1.4 Introduction

What is Ecstasy? Why should I
use
it?

Ecstasy is a front-end to the EC compiler (the main compiler for the E language).

I guess you could use it for other languages as well... but certain elements of it are biased towards E - things like the filter for the compiler output.

I was using a small program called EZ_E which I picked up from somewhere... but I ended up getting annoyed with it. It wasn't font sensitive, so it looked a little funny on my screen. Even if you cancelled an operation, it still continued anyway. (AAARGH!) It was extremely UNconfigurable.

So I created this...

What advantages does Ecstasy have?

- * Support for
 WBStart-Handler
 .
- * Font-sensitive GUI - I have struggled with GadTools to create a decent looking GUI, rather than opting for MUI/BGUI/Triton etc...

Ecstasy will use any

- font
you choose for its main interface.
- * Easily configurable interface.
- * Ecstasy has a menu reserved for configuration by the user. The editor for this is external to the rest of the program, to save ← memory.
- * Implemented as a commodity, for extra usability.
- * Will run on any public~screen.
- * Has been tested/used for five months to develop itself and other programs.
- * Ecstasy has none of the ugly input-output windows that plague programs of this type (although it used to ;-). Instead, the program will notify you of any unusual messages from the compiler.

1.5 Installation

Installation is pretty simple - copy it to your E bin directory. ←
(It will run from anywhere else, as well, but this is a logical place to put it.)

Ecstasy needs certain libraries - all common, but someone out there may not have ReqTools yet (like those lost tribes in Borneo :-). See Requirements for details of these libraries.

If you wish to run files from their icons with Ecstasy, then you must have the file

WBStart-Handler in the L: directory. This file is provided with the Ecstasy distribution. If this file is not found, then nothing untoward will happen - files will merely be run from the command line instead of from Workbench.

Also, once Ecstasy is running, you must configure it. See Preferences to find out how to do this.

1.6 Requirements

Ecstasy REQUIRES Workbench 2.0+. If you do not have a machine which is able to run this program, then you are missing out on a lot more than just this little utility! Almost all major programs these days will not run on WB 1.3 machines. Upgrade, and join the rest of us.

Also, Ecstasy uses the Reqtools library for its requesters.

Reqtools is © Nico Francois.

I have been using version 38.1248 - any problems that result MAY come from using a version of Reqtools lower than this. I can't really say, but if there are any problems then this could be something to try.

Specifically, Ecstasy needs these libraries in your LIBS: directory.

Asl.library (v37+) Provided as part of the OS.

Commodities.library (v37+) Provided as part of the OS.

Diskfont.library (v37+) Provided as part of the OS.

Icon.library (v37+) Provided as part of the OS.

Iffparse.library (v37+) Provided as part of the OS.

Reqtools.library (v38+) This is available in the public domain.

It will optionally use this handler:

WBStart-Handler Place this in the L: directory.


1.7 Using Ecstasy

The actions Ecstasy will take depend on whether there is an 'active' file or not. This is determined by whether you have selected a file to edit since you started the program. The active file (if one exists) is shown - file name only, without the path - in the box below the action buttons.

This active file can be changed using the small gadget with the question mark on it next to the display window.

Key-short cuts exist for all the buttons - they are underlined on the buttons themselves.

1.8 Menu Preferences

These are the options you are asked to supply for the preferences  option. It

is best to use absolute paths (i.e. from the root of the device you are referring to) because the paths passed to the program by the preferences are relative to the location of the program.

This options can be changed from the 'Project' menu.

- Jump Screen: Use this option to jump to the next public screen. However, if the public screen is in 'private' mode (i.e., it is not allowing any visitor windows to open) then Ecstasy will present a requester complaining that it cannot open on that screen.
- Work directory: This is the directory that contains all of your source files. Ecstasy will CD to this directory when it starts up. It will look for its various settings here in the '.ecstasy' and '.ecstmenu' files.
- Save to Icon: This saves the current working directory to the program's icon. The next time the program is started, it will CD to this directory and search for a config file there.

These options can be changed from the 'Settings' menu.

- Font: The font to use for the Ecstasy interface. You are limited to using fonts between 6 and 18 points in size (and even they make the window pretty big).
- Editor: This should be a path to your preferred editor.
- (Run editor on start) This is a setting which will only matter on start-up; it governs whether Ecstasy attempts to run the (saved) editor with the (saved) active file.
- (Wait for public screen) This governs whether, if the named public screen that Ecstasy should open on is not open, whether the program should wait for it to open (after a certain configurable time, it will put up a requester asking whether it should continue waiting, open on the default public screen or quit) or just open directly on the default public screen.
- Compiler: This is where you choose the location of your compiler (usually EC in the /bin directory of the Amiga E distribution, but you may want to run a different version).
- Compiler options: If you want to run your compiler with any command line options, they can be entered here. For example, if you wanted to debug a file using EDBG and compiling with EC, you would open the compiler options requester (RAmiga-C, or use the menu) and enter DEBUG.
- (Show unreferenced) Toggles reports of unreferenced variables in the post-compilation requester.
-

(Show warnings) Toggles reports of compiler warnings in the post-compilation requester.

