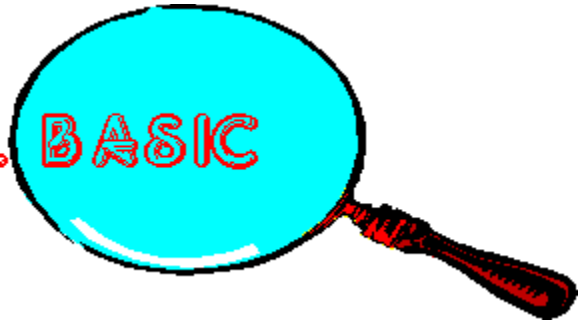

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# SUCCESSFUL SHAREWARE

## PART 2

This column is going to look at the different aspects of becoming a successful Shareware author. For this second installment I will be writing about how and where to distribute your program and more!

First off I would like to mention writing help files for your programs. As you have probably noticed there are articles and reviews on help files in this issue of the magazine. If you remember in my last installment I talked about first impressions towards your shareware program can be very important. A well written .HLP file gives your application a more polished and professional look that your users will appreciate. Which in turn should help you receive more registrations. So be sure and read the help related information throughout the magazine.

Now on to the main focus of this article - Distributing your Shareware program. Marketing your programs as Shareware requires a new way of distribution. You need to get as many copies of your Shareware program out to the public as possible. You do this by giving away as many copies as possible for free. This might sound funny when your trying to make money from your program. However, this is the only way you will receive registrations. If you give out free disks of your \$20.00 program to 100 people and 10 register you have made \$200.00. Not very much if you have spent months working on a complex program. Now lets say you give out 1000 free disks and 100 people register it you have made \$2000.00. Since disks are cheap it makes sense to give away as many as you can.

You will do this by sending copies to shareware vendors and user groups. Computer Swapmeets and Shows are other good places to give out disks. Another good way to spread your program around to as many people as possible is to put it on lots of BBS systems and also the major on-line systems. To do this you will need a modem and communications software. Get the fastest modem you can afford because it will save money in the long run due to smaller phone bills. You will want to upload your program to Compuserve, Genie, America Online and Delphi. These are all huge systems and your program will spread fast on these systems. A way to get your program spread even faster is to ask in your README.TXT file that you would appreciate it if anyone who has your shareware program would upload it to their local BBS systems.

You will also want to send a copy of your program to large User groups. These groups have shareware libraries that are available to their members. To find out the user group

addresses, pick up a copy of *COMPUTER SHOPPER*. It also has a list of BBS system phone numbers.

You will also want to send copies of your disk to Magazines. I have noticed that the Windows Magazines have started to review more and more Shareware programs. Even general computer magazines are also including Shareware reviews. If you are sending disks to magazines you must provide them with a very professional looking package. This is not to say you need to spend lots of money on color boxes. Just remember what I said in the previous issue. Make sure you have README.TXT files on the disk and printed disk labels stating the name of the program and installation instructions. It is also a good idea to send printed documentation along with your disk. Editors of these magazine receive lots of programs to review. You need to grab their attention and let them know what your program can do.

This brings this installment to a close. In the next issue of *ELECTRIFIED VISUAL BASIC MAGAZINE* I will discuss business aspects of running your shareware business!

VB/ISAM is a tightly written VB library consisting of 18 functions. Data management can be accomplished with as little as 8 of these functions. **The entire DLL takes up less than 50kb.** The program is known for its speed and efficient use of memory. Received the 1992 Readers Choice Award by the readership of BasicPro Magazine.

Features include:

- File size up to 512 MB.
- Implemented in commercial applications since 1991.
- Up to 80 indices per file, all information stored in one DOS file.
- Information is immediately updated in sort order when performing updates or modify / delete records.
- File / Index space is maintained automatically, no periodic compaction required.
- Variable length records and fields; any record can be a variable length string field.
- Multiple files can be open at the same time.
- Both Random and Sequential Data Access - You can read records randomly (by index lookup) and then move forward or backward through the file with Next and Previous functions.
- Range Positioning / Nearest Match / Partial Key Search - If no exact match is found the pointer is positioned in the appropriate index.
- Arrays, Multiple Record Formats, Substructures - You can have any number of different record types in the same file plus a unique technology allows you to insert different substructure into records.

## DETAILED REVIEW COMMENTS

I am a firm believer in the idea of "every job calls for a specific tool". Of course, thinking along those lines has advantages and drawbacks. And while I know many of you like working with specific programming tools, I also know that you are interested in adding to that tool chest. Why else would you read this magazine ?

By now you may have found, as I did, that while there are numerous DLL's and VBX's out there, simply because one is not as flashy as another does not mean it will have a lower performance. The reverse of this statement is equally true, just because one company has the funds to promote their product lavishly doesn't mean it is a better product. I like nothing better than finding a little gem that is not well known but does a great job.

Which brings me to the subject of this product review - VB/ISAM by Software Source. I will leave it up to you to decide whether this one is a gem, but it may interest you to know that it has been given the Readers Choice Award by the readership of BasicPro magazine (our esteemed competitor). In addition, it has been utilized in the creation of VB Assistant by Sheridan Software. What better compliment to a product, and indicator of its quality, than the usage by another member of the same industry for programming purposes. The library itself is available for VB/Win, Dos and C. In addition you can purchase either single or multi-user copies, costing \$99.95 and \$169.95. respectively.

Oh, by the way this is the company I was talking about at the close of our last issue. Anytime I run into people who stand by their word - in this or any other business - I like to make sure everyone knows about it. The good people at Software Source, especially Sam Cohen, fall into that category. On my scale for customer service and helpful attitude this company ranks highly. Such a characteristic may not mean much to you until you are working on a job, utilizing a third party library, and find out the manufacturer has an attitude problem - some of them do you know. You quickly learn to appreciate things like good customer service.

