# WebColour

#### 1.1 main

Please note that the source code to version 1.0 of WebColour is available on Aminet (webcoour\_src.lha). I may get around to releasing the code for this version sometime too.

### 1.2 Requirements

WebColour requires MUI to be installed on your system (which in turn means something like hard disk, 2MB RAM, OS3.0+ or something like that).

### 1.3 Installation

WebColour requires no special installation, and may be run from any location. MUI must be obtained separately - please see their documentation for details on how to install them.

### 1.4 Instructions

WebColour is a program that creates text for HTML with a changing colour, eg, you could have a heading with the left letter as red, the right letter as blue, and it would smoothly fade in between. Of course, every individual letter is a constant colour throughout that letter, but looking at the text as a whole, it appears as if the colour changes smoothly throughout.

An example of the text produced (for the word 'Title') is as follows:

<FONT COLOR=#FF0000>T</FONT> <FONT COLOR=#C0003F>i</FONT>

<FONT COLOR=#80007F>t</FONT>

<FONT COLOR=#4000BF>1</FONT>

<FONT COLOR=#0000FF>e</FONT>

To use, simply type the text into the text gadget labelled 'Text:' (says 'Edit Me' by default), then set the start colour (ie, first/left letter), and the end colour with the red/green/blue sliders, and then select go. The output is printed in a console output window.

To use, you should highlight the text with the most, then copy it to the clipboard by pressing the 'Right Amiga' and 'c' keys together. You can then paste into whichever word processor you wish to use ('Right Amiga' and 'v' is the standard shortcut).

As a default, the effect is set to 'fade', and fades from the start to the end colour. You can also switch to 'bounce' (use the cycle gadget) which fades from start to end (in the middle), and then back to start again.

Also, you can output to a file - a file requester will appear when you click on go.

Note that any spaces in the text are ignored for the purposes of colour changes (but the spaces still appear in the output, of course).

As a default, line breaks are inserted after every word (ie, at each space), but if you prefer, you can choose to have them inserted after every letter. This is not recommended, as Web browsers will view line breaks as spaces - this option is provided if you have a long string of letters without spaces, and you want to keep the line length down.

You will see that the current start and end colours appear in the two boxes at the top, but this will not work if there are not enough free colours on the screen. You can swap the start/end colours by clicking on the appropriate button.
