closed Sunday. It has U. S. City Directories before 1860. (You can get a permit to go behind stacks to use City Directories from Office of the Stack & Readers Division in the Main Reading Room.) Example of what this room has is a Directory for Maryland 1878-1882 which gives the County, merchants, and farmers, what section, and where farming.

Newspaper & Current Periodicals Room - First floor, Annex. It has 18th and 19th Century newspapers. Bound volumes are housed in Alexandria and take 24 to 48 hours to get. Swigart's 6 vol. index can show what is available. See also "A Check List of American 18th Century Newspapers in the Library of Congress."

At the library desk in each room is posted the last time of day they will accept call slips. You can call the day before, before noon, and it can be available for you when you go in. Upon request, a special search will be conducted for a book that cannot be found.

Last, we were given a handout for searching in the Local History and Genealogy Room, Thomas Jefferson Room, Fifth Floor, Annex.

(If you do not have "Searching in the Local History and Genealogy Room," ask one of the reference librarians for a copy.)

Basic Card and Book Catalogs (all card except 5 and 6-7)

- 1 - 2 Family Name Index (to the right as you go in)
- 3 - 4 Surname Index and Biographical Index - mostly mid-west
- 5 Books: Rider's American Genealogical-Biographical Index
Consult the librarian for the key. New England, East coast, and South.
- 6 - 7 Genealogical Indexes in Book form - especially Newberry library and periodicals.
- 8 Coats of Arms Index (chiefly English)
- 9 Index to Sibmacher's Wappenbuch (chiefly German)
- 10 Local History Shelflist -- consult librarian for guide to the shelflist
- 11 Author catalog for Genealogy, Heraldry, and Local History

See handout for filling out call slips. Do not put on date unless it is given in call number. If slip comes back "not on shelf," you may (1) check to make sure it is not on the reference shelves lining the room or behind the librarian's desk; (2) check to make sure you copied correct call number; (3) check size of book in card catalog; if large, write "folio"; (4) ask that it be sent through Central Charge File; (5) ask for a special search. Also the book might be in Brittle Binding, Rare Book, Microfilm or Vertical file. Be sure to check with the reference librarians if you have any problems or a question; they are very helpful.

Some of the books on the shelves of the Reading Room, starting left and going clockwise, are: introductory works, Peerage, European lineage, origin of names, Encyclopedias (Boston transcript 1875-1930, Hinshaw: Quakers, 6 vols.); then into the small room in the back you find military records, 1790 census, New England Register, Mass. Vital Records, New York Genealogical and Biographical Records, New Jersey Archives, Egle's Notes & Queries, Pennsylvania Archives; now you return to large room to Maryland Archives, 11 volumes of Magruder's Maryland Colonial Abstracts, such Virginia references as Tylers Quarterly (and others referred to in Swem's Index), Wulfeck's Virginia marriages; then the shelves are filled with other state reference books.

There is a photocopy machine just outside the Thomas Jefferson Reading Room.

MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY
September 3, 1975

The meeting was called to order by President Shirley Wilcox. The minutes of the June meeting were corrected by the addition of the initial "L." to the name of Calvin Jones--reading Calvin L. Jones. Corrections noted and minutes were approved as corrected.

Incoming correspondence was read by the Secretary. The Treasurer, Lorraine VanTassel, was absent--therefore, no report.

Committee Reports: Program Committee Chairman Calvin L. Jones announced the program of the evening and coming attractions. Barbara Crissey Dash was the speaker of the evening and Mr. Theodore Brownyard would be our guest next month. There is a need for one more member to help with refreshments.

Membership Committee Chairman James McCafferty requested that all name tags be returned to the box provided at the entrance table. It was requested that the membership cards be dated because some establishments question the searching of legal documents; new members are now receiving cards with the year written in. Education Committee Chairman Sarah Fleming reported on several area genealogical seminars and meetings that are open during September and October. Further information was on the education table.

Unfinished Business: Correspondence from Winfield Kelley was read concerning the relocation of graves in reply to our expressed concern. Donald Barnes was presented with a Past President Plaque. Certificates of appreciation and a free copy of the Special Publication #2 were given to the following: Dr. Laird C. Towle, Sarah Fleming, Olive Jones, Emerald Miner, and Shirley Wilcox.

New Business: Lecture series sponsored by our Society and the public library will be held at Hyattsville Library each Tuesday in October. Acknowledged receipt of genealogical charts on royal lines; Donald Barnes volunteered to store these for us. Gencor Inc announced a representative would be available for lecturing to our group; no interest was shown at this time. Dues are due; if you are not sure of your status, check with the treasurer. No council meeting in Sept.

Show and Tell: Dr. Laird C. Towle has an index of 500-600 Prince George's Co. families appearing in genealogical periodicals. Pricia Paulkovixh stated that you can get a great deal of additional information if you can get to the courthouse to check out original marriage certificates. Freeman Morgan stated that Mystic River Historical Soc. of New England and Connecticut (SE) have new publications at \$3.50.

SPECIAL PUBLICATIONS

Many of our new members may wonder how we came to have such a large amount in our treasury. Our present dues now just cover expenses of printing our BULLETIN and other operating expenses of the Society. A small amount accumulated in our treasury the first years we were organized. We recognized early that we needed a "nest egg" to finance any publishing. That fund was first built by spending less than we took in.

