

Newly Proposed Bylaws for Amiga Atlanta

Drafted by AAi President John Lotshaw

SECTION 1: PURPOSE.

Amiga Atlanta, Inc. (AAi) is a non-profit user group for all users of the Commodore Amiga computer family. AAi's purpose is the exchange of ideas and information concerning Amiga computer hardware, software and peripherials, as well as the promotion of the Amiga computer platform.

SECTION 2: MEMBERSHIP.

There are no membership requirements in AAi. Anyone may join, whether or not they own or use Amiga computers. Membership is not required to attend meetings, however, it is to be encouraged. Member- ship dues are twenty-four dollars a year, payable to the Treasurer of AAi. Minimum membership benefits shall include full access to AAi's bulletin board system and monthly newsletter subscription.

SECTION 3: SCHEDULED MEETINGS.

There are to be two scheduled meetings held by AAi each month.

General Meeting. The General Meeting, is to be held on the last Saturday of each month, at the Dunwoody Branch of the Dekalb County Public Library, staring at 1:00pm. This meeting is to be open to the public.

Business Meeting. The Business Meeting is to be held on the second Sunday before the General Meeting. The starting time and place is at the discretion of the President. This meeting is open to all paid members of AAi.

Schedule Conflicts. Should any AAi meeting conflict with a holiday, such as Christmas or Thanksgiving, or conflict with a previously scheduled function at the library, the President shall reschedule the General Meeting to the next best available date. The change must be before the newsletter for the affected month is published and notice of this change must be made in the newsletter.

SECTION 4: ELECTED OFFICERS:

AAi shall have three elected officers, who shall serve one year terms that shall begin in January of each year.

President. The President of Amiga Atlanta's responsibilities shall include the organization of the two scheduled meetings, acting as liason between the club and developers and/or demonstrators at the scheduled meetings, appointment of non-elected officers and organization of committees to delegate tasks within AAi.

Vice-President. The Vice-President of Amiga Atlanta's responsibilities shall include performing the President's duties in the event that the President is unable to perform them, as well as assisting the President with the execution of the President's duties. This may include, but is not limited to, organizing and running AAi's Special Interest Group Program.

.

Secretary/Treasurer. The Secretary/Treasurer of Amiga Atlanta's responsibilities shall include financial recordkeeping, as well as the transaction of monies within the club. The Secretary/Treasurer is also responsible for maintaining the membership list and keeping it current.

SECTION 5: NON-ELECTED OFFICERS:

AAi shall have several non-elected officers, who shall serve one year terms that shall begin in January of each year.

Newsletter Editor. The Newsletter Editor is responsible for gathering, producing, copying and distributing a monthly newsletter devoted to the Amiga.

BBS Sysop. The BBS Sysop is responsible for providing a site for AAi's bulletin board system. The Sysop is responsible for maintaining the BBS, as well as ensuring the obligations of the BBS (such as telephone bills) are met with AAi funds.

Public Domain Librarian. .The Public Domain Librarian is responsible for maintaining AAi's public domain disk library, as well as making it available to club members. At the PD Librarian's discretion, the Librarian may also be responsible for producing a monthly collection of public domain and shareware software to be used an AAi fund raising activity.

Advertising Manager. The Advertising Manager is responsible for selling and invoicing of newsletter ads.

Equipment Manager. The Equipment Manager is responsible for storing and maintaining all club owned electronic equipment that may be used at AAi functions. In order to provide an atmosphere of profession- alism at AAi functions, the Equipment Manager will also be responsible for ensuring that any special equipment needed for any AAi function is properly set up and operating before the time that it is needed.

Publicity Manager. .The Publicity Manager is responsible for generating publicity for AAi and the Amiga computer in the local media. This may include, but is not restricted to, announcements of AAi meetings and functions in local media and arranging press releases and interviews concerning AAi or the Amiga.

SECTION 6: ELECTION AND SUCCESSION OF OFFICERS.

Candidates for officers will be nominated at the November General Meeting before the upcoming term. At the following December Meeting. elections will be held for the three elected positions. A simple majority is required to declare a winner. If no candidate receives a simple majority, then a run-off will be immediately held between the candidate with the most votes and the candidate with the next highest vote count.

After elections are held, the President shall produce a list of nominees for the non-elected positions, which will be presented to those present at the January Business Meeting. A simple majority of those present are required to approve the list of non-elected officers.