Before I get too deeply into the details of the product, I want to reiterate that there are several different approaches to managing data in the VB environment. The manufacturers of add on products by their very marketing efforts are adding new ways all the time. Some of the better known efforts include methods that are very compatible with Dbase, FoxPro and Clipper programming, down to the function names. CodeBasic comes to mind in this category. Others approach the subject from a more visually oriented standpoint, among them Agility and QE/VB are prominent. Furthermore, there are considerations of what are commonly called "low level" and "high level" approaches. Each has it's advantages and disadvantages. High level will not require an individual to write as much code (if any), at a cost of size and speed. Low level requires more coding, however, the libraries are smaller and oftentimes the resulting applications are faster.

VB/ISAM takes an approach that falls somewhere in the middle of the "visual scale", meaning that it requires coding and does not have the "click and run" interface of other libraries. The name stands for Indexed Sequential Access Method. As you know, native VB itself has

several ways of managing and retrieving data. Two of those ways are the Random and the Sequential Access Methods. For illustration purposes it may help to think of VB/ISAM as being the Random Access Method "*on serious steroids*". And no, it is not a library using straight dBase, FoxPro or Clipper file formats.

Comments made by programmers who have tried VB/ISAM oftentimes allude to the idea that this is the way Microsoft should have handled data I/O to begin with. (But where would all the third party add-on developers be if MS did everything right?)

Gregg Irwin, an independent developer based in Claremont, California reports that he was amazed at the speed of VB/ISAM. "I've only had VB/ISAM for a week and put together a test because I couldn't believe how fast the thing was. The test routine generated records and put them into a dataset, which has seven fields and five of them are indexed. It took VB/ISAM only twelve minutes to create a dataset of 10,000 records. Our next step was to perform some retrieval tests. The first test was reading all records in the set, it took 25 seconds with full data retrieval, 12 seconds without. another test was retrieving a group of 100 records, time - 2 seconds. This test included overhead for concatenating 5 strings per record and putting them into a list box for display.

Mr. Irwin described two projects, one current the other a future possibility, for which he thinks VB/ISAM lends itself. The first involves transferring images and data among a network of 1000 Information "Kiosks", the other entailed the creation of language / country localized applications that can be re-configured through remote access. The transfer of graphic images in the first project is handled in a particularly interesting manner. The image is compressed to approximately 10k, then via code assigned to a specific database field. When the record is recalled at another location, the image is decompressed into a temp file and displayed. As Mr. Irwin puts it : "Very fast, very easy, and I feel comfortable undertaking these projects with VB/ISAM because the program, among other things, can handle file sizes up to 512 MB, and creates extremely fast indexes". I'm sure that there are a number of other users who will agree with Mr. Irwin's assessment.

My research indicates that the people who are responsible for the development of VB/ISAM have a good deal of experience in the industry. This is born out in the name itself. ISAM is an "ancient" acronym. However, once you get past the name you'll find a tightly written library consisting of 18 functions to aid and assist you in the management of your data. **The entire overhead created by this library is less than 50KB.**

Some of the other features include:

Variable Length Records - within VB ISAM you can mix records of any length up to 64K and index keys of any size up to 253 bytes.

Large Files - As mentioned before up to 512 megabytes. The program dynamically allocates disk space.

Both Random and Sequential Data Access - You can read records randomly (by index lookup) and then move forward or backward through the file with Next and Previous functions.

Range Positioning / Nearest Match / Partial Key Search - If no exact match is found the pointer is positioned in the appropriate index.

Arrays, Multiple Record Formats, Substructures - You can have any number of different record types in the same file plus a unique technology allows you to insert different substructure into records.

No Compacting or Reorganization - VB/ISAM keeps its file space organized at all times, hence no compacting is required.

Sequence Protection - To minimize keyboard errors VB/ISAM treats upper-case letters as lower case when doing lookups, ordering or comparisons.

Update Protection - You can protect the integrity of the data by (optionally) specifying "add - only" or "replace - only" during writes

Data Validation - VB/ISAM aggressively checks file and record validity, returning error codes if your data has been corrupted.

Additional information indicates that VB/ISAM is comparatively "easy" on your hard disk, showing less disk access than other software.

One of the more unusual features of this software is the user manual, which was written with a sense of humor. For example, in an introductory paragraph the discussion centers around the name of the program and the specific job of a record manager as opposed to a database manager.

".....Database management software is scary and cumbersome, sort of like Boris Karloff with an ax. Record managers are more like Erroll Flynn with a saber - most of the power, but with much more flexibility and control....."

There are other passages. This kind of writing really makes it entertaining to crack a manual open. I found myself reading the manual just to see what the next joke will be. Granted, it's not Eddie Murphy or Robin Williams, but it's not supposed to be. What it does - namely getting a person to read the manual - it does pretty well.

The actual data management, or in this case record management. is accomplished via the use of 16 functions (18 in the multi user version), and up to 80 automatically maintained indices. My own experience with the program shows that you can accomplish a good deal of data management with only ten functions. They are VmxCreate, VmxOpen, VmxClose, VmxPut, VmxDelete, VmxLookup, VmxGet/Next, VmxPrevious, VmxBOF, and VmxEOF. Does some of this sound familiar to you? Open? Put? When working in a multi user environment you will also need to implement VmxLock and VmxUnlock to manage the data access by several users.

The program's high speed is attained through the use of memory pointers. For example the VmxGet/Lookup function sets a pointer for a specified index to the insertion point of your lookup value. If no exact match was found the pointer is set to the closest matching position. If you are looking for Mr. Baldwin, and you have no entry beginning with the letter "B", the pointer will end up on the last entry for A (the closest entry above B) or in-between A and C, in which case the result field will be empty. From there you can step through the data one entry at a time. This method requires a little getting used to, especially in the design phase of a project, because it is easy to search for a string or value and end up with an empty results field. Of course that is



not an error, it just means there is no exact match. Using Next and Previous will show where in the file your pointer came to "rest".

Did I thoroughly confuse you?

Just remember, it's wickedly fast and has up to 80 auto -matically maintained indices.

Rather than including screen shots of my test application, I want to refer you to a shareware utility that is in large parts based on VB/ISAM. The program is called Time & Chaos by iSibister Software. It was featured as a "Windows Utility of the Month" by one of the leading PC magazines. What better way to inspect the creative use of VB/ISAM?