The first publication, New Hampshire Genealogical Research Guide, was written by Dr. Laird C. Towle and donated to our Society. We paid the publishing costs and have realized all profits from the sale of the Guide. As of July 1975 we made a profit of over \$700. This then is the basis for our hefty balance in the savings account, all made possible because of the generosity of Laird Towle. At the time of our first publication it was decided that all profits realized would be saved and used for publishing expenses on any future publications. Unless the council and membership vote otherwise this money can be used only for future publications.

The cost of preparing our first publication was just over \$350. Our second publication, A Bibliography of Published Genealogical Source Records, Prince George's Co., MD, cost about \$200 to publish. We have two more publications in the works now: the first volume of Prince George's County deeds (ready for typing) and the 1850 Census of Prince George's County (still being abstracted). We will have to sell over 150 copies of our second publication to clear expenses. So far our publications have been small undertakings. All have had cardboard covers. A clothbound publication would require a much larger initial outlay. I suggest that the index to the 1850 Census be clothbound because it will receive prolonged use. The number of pages will be substantially greater than anything we have previously published. Initial publishing costs may be \$1000.

Just how much we need to keep in our Special Publications fund permanently has not been determined. There may come a point where we will be making enough profit to divert some proceeds to other uses of the Society. The Society owes thanks to all the members who have contributed to the successes of our publication efforts to date, and we are pleased to have in the bank sufficient funds to initiate publications as they become ready for printing.

The following is the Maryland section of "Research in Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland: A Bibliographical Essay" by Milton Rubincam. The essay was originally prepared as part of Mr. Rubincam's lectures on genealogical research in Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland, at The National Institute on Genealogical Research, conducted by The National Archives and Records Service, Washington, D. C. The entire article appears in the summer 1975 quarterly of the Illinois State Genealogical Society.

"RESEARCH IN ... MARYLAND: A BIBLIOGRAPHICAL ESSAY"

III. Maryland. The student of Maryland genealogy should add to his library three essential works: Eleanor Phillips Passano, An Index of the Source Records of Maryland, Genealogical, Biographical, Historical (1940; reprinted with a new introduction by P. W. Filby by the Genealogical Publishing Co., Baltimore, MD, 1967); Morris L. Radoff, Gust Skordas, Phebe R. Jacobsen, The County Courthouses and Records of Maryland, Part II, The Records (Hall of Records Commission, Annapolis, MD, Publication No. 13, 1963); and Mary Keyser Meyer, Genealogical Research in Maryland--A Guide (published by The Maryland Historical Society, 1972).

Although Mrs. Passano's work is 35 years old, it is still invaluable for the sources and references--thousands of them!--that she painstakingly catalogued in 1940. The book provides complete bibliographic information (as of 1940) about individuals, families, churches, vital statistics, tombstone inscriptions, state and county records, military records, census enumerations, commissions, bibliography of other states containing references to Maryland families, etc.

The Hall of Records Commission at Annapolis published Part I of The Courthouses and Records of Maryland as its Publication No. 12. This volume deals with the history and architecture of the courthouses. But more important to us as genealogists is Part II, The Records (No. 13). This work, which is a "must" for every working genealogist of Maryland families, describes the county government in the state and the basic county records. The bulk of the book is arranged alphabetically by county, and under each county are described its records--land records and commissions, naturalization records, marriage licenses, birth and death records, Orphans' Court proceedings, probate records, inventories, indentures, divorce records, etc., and where they are located--whether in the Hall of Records or in the appropriate courthouse. The book also provides information on the loss of records sustained by the courthouses.

Mrs. Meyer's Genealogical Research in Maryland--A Guide joins the two works named above as a basic tool of research. She lists the 23 counties (and the independent city of Baltimore), giving the dates formed and the parent counties, discusses the holdings of the Maryland Historical Society, the Peabody Library, the Enoch Pratt Library, the Hall of Records, the Maryland State Library, and

describes the vital, church, census records, oaths of fidelity, military records, rent rolls and debt books, tax lists, passenger lists, etc. She also lists the county genealogical and historical societies in Maryland, and provides a good bibliography.

The more useful historical accounts that provide the necessary background for an understanding of Maryland records include Matthew Page Andrews, History of Maryland: Province and State (1929); reprinted by Tradition Press, Hatboro, PA, 1965; valuable especially for the colonial, Revolutionary, and post-Revolutionary periods, to the Civil War; Morris L. Radoff, Ph.D., editor, The Old Line State: A History of Maryland (The Hall of Records Commission, Publication No. 16, 1971); John Thomas Scharf, History of Maryland (1879); and Donnell MacClure Owings, His Lordship's Patronage: Offices of Profit in Colonial Maryland (Maryland Historical Society, Studies in Maryland History, No. 1, 1953.)

The most important printed source for Maryland history and, indirectly, genealogy, is the Archives of Maryland, published since 1883 by the Maryland Historical Society. It contains the Proceedings and Acts from 1637/8 to 1774; Proceedings of the Provincial Court, 1637-83; the Journals of the Maryland Convention, 1775 and of the Council of Safety, 1777-1789; the muster rolls and other records of service of Maryland troops in the Revolutionary War (vol. 18); the Proceedings of the County Courts of Charles, Kent, Talbot, and Somerset, all in the 17th century; the Proceedings of the Manor Courts of St. Clement's Manor, 1659-72; etc. There is a tremendous amount of genealogical information hidden in these volumes for the researcher who has the patience to ferret it out.