Should the President be unable to complete the full term, the Vice-President will become President immediately upon notification. The new President will then serve out the remaining time of the term.

If a vacancy arrives in either the Vice-President or Secretary/Treasurer position, an election will be held at the next General Meeting to select a new officer to fill the post for the remainder of the term.

Vacancies in any of the non-elected positions will be filled by a person appointed by the President to serve the remainder of the term.

SECTION 7: SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS (SIGs).

AAi shall run a program of special interest groups, which will be dedicated to specific topics within the realm of Amiga computing. If an AAi member wishes to run a SIG, notification of this by the member to the President is requested. At the President's discretion, offical AAi sanctioning to the proposed SIG may then be given.

With offical sanctioning, time can then be allocated at the General Meeting for the SIG to meet. At the SIG Leader's discretion, the SIG may also be held outside of the General Meeting, at a time and place of the SIG Leader's choosing.

SECTION 8: CLUB AFFILIATION.

If a user's group in another community wishes to become an Amiga Atlanta Affiliated User's Group, notification of this fact must be made by the other organization at a Business Meeting. Members present at the Business Meeting approve a resolution endorsing the affiliation by a two-thirds majority.

Membership dues for an affiliated club must be at least \$18 a year. This will provide members of the affiliated club with membership privileges that are identical those AAi

What's New On Aminet

Yep, there's more new software out there in internet land this month and some of it is pretty nifty (IMHO). My picks this month include everything from networking software to a simple recipe program, which appears just in time to keep track of those meals for the upcoming holiday season.

My personal pick of the month is SatTrack 3.0, which I used recently to track the orbit of the Space Shuttle Columbia. STS-58 was a record breaking mission, primarily in duration, just over 14 days in orbit, making it the fourth longest mission in US Spaceflight history only behind the three Skylab missions of the 70's. Also on board Columbia for this flight was the Shuttle Amateur Radio Experiment or SAREX as it is known. Three of the crew members are licenced Amateur radio operators (or HAM's). HAM's and school children all over the world were able to talk directly to the crew of Columbia as it orbited the earth some 154 miles above. I used SatTrack 3.0 to plot the shuttle's path overhead and determine when I could listen in to the astronauts via my scanner radio. It worked perfectly, I could listen in on SAREX every time that SatTrack said I could. I suppose it's also useful for tracking spy satellites that are taking pictures of you and your Amiga, or some old space junk that you might be worried about falling on you...<GRIN>.

DESCRIPTION

AmiTCP/IP is the first publicly available TCP/IP protocol stack for the SANA-II interface. AmiTCP/IP provides an application level socket interface to the Internet protocols as an Amiga shared library.

The Internet protocol suite, commonly known as TCP/IP, consists of user level protocols TCP and UDP which use IP as the network level protocol. There is a wide variety of different network applications and services using TCP/IP protocols. The BSD compatible socket interface to Internet protocols makes it possible to port existing applications with minor modifications.

AmiTCP/IP connects to the network via SANA-II compatible device drivers. SANA-II is a hardware and protocol independent network adapter interface specification published by Commodore. Several network adapter manufactures have made available SANA-II device drivers for their hardware. Currently there are SANA-II drivers available at least for Ethernet, Arcnet and serial line interfaces, so you can connect to Internet with Ethernet LAN, or via modem line with Serial line IP (SLIP) optionally with compressed headers (CSLIP).

A typical application is to use (C)SLIP to connect to the Internet and have multiple connections simultaneously. You can read your e-mail andnews, transfer files and have multiple terminal sessions at the same time over one modem line.

FEATURES

- 2. BSD-compatible socket interface as a Amiga shared library.
- 3. ARexx port for configuration and statistics.
- 4. Over 200 pages of documentation including:

- Programmer's manual based on the BSD IPC manual. This is a fairly complete tutorial for developing powerful client / server applications
- Internal description of the implementation Utility and API function reference guide
- in AutoDoc form.

- 6. Based on the BSD Net/2 release.
- 7. Full source code included.

