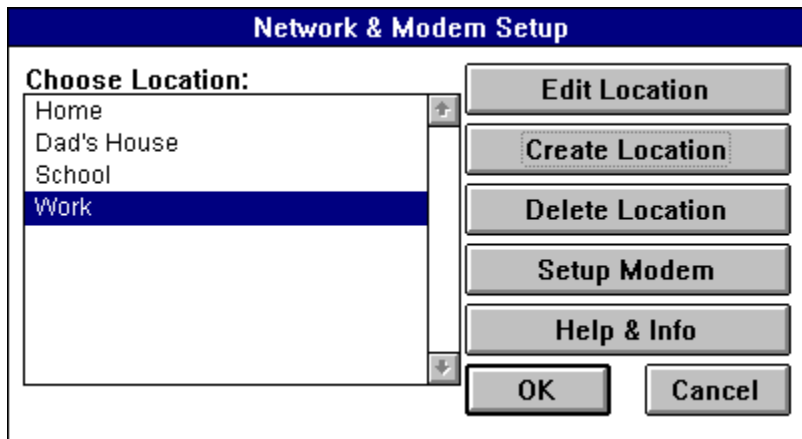

A few rules for modem strings

There is a file you can download from our BBS and run from your America Online directory which may resolve a common computer BIOS problem. Before you use this procedure, you should try to resolve the problem by making changes to your [Windows Control Panel](#).

To download the file, and run the program:

1. [Connect to the BBS](#).
2. Choose the option for America Online for Windows at the Main Menu.
3. Choose the option for Error Messages and Solutions from the America Online for Windows Help Files menu.
4. Choose the option for Open Failed Fix File (Error #1) from the WAOL Error Messages and Solutions menu. Information about the BIOSFIX.EXE file will be displayed.
5. Choose **C** for XMODEM-CRC as the download option if you are using [Windows Terminal](#) as your communications software. (Otherwise choose the appropriate protocol for your communications program.) The BBS will begin to send the file to your computer.

To complete the transfer, you must receive the file. If you are using Windows Terminal, continue with Step 6. (If you are using another communications package, receive the file as a binary file, place it in the C:\WAOLxx subdirectory, sign off the BBS, and continue with Step 14 below.)

6. Receive the file by clicking on Transfers from the menu bar, and selecting Receive Binary File. A Receive Binary File dialog box will open.
7. Double-click on the C:\ folder to move to the root directory.
8. Double-click on the WAOLxx folder (where xx is the release level of your America Online software) to move to the America Online subdirectory. (Use scroll bar, if necessary, to find the WAOLxx subdirectory.)
9. Type **BIOSFIX.EXE** in the File Name box.
10. Click on OK in the Receive Binary File dialog box. A box at the bottom of your screen provides information on the progress of the transfer. When the transfer is complete:
11. Press Enter. The WAOL Error Messages and Solutions menu will appear.
12. Sign off the BBS, by clicking on Phone, and selecting Hangup.
13. Exit Windows Terminal by double-clicking on the box in the upper left corner of the window.
14. Double-click on the File Manager icon in the Main Program Group.
15. Locate the BIOSFIX.EXE file in the C:\WAOLxx directory.
16. Double-click on the filename BIOSFIX.EXE to run the program.
17. Answer **Y** when asked if you want to extract the files. The program will create three new files in your America Online directory.

Using Debug to fix BIOS problem

This procedure is complicated and should only be used if you could not resolve your problem by making [changes to your Windows Control Panel](#), or downloading and using the [BIOSFIX.EXE from the BBS](#).

America Online cannot be responsible for any unpredictable results from using this procedure. If you do not feel that you can complete these steps alone, call the America Online support number, 1-800-827-3338. We will walk you through the procedure. If you decide to proceed on your own please read completely through the procedure at least once before beginning.

Important Note: Text that you should type appears in the instructions below in **boldface** type. Be sure what you type is **EXACTLY** as shown in the example, including spacing. Use the number zero, not the letter "oh."

First you must examine the addresses that the computer has assigned to the various Com Ports by using a utility called Debug. This will verify that there is a Com port shift problem.

