

Specifies that Internet addresses are ignored when Outlook Express checks spelling.

Specifies the language used when Outlook Express checks spelling.

[Click this to add words or change words in your custom dictionary.](#)

Specifies how you want to send and receive mail if you are not connected to the Internet. You can work offline, remain disconnected, or try to establish a new connection.

Specifies whether your computer plays a sound when new messages arrive. If you clear this check box, you do not hear any sound, but the Outlook Express status bar and message list will indicate that you have unread messages.

Specifies whether to show ToolTips in the message list when an item is cut off by another column.

Displays the list of character sets available.

Click this to remove the selected character set.

Specifies whether a message should be marked as read after you have previewed it for the number of seconds indicated. If you clear this check box, messages are not marked as read unless you open the message in a message window; scroll the message in the preview pane; or select the message in the list, click the **Edit** menu, and then click **Mark as Read**.

Specifies whether to send and receive messages in all accounts when Outlook Express is started.

Specifies whether to check your mail server for new messages at the specified interval of minutes. It also sends any messages in the Outbox at the same time. If you clear this check box, you can only check for new messages by clicking the **Tools** menu and then clicking **Send and Receive**.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should permanently delete messages from the Deleted Items folder when you quit Outlook Express. If you clear this check box, deleted messages stay in the Deleted Items folder until you open that folder, select the messages, and then delete them.

Specifies whether you want to save copies of the messages you send in the Sent Items folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of a message by including yourself on the **To**, **Cc**, or **Bcc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you click a link in a Web page to send an e-mail message or choose the **Mail** command in your Web browser.

Specifies whether to automatically resolve any incomplete e-mail addresses while you are composing a message.

Specifies whether to send your messages in HTML format.

Specifies whether to send your messages as plain text, with no formatting.

[Click this to specify format settings for message encoding, message line length as well as reply format.](#)

[Click this to specify message encoding format, message reply format, and whether or not to send pictures with the message.](#)

Specifies whether to start Outlook Express in the selected newsgroup. If this check box is cleared, Outlook Express starts in the newsgroup you were viewing when you last used Outlook Express.

Specifies whether foreign character sets, high ASCII, or double-byte character sets (DBCS) are allowed in the header without encoding. If this check box is cleared, these characters will be encoded.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should delete all newsgroup messages from your computer after they have been on your computer longer than the specified number of days.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should delete all read newsgroup messages stored on your computer when you quit Outlook Express.

Specifies that Outlook Express should compact storage files on your computer when the amount of wasted space exceeds the specified percentage.

Lists the fonts available on your computer. Click a font, and then see what it looks like in the **Sample** area. You must select text before you can change its font.

Uses a font style to add emphasis to words and phrases in your message. Font formatting applies only to currently selected text.

Changes the size of the message text that is selected. Font size is relative and depends on the font selected, the size of the base font, and the browser you are using.

Shows sample text with the selected font formatting. The sample text changes as you change formatting options.

Underlines the selected text.

Changes the color of the selected text.

Provides a space for you to type the path and file name of the image. You can also click **Browse** to locate an image.

Provides a space for you to type text that you want displayed in place of the image when images are turned off or when images are unavailable on the recipient's computer. The alternate text is also displayed when the image is loading.

Positions the image on the page depending on your selection.

To do this

Align the bottom of the image with the baseline of the text.

Places a border around the image in the width (in pixels) you specify. Type a number between 0 and 999.

Adds the specified amount of space (in pixels) to the sides of the image. Type a number between 0 and 999.

Adds the specified amount of space (in pixels) to the top and bottom of the image. Type a number between 0 and 999.

Specifies whether to create a link to the file you want to send.

Provides a space for you to select a file type and then type the address or path that you want to create a link to.

Specifies whether to format the paragraph with bullets or numbers.

Specifies the margin that you want to align the text with.

[Click this to enter more criteria for your search.](#)

Specifies whether to search all the text in any downloaded messages of your e-mail or newsgroup accounts.

Click this to find the next instance of the text you entered.

Enter the text you want to search for.

Click this to browse through folders to find the picture file you want.

Specifies whether to log on to MSN Messenger Service when Outlook Express starts.

