These pathnames represent files and directories that were create on your hard drive when Netscape Navigator was installed. You may wish to change some or all of these particular settings in your profile so that the paths point to other files or directories. For example, in a shared computing environment, you may want to save separate Bookmark or Address Book files (stored elsewhere), so that your address and bookmark entries are kept distinct from another user's. To change any of the default settings listed above, follow the instructions below.

NetWiz works by taking advantage of how Netscape Navigator stores and reads a users preference settings. In Windows 95 and WindowsNT, much of what was accomplished previously with .INI files is now done through the Windows registry. Netscape Navigator's use of the Windows registry to store its preferences (instead of a .INI file) makes it difficult to use Netscape Navigator as a multi-user News, Mail or WWW client, since each set of preferences entered by a user overwrites the previous user's settings.

NetWiz solves this problem by storing multiple user profiles for Netscape Navigator preferences in a .INI file. Once NetWiz is configured, using it to start a session using Netscape Navigator is as easy as 1-2-3: (1) The user opens NetWiz, (2) highlights his or her pre-defined profile, and (3) clicks a button to launch Netscape Navigator with the user's own News, Mail, and WWW settings automatically loaded!

In order to keep access to your e-mail account protected from unauthorized users, it is recommended that you not choose the "Remember Password" option if you are sharing a computer with other users. Selecting this option could enable the next user of Netscape Mail to access your e-mail account (intentionally or not). This is true whether you have saved a separate .INI file to store your own profiles or not (see [Setting the .INI File Location](#) for more information on this). By **not** choosing the "Remember Password" option, you can protect access to your e-mail account and prevent its unauthorized use.

Though not required for using NetWiz, you may want to store your personal NetWiz profiles in a separate NetWiz .INI file (see [Setting the .INI File Location](#)). This will protect your profile from being lost (altered, deleted, overwritten, etc.). Several scenarios are possible:

- You can store the NetWiz .INI file on a floppy disk. See also [Using NetWiz on a Single Computer](#) and [Managing Multiple Profiles for an Individual User](#).