I'd like to close with a preview of what's in the works for future issues. Having become more familiar with data management under VB you may find that once you have a database established you are lacking a way of getting the information out of the computer and onto paper in a meaningful manner. This function is being solved by report generating libraries, such as Crystal Reports by Crystal Services and The Report Generator by MicroHelp. I am hoping to bring you information regarding these tools. In addition, I will tell you about a new release by Pioneer Software, makers of Q+E/VB. Pioneer is truly living up to it's motto of being "the connectivity company". Presently their new product called Multilink/VB is undergoing beta testing. Multilink/VB enables you to produce VB data entry and manipulation (query) front-end's for up to 16 different databases, including dBase IV, Paradox, Informix, DBII, Oracle, Progress, Netware SQL and even Excel files.

And again, if you have seen an innovative program, or a new way of doing the same old thing, or just want to share your ideas, please drop us a line.

## CODE SAMPLE

The following code shows the global declarations for an example dataset that will keep track of the information described in the Type....End Type section. This is the basic setup of an application. From here the data is managed via the use of function calls, such as VmxOpen, VmxLookup, etc.

The following code shows a sub procedure that enables the user to find a record based on the SocSecNum entered by him or her. This short sample utilizes the VmxGet / Lookup function, and again it makes mention of the fact that the record pointer will be positioned in a way that indicates where the record is - whether it's there or not. If it's there it will show, if not you will see no result, however the pointer will be in the middle of your data (if the example is located somewhere in the middle). It also shows the implementation of error trapping and error return codes that are supplied with each function:

# CODE FRAGMENTS

Welcome to "Code Fragments". This feature is dedicated to the Visual Basic developer who wants to get a little more out of his code...or into it. The articles will vary in depth from basic, to intermediate and advanced programming topics. The goal will be to provide practical examples and techniques described in plain and simple language accompanied by useful **Code Fragments**.

This month I want to take about using the Windows API. It didn't take long for me to realize that there were things I wanted to do in my VB applications that I just couldn't accomplish from the confines of the Visual Basic language. The obvious place to look was the Windows API. I've coded in C for years in UNIX and DOS but never in Windows but I knew their must be some use for the 500 or so functions in Windows SDK. This month I'll show you a few that I now use regularly.

From programming applications in the DOS world I'd found that having configuration files to keep local customizations was extremely useful. Window applications uses this idea extensively and the files are called initialization files, .INI files. Windows initialization files are broken into logical groups called sections. Each section follows this format:

An example is the extensions section of the WIN.INI file where file extensions are tied to executable programs.

Well then, how to we read and write these values? First, there are four functions useful for this purpose; GetProfileString, WriteProfileString, GetPrivateProfileString and WritePrivateProfileString. They work in pairs. GetProfileString and WriteProfileString read and write to the WIN.INI file while GetPrivateProfileString and WritePrivateProfileString read and write to YOURAPP.INI. I recommend that you only ever read from the WIN.INI file. Although the 32K size limitation on this file was removed with Windows 3.1 adding more "clutter" to WIN.INI is generally view as unacceptable these days. It is also easier to un-install you application if it uses its own INI file.

Let's get started. First we need to include the declarations of the functions we are going to use. They are:

I'll conclude with one final example. Ever wish your list box could have a horizontal scroll bar? Well it can! Windows is a message based system, that is applications sit and wait for messages and then react to them. Therefore we have the multi-purpose function. "SendMessage". One use of "Send Message" is to create a horizontal scroll bar.

I have constructed a function to create horizontal scroll bars for a given list box control name. Its second argument is the new width of the list box as a factor of its current size. That is the increment would be 1.5 or 2 (or whatever) which represents one and a half times the size or twice the size of the list box's current size.

# ROBOHELP REVIEW

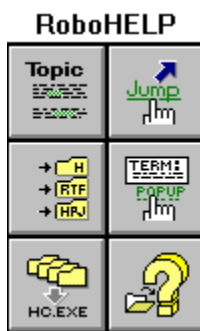

If you have already read the article Writing Help Files with Word for Windows you can begin to imagine how long and tedious a job this will become if your help file is of any great size. If you are going to have more than a couple of pages you need some help to write your help files. RoboHelp fits the bill nicely.

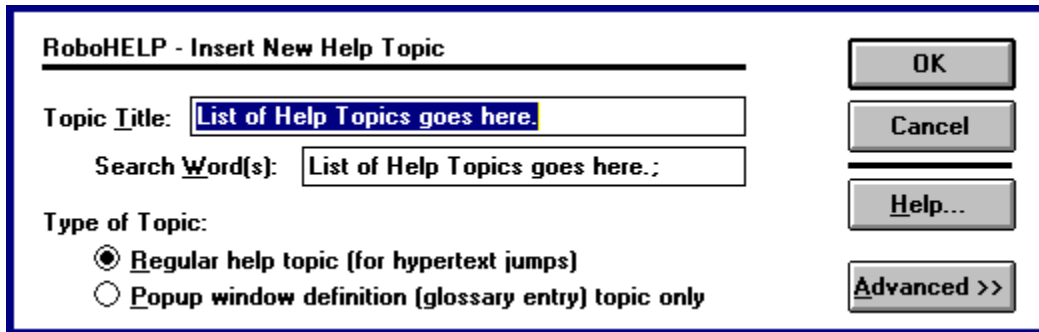
To create a ".HLP" file without RoboHelp you have to use an .RTF format capable word processor to enter codes into footnotes. These footnotes will specify the topic names, any search keys, jumps, browse sequences, and any bitmap files that will be used in your help file. Then you use the Windows Help Compiler to create the ".HLP" file. Hopefully you did not make any mistakes or its back to the word processor and trying to sort out the cryptic codes in the footnotes.

With RoboHelp you begin a new help file by simply creating a new document with the RoboHelp template in Word for Windows. You must already own Word For Windows. You will perform all of the steps of creating, compiling and testing your help file right from within the WinWord document.

After launching WinWord with the RoboHelp template you will save your document and then a floating button bar will appear on your screen. This ToolBar gives quick access to the functions used in creating help files.