Specifies whether, when you reply to e-mail, the names and e-mail addresses of recipients are added to the address book.

Specifies whether the contents of the Inbox are displayed when you first open Outlook Express.

Specifies whether to automatically display mail and newsgroup folders that have unread messages.

Specifies whether replies to messages use the format of that message, either plain text or HTML. This setting overrides other text formatting settings, such as bold or italic.

Adds your digital signature to all messages you send. If you sign your messages, recipients will be able to determine if a message is really from you. **Note:** The recipient does not need a digital ID to view signed messages.

Attempts to encrypt contents and attachments for all outgoing mail messages. To send an encrypted message, you must have the digital ID of the message recipient in your Address Book.

Specifies the lowest level of message encryption that you are willing to send out without getting a warning. Outlook Express will warn you when sending encrypted messages with less than this level of encryption.

For people with modem connections to the Internet, this option specifies that your Internet connection number is not dialed when you start Outlook Express. If you select this option, use the **Dial** button on the toolbar to start an Internet connection.

Specifies which Dial-up Networking number Outlook Express uses when connecting to the Internet. This option is useful if you have more than one Dial-up Networking connection to the Internet.

[Click this to change the location of your message store.](#)

Specifies that Outlook Express will compact your messages in the background so that you can continue using Outlook Express.

Specifies that Outlook Express will purge all IMAP messages marked for deletion when you leave the IMAP folder.

[Click this to change the Internet connection settings. These settings are shared with Internet Explorer.](#)

Specifies that a message appears when you start Outlook Express, asking if you want to start an Internet connection. This option is useful if you frequently read newsgroups or e-mail offline.

Specifies that if you have more than one Dial-up Networking connection, Outlook Express displays a message enabling you to cancel a connection that isn't working.

Specifies that Outlook Express disconnects from your Internet connection after you click the **Send/Recv** button on the toolbar or download newsgroups for offline reading.

Specifies whether messages that have attached picture files (*.bmp, *.gif, or *.jpg) display the picture in the message after the message text.

Specifies whether, in messages that have multiple attached pictures, the pictures are displayed one at a time in the message, with forward and backward buttons used to view additional images.

Specifies the color that you want to highlight any watched messages with.

[Click this to set the font and text size of incoming messages.](#)

Click this to review the list of character-set substitutions that you have previously used for incoming messages. Every time you change a character set in a message by using the **Language** button on the toolbar, you can add it to this list. Then, any incoming message with the same character set is automatically reformatted to the character set you specified.

Specifies whether all commands sent to and from the news server are saved in a log file. The log file is useful for troubleshooting.

Specifies whether all commands sent to and from the mail server are saved in a log file. The log file is useful for troubleshooting.

Specifies whether all commands sent to and from an HTTP mail server are saved in a log file. The log file is useful for troubleshooting

Specifies that commands sent to and from the news server when you download newsgroups for offline reading are saved in a log file. The log file is useful for troubleshooting.

[Click this to set the font and size of outgoing message text.](#)

Specifies that the font settings you selected are added to outgoing messages.

Adds the selected image to messages. The image appears behind message text.

[Click this to select stationery to use for new outgoing messages.](#)

[Click this to create a signature and/or include a business card in outgoing messages.](#)

Specifies whether to add your signature to all outgoing messages.

Specifies that the text you type is added to the signature. Click **Set as Default** to make this your default signature.

Adds the file you specify to the end of outgoing messages.

Click this to search for files in your local or network folders to append to outgoing messages.

Displays the name of the business card selected to include in new messages. To change business card information, click **Edit**.

Specifies whether to include your business card in new messages. You can include a different business card for mail and news.

Click this to assign different signatures to different accounts. For example, you can assign one signature to your outgoing mail messages and a different signature to your outgoing news messages.

Click this to make the selected signature your default signature for all outgoing messages.

Displays the list of signatures you have created.

Click this to rename the selected signature.

Click this to remove the selected signature.

Click this to create a new signature.

Specifies whether your signature is added when you reply to or forward a message.

[Click this to create a new Address Book listing to use in your stationery.](#)

[Click this to change contact information that you want to send as a business card.](#)

Specifies whether to add the contact information for the specified person to outgoing messages. The contact information is in vCard file format, which can be read by any digital device.