Debugger: This is where you choose the location of your debugger (usually EDBG in the /bin directory of the Amiga E distribution, but you may want to run a different version).

Edit Actions Menu: This calls an external prefs program to edit the menu (see EcstasyPrefs).

Save to Dir: This option saves the settings to the current directory.

1.9 Local Preferences

In writing this program, I wanted to easily support working on several different programs at the same time. Therefore, while using Ecstasy it is possible to save your settings to a small file (called '.ecstasy') in the current directory of the program. This ensures that when you change directories (and effectively change the project you are working on) you can change the appearance of the GUI and the operation of Ecstasy's functions.

Each time you change Ecstasy's current directory, the program checks to see if it can find a '.ecstasy' file in the new directory. If it cannot find it, then the program settings remain as they were; if it can, then the settings are changed.

The only option which is saved to the icon is the working directory. This option has been separated from the others to emphasise this fact.

You can save your settings to the current directory using the 'Settings/Save to Dir' menu option.

1.10 Menu Editor

This program serves as a menu editor for the (optional) 'Actions' menu.

I made this external to the rest of the program because it would have taken up too much memory otherwise - another 25K or so for something not often used. Instead it is called by Ecstasy, which expects to find it in the same directory as itself.

In order to see what the program does, call it from within Ecstasy (use 'Edit Actions Menu' or press Left-Amiga M) and press Add. You may then type a name and an action to be associated with that name. There are two modes that this action may be run in: CLI, which executes it as if it had been typed in from the command line, and WB, which runs the named program using the WBStart-Handler (and therefore expects to find an icon).

In order to place a line (menu bar) across the menu, just enter the word 'MENUBAR' (without quotes) in the 'Name' gadget. This line will be interpreted by Ecstasy when it reads the saved menu prefs file ('.ecstmenu') back in.

You can therefore see that more complex actions can be easily set up by executing scripts.... e.g. if I wanted to make three assigns and run two programs with one menu selection, I would write a script to do these things, place it in the S: directory, and then put 'Execute S:MyScript' in the Action string gadget in the menu editor (using CLI mode, of course).

I decided to do this when I was on the point of adding hardwired support for AutoBuild and FlushCache in the main program, and suddenly realized that it would make much more sense to provide an expandable mechanism instead.

The program uses a standard GadTools listview interface... there are a few things to mention though. When adding or editing an entry, make sure that you have pressed 'Return' in the string gadget, otherwise the change will not register. Also, I have limited this program to only allow 20 menu entries, largely because this would unbalance the look of the menus.

1.11 Tooltypes and the Command Line

Ecstasy only has one application-specific tootype:

```
WORKDIR=<active directory>
```

This points it to a default directory, where it expects to find file(s) that tell it how to
configure
itself for that particular
project.

Ecstasy also supports the normal system tooltypes which configure commodities:

```
CX_POPUP=<either TRUE (or YES) or FALSE (or NO)>  
CX_POPKEY=<preferred hotkey combination>  
CX_PRIORITY=<priority in the commodities chain>
```

Defaults for these are:

```
CX_POPUP=TRUE  
CX_POPKEY=rawkey ctrl lalt e  
CX_PRIORITY=0
```

These can also be invoked on the command line, as follows...

```
'Ecstasy WORKDIR=hdl:Programming/MyProject/ CX_POPUP=YES' etc.
```

1.12 Version History

0.50a (30.5.95)

- * Started version history :-)
- * Added full selections for prefs, along with save/load for config.
- * Dumped font load option until I can fix it so it stops crashing my machine :-)

0.55a (31.5.95)

- * Added box showing the active file.

0.75a (4.6.95)

- * Started AmigaGuide documentation.
- * Font rendering now working perfectly - problem with differences between E 'normal' strings, E 'EStrings' and the strings Intuition expected :-)
- * Truncated strings so they wouldn't over-run the text box (oops)
- * Added 'Debug' and 'Shell' buttons.
- * Added 'work directory' concept.... you can choose the current directory in the prefs.
- * Fixed 'Debug' so it didn't lock up program (oops...)
- * Changed routines to cope with operations being cancelled better.

0.80B (7.6.95) LIMITED RELEASE VERSION.

- * Tidied up code... made font rendering screen sensitive.