While all Internet services and applications (telnet, ftp, news, mail) are possible with AmiTCP/IP, many applications are still under development by us and others. Current release of the AmiTCP/IP contains following applications:

- * Telnet standard program to log on other systems **
- * Ftp standard program to transfer files between systems **
- * Finger prints information about local and remote users
- * Is Directory lister with user and group information
- * Napsaterm a VT100 terminal emulator using remote login protocol
- * NcFTP an alternative interface to FTP protocol %%
- * NetFS a Amiga specific network filesystem
- * TCP networking support for GNU Emacs. With TCP you can use any elisp-based networking applications (Gnus, Gopher, Irchat etc.)
- * FingerD a Finger daemon which prints user information or a banner file
- QWriter an application to test and benchmark network

Following network utilities are also available:

- * arp tool to handle ARP hardware address translation tables
- * ifconfig tool to control network interface parameters
- inetd Internet super server, which starts other services when needed and provides some simple services by itself
- * letnet a simple filter for connecting to TCP based services. Suitable for scripts and testing
- * netstat a ARexx script to get statistical information from networking
- * ping utility to test network connectivity
- * route tool to display and manipulate routing tables
- * online/offline utilities to control SANA-II device drivers

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

AmiTCP/IP can be run from floppy and with one megabyte of memory, but as usual, a hard disk and more memory makes your life easier.

Amiga OS release 2.04 or newer is required.

SANA-II device driver is needed for your network adapter. A test device driver, agnet.device, is included with sources. Also the freely distributable Commodore A2060 (Arcnet), A2065 (Ethernet), SLIP and CSLIP drivers are included. The rhslip.device and rhcslip.device are derived from Commodore drivers but contain bug fixes made by Olaf Seibert.

LHA or lx utility is required to unarchive distribution archives.

Most of the source files has been compiled with GNU C 2.3 and SAS C 6.3. Some utilities and libraries are compiled only with SAS C 6.3. However, only the executable files compiled with SAS C are tested. Also, the DICE C support is untested.

Dave Haynie Interview

Transcript from the Portal On-Line Conference

This is an edited transcript of a special *live* chat conference, held on the *Portal System in the Amiga Zone chat area, on the evening of November 7, 1993. This transcript is Copyright 1993, The Amiga Zone, and may be freely distributed provided no further editing of any kind is performed on it. User Groups may reprint this transcript in their newsletters and it may be posted on Bulletin Boards, Usenet, and FTP sites.

Our special guest speaker was Mr. Dave "Hazy" Haynie, of Commodore West Chester. The conference took the form of a question & answer session with Dave.

I understand that with the new 3.1 ROMS I will be able to use many AGA programs in 256 colors with Picasso's Retargetable Graphics. How do I get this ROMS and can you confirm the above. Also will they allow me to finally upgrade my CDTV so I can run 2.0 programs and Operating System?

hazy: I don't know the exact status of 3.1. Last I heard, it was, like 2.04 before it, planned as an upgrade for all systems. This would be for A3000, A500/A2000, and probably the new ones, since it is a different ROM. The CD32 has what's essentially a per-title patch library to handle CDTV titles. I don't know if they plan this sort of upgrade for CDTV or not.

Kerry - Stratford: Sorry I use the CDTV for my kids as a computer and you can't with the CD-32.

hazy: Like I said, I don't know of the CDTV plans.

ScottJ: Dave, has CBM decided which RISC chip to

use in future Amigas? If they haven't which one would you prefer to see used, PowerPC, Alpha, MIPS, or HP/PA?

hazy: We have looked at all of the RISC chips. No decision has been publicly announced, however. Keep in mind that chances are, the chip we pick will need to be serviceable at all levels of computing, from our high enough down through the games level. However, I don't imagine we would be going with a chip not on the list you have given, if that's enough of a clue for you (it's all you're gonna get).

ScottJ: I hope its not SPARC, that chip's a dog. Thanks, Dave.

hazy: The next generation high-end systems will use a CPÚ independent local bus, so the RISC decision isn't particularly critical at this point.

Timeus: Will there be a display enhancer for the A4000 similar to the A2000's? When?

hazy: The planned display enhancer for the A4000 has been tabled at present. That means that no one is currently working on it, not that they never will. I believe the design was offered to 3rd parties, though I don't know if any of them picked it up or not. I'm not certain it's much advantage over some of the existing 3rd party display cards.

soft-logik: Dave, do you have any guess as to who bought a lot of Commodore stock last Thursday?

hazy: Rumors abound. The rumor mill has been guite active lately, with talk of some financial improvements and some possible takeovers. However, I don't know what's going on.


soft-logik: Well, good luck to va.