1. Exit Windows.
2. Type **cd c:**
3. Press Enter to move to the root directory.
4. At the C:\ prompt type **debug**
5. Press Enter. A dash (-) will appear on the screen.
6. Type **d 40:0**
7. Press Enter. The first part of the first line should look something like:

```
0040:0000 F8 03 F8 02 E8 03 E8 02-
```

where: F8 03 is the Com 1 address.
F8 02 is the Com 2 address.
E8 03 is the Com 3 address.
E8 02 is the Com 4 address.

If there are no devices installed on Com 3 or 4, the first part of the first line will look like this:

```
0040:0000 F8 03 F8 02 00 00 00 00-
```

and you do not have a problem with your com ports.

If the first part of the first line looks like this:

```
0040:0000 F8 03 F8 02 E8 02 00 00-
```

the Com 4 address (E8 02) has moved to the Com 3 position.

6. Type **q**
7. Press Enter to exit debug.

YOU SHOULD NOT PROCEED if the first part of the first line didn't look like **any** of examples, or if you have all zeros in the Com 3 and Com 4 positions. Instead, call the America Online technical support number, 1-800-827-3338. Please tell the America Online representative that you used the instructions for fixing the BIOS problem with DEBUG.

To resolve the problem of the Com 4 address being in the Com 3 position:

1. Type **win**
2. Press Enter, to restart Windows.
3. Double-click on the Accessories Program Group from the Program Manager.
4. Double-click on the Notepad icon.
5. Type the following, using the number zero, not the letter "oh." Press Enter at the end of each line:

E 40:6
E8 02
Q

6. Click on File on the menu bar.
7. Select Save. The Save As dialog box will open.
8. Type **c:\fixcom.bat** in the File Name box.
9. Click on OK.
10. Click on File from the menu bar.
11. Select Open. The Open dialog box will appear.
12. Type **c:\autoexec.bat** in the File Name box.
13. Click on OK.
14. Position the cursor at the end of the file.
15. Create a new line at the end of the file by typing **debug < fixcom.bat > nul**
16. Click on File from the menu bar.
17. Select Save.
18. Click on File from the menu bar.
19. Select Exit to close the Notepad function.
20. Exit Windows.
21. Reboot your computer by pressing the <Ctrl>, <Alt>, and keys simultaneously.
22. Open America Online.
23. Click on Setup from the America Online sign on screen.
24. Click on Setup Modem.
25. Click on Com 4.
26. Click on OK to save the change.
27. Click on OK to return to the sign on screen.
28. Sign on.

Location Field

The location field enables you to save separate setups for different uses. For example, you could have a setup for use at home and another one for use at work. To change the current name of your location profile, use your mouse to highlight the text in the location field and enter a new location profile name. Select the save button to exit and save changes. Select the cancel button to exit without saving changes.

Phone Type

Most local phone exchanges support tone dialing. However, you can still connect to America Online using Pulse dialing. If your phone line does not support touch tone, select Pulse.

Phone Number Field

The phone number field allows you to enter two local access numbers to use for connecting to America Online.

For most members in the continental United States, a call to SprintNet or Tymnet will be a local call. Remember, phone charges are your responsibility, so be sure to pick either a local number or one that minimizes any phone costs. When you select your access phone number, be sure to make a note of the transmission speed (also known as baud rate) and the name of the network (SprintNet, Tymnet or Datapac).

America Online allows you to enter two phone numbers: one for your first try, another for your second try in case the first number is busy or not operating. If your first number can't connect, the America Online software automatically tries the second number. If only one number is available for your area, leave this box blank. The software will automatically try the first number again.

Be sure to select baud rates and networks that match the phone numbers you are using.

In some areas you may need to dial an area code, even for a local call. If you normally need to do this when you place voice calls, you will need to do it for America Online access as well.

Baud Rate Field

The baud rate field allows you to select the baud rate used for connecting to America Online. To change the baud rate, simply click on the down arrow to the right of the drop down box. Then select the baud rate you want to sign on with.

Be sure to [select baud rates and networks](#) that match the phone numbers you are using.

Network Field

The network field allows you to select the network carrier for the local access number you are using to connect to America Online. To change the network, simply click on the down arrow to the right of the drop down box. Then select the correct network for your local access number.