The Laws of Maryland (1634 to date; titles and publishers vary) provides much genealogical information such as early naturalizations, Revolutionary War pensions, divorces, changes of names, lists of insolvent debtors, paupers, business and church affairs, escheated estates, permission to aliens to own land; etc. It was the Laws of Maryland which provided the bases for Mary Keyser Meyer's valuable little work, Divorces and Names Changed in Maryland by Act of the Legislature, 1634-1854 (1970).

A very useful book is Land Office and Prerogative Court Records of Colonial Maryland, by Elizabeth Hartsook and Gust Skordas (Hall of Records Commission Pub. No. 4, 1946); reprinted by Genealogical Publishing Co., 1968). It discusses the history of land administration under the Lords Proprietor, the Barons Baltimore, and describes the types of records in the Land Office (patents, warrants, rent rolls, debt books, etc.). (In 1966 the second part of the book narrates the history of the Prerogative Court of Maryland where all wills were probated before 1777, and lists the numerous proprietary records, testamentary proceedings, probate records, and inventories.

In 1966 the Genealogical Publishing Co. published an original work (not a reprint, this time!) entitled, The Early Settlers of Maryland. An Index to Names of Immigrants, Compiled from Records of Land Patents, 1633-1800, in the Hall of Records, Annapolis, MD, edited,

with an introduction, by Gust Skordas, Assistant Archivist of Maryland, and with a foreword by Dr. Morris L. Radoff, Archivist and Records Administrator of Maryland. As Dr. Radoff noted, "This is a remarkably useful work, especially for Maryland, because no list of passengers or ships has survived."

James M. Magruder's Index of Maryland Colonial Wills 1634-1777 (3 vols., 1933), his Magruder's Maryland Colonial Abstracts, Wills, Accounts, and Inventories, 1772-1777 (1934-39), and Jane Baldwin Cotton's The Maryland Calendar of Wills (8 vols., 1904-28) are important finding aids and all have been reprinted by the Genealogical Publishing Co.

The 1790 Census of Maryland, first published by the Government Printing Office in 1907, was reprinted by the Genealogical Publishing Co. in 1965. In recent years, a large number of census schedules (especially for 1800), indexes to census enumerations, tax lists, and abstracts of wills have been published for most of Maryland's counties.

Two useful works providing historical background of the counties are Edward B. Mathews, The Counties of Maryland, Their Origin, Boundaries, and Election Districts (MD Geological Survey, Vol. 6, 1907), and Mary Ross Brown, An Illustrated Genealogy of the Counties of Maryland and the District of Columbia as a Guide to Locating Land Records (1967).

The National Genealogical Society has recently published, as its Special Publication No. 38, Marriages and Burials from the Frederick MD Evangelical Lutheran Church, 1743-1811, by Frederick S. Weiser. The Genealogical Publishing Co. issued in October 1973 another original publication; Marriages and Deaths from the Maryland Gazette, 1727-1839, compiled by Robert Bernes.

BOOK REVIEW by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

1975 St. Louis Genealogical Society Topical Index of 1974 Genealogical Quarterlies by Geraldine Bailey. \$1.00 Purchased by the Society.

This index was compiled from 122 periodicals exchanged with the St. Louis Genealogical Society in 1974. The bulk of the material is indexed either by county and state or surname. It does not cover as many periodicals as the Genealogical Periodical Index, but it has the advantage of being available soon after the end of the year covered and is available at a very low cost. It is well worth the money.

BOOK REVIEW by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

Colonial Maryland Naturalizations by Jeffrey A. Wyand and Florence L. Wyland, Baltimore, MD: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1975. 104 pp. Indexed. \$8.50. A gift from the publisher..

This collection of naturalization records is in three parts. Parts I and II have been abstracted from the Archives of Maryland. The third part which contains the bulk of the material consists of material which, except for the names of the emigrants, has never been available in print. Many of the names contained in this work are those of German protestants. In fact it was a search for genealogical material on the Germans in western Maryland that led to the extraction of the naturalization records found in this volume.

An informative introduction gives the researcher a brief account of how and why the naturalization laws came into being and explains the impact of these laws. This is followed by an explanation of the format of the three sections. The appendix contains a very useful list of place names with identifying material and also a list of clergymen and data as to the church with which they were affiliated, birth and death dates when known and years and places of service. An index to the aliens who were either denizenized or naturalized is found at the end of the book.

This is a fine addition to Maryland genealogical material and it is a pleasure to add such a well done volume to our library of Maryland genealogical material.

THE GENEALOGICAL USES OF CITY DIRECTORIES

By Theodore L. Brownyard, C.G.R.S.

The collection of City Directories at the Library of Congress is an invaluable source of genealogical information. The earliest ones began a century and a half ago. They were issued for all the large cities and for many small ones. The entries give name, occupation, home address, and often business address. The wife's name is usually given. The children appear when they are 16 - 18 years old as boarders in their parents' homes. This makes it possible to follow the growth of the family. The appearance of Jones, Helen (wid. Samuel) signifies a death. Many directories give the date of death. The disappearance of a daughter often signifies her marriage. A son's marriage is indicated by a change of address and the appearance of his wife's name after his. The disappearance of a name can also signify removal to another city.