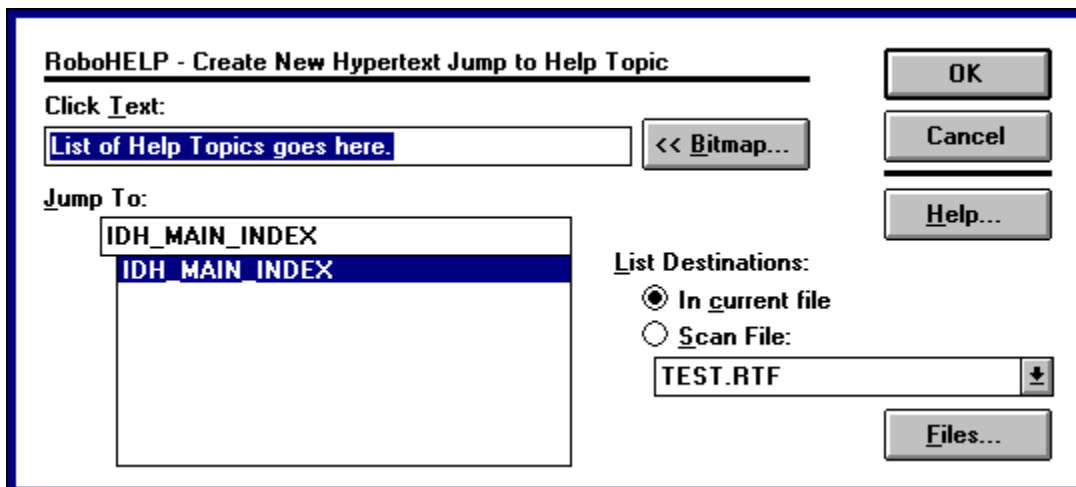


The saved document will have the first topic already created for you. To create additional help topics just click on the TOPIC button. RoboHelp puts up the following dialog box so you can set up your next topic.



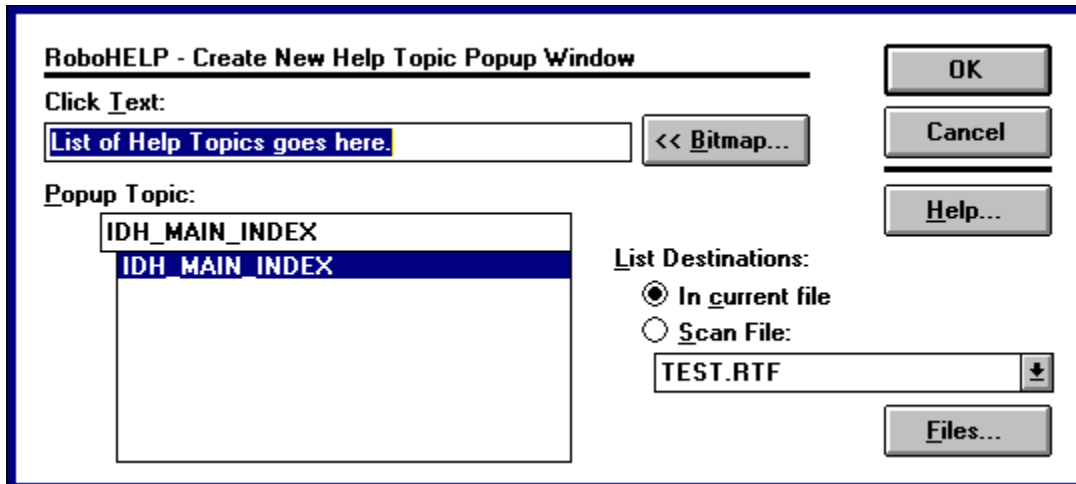
This is where you will enter the topic title, search keywords and more. When you click on OK RoboHelp places the correct codes into WinWord footnotes for you.

Once you have several topics defined you are ready to make jumps from topics to topics. To create a jump select the word or words you want to jump from and click on the JUMP button. RoboHelp puts up the following dialog box listing all of the topics you have created.



Select the topic you want to jump to and RoboHelp creates the jump by underlining your chosen word or words and placing hidden text after them that specifies the destination topic.

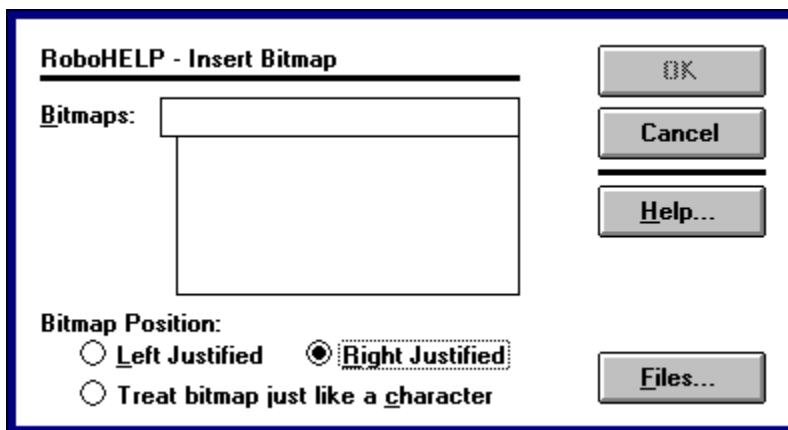
Next you can create popups. To create a popup you follow the same basic procedure as creating jumps except after selecting a word or word you click on the POPUP button. RoboHelp the displays the following dialog box listing all of the topics you have created.



Select the topic you want to popup to and RoboHelp creates the popup by underlining your chosen word or words and placing hidden text after them that specifies the destination topic.

You can also place .BMP pictures in your help files. Keep in mind that the pictures can greatly increase the size of your help file. You can place the same picture in the same document as many times as you want without increasing the size. For example you could have either 10 small .BMP bullets or 100 and the file size will be the same.

To place a bitmap click on BITMAP BY REFERENCE from the INSERT menu (or by pressing CTRL-B). All of the .BMP files you want to use must be in the current work directory. RoboHelp will then display the following dialog box.



Select the bitmap files you want and the position you want them in and click OK. RoboHelp will the automatically place the necessary code to display the bitmap in your help file.