Be sure to [select baud rates and networks](#) that match the phone numbers you are using.

Reaching an Outside Line Field

Click on the check box if you must dial a prefix to reach an outside line. If you use a different prefix than 9 to reach an outside line, highlight the "9," in the box to the right and change it to the proper prefix. Be sure there is a comma after the prefix. The comma indicates a pause in the dialing sequence, and is necessary to allow enough time for the connection process to complete.

You must dial a "9" (or other prefix) to get an outside line on some telephone lines, particularly in hotels or businesses.

To configure your Setup to automatically dial a prefix before dialing the [local access number](#):

Call Waiting

We recommend that you temporarily disable Call Waiting when you are signed on to America Online. Otherwise, you will lose your America Online connection if you receive an incoming call. When you sign off and your modem hangs up the phone, Call Waiting is reactivated.

To temporarily disable Call Waiting:

1. Click on the Setup button from the America Online sign on screen.
2. Click on the Edit Location Button.
3. Click on the check box for "Use the following command to disable Call Waiting:"
4. Consult your local telephone book (in the front section, under Call Waiting) for the deactivation code in your area. Typical codes are *70 for touch-tone service and 1170 for rotary service.
5. Enter the correct deactivation code in the box to the right, if yours is different than the one provided.
6. Make sure there is a comma after the deactivation code. The comma indicates a pause in the dialing sequence, and is necessary to allow enough time for the disabling process to complete.
7. Click on Save to save the changes to Network Setup.
8. Click on OK on the Network and Modem Setup screen to return to the sign on screen.

Call Waiting Field

Click on the check box to temporarily disable the Call Waiting function on your telephone while you are online.

Save Button

The save button will save the changes made in the current window, and return you to the previous window.

Swap Numbers Button

The Swap Phone Numbers button will switch the order in which your modem dials the two local access numbers you have selected.

Cancel Button

The cancel button will not save any changes made in the current window and will return you to the previous window.

Modem in data state

Sometimes if the modem dials a number and is not able to connect, it will remain in a data state, and the America Online software cannot reinitialize the modem. In this case, the modem will need to be reset.

To reset an external modem:

1. Turn the modem off.
2. Wait a moment.
3. Turn it back on.

To reset an internal modem, reboot your computer.

To determine if your modem is defective, try the modem with a communication program other than America Online, such as the Terminal program that comes with Windows.

If your mouse is on Com 1 and your modem is on Com 3, or if your mouse is on Com 2 and your modem is on Com 4, you have a hardware interrupt, or IRQ, conflict. The easiest way to correct the IRQ conflict is to move your modem to Com Port 3, IRQ setting 5. See your computer and modem manuals for instructions on moving your modem to a different Com Port or changing its IRQ setting.

What is an IRQ Conflict?

Whenever a device attached to the computer has data to send to the computer, it sends a signal to the computer. This signal is called an Interrupt Request, or IRQ. Each device needs a unique IRQ number to distinguish it from other devices installed on the computer. Normally, both Com 1 and Com 3 generate an IRQ 4, and Com 2 and Com 4 generate an IRQ 3. This will not cause a problem as long as you don't use devices attached to Com 1 and Com 3 (or Com 2 and Com 4) simultaneously. Because the America Online software requires the use of a modem and mouse at the same time, you must make sure that these devices each have their own IRQ.

If you do not know the Com Ports your modem and mouse are installed on, you can use Microsoft Diagnostics, a utility that comes with Windows 3.1 or higher, to locate the Com Ports these devices are using on your system.

To use Microsoft Diagnostics:

1. Exit out of Windows.
2. Type **MSD** at the DOS prompt.
3. Press Enter.
4. Type **U** to find information about your Mouse.

The sixth line on this screen reads "Mouse IRQ".

- If the IRQ number is 3, your mouse is installed on Com Port 2
 - If the IRQ number is 4, your mouse is installed on Com Port 1
4. Press Enter to leave the Mouse information screen.
 5. Type **C** to find information about your Com Ports.
 6. Locate the Com Port column that contains YES for Data Set Ready (DSR) and Clear to Send (CTS). This is your modem Com Port.
 7. Press the F3 key to exit out of Microsoft Diagnostics.