The information in City Directories must be checked, of course, against birth, death, marriage, and other primary record sources of information. Checks must be made for children whose names did not get into the directories. Some directories do not list children at all; and not all children appear. Sometimes the disappearance of a name signifies removal to the suburbs. Then the collection of telephone directories becomes helpful.

The occupation given for an entrant in a sequence of City Directories can show his progress up the ladder of success. He or she may appear first a clerk, then buyer, then asst. manager, manager, and finally Vice-President, or other officer of the company. Or at a certain point, the entrant, man or woman, may appear as head of his or her own business.

CARE AND PRESERVATION OF DOCUMENTS

By Olive Kniesche Jones

What happens to documents? Where do people tend to store their old documents? Where do you put them? What happens to them in the attic? ...dryness causing brittleness, rodents, insect damage, fire, dust, etc. What happens to them in the basement? ...insect damage, mold, dampness or water damage, dust, etc. What other places are really important documents sometimes put? ...1. on wall, framed, in light which causes fading, or 2. folded, then handled and stored which causes breaks or folds which will break when opened; becoming dry and brittle, they sometimes disintegrate at a touch.

The problem of restoration of documents and records is still the subject of conjecture and discussion by archivists, librarians, and scientists.

What are you dealing with in old records? Paper, ink, parchment, tracing cloth and leather. I will be discussing chiefly the handling and care of paper records. Most records that are on good paper in a fair state of preservation will continue for an indefinite period without perceptible deterioration. If properly stored and carefully handled.

Understanding what causes deterioration of paper leads to a study of the basic materials of which paper is composed. Until about 1870 almost all writing papers were made from white rags, therefore the drastic treatment of chemical process was not required as does our more modern paper. Today cellulose fibers (mostly wood pulp), cooked with added chemicals, and beaten to a pulp are highly diluted so they may be spread out and felted together to form a strong thin sheet on the paper machine. The chemicals added in this process such as alum and rosin increases the acidity of the mixture which causes the paper to have poor aging qualities. High grade papers are frequently given a bath of warm, diluted animal glue or starch to increase the strength and improve the papers surface and erasing qualities. This may lead to attack by insects or mold if storage conditions are not favorable. Highly acid papers are subject to premature deterioration.

Now--what can be done to help preserve the old documents or records in your possession?

First, fumigate, if necessary, if any evidence of insects is present.

A reasonably airtight box, preferably metal lined is required--for one 3 x 3 x 6 feet use: one pint of a mixture of three parts by volume of ethylene dichloride to one part carbon tetrachloride--place papers loosely in the box and place liquid fumigant in shallow pans suspended from the top of the box for 24 hours. Keep material isolated for about three weeks, (live insects will be killed but not larvae) and refumigate if necessary. These vapors are poisonous to breathe so use in a well ventilated room. A boric acid and starch mixture placed on shelves or cases also acts as a repellent.

Secondly, remove all pins, clips, rubber bands, staples, etc. that have been used to hold papers together. If paper has been damaged by water and become mildewed, wipe these particles gently with a piece of cotton to remove. Dust or dirt marks may be removed safely with a small ball of wallpaper cleaner or an art gum eraser. Work from the center of the sheet outward, using very light strokes.

Then spread out the papers as smoothly as possible by hand and place in a warm damp room. Use your electric iron (on low heat) to remove any folds or creases and remove excess moisture. Have an ironing surface that is hard cushioned and surfaced with white blotting paper. Place a clean white piece of paper between the iron and the document. Documents should be stored at 50% humidity, at 65° to 75° temperature. If documents are extremely fragile or weak they may be flattened by placing them between blotting paper under light pressure for 24 hours.

Among other problems encountered are old pressure sensitive tape (such as Scotch Tape) which has discolored with age (sometimes the tape has fallen off leaving a residue). It may be cleaned off by use of acetone. Newer type tapes may be removed by using benzene, toluene or acetone. The Minnesota Mining and Mfg. Co. claims their new #810 Magic Mending tape is practically insoluble, even in strongest solvents. Acetone will dissolve the tape, but will not remove the adhesive. A combination of film cleaner and benzene will loosen it enough so that it may be removed with light rubbing strokes with the fingers.

Acid, paste and glue are best removed by washing the documents with water. Coated papers may be damaged by contact with water and some inks are water soluble. Test with a small drop of water on an unimportant part of the document, then blot after a short time with a clean white blotter. If any color is transferred to the blotter the ink must be protected before proceeding. All ink portions are lacquered with a thin solution of cellulose acetate in acetone. When dry, proceed with the washing. Half fill an enameled photographic tray with clean distilled lukewarm water. Wash each paper separately by sliding it edgewise into the water and rock the tray gently back and forth several times. After the paper has been well soaked, any residue of paste or glue may be carefully sponged away with absorbent cotton or a soft cloth. Then rinse the papers in clean water, drain and lay individually between white blotters and press. Iron (as previously explained) and lastly remove the lacquer coating by sponging the paper with cotton dipped in acetone. In many cases washing actually increases the strength of the paper. Extremely weak and brittle documents as well as those which have been stored in celluloid envelopes must be handled with great care and it is generally not advisable to wash them even though they are highly acid as they may dissolve completely. When only a small part of the document requires washing it is recommended that the entire piece be washed because unequal expansion of the paper occurs with partial wetting and causes wrinkling or curling even following ironing. There is also danger of causing a water stain.