Once you have all of your jumps, popups and bitmaps the way you want it's time to save and compile. RoboHelp makes this an easy process. First click on the Save and Generate button.



This causes RoboHelp to save the file in .RTF format and creates the necessary .HPJ file. Next you will click on Make Help system button.



This causes RoboHelp to call the Help Compiler and make the .HLP file. Finally you will click on the Run The Help System button.



The only thing I would like to see added to RoboHelp is some way to track the jumps automatically. I had to make up an outline to keep track of all my links in the large test file I did for this review.

Overall , RoboHelp is great help to help file writers. It is very simple and easy to use. After completing my test help file using RoboHelp I did it all over again using just WinWord. Using RoboHelp cut the time in half that it took to develop a large .HLP file. The RoboHelp manual contains information that will be very helpful to people that have never created a help file before. A good help file gives your program a professional appearance and RoboHelp makes it quick and easy.

# HELP MAGICIAN

By Mike Able

Help Magician is the only .HLP file creator that does not require a Word Processor. It is a completely stand alone help file creator (the only other item needed is the Help Compiler itself - it is not included in the package). It is a standalone Windows program that lets you edit your help file from within Help Magician



The editor lets you define font attributes for your help file including font name, size and color. It also supports cut, copy, paste, find and replace. Text can be pasted from the Windows Clipboard into the editor. You can also import and export ASCII and RTF files directly into the editor.

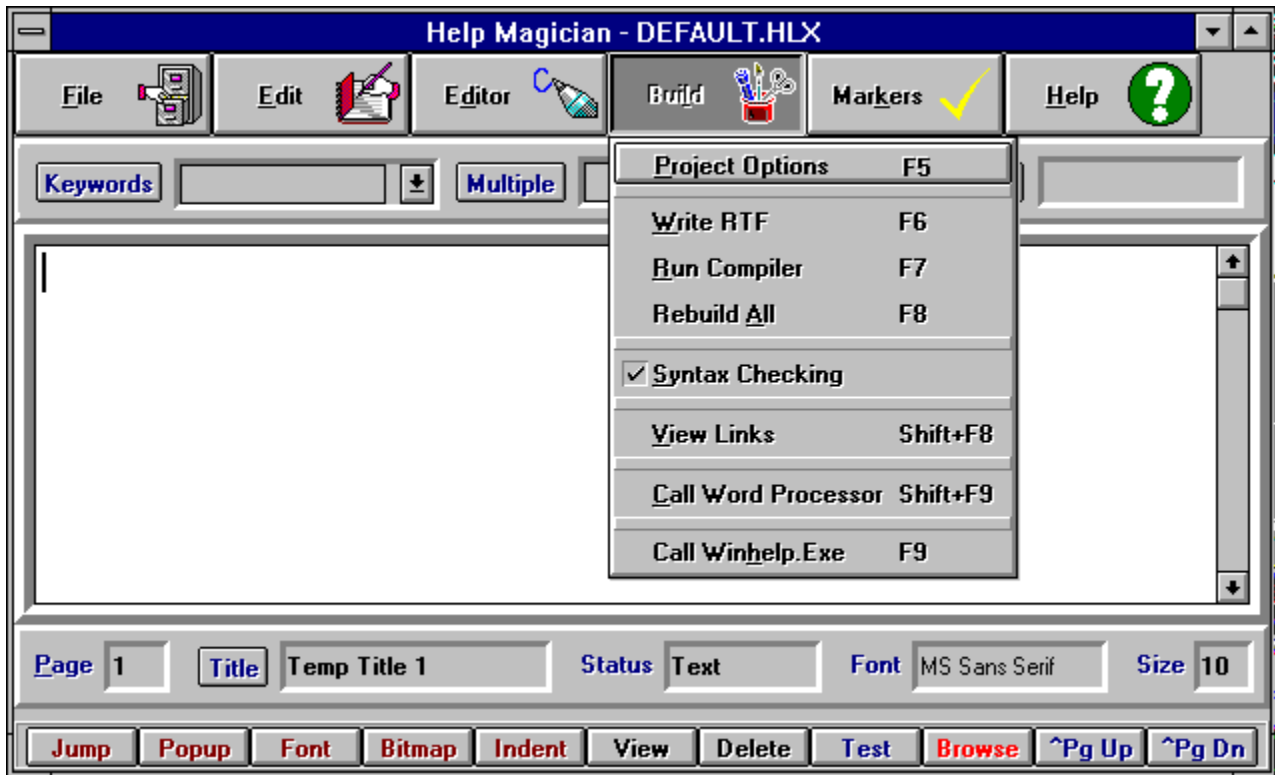
Each page in the editor is a help Topic, with a name you provide. On each page you will define text to be jumps or pop-ups. This is a simple process done by marking the desired text and clicking on the Jump or Popup button and selecting the destination. You edit the help file by paging through your help file by clicking on the Pg Up and Pg Dn buttons. You can also pick a .BMP graphic to display in your help file.

While working on your help file you can go into a Test Mode, that simulates Windows help system. This lets you instantly test your help system without having to go through the compile process every time you want to see if a portion of your help file is working correctly.



You can test your jumps, pop-ups and view any bitmaps included in your help file.

After you have completed and tested your help system the next step is to create a .HLP file. Select Write RTF from the build menu and Help Magician will create the proper .RTF file for you. Next select Run Compiler from the build menu and your help system will be compiled into a .HLP file. By clicking on Call Winhelp.exe you can view your completed help file right from within Help Magician.



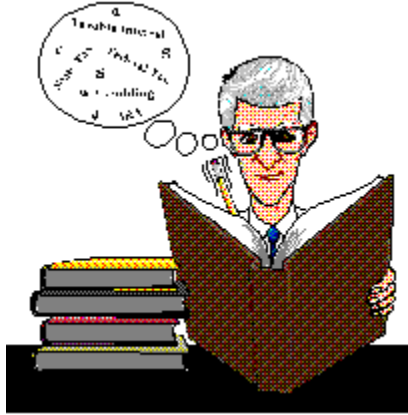
One feature I found very useful is a command called View Links that is available from the build menu. This allows you to view the list of links for your jumps and pop-ups. You can also print the lists out. This feature is a big help in keeping your help file organized.