Phone Line and Modem Setup

The phone line and modem may not be set up correctly.

If you have an external modem:

1. Make sure the modem's power cord is securely plugged in, and the modem is turned on. The modem's lights should be on.
2. Make sure the modem cable is securely attached to the modem and to the computer.

For all modems:

1. Make certain the phone line coming from the wall goes into the modem connection that reads LINE, JACK, or TO WALL.
2. Unplug the line going to the modem and connect it to a phone.
3. Listen for a dial tone. If there is no dial tone, the problem is with the line from the wall to the modem or the phone wiring in the building. [If there is a dial tone](#)

If you have a Meridian, Aspect, Rolm, or other digital phone system (normally used only in offices), your phone system probably is not compatible with your modem, since standard modems are analog.

Com port conflict

Some computers are shipped with an external Com 1 and Com 2 installed.

You may have added an internal modem that has the same address or IRQ as the external Com 1 or Com 2. In order to use your modem on the internal Com Port, you will have to disable the computer's external Com Port. On some computers these external Com ports can be disabled by changing the CMOS settings. Some computers use jumpers to disable the external Com ports. See your computer manual for instructions on how to disable the external Com ports.

Help & Info Button

The Help button accesses these help files.

OK Button

This button will save changes made to the current window, and return you to the previous window.

If your modem answers the phone after disconnecting from America Online, the modem is in an answer state. To correct the problem:

1. Click on Setup from the America Online sign on screen.

4. Add [ATSO=0](#) to the modem string (before the ^M) in the Setup Modem String box.
5. Click on OK as necessary to return to the sign on screen.

Modem Port

This field allows you to select the Com port that your modem is connected to. To change the Modem Port, click on the radio button next to the communications port that your modem is connected to.

Edit Commands Button

The Edit Commands button will allow you to customize the modem strings to be sent to your modem. In most cases, you will not need to modify the modem strings.

Edit Result Codes Button

Result Codes are codes or messages sent by the modem to communicate connectivity information, in response to commands from the computer.

A modem's result code set varies based on the type of modem. For example, a 1200 baud modem does not support the CONNECT 2400 result code of a 2400 baud modem. See your modem manual for more information on result codes.

In most cases, it will not be necessary to modify any of the result codes.

Edit Advanced Button

The Edit Advanced screen contains additional modem setup options that affect sign on. For most modems, you will not need to change this information.

Local Access Number

This is telephone number your modem dials during the process of connecting to America Online. In most cases this number will be a local call for you.

What is a node?

When your modem dials the local access number, the call is routed to a bank of modems operated by our network carriers, Sprintnet, Tymnet, or Datapac. The physical location of this bank of modems is called a local node.

Keyword

Keywords make it possible for you to "jump around" quickly on the service.

To use the Keyword function:

Click on GoTo from the menu bar, and select Keyword

FlashSessions

FlashSessions allow you to go online - immediately or at times you designate - to send mail that you have prepared offline or queued to Send Later, to retrieve mail that is waiting for you, or download software files that you have collected in your Download Manager.

All of these functions are managed from the FlashSession feature. You can access this feature whether you are on or offline by selecting "Flashsessions" from the Mail menu on your menu bar.

Why use FlashSessions?

You do not need to use FlashSessions in order to send and retrieve mail, or to download files from America Online. But here are a few ways FlashSessions can make your life easier:

- You can schedule a FlashSession to sign on and retrieve mail at night, or while you are at work, and then automatically sign off. In the morning, or when you return home from work, all of your mail will be waiting in your outbox for you to review and respond to offline.
- You can write all your e-mail offline, then activate your FlashSession immediately to sign on and send the mail all at once, or you can schedule the FlashSession to occur at a later time.
- You can use your FlashSessions to download files you have selected while online and stored in your Download Manager. If you have selected a couple of hours' worth of downloads in your Download Manager, you won't have to "babysit" a long download. You can schedule a FlashSession to sign on at a time you designate, download all those files, then automatically sign off.
- You can schedule your FlashSessions to occur while you sleep or are away from home so that the household phone line will not be monopolized inconveniently.

Setting Up Your FlashSession

Setting up a FlashSession is easy! Just select FlashSessions from the Mail menu.