Quite a few other solvents may be used with safety for different types of stains on paper. Test the ink for color fastness first with the selected solvent. Treat the part to be cleaned with cotton dipped into the selected solvent by laying the paper stained side down on a white blotter and sponge from the back. Move to clean portions of the blotter as necessary. Turn the paper over and treat in the same way on the stained side. When the paper is dry, no flattening or ironing should be necessary.

The following table will help you select the best solvent for various types of stains and reinforcing mediums:

<u>STAIN</u>	<u>RECOMMENDED SOLVENT</u>
Adhesive tape	Carbon tetrachloride or benzene
Duco cement	Acetone
Glue (linen or Glasine type)	Warm water
Lacquer	Acetone
Oil	Carbon tetrachloride or benzene
Paint	Mixture of alcohol and benzene
Paste	Water
Rubber cement	Mixture of benzene and toluene
Scotch tape	Mixture of benzene and toluene
Shellac	Ethyl alcohol
Wax	Mixture of benzene and toluene

Even with this guide a certain amount of experience and judgment is required--try it on something not so valuable before using it on your precious old documents. These solvents are all harmless to paper but will cause most black typewriter inks and carbon to bleed. A starch sizing treatment will protect them--immerse papers in a starch bath, dry and then iron them. This starch treatment may also be used to keep penciled papers from smearing. Make the starch with 25 grams of cornstarch mixed with a little cold water then add to one liter of rapidly boiling water. Dip the paper and after hanging to dry using clip clothespins, iron. When using any of these solvents, use in a well ventilated room away from any open flame. Ink stains are best left alone as any treatment used to remove the ink will weaken the paper.

All paper records created after 1900 need to be deacidified. That is, to neutralize the acidity in the ink and the paper. To do this mix $8\frac{1}{2}$ grams of magnesium carbonate in one gallon of water. As it will not dissolve in water alone, CO_2 gas (carbon dioxide) is bubbled into it, using a medium gas disbursing tube (Fritted disc). When the mixture is no longer milky in color (about three hours) place the documents in the solution and soak for 20 minutes to one-half hour. In many instances flue, paste and other water soluble substances will be removed in this process. Before doing this however, be sure to test all inks as previously explained.

That brings us to another problem--INK. Highly acid inks of the iron gallate type fade in time to a faint yellow and sometimes eat right through the paper. Dye base inks for use in fountain pens also fade

with time and sometimes leave no trace. So called India inks are the most permanent. They do not fade and cannot be removed by chemical process, and cause no damage to paper. Fading inks cannot be restored safely to their original appearance without undue harm to the paper. When iron-gall inks become almost invisible as they yellow and blend with the paper the original iron remains and they may be brought out to visibility by exposure to ultraviolet light. It must be used in a completely dark room for satisfactory results. Sometimes dye ink which has faded to a very pale color may be photographed using special filters for maximum contrast.

There are several methods of reinforcing torn or brittle paper documents.

The "inlayed" method may be used on weak but still whole and relatively small size documents. Using this method a document is framed in permanent papers to protect the edges and keep both sides exposed. Use a sheet of heavy permanent paper somewhat larger than the document and with a pencil draw the outline of the document upon the paper. Cut the center portion out to form a frame for the document. Carefully shave the margin down to $\frac{1}{2}$ its original thickness and the outer edge of the document is also shaved down. Paste is then applied to the thin edge of the frame and the document is laid in place and smoothed down. Place between sheets of heavy waxed paper, then between blotters and dry under pressure. The process is rather tedious and actually strengthens the document very little. It is used mostly for repair of documents for display purposes.

Papers that have writing on only one side may be preserved by mounting on permanent paper. For instance, newspaper clippings may be mounted by using a medium consistency paste over the entire back, then mounted and placed between blotters and dried under pressure. Change the blotters once or twice until completely dry or the paper may wrinkle or curl. Today, poly vinyl adhesive (such as Elmer's glue) may be used. Before the invention of this type adhesive, the paste had to be made fresh each day from wheat paste, such as wall paper paste, water, and one tablespoon of glycerine to each pint of paste. The use of glycerine prevents the material from drying completely and thus becoming brittle. Pressure sensitive tapes (such as Scotch tape), rubber cement and many other commercial adhesives are impermanent and will discolor the paper and cause it to become brittle and sticky.

The best and most permanent method of preservation is by lamination, which is a method of applying cellulose acetate to fragile papers without adhesive by melting it into the paper using heat and pressure. Papers to be laminated must be cleaned of all foreign substances such as glue, paste, oil, old reinforcements such as Scotch tape, etc., carefully flattened and ironed dry. This method may be done by hand by an amateur. Lay the document flat on a piece of glass. A sheet of cellulose acetate is placed over the document, then a sheet of tissue paper on top. Using a cotton ball dipped in acetone and starting from the center of the document, moving outward, apply acetone all over the document sandwich. The cellulose acetate

foil melts and acts as an adhesive for the tissue paper. After drying for about one minute turn the document over and treat the other side in the same manner. The sandwich is then placed under pressure for 3 or 4 hours between sheets of wax paper until the acetone is completely evaporated. If preferred, you may iron on low heat between sheets of wax paper instead of placing under pressure. When the laminated document is completely dry trim around it leaving a 1/8 inch margin.