Provides a space to enter a contact name from your address book to use as a business card. The business card is the contact information stored in a vCard file, which can be read by any type of digital device. If you do not have an entry for yourself in your address book, click **New** to create one.

Lists the names of the stationery files on your computer.

Specifies whether to show a preview of the selected stationery.

Displays a small sample of the selected stationery.

Click this to start Microsoft FrontPage Express and edit the HTML file of the selected stationery.

[Click this to start Internet Explorer to view more stationery.](#)

[Click this to search for files to use for stationery in your local or network folders.](#)

[Click this to use the Stationery Wizard to create custom stationery.](#)

Specifies whether to indent the original text of a reply message or forward message with a special character. You can select the character that you want to use.

Specifies whether to use the selected stationery when sending messages. You can choose different stationery for mail and news.

Displays the name of the selected stationery. To change the stationery, click **Select**.

Shows a sample of how text will appear with the specified font settings.

Specifies whether to indent the original text of a message when replying to it. If this option is cleared, the entire message is aligned on the left.

Specifies whether any pictures in the message (including background images) are added to the message. If this option is cleared, only a reference (or pointer) to the picture is included. Use this option if the message recipients do not have access to the picture (for example, if it is on your computer or if they are reading the message offline). Including pictures makes the message larger and harder to download.

Specifies whether to display a list of icons similar to Microsoft Outlook on the left side of the window.

Specifies whether to display a list of default folders (such as the Inbox, Outbox, and Drafts folders) and folders you create. The list appears on the left side of the Outlook Express window.

Specifies whether to display a horizontal bar between the toolbar and the message list that shows the name of the currently displayed folder.

Specifies whether to display a list of names from your address book. This list appears on the lower left side of the Outlook Express window.

Specifies whether to display a horizontal bar along the lower edge of Outlook Express that shows the current status of the selected folder; for example, how many messages are in the folder.

Specifies that the Outlook Express toolbar is displayed. The toolbar gives you quick access to the most common options.

Specifies whether to display a horizontal bar between the toolbar and the message list that allows you to change which messages are displayed. For example, you can choose to hide all messages that you have already read. If you create custom views, you can select one from this list also.

Specifies whether to display an information window at the bottom of the Outlook Express window. The Info Pane can be resized as needed.

Specifies that every time you start Outlook Express, a different idea for efficiently using it appears.

Specifies that you want to move the toolbar to a particular area of the Outlook Express window.

Specifies whether to display the name of the toolbar button below the button.

Click this to add or remove buttons on the toolbar.

Specifies whether to display the preview pane, which shows the contents of the selected message.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should display the preview pane horizontally (below messages) or vertically (beside messages).

Specifies whether to display the information in the **To**, **From**, and **Subject** boxes of the message at the top of the preview pane.

[Click this to view and manage your personal certificates, as well as certificates from trusted certification authorities and other people in your address book.](#)

[Click this to change the settings for your security zones.](#)

Specifies the encryption algorithm for encrypted mail that is sent to you. This setting is transmitted with each piece of digitally signed mail you send. Unless you frequently move between machines that support different algorithms, it is not necessary to change this setting.

Specifies whether to also encrypt the message to yourself (so that you can read it).

Click this to send the digital ID of the message recipient.

Specifies whether the public key portion of your digital ID is sent whenever you send digitally signed mail. Mail recipients can use the public key to encrypt messages to you.

Specifies that you do not want to check if a digital ID has been revoked.

Specifies that you want to check incoming digital IDs against a list of revoked certificates to determine if the certificate is current.

Specifies that you want all certificates from the signed messages you receive to be added to your address book.

Specifies whether your digitally signed messages should be encoded to help avoid tampering with the signature. If this option is on, users of e-mail programs that do not support S/MIME will not be able to read your signed messages.

Specifies whether Outlook Express is used when sending documents from within other applications using the **Send** command on the **File** menu. Selecting this check box disables both the Microsoft Exchange and Microsoft Outlook mail programs for this purpose.