My only complaint with Help Magician is that the help file is limited to 1 megabyte. When putting together a large help file for a complex program it may be possible to exceed this limit.

If you don't have an RTF compatible word processor this is an excellent choice. Even if you do this may be a good addition to your toolkit due to its Test Mode and other handy features. With Help Magician you will be cranking out help files in no time and the list price is a reasonable \$199.00.

# THE VISUAL GUIDE TO VISUAL BASIC FOR WINDOWS BOOK REVIEW

If you read the book review I did on Visual Basic Super Bible you will remember that I think the manuals that come with Visual Basic are good. However, I still collect and read all of the 3rd party books I can lay my hands on. Well, this month I am going to cover another good reference book. THE VISUAL GUIDE TO VISUAL BASIC FOR WINDOWS. This is also definitely not a book that you read from cover to cover. It is a huge book at almost 1400 pages. This book covers Visual Basic version 2.

The book contains three sections. Section I is a step by step guide to programming Visual Basic. Section II is the Reference A-Z. Section III is the four appendices.

The first section covers the elements of Visual basic - explaining forms, events, properties, subroutines, and modules. Then continues on with explaining the various menus of Visual Basic - file, edit, view, run, debug etc. The last part of Section I shows the creation of a disk view program and then goes on to expand it into a graphics viewer. While I feel this section is very well written it is only 44 pages long. I don't think I would have called it "A step by step guide to programming Visual Basic". That section title seems a little misleading. I let my wife (who is just getting started with VB) read the section and she felt the same way.

Section II is the meat and potatoes of this book. This huge section covers from page 47 to page 1321. It is a thorough examination of Visual Basic 2.0 commands. The list is in alphabetical order and starts with ABS and ends with ZORDER. Each entry in this section includes uses for the command, cautions to keep in mind when using the command and an example of the command in use. The writing style is plain English and very easy to read. The book is also filled with hundreds of screen shots of the examples and makes there understanding easier. This book has replaced my copy of The Super Bible as the book I turn to when I need information on a command.

Section III has four appendices covering the following:



Windows API



Getting Rid of Bugs



Operators



Add-on Products for Visual Basic & Windows

These are small sections that just briefly cover these topics. The subject of the Windows API can fill a book this size all of its own.

There is also a companion disk that includes a plain ASCII text of all of the examples from the book. Since I did not have the Disk I really can't say much about it. It does cost an extra \$29.95 plus \$3.90 for shipping.