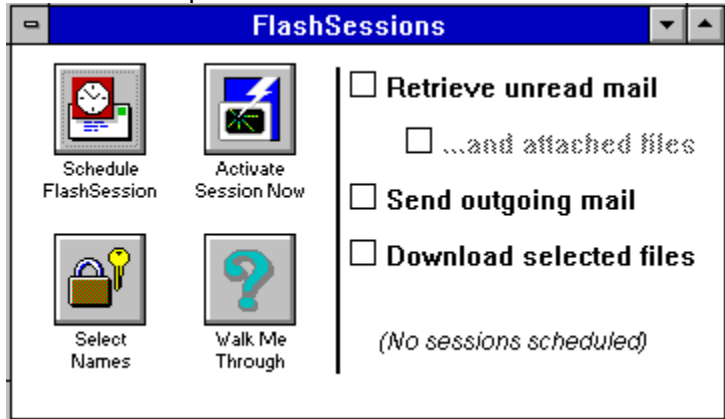
If you are new to FlashSessions, a helpful Walk Me Through function will guide your selections every step of the way and explain what each function is.

You can bypass the Walk Me Through process by clicking on [Expert Mode](#) from the FlashSessions Walk-Through window.

Retrieve Unread Mail

Any mail you have not read will be retrieved from the America Online host computer. You can read this mail by selecting [Read Incoming Mail](#) from the Mail menu.

... and attached files

If there are any files attached to the e-mail you have received, they will be downloaded as part of the FlashSession. Remember, these files could be quite large and may require a lot of time to download. If you don't elect to have these files downloaded automatically, they can still be retrieved later, on a selective basis.

Send Outgoing Mail

Any mail you have composed offline and selected to Send Later will be sent during the FlashSession.

You can check your outgoing mail, by selecting [Read Outgoing Mail](#) from the Mail menu.

Download Selected Files

Any files you have selected for downloading while you were online, and placed in the Download Manager, will be downloaded during the FlashSession.

You can check what files are currently in your Download Manager by selecting Download Manager from the File menu.

A few rules about FlashSessions

- FlashSessions features only become accessible after the America Online account registration process has taken place.
- Each screen name has its own incoming mailbox, outgoing mailbox, and Download Manager.
- "Guest" has no mailboxes and no Download Manager and cannot be used for FlashSessions.
- FlashSession settings (schedules, actions to be performed, etc.), and preferences apply to all screen names.
- Scheduled FlashSessions can only occur if the America Online application is open at the scheduled time. You will be reminded of this if you try to close the application while there are FlashSessions scheduled.
- The number of items that can be stored in a FlashMail mailbox is limited only by the amount of available disk space on your computer.
- The largest message that can be stored and displayed is 64K.

UN-Scheduling a FlashSession

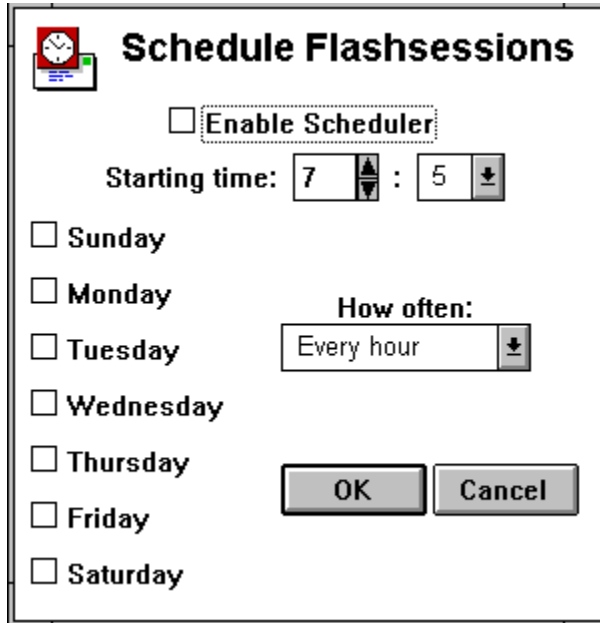
If you want to prevent your FlashSessions from running for a period of time, just click on the Schedule FlashSession icon on the FlashSession screen, and click on the Enable Scheduler check box, so that it is no longer selected.