0.85a (13.6.95)

- * Prefs options shifted to menu - now they can be changed individually and only need to be saved when you want.
 - * Exit button removed - with close gadget and menu quit to choose from, another way out seemed like overkill.
 - * I/O window now always adaptive in height to size of main window.
 - * Bit the bullet and moved to reqtools.library - most serious users will have it permanently patched into memory anyway.
 - * Added compiler command line options, and saving/loading of them.
 - * Added config file identification. Now the program does not attempt to parse any and all files as configs...

- * Ecstasy is now a commodity, with all CXExchange options enabled.
- * Now extremely(!) font-sensitive.
- * Added selector button for the active file box.
- * Added key short-cuts for all gadgets.
- * Added check before quit.

0.90a (25.6.95)

- * Now saves/loads location of main window.
- * If no executable, then compile and run: feature added.

0.93a (29.6.95)

- * Fixed an exit bug - gadget list was being freed twice (oops!)
- * Program now checks for OS version and prints out a response if the machine only has 1.3. Previously it just failed to run.
- * Been wrestling with bugs in directory locking - all fixed now (touch wood).

0.97a (3.7.95)

- * Added support for Stefan Becker's
WBStart-Handler
. Now, whenever you try
to execute a file, the program checks to see if an icon exists. If it
does, then the program is started with a simulated Workbench start.
- * Bugfix: paths can now be provided in the tooltypes either with or without
trailing slashes (e.g 'hdl:e/dev' OR 'hdl:e/dev/' are both acceptable).

0.98B (5.7.95) BETA VERSION

- * Ecstasy now correctly identifies the name of the executable it is running
from. The name of the program is not hard-wired into it anymore.
 - * Changed default font (i.e. if preferred font could not be loaded) to
the screen font instead of topaz/8. If the screen font cannot be loaded,
THEN topaz/8 is used as an extra fallback.
 - * Bug: previously, if Ecstasy could not read any tooltypes to begin with,
then it could not save any out either - fixed.
 - * Fixed an old bug where the view-window could leave garbage on redraws
after a window re-render.

0.99B (1.9.95)

- * Fixed small bug in window rendering to cope with (other peoples') machines :-)
- * Made *ALL* file names active with full path - to avoid 'relativities' when locating program tools etc
- * Fixed gadget handling - now checks for multiple button presses/commodities messages that may have occurred while it was 'busy'. This would usually happen while compiling a large project, or compiling a project with an empty module-cache. Also ghosts the gadgets when the program cannot accept input while compiling.
- * Removed i/o window - now notifies user of compiler errors via a requester.
- * Added jump to public screen (is also saved in prefs). Program can optionally wait until this public screen opens.
- * Added local prefs saved as a file in a project directory. Ecstasy can now change its operation 'on the fly' in response to the different demands of your programming.
- * If the local settings file contains an active file, Ecstasy loads the editor with this file when it starts/changes directory. (optional)
- * Made unreferenced check, warnings optional (via menu).
- * Tidied up the icon save/dir save. Empty fields now saved as "NONE", scanned back in correctly.

1.00 (10.10.95)

- * Added 'Actions' menu, and the editor for it - see EcstasyPrefs.
- * Made the editor external after realising that it increased the executable size by about 20K.
- * Wiped out a few small buglets. Made compiler name and debugger name chooseable. Made program more useable with earlier versions of EC. Fixed Ecstasy's public screen handling - sometimes locks were left when they shouldn't have been. Fixed an old menu bug.

1.03 (13.10.95)

- * Made an infinite-length strings module, and incorporated that internally. File requesters now have a 2K buffer space - should be safe. Fixed gadget rendering - I must have read the AutoDocs wrongly :-)

1.13 Still to Come

Does anyone want these built in?? I could undertake to do any of these, but it depends on whether anyone wants them...

- * An ARexx port.
- * Support for using a default icon in env:sys/, rather than the one built into the program.
- * Locale support - catalogs etc...
- * MUI/Triton/BGUI versions...

1.14 Bugs

I have recently made some pretty wide-scale changes to this program, and some bugs popped up... I think I've gotten rid of them, though.

I'm sure, however, that they teem unrestricted within the confines of my code, merely waiting until I release the program before raising their collective heads.

If you think you have found one, first check (within the documentation) that it is not an 'implementation issue'... i.e. that it was not a deliberate choice due to the restrictions of operating system (or, indeed, those of the programmer ;-).

One thing to note is that i have tried to make this program as font-sensitive as possible. However, I have only been able to test this on a couple of other machines, so I am not sure that it will work on all machines.

1.15 WBStart-Handler

I used the most recent version of the WBStart-Handler development docs I could find, for v1.3, on Fish Disk 896.

However, the version I use (and the version I have included with this program) is v1.4. No problems have resulted in using this newer version.

If this file cannot be found, then the program will still run - however the feature of starting programs from their icon will be lost.

1.16 About Ecstasy

If anyone objects strongly to the name, then they can contact me. I'm sure it will probably lead to me being arrested on some trumped-up drug charges, but that's my problem.