**OVERALL I HIGHLY RECOMMEND THIS BOOK FOR VISUAL BASIC FOR WINDOWS VER.2 PROGRAMMERS!**

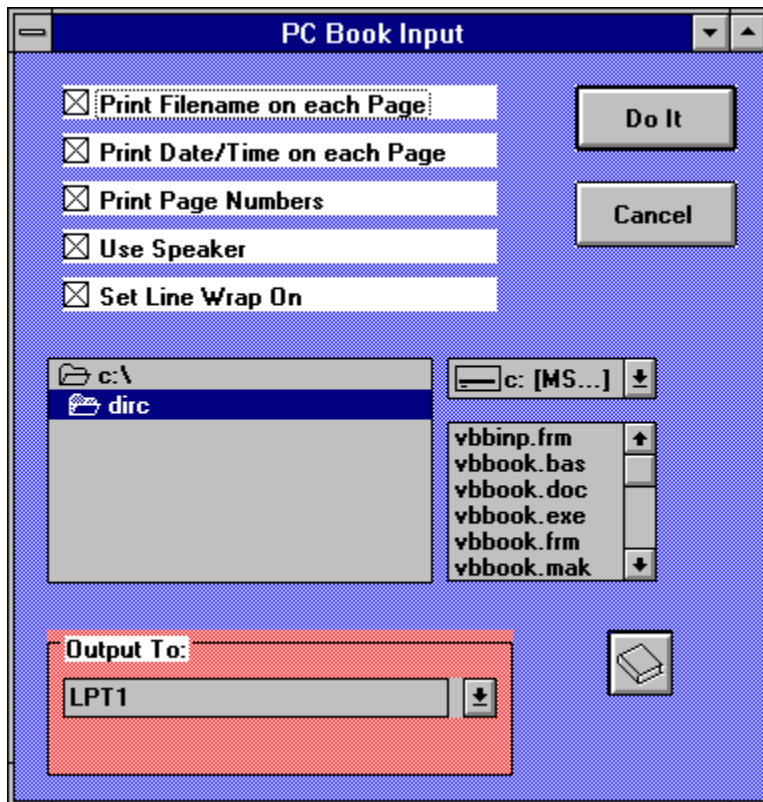

## VBBOOK.ZIP

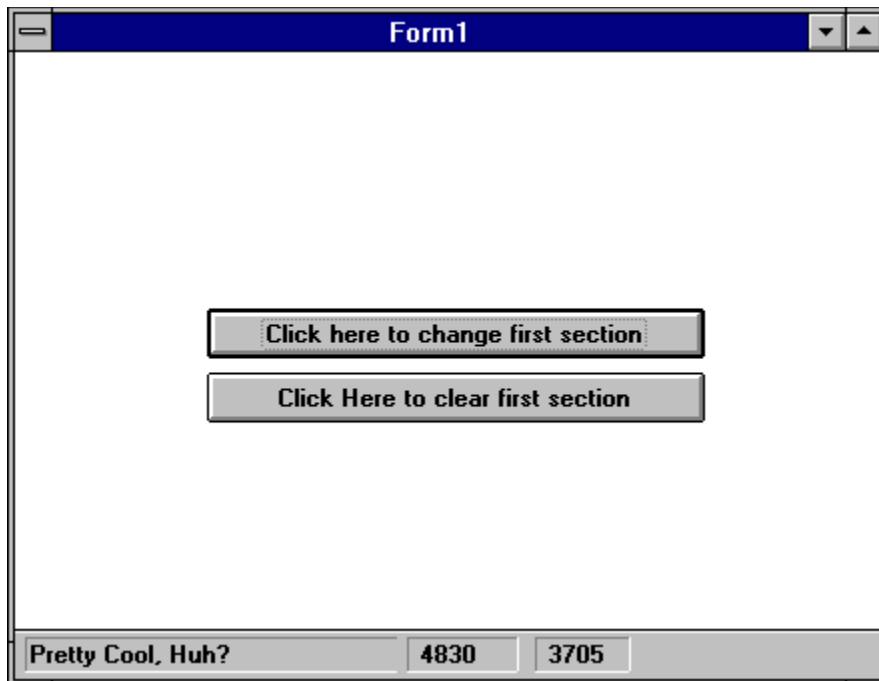

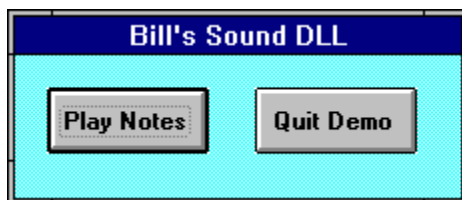
This is a Visual Basic status bar control! To use it, simply click on File - Add File and load status.dll. You will then see a button that looks like a status bar in the toolbox. You can now use the status bar control as if it came with Visual Basic.

The current version will (at run time) automatically force all instances of status bars to the bottom of the screen and will force the first instance to be the width of your form and the all others to be flush right. If the form is resized, the bar will remain "glued" to the bottom. The first section will resize itself to the width of the form and the others will remain glued to the bottom right.

You can change captions, colors and so forth as you would any other control.

Despite what you may have heard, it is possible to create decent help files by using only Word for Windows and the SDK help compiler (hc31.exe or hc30.exe). There are at least two Microsoft SDK books describing Help Files and their construction -- but, neither gives the information about how all these cryptic commands can be entered using just Word for Windows.

This help file was constructed using: **1) Word for Windows 2.0a** **2) hc31.exe** and **3) Windows' Paintbrush** (for icons). If you want absolutely first rate Help Files, that are relatively easy to construct -- check out the RoboHelp and Windows Help Magician reviews elsewhere in this issue.

## **Requirements for Creating Help Files**

**For Basic Help Files --** You'll need the following items:

*Microsoft Windows 3.1*

*Microsoft Help Compiler (hc31.exe)*

*Microsoft Word for Windows 2.0a*

**It's Sure Nice to Have --**

*Microsoft SDK "Programming Tools" booklet*

*Microsoft SDK Hotspot Editor (SHED.EXE)*

*Microsoft SDK Image Editor (IMAGEDIT.EXE)*

Patience and time to experiment

## Overview of Help File construction

When you create a C program, many people use a **makefile** and run **nmake makefile** when creating the executable file. The **makefile** is just a text file that gives the names of various files and instructions to the compiler/linker to create the executable program. In the same fashion, the Help Compiler (**hc31.exe**) requires a text file with instructions on how to build the help file. For a C program the makefile will usually have .c, .h, .def, etc. files referenced. The Help Compiler usually only needs to know **.rtf** (rich text format) file(s). The Help project file that contains the instructions and file names is a **.hpj** file instead of the C **makefile**. A basic Help file project can consist of just two files: **somename.rtf** and **somename.hpj**. To make the help file you would enter the command **hc31 somename.hpj** from the DOS command line. When creating the files using Word for Windows -- be sure to choose **Save As** from the **File** menu and then select **text only** for the **.hpj** file and **rtf** for your **.rtf** file.

Just like the C **makefile** has syntax rules, the **.hpj** file also has syntax rules. View the topic for [HPJ syntax](#) for more information.

A popular thing to do is to add Bitmaps (pictures) to the Help file. Bitmaps can be used as just pictures, as jumps to other topics, and pop-ups. You can use Windows' Paintbrush to create the Bitmaps (.bmp files).

Microsoft Word for Windows is used to create the **.rtf** and the **.hpj** files. Creating the **.rtf** file is easy because you should already be familiar with the basics of Word for Windows. In addition, it's easy because the text you see in Word is what you will see in the Help File. View the topic [Constructing Help Files](#) for more information about using Word to create the **.rtf** files.



## **Word for Windows <--> Help Files**

Here are some suggestions to try when you are just starting to make help files. As you gain more experience and feel more comfortable with it -- you'll develop your own "routine".

### **Set Word for Windows**

Before you start anything -- you need to know that much of the Help Files process makes use of "hidden" text and "footnotes". You should already have an general idea about what footnotes are. You will need to set Word for Windows to show hidden text. Start Word for Windows, but before you go too far, choose **Tools** then **Options** from the menu. In the **View** Category -- make sure the **hidden text** box is checked in the Non-Printing Characters section.

It's a pretty good idea to use Helv 10pt font for much of your text to start. It doesn't look bad, and most systems have this font on them.

### **First Time suggestions**

1. Try making a first "test" Help file. This is just to see how things work. Make up a short file just to experiment with.
2. Taking a little time and maybe a few notes before you start your text file usually pays off in less confusion when it comes time to do jumps, etc. In other words, try as best you can to "rough out" how the Help File looks and operates before doing a lot of typing.
3. After reading through these notes.....Open a .rtf file (like wfwhlp.rtf) and take a look at some of the things you have been reading about.

## Constructing .RTF files

Be aware of what Windows takes care of and what you must take care of when it comes to Help Files. Windows will handle the help window size and wrapping text in the window. You have to take care of fonts, sizes, colors, and bitmaps/graphics in your .rtf and .hpl files. Windows takes care of the Contents, Back, and History buttons. You have to tell windows to use the Search and/or Browse ( << >> ) buttons in your .rtf file.

### IN A NUTSHELL --

Help files are very similar to a card file. Each "screen" in the Help file is like a single card. You get to different screens by selecting one of the "jump" words. Jump words are green with a solid underline. When using Word for Windows to create the .rtf text file -- each screen is a separate page. Each of the pages is referred to as a "topic". Each topic has a unique tag(character string) associated with that page. Each topic **must** have a string. Each topic **can** also have a title, keyword, and identifier. If you use a keyword, you must also use a title. Since each topic(i.e. page) is identified with a string, jumps are possible by using the string.