Cellulose acetate, cellulose acetate-propionate, cellulose acetate-butyrate and nylon films are all suitable for application in this method of paper preservation. Materials similar in appearance such as cellophane, cellulose nitrate, ethyl cellulose and vinylite resins should not be used in records treatment as they are either not sufficiently plastic or not permanent.

Cellulose acetate is best to use as it is readily available and cheapest to use at the present time.

In conclusion:

1. Use a good grade of paper for the records you are now creating.
2. Don't use such things as pressure sensitive tape which can do more harm than good.
3. Don't handle your documents unnecessarily as it may leave a residue of perspiration or dirt which is harmful to them.
4. Store your documents flat rather than folded or rolled up.
5. Protect them from excessive heat, dampness, light, insects, rodents, mold, fire, and water damage.
6. Store in covered containers to keep dust out.
7. Do not use any liquids made of cellulose nitrate, shellac, varnish or drying oil bases to treat documents--they yellow and deteriorate on aging and cause paper to become brittle.
8. Always remember that the ideal conditions are: 50% humidity and 65° to 75° temperature 365 days of the year--24 hours a day.

The following is a portion of the material submitted by the Board for Certification of Genealogists, 1307 New Hampshire Ave N.W., D. C. 20036, on how to get started on the fascinating hobby of finding ancestors.

FIRST - read a few excellent books on the subject: Genealogical Research Methods and Sources (published by The American Soc. of Genealogists in two volumes); Searching for Your Ancestors by Gilbert H. Doane; Know Your Ancestors by Ethel W. Williams; Genealogy as Pastime and Profession by Donald Lines Jacobus; The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy by Val Greenwood; and the textbooks by the Mormon writers, Archibald F. Bennett, Derek Harland, and E. Kay Kirkham, etc. We also suggest you check for Adult Education classes in basic genealogy.

SECOND - all genealogical research must proceed from the known--you and your parents--back to your grandparents, great grandparents, etc. The full names of your great grandfathers and the maiden names of your great grandmothers will give you eight surnames for your research.

ALWAYS - find out the county where they lived, and township is possible. Many records are located by county only. Organize your records; family charts are available through many sources. Use public records such as birth, death, marriage, wills, deeds, federal and state census records; Church records such as baptism, marriage, confirmation and burials; family records such as Bibles, old letters, diaries and obituaries.

COPY - full name (nickname also) date and place of birth, date and place of death, date and place of marriage. Cemetery sexton's records and tombstone inscriptions. Places they lived from birth to death. Some interesting facts about the family.

ALWAYS DOCUMENT - your source of information. If taken from a secondary source, book, page number, publisher and copyright date. Contact parents and other family relatives; there may be some member who has family records. (If they are not documented use the information for clues - AND YOU DOCUMENT WHEN CHECKED.) When you write for information, make a carbon copy and list the questions so they can be answered on the same paper. (Remember older people sometimes have a hard time of reading and writing.) BE PATIENT and be sure not to request too much at one time. ALWAYS ENCLOSE A SELF ADDRESSED STAMPED ENVELOPE.

The meeting was turned over to Mr. Milton Rubincam who spoke on the German mercenaries who came to fight for the English during the American Revolution; a fascinating and informative topic.

OPEN LETTER TO THE SOCIETY

Dear Fellow PGCGS Members:

I am collecting basic facts from limited family data and trying, through correspondence, to get enough specific information to start exploiting the resources of the Library of Congress, DAR and Archives. It should not be that difficult since, at the moment, I am only working back to about 1840. Of course, I am doing nearly all of this research in the Greater New York area, and believe me--location is everything.

The major problem is in writing to public record sources for information. Even though I carefully provide all the specific data that I have, enclosing a self-addressed stamped envelope, the results are frustrating. Does anyone in our organization know how to overcome this deficiency? Has anyone solved the question of how to overcome the APATHY BARRIER?

When I do receive a reply, it may state there is no record they can find and if I send more information they will be glad to help. The information they ask me for is the very information I am trying to get.

Case in point #1. Fact: My father was a major in the U. S. Army Air Corps in World War I and was given a military funeral. I have written the National Military Records Center in St. Louis giving all the personal information on my father and requesting his service records--or key information from that record. They say they cannot locate him and ask me to provide his service number and Social Security number. My father died four years before Social Security became law and my letter clearly showed his death date.

My father was a member of the American Legion. I cannot get any further information because I don't know which Post he belonged to. The Legion has no master roster of members.

Case in point #2. My maternal grandfather died in a New York City Home for the Blind. I have his death certificate. The Home in which he resided is no longer in business. I was informed that all records were turned over to the New York State Commission for the Visually Handicapped. Zero. They have no such record.

