On a related note, Sigma Designs makes a NuBus card called the DoubleUp board that makes DiskDoubler run about 10 times as fast as the software version alone. (I'm unsure as to which computer is used as a benchmark for this comparison, but I'd assume a llcx.) Once

time I finished with it, or I'd spend all my time waiting for it to compress and decompress! Applications like UnZIP and UnARC, though, are ideal candidates for DD, since I use them once a month at most.

This new version adds a "Create SEA" (Self-Extracting Archive) command, so you can compress a large document to send to an associate, and he'll be able to decompress it without a copy of DiskDoubler. The decompression routine adds about 11K to the size of the file. A freely available DDExpand package (Expand-only versions of the program and INIT) is also available.

I'll be honest: DiskDoubler has saved me from having to buy a second hard drive. (All right, a third hard drive. See what I mean?) I still use it only for local compression--Compact Pro is *much* better suited for multiple-file archives. (DiskDoubler has a Combine command, but individual files cannot be extracted)

This new version is System 7-Savvy, with judiciously implemented balloon help and complete compatibility. With a better combined-file system and slightly better speed, it would quite possibly be the perfect Macintosh file-compression product. **B+**.

it's installed, DiskDoubler functions the same way, but runs much faster. It carries around a \$150 street price. Salient is currently working on a very much-

improved compression product that will be more memory-intensive and boost speed. According to Salient, it will be offered to current DiskDoubler users "at a substantial discount."

DiskDoubler does its best compression on text- and number-heavy files such as PageMaker documents, ASCII text and Word-processor files, and on TIFF graphic images. Others, such as applications and complicated object graphics files, tend not to compress quite as well. I find I get an average of about 45% savings on the items that I compress on my disk. DiskDoubler is ideal for compressing occasional-use things such as clipart and old documents. I certainly wouldn't compress PageMaker each