Specifies that Outlook Express attempts to connect to your dial-up Internet mail account at the interval you set with the **Send and receive messages every xx minute(s)** option. (To see this option, click the **Options** menu, and then click the **General** tab.)

Specifies whether all commands sent to and from the IMAP mail server are saved in a log file. The log file is useful for troubleshooting.

[Click this to change the location of your personal e-mail storage location.](#)

Provides a space for you to enter the name of the file you want to put in your message.

Click this to search your computer for the file.

Specifies that the sound file should repeat the number of times you enter.

Specifies that the sound file should repeat continuously.

Provides a space to enter the URL (address) of the Web page you want to use to create your new message.

Provides a space for you to enter the address that you want to block.

Specifies whether you want to block mail, news, or mail and news messages from the address you entered.

Shows the list of columns that you can display in the main window. If a column is checked, it will be displayed in the main window.

Moves the selected column up one level in the displayed columns.

Moves the selected column down one level in the displayed columns.

Click this to display the selected column.

Click this to hide the selected column.

Provides a space for you to enter the width of the selected column.

Allows you to enter text to find all IMAP folder names that contain the text you entered.

Lists the available IMAP accounts. Click a server to show its list of folders.

Lists the folders available for the selected IMAP account. You can narrow this list to folders that contain a specific word in the name or description.

Displays the selected folder in the folder list in the main window. An icon appears next to folders you have chosen to show.

Removes the selected folder from the folder list in the main window.

Downloads the list of folders for the selected IMAP account.

Opens the selected folder.

Lists the available conditions you can apply to this view.

Provides a space for you to enter the name of the view.

Lists the descriptions that apply to the condition you selected. Click any underlined words to complete the description.

Select one or more check boxes to set up criteria that will be applied to incoming messages. For example, if you want the rule to apply to messages from a certain person, select "Where the From line contains people"

Select one or more check boxes to determine how to handle messages that meet the conditions you set. For example, if you want this rule to move messages to a certain folder, click "Move it to the specified folder."

Click the underlined areas in the Rule Description box to fill in specific information on the rule conditions. For example, to identify the senders that this rule applies to, click the words "contains people."

Type a descriptive name for your rule to help you remember its contents.

Click this to select all of the rules listed.

Describes the content of your individual rules.

Displays the folder your rules are applied to.

[Click this to apply your rule\(s\) to the subfolders in the currently displayed folder.](#)

Click this to find the folder you want your rules applied to.

Click this to apply your rules to the messages in the selected folder.

When you click this, Outlook Express monitors incoming messages and moves suspected junk mail to the Junk Mail folder.

[Click this to specify certain types of messages that should not be treated as junk mail.](#)

Adjusting the slider will affect which messages are filtered as junk mail. Move the slider to the left to catch less junk mail, move the slider to the right to catch more. The midpoint is the recommended setting.

Click this to set up a schedule for cleaning out your junk mail folder. When you use this option, Outlook Express permanently deletes all items from the Junk Mail folder at the specified time.

[Click this to modify a selected entry, including whether you want to block this sender from mail accounts, news accounts, or both.](#)

Click this to remove the selected sender or domain from your blocked senders list. Messages from this sender will no longer be blocked if removed.

Click one or more check boxes to set the criteria for your view. Your current view criteria (if any) are already selected.

Displays a description of the view criteria and its associated action. Click an underlined word to switch actions.

Type the name of your view here.

Click this to remove the currently selected view.

[Click this to apply a view to the currently selected folder. The view criteria will be applied to messages immediately.](#)


This area displays a description of your view. Click an underlined value to edit the view.

Specifies the character set standard to use for sending international messages.

Uses the English words **To**, **From** and **Subject** in your reply, even if the language of your reply is not English.

Displays all incoming messages using the default encoding regardless of the message headers. Select only if your messages are frequently unreadable because the language specified in their headers is inconsistent with the message bodies.

Displays the character set standard that will be used as the default encoding when the check box below is selected.

Help is available for each item in this group. Click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the specific item you want information about.

Lists the available columns that can be added to your message list.

Lists the columns currently displayed in your message list and the order in which they appear.

Moves the selected column from the **Available columns** list to the **Displayed columns** list.