Case in point #3. I have learned that my paternal great-grandfather and his wife were buried in Calvary Cemetery in Brooklyn NY. If I could get their death dates, I could get the names of their parents plus other data. I wrote to the caretaker. His answer is a delight for all genealogists: "In order for us to assist you in locating your great grandfather's grave, we require the full location of the grave (Section, Range, Plot and Grave number) plus the exact date (month and year) of someone interred in the plot. Our records are kept numerically; we do not use an alphabetic system." Right--tell where he's buried and when he died and I'll tell you where he's buried and when he died.

SOCIETY LIAISON REPORT - The Society of Mareen Duvall Descendants

Mareen Duvall was born about 1625 in Laval, France. As a young man fleeing the persecution of the Huguenots, he was brought into the Province of Maryland by William Burgess in the 1650's. By 1659 Mareen Duvall had completed his period of indentureship under John Covell and, as a freeholder, applied for his rights to 50 acres of land. When Lord Baltimore granted him his first tract of land, 100 acres at the head of South River, he named it "Laval" out of affection for his boyhood home. In 1664 Lord Baltimore granted Mareen Duvall, near his original survey of "Laval," a tract of land of 600 acres, which he called "Middle Plantation" and which remained his seat until his death in 1694. Here many of his 12 children were born and here he became one of the early merchant-princes of the Province. His landholdings amounted to over a thousand acres.

That the good deeds of our ancestor, the noble principles that governed his life should be perpetuated, The Society of Mareen Duvall Descendants was organized. The first gathering was Dec. 9, 1926 in Baltimore where plans were made for a meeting Feb. 22, 1927 to form a permanent organization, at which Dr. Wirt Adams Duvall of Baltimore who had been active in bringing descendants together was elected the first president. Plans were made to hold a summer reunion in 1927 at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Collington since this church was built on land which had been owned by the Duvall family. Our membership now totals 167 active members. We have placed 3 historical road markers in this area: one at Marietta, home of Justice Gabriel Duvall; one at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church; and one marking the location of Middle Plantation on Rte 424 near Davidsonville. The marker which the Society, in cooperation with the U.S. Dept. of Interior, placed on the old Duvall Bridge in the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center has been removed by vandals.

We publish a newsletter, usually in Feb. and Sept., and hold an annual meeting in October. In 1952 one of our members Mr. Harry Wright Newman wrote a book on the family and descendants, Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation. His limited edition has all been sold and the society is planning to have it reprinted. OUR SEARCH FOR THE INDIAN SPRING MEETING HOUSE

All that Friends ever need for action is a sufficient concern. My concern is that members of the Sandy Spring Meeting do not know the location of the Indian Spring Meeting of which we were a part for so many years.

There seem to be two misconceptions. Some believe Sandy Spring and Indian Spring are identical and that only the name has been changed. Others believe that the old meeting house was on the site of the Indian Spring Country Club, when in fact the club, retaining its name, moved to the ridge above Lay Hill Road only three or four years ago. Wherever Indian Spring may lie in the club's background, it isn't ours!

Records from yearly meetings show that Sandy Spring Preparative Meeting belonged to Indian Spring Monthly Meeting as early as 1766 and that members of our Meeting travelled there each month until 1796 when it was decided to alternate the gatherings between Indian Spring and Sandy Spring. Later, in 1827, when membership at Indian Spring had dwindled considerably, the Monthly Meeting became a permanent part of Sandy Spring, still known as Indian Spring Monthly Meeting. In 1846 the name Indian Spring Monthly Meeting was changed to Sandy Spring Monthly Meeting. The local meeting at Indian Spring disbanded in 1865. In 1890 Baltimore Yearly Meeting deeded the property to the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church.

Since everyone at that time still knew where Indian Spring was located, there was no need to make a note of its exact location. However, in 1937, Miss Helen Stone, a member of the Eye Street Meeting in Washington D. C., in an effort to locate the Indian Spring, of which the Eye Street Meeting had been a part of the Monthly Meeting since 1803, notes records of its location were lost. After going over the records at 1811 Eye Street and those of the Baltimore Yearly Meeting, Miss Stone obtained enough information to make a pilgrimage to Indian Spring. In a booklet called Pages From the Past, she reported, "We drove by winding roads and over swollen streams to an obscure place near the Patuxent River." While there she discovered the old stone meeting house in ruins, but a frame church with a cornerstone marked "Forks A.M.E.Z." had been built across the road. She saw an old burying-ground with weather-worn headstones and she found the Indian Spring itself, but she failed to mention where "this obscure place" was.

After a recent reading of Miss Stone's booklet which had been given to me by Nancy Thomas, the wife of our Clerk, concern for finding the Indian Spring Meeting prompted me into action. On the lovely spring afternoon of April 6, 1963, George Nesbitt and I, armed with miscellaneous bits of information, set out on our mission to locate the

Indian Spring Meeting. An early map (after 1800) showing the location of Monthly Meetings under Baltimore Yearly Meeting placed Indian Spring near the Patuxent, 20 miles from Washington, 22 from Baltimore, and 20 from Sandy Spring. Miss Stone thought the location might be at Hughesville, but a pencilled note in the margin said "near Bowie, near the railroad." We explored every road between Bowie, the river, and the Pennsylvania railroad, wallowing through sand and swamps, dead-ending in gravel pits and where bridges were out, through gloomy country brightened only by the ghost-like bloom of the shadbush among the vine-choked trees. After making several inquiries we were told that there had been a colored Methodist church--over that way--but where Fort Meade was enlarged, the Army had taken over the property and the church had been rebuilt somewhere else. After following the long road that roughly paralleled the railroad, we came upon a neat white frame church which a cornerstone marked, "Forks A.M.E.Z. Church, Established 1869, built 1942." When we entered the unlocked church we saw quaint old benches that might have been hewn with a broad axe. Could these benches be the link between the present and the past? If so, where did the past lie?