Of course, you could also just make sure the America Online application is not open during the time your FlashSession is scheduled, as FlashSessions cannot run if the America Online application is not open.

Walk Me Through

The Walk Me Through function will guide you through the setup and scheduling of your FlashSession.

Sign off when finished

This option only appears if you are online when you select Activate FlashSessions Now. Click on the check box if you want to sign off of America Online when the FlashSession has completed.

Begin

A FlashSession will begin, and perform the selected tasks for the selected screen names

Set Session

Allows you to [change the tasks or screen names](#) selected for your FlashSession.

Days of the Week

Click on the check box to schedule a FlashSession on that day.

Enable Scheduler

Your FlashSessions will not run unless this check box is selected.

Starting Time

Click on the up or down arrows to change the time. Time is measured on a 24-hour clock, with 0 hours being 12:00 midnight.

The time for your FlashSession is determined by the internal clock on your computer. Be sure your internal clock is accurate.

In order to balance the load on the America Online host computer, FlashSessions are set up to run at two different times during the hour. You have the choice of either of these two times during the hour to have your FlashSession begin.

How Often

Click on the down arrow next to the box, and select how often you want your FlashSessions to run each day. Times are based on the Starting time you have selected.

Screen names

Click on the check box next to each screen name you want used during the FlashSession. When the FlashSession is activated, each screen name will be signed on in turn, and the tasks selected for the FlashSession will be performed for that screen name.

Passwords

You must enter a password for each screen name selected for your FlashSession.

The Compose Mail command is available while you are offline, or online.

If you are online when you compose your mail, you have the option to Send the mail now, or Send Later in a FlashSession.

If you are offline when you compose your mail:

Click on the Send Later icon to queue your mail for the next [FlashSession](#),

or,

To go online and Send your mail:

1. **Do Not** close the Compose Mail form.
2. Click on GoTo from the menu bar.
3. Select Set Up & Sign On.
4. Sign on to America Online.
5. Click on Window from the menu bar.
6. Select the Compose Mail window at the bottom of the menu.
7. Click on the Send icon.

Read New Mail

The Read New Mail command is only available while you are online. It accesses mail that has arrived since your last FlashSession ran.

Check Mail You've Read

The Check Mail You've Read command is only available while you are online. It accesses mail retrieved from your last FlashSession, as well as any other mail you have read.

Check Mail You've Sent

The Check Mail You've Sent command is only available while you are online. It accesses mail you have sent, either manually (with the Send icon on the Compose Mail form), or in a FlashSession.

Fax/Paper Mail

The Fax/Paper Mail item provides information about sending a letter by fax, or through the U.S. Postal Service using America Online.

Additional charges will apply for faxes or paper mail sent through America Online.

Mail Gateway

The Mail Gateway item provides information about sending mail to friends and associates on CompuServe, MCI Mail, AT&T Mail, Prodigy, and any other service or address on the Internet.

Read Incoming Mail

The Read Incoming Mail command is available offline and online. It accesses mail retrieved during your last FlashSession. (This mail can also be accessed while you are online, by selecting Check Mail You've Read.)

Read Outgoing Mail

The Read Outgoing Mail command is available offline and online. It accesses mail queued up (by clicking on the Send Later icon in the Compose Mail form) for the next FlashSession.

To send this mail immediately, select Activate FlashSession Now.

Edit Address Book

The Edit Address Book item accesses your personal address book.

Connecting via TCP/IP

If your computer network is attached to the Internet, and your network software includes WINSOCK.DLL Version 1.1 (or higher), you can connect to America Online via TCP/IP. To connect via TCP/IP select the TCP/IP (Winsock) entry from the Choose Modem list. For more information on using TCP/IP and your computer network to connect to America Online, please see the system administrator at your location.

TCP/IP

If your computer network is attached to the Internet, and your network software includes WINSOCK.DLL Version 1.1 (or higher), you can connect to America Online via TCP/IP. Post Office

The Post Office item is only available while you are online. The Post Office combines the functions of several of the other items on the Mail Menu, such as Check Mail You've Read, Check Mail You've Sent, Read New Mail, and Compose Mail.

You can also access the Post Office by clicking on the Post Office icon from the Main Menu screen.