Moves the selected column from the **Displayed columns** list to the **Available columns** list.

Moves the selected column up one level in the displayed columns.

Moves the selected column down one level in the displayed columns.

Restores the columns to the settings originally displayed when Outlook Express was first installed.

Lists the available news accounts. Click on a news server to show its corresponding newsgroups.

Allows you to enter text to find newsgroup names containing the text you typed.

Lists the newsgroups available on the selected server. You can narrow this list to newsgroups that contain a specific word in the name or description. In addition, you can click the tabs to display all of the newsgroups available on the selected server or just the subscribed or new newsgroups available.

Specifies whether to search newsgroup descriptions in addition to newsgroup names.

Opens the selected newsgroup.

Adds the selected newsgroup to the newsgroup list in the main window. An icon appears next to a subscribed newsgroup.

Removes the selected newsgroup from the newsgroup list in the main window.

Downloads the list of newsgroups from the selected news server.

Lists all the newsgroups on the selected server.

Lists only the newsgroups that you have subscribed to on the selected server.

Lists the newsgroups that have been added to the server since you last clicked **Reset List**.

Specifies whether to download the chosen number of messages when viewing a newsgroup or to download all messages in the newsgroup.

Specifies whether to display threads and all replies in the message list when you open a newsgroup. If you clear this check box, only the original message is displayed.

Specifies whether to mark a message as read after you have previewed it for the number of seconds indicated. If you clear this check box, you can still mark individual messages as read. For more information, look up "Marking messages as read or unread" in the Help Index.

Specifies whether to check your news server for new messages and send messages from your Outbox at the interval of minutes indicated. If you clear this check box, you can still check for new messages and send messages from your Outbox by clicking the **View** menu and then clicking **Refresh**.

Specifies whether to check for new newsgroups and download their names when you access a newsgroup server. If any are found, you can view the list of new newsgroups. If you clear this check box, you can still check for new newsgroups by clicking the **Tools** menu and then clicking **Newsgroups**.

Specifies whether to mark all messages as read when you exit a newsgroup. If you clear this check box, you can still mark individual messages as read. For more information, look up "Marking messages as read or unread" in the Help Index.

Specifies whether to display the body of a message in the preview pane whenever the header is selected in the message list. If you clear this check box, you can display the message body by selecting the header and then pressing the SPACEBAR.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you click a link on a Web page to go to a newsgroup or when you choose the **News** command in your Web browser. If you clear this check box, your browser will not use Outlook Express, and you must install another newsreader to view newsgroups from your browser.

Specifies whether you want to save copies of your newsgroup postings in the Posted Messages folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of a message by including yourself on the **Cc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to automatically select whole words when selecting text in the body of your message. If you clear this check box, you can select text one character at a time, and you can automatically select whole words by double-clicking a word and extending the selection word by word.

Specifies whether to include the text of the original message when you reply to a message. You can edit or cut any of the text. If you clear this check box, the body of your message contains only the text you type or paste.

Specifies whether to indent the beginning of each line of original text included in your reply, preceded by the character indicated. This distinguishes the text you type from the text in the original message. If you clear this check box, then the original text and the text you add appear the same.

Click this to select advanced settings for sending messages, specifying message format and line length, and sending messages immediately.

Specifies whether a copy of each message you send is saved in the Sent Items folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of an individual message by including yourself on the **To**, **Cc**, or **Bcc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you send e-mail replies to the author of a newsgroup message. If you clear this check box, your browser will not use Outlook Express, and you must install another e-mail program to send messages.

Click this to select advanced settings for sending messages, including specifying the character set, message format, and line length, and for sending messages immediately.

Specifies whether to use a different international character set from the default character set associated with your **Regional Settings** in Control Panel. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express uses the default character set.

Specifies that Outlook Express should encode your messages using MIME. This is the common format used by most Internet mail programs.

Specifies that Outlook Express should encode your messages using Uuencode. This format is commonly used to send binary files as attachments in messages posted to newsgroups.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should automatically wrap the text of outgoing messages so that each line is no more than the number of characters indicated. Some older Internet mail programs do not properly display messages with lines over 80 characters long. If you clear this check box, your message might appear to have extra line breaks to recipients whose mail or newsreading program can display only 80 characters per line.