The string, title, keyword, and identifier are stored with the .rtf text file in the form of footnotes. For each topic -- you enter the string(and the optional title, keyword, and identifier) as a footnote using "special" characters for the footnote mark. Instead of the footnote belonging to a particular word -- as you might in a report -- these footnotes belong to the topic(i.e. page) and are usually found at the start of the page.

Just so you won't get confused when reading Microsoft documentation; the string I mentioned above is called a "context string". The items and their associated footnote marks are as follows:

Footnotes are associated with a topic (page) as opposed to an individual word or phrase. Generally, footnote marks appear at the beginning of the page.

## **Jumps Syntax**

In Word for Windows the jump word is double underlined by selecting Format then Character then double underline from the menu. Immediately following the double underline jump word is the context string name in hidden text. In Word for Windows hidden text is done by selecting Format then Character then hidden from the menu. Hidden text is displayed with an underline of dots. Windows takes care of making the word green colored in the help file. Sample of a jump with hidden context topic:

jumppage two

## Pop-up Syntax

Pop-ups are created by identifying a word or phrase to be clicked on by the user to pop-up a dialog box containing context string info. In Word for Windows the pop-up word is single underlined by selecting Format then Character then single underline from the menu. Immediately following the single underline pop-up word is the context string name in hidden text. In Word for Windows hidden text is done by selecting Format then Character then hidden from the menu. Hidden text is displayed with an underline of dots. Windows takes care of making the word green colored in the help file. Sample of a pop-up with hidden context topic:

popupppopup\_string

## Bitmap Displays

Only 16 color bitmap displays are supported.

Graphics can be incorporated by using the normal procedures in Word for Windows.



Bitmaps can also be used for jumps or pop-ups. Bitmaps can also be displayed in either the right or left margin with text wrapping around them as shown by the bitmaps at left and right. Bitmaps can also be displayed as a "character" where the bitmap will be displayed with the bottom and lower left starting at a character location as shown below:

## Bitmap Jumps

Bitmap jumps are created by identifying the bitmap to be clicked on by the user to jump to another context string (page). In Word for Windows the bitmap style and filename is double underlined by selecting Format then Character then double underline from the menu. Immediately following the double underline bitmap info is the context string name in hidden text. In Word for Windows hidden text is done by selecting Format then Character then hidden from the menu. Hidden text is displayed with an underline of dots. Sample of a bitmap jump with hidden context topic:

## Bitmap Pop-ups

Bitmap pop-ups are created by identifying the bitmap to be clicked on by the user to pop-up another context string (page). In Word for Windows the bitmap style and filename is single underlined by selecting Format then Character then single underline from the menu. Immediately following the single underline bitmap info is the context string name in hidden text. In Word for Windows hidden text is done by selecting Format then Character then hidden from the menu. Hidden text is displayed with an underline of dots. Sample of a bitmap pop-up with hidden context topic:

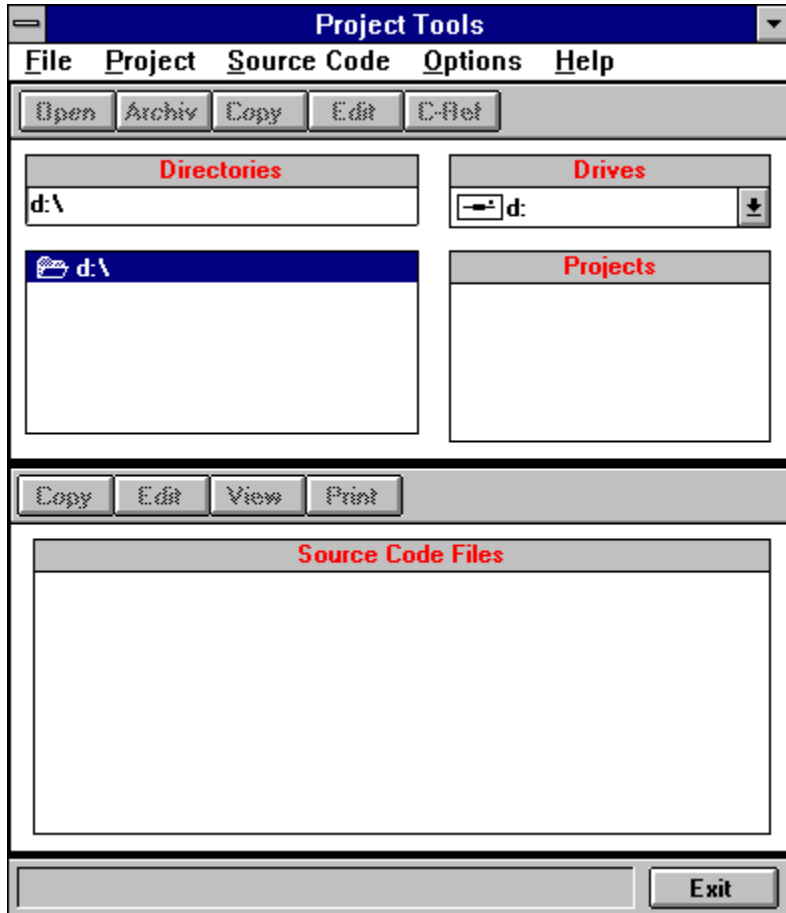
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# VB PROJECT TOOLS



Projects Tools is an application designed as a front-end to Microsoft Visual Basic 2.0 for the purpose of managing Visual Basic projects (.MAK files). It is targeted for use mainly by the application developer but it can also be used by MIS departments that need to manage and control source code. Project Tools is completely written in Visual Basic 2.0 and makes occasional use of the Windows 3.1 API. Projects Tools features include the ability to:

- Copy project files from one directory to another
- Create a new project in its own directory
- Archive a project
- Launch VB with a particular project
- Compile projects
- Edit and Print project source code files
- Produce a Cross Reference listing for source code files
- Edit the project .MAK file

PROJECT TOOLS is shareware. Users can use an unregistered copy of PROJECT TOOLS for sixty (60) days. After that time users must either register their version of PROJECT TOOLS or

delete PROJECT TOOLS.