We drove on across the railroad tracks but soon came to a sign marking Fort Meade property. We turned back reluctantly, the afternoon nearly gone and our mission still unfulfilled. As we drove on we noticed a man building a fence and we stopped. "Is the Forks church that was built in 1942 on the same location as the old one?" we asked. "No, ma'am," he said. "Do you know where the old one was?" "You mean the frame church or the old stone church?" The fence builder now known to us as Calvin Wilson took us a few hundred yards back across the Fort Meade boundary line to a spot where the Forks frame church had stood and where we saw the crumbled foundations of the old stone meeting house, now nearly returned to earth itself.

The spring Miss Stone had found in 1937 had been filled in. The burying ground with its worn reddish head stones and later simple monuments is now marked "Cemetery 13. Out of bounds for military personnel," but it is well taken care of by the military. We brought home with us a stone that had been part of the meeting house. The directions on how to reach Indian Spring are given below.

The ruins of the Old Indian Spring Meeting House lie approximately nine miles north and east of Bowie on a continuation of Conway Road, a few hundred yards across the boundary line of Fort Meade and near a crossing of the Pennsylvania Railroad known (but not marked) as Woodiesville. One way to reach the spot is to take Maryland 197 from Laurel to Bowie. Turn left off 197 before reaching Bowie at Jericho Park Road and continue along this road until Bowie Race Track. Turn left around the track and follow Myers Station Road to Conway Road. Turn left on Conway Road and continue across the tracks. After a small Fort Meade sign continue perhaps 100 yards. The ruins are on the left. Continue to the first intersection to reach the cemetery, on the southeast corner of the intersection.

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BOOK REVIEWS by Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

The Centenary of Catholicity in Kentucky by Hon. Ben. J. Webb. Charles A. Roberts. 1884. Reprinted by Unigraphic, Inc. 1973. 594 pp. Purchased by the Society with money donated by two persons.

As many of the Catholics in Kentucky had come from Maryland, this book will be of interest to members of our Society with Maryland and Kentucky families. Catholic families, principally from St. Mary's, Charles, and Prince George's Counties, Maryland, began emigrating to Kentucky in 1785. In that year sixty families, mostly residents of St. Mary's county formed "a league" and pledged to emigrate to Kentucky within a specified time. Twenty-five of those families left Maryland in 1785 and arrived in Kentucky during the spring of that year. Areas where Marylanders had a part in the early settlement were Pottinger's Creek settlement, Hardin's Creek settlement, and Bardstown.

For protection and shelter, a block house or "station" was built in every neighborhood. According to the author, "the stations situated in the district occupied by the Catholic emigrants from Maryland were known as Bardstown, Cox's Creek, Burnt, Rogers' and Goodwin's, all in Nelson county; Sandusky's, Cartwright's, Harbeson's and the Rolling Fork in Washington County; Mann's Lick in Bullitt county; and Kincheloe's, in Spencer County."

Among those persons mentioned as from P. G. Co. MD were the families of James and Susannah Brooke Rudd, Nicholas Miles, and Thomas and Rebecca Miles Hills. It is believed that Thomas Hills may have returned to Prince George's County.

A comprehensive name index is found at the back of the book which adds immensely to its usefulness.

Index to Genealogical Periodicals, Together with "My Own Index" by Donald Lines Jacobus, M.A. Originally published New Haven, 1932, 1948, 1958. Three volumes reprinted in one by Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., Baltimore, 1973. Purchased by the Society.

Much valuable material can be found in periodicals, but locating articles on a particular surname or area of the country is difficult without a comprehensive index covering more than one publication. The three volumes compiled by the late Donald Lines Jacobus contain references found in more than fifty periodicals. A careful reading of the introduction in front of each volume is a must so that the reader understands what has or has not been included in each volume. For instance, volumes 51 to 85 of the NEW ENGLAND HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL REGISTER are included in the index but the first fifty volumes are not as they are covered quite well in the Register's own index. Also some periodicals have been indexed only with respect to the records of places since the surnames are covered in Munsell's Index of 1900-1908.

This book is a very basic and useful tool. Checking this index before a trip to the library could save valuable research time. If readers are not acquainted with its contents, they should lose

no time in checking this reference book out. If it does not become worn from constant use then there is something wrong with our membership, assuming they don't own a copy themselves.

In preparing the index each article is scanned to identify its true content, which is often not revealed by the title of the article, thereby providing valuable depth of coverage.

Dr. Towle is the editor of the newly published 1974 edition. The coverage has been expanded to include all the book reviews appearing in the 95 periodicals indexed. This edition has about 3500 citations in an 8 1/2 x 11 softbound format. The cost is \$9.50.