It is suggested that you set your limit to about 72 characters. Most mail and newsreading programs indent quoted text in replies or forwards. Setting the limit to 72 allows the message to be quoted several times without causing extra line breaks.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should immediately forward to your mail server any messages you send. If you clear this check box, messages you send are placed in your Outbox and are not sent until you click the **Send/Recv** button on the toolbar.

Lists the available bit and binary formats for encoding your message.

Shows how your text appears in outgoing messages. Recipients whose servers or e-mail programs do not support text formatting see the text displayed as plain text.

Shows how text appears in messages you receive as unformatted text.

Shows how text appears in the original text included in your reply. Recipients whose servers or e-mail programs do not support text formatting see the text displayed as plain text.

Changes the font characteristics, such as font, font style, size, and color.

Specifies whether to show suggested spellings for misspelled words found during a spelling check. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express displays misspelled words but it does not suggest correct spellings. However, you can still type the correct spelling in the box.

Specifies that Outlook Express should check the spelling in messages you send and give you a chance to change, ignore, or correct any misspelled words.

Specifies that Outlook Express should check the spelling in the background so you can continue typing.

Specifies whether to ignore words in uppercase letters. This is useful when the text you are sending contains computer-programming code, which is often in uppercase letters and uses character combinations that do not form identifiable words. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks words in uppercase for misspelling.

Specifies whether to ignore words that contain numbers. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks words that contain numbers for misspelling.

Specifies whether to ignore misspelled words in the original text included in a reply or forward. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks the original text, in addition to your own, for misspelled words.

Specifies that no signature should be added to your messages.

Specifies that a text file should be used as a signature in your outgoing messages.

Specifies that you want to insert the contents of a text file as part of your signature. You can type the path and name of the file you want to use, or you can click **Browse** to locate the file.

Specifies whether to add your signature to all outgoing messages. If you clear this check box, outgoing messages do not contain your signature unless you add it to an individual message.

Specifies whether to add your signature to all outgoing messages except replies or forwards. If you clear this check box, outgoing messages do not contain your signature.

Displays a possible error, such as a misspelled word, a duplicate word, or incorrect capitalization. The word is highlighted in the message, so you can see it in the context in which it is used.

Proposes a replacement for the word displayed in the **Not in dictionary** box.

To replace the word displayed in the **Not in dictionary** box, you can:

- Accept the word listed in the **Change to** box by clicking **Change**.
- Type the correct word in the **Change to** box, and then click **Change**.
- Double-click a word in the **Suggestions** list.

To delete the word from the document, delete the text in the **Change to** box, and then click **Delete**, or, to delete all instances of the word in the document, click **Delete All**.

Lists suggested replacement words from your dictionary when you click **Suggest** or if you have selected the **Always suggest** check box on the **Spelling** tab.

Specifies the rules that Outlook Express uses to check spelling.

Reverses the most recent actions made during the spelling check. You can undo several changes by clicking **Undo Last** several times.

Leaves the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box unchanged.

Changes the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the word in the **Change to** text box.

If the **Change to** text box is empty, the button name changes to **Delete**. Click **Delete** to delete the selected word.

Adds the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the Outlook Express dictionary.

Closes this dialog box.

Leaves all instances of the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box unchanged in your message.

Changes all instances in this message of the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the word in the **Change to** box.

Displays a list of proposed alternatives for a misspelled word.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download messages from all newsgroups that you subscribe to, from all servers that contain newsgroups that you subscribe to.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download messages from only the subscribed newsgroups that you select, from all servers.

You can select individual subscribed newsgroups on one or more servers, or all subscribed newsgroups on individual servers.

Lists your newsgroup servers and the subscribed newsgroups on them, and provides a place to select servers or newsgroups to download.

To display the subscribed newsgroups on a server, click the plus sign (+) next to the server.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download only the headers for the newsgroups you select to download. You can later view those headers and select which messages you want to download.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download the headers and message bodies for the newsgroups you select to download.

Specifies whether to download any new messages that have been posted longer ago than the number of days you specify. If you clear this check box, all new messages will be downloaded.

Downloads messages now.
