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1.2 chess

If you read About the Author you will see that I Play Correspondence Chess. With this in mind I have created a few useful documents to help keep records of games played..

All the Chess documents are on a Normal A4 Sheet, and there should not be any problems printing any of them.

You will find I have included all of the Chess pieces in a ILBM Brush format, for example BR_WhiteKing.IFF. To use them just load them into a Picture Frame for a better printout

To create the Chess Boards I have Grouped together individual lines to make up an 8×8 Board.

If you need only to print out one board it helps to use the Horizontal & Vertical rulers to get it Square.

1.3 forms

A couple of standard sponsorship forms to play around with in here. I've been asked for quiet a few of these forms from various local Clubs, Pub's and Groups. Once again easy to modify and very self explanatory.

I've also included an invoice sheet that's been asked for. this can be easily altered for any other company or small business.

1.4 lottery

Two forms in here both self exploratory. The first is a Bonus-Ball or First Ball out grid. You see these in Pubs, Clubs, & Shops. I print one out and Photocopy them onto coloured A4 Sheets of paper. These are always in demand.

The second is a syndicate form that you can alter for your own group or club, and gives a basic reference for each member that signs it.

You must remember that it's not a legal! document though.

1.5 business

One of the many items I get asked for are business cards and Birthday Invitations. You will find a group of Four Standard Birthday Invitations and five of the most popular Cards that I think you will see.

Creating any type of Business Cards is down to you or the company that want's them, but I find that with many of the cards that I create it's a very hit and miss affair, as people have very different views

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on what they want. As when I ask if a the person had a Logo he wanted to be placed on his cards he said 'no but I would like two very thin lines along the bottom of the card but not touching any of the edges of it.' Far be it for me to say that I thought it looked odd, but he was over the moon with them.

So I think what I'm trying to say is is to just experiment all you can when creating them. It does help to try and collect other people Cards to gain more ideas for your own.

You will also find in this draw some standard sized Post Card templates grate for all those AF Competitions!.

Hints & Tips.

 $\label{text-degree} $$\operatorname{Printing.}$ When printing any type of Business Cards or $$\leftarrow$ Invitations$

try and leave a two millimetre gap between each one, this depends on how you cut them out, after you've printed or photocopied them to card, but I've found that a two millimetre gap leaves just enough room for my Hobby cutter to get an equal edge around each Card/Invite.

\textdegree{} Items to a

A4 Sheet. With the Birthday invites or the post Card sized Cards I'm only able tom get four to an A4 Landscaped sheet. With the Business Cards though I find it's possible to get ten to each A4 sheet.

\textdegree{} Memory. Although most of my Documents are able to be used if you
 only have 4meg you will find that it's far better and
 easier if you have 8meg or more especially with any Booklets
 that you have in mind that would use a lot of Clip-Art or
 Graphics.

1.7 clockface

Yes! now here's an idea that I've come up with were everyone want's one.

A DIY Clock.

'I should give myself a Blue Peter Badge for this one'.

\textdegree{}Step One.

Nothing could be more simpler than to just cut-out your favourite bit's of clip Art using your favoured Art package e.g. PPaint or DPaint.

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'I have chosen a few of the Tiny Toons characters from the PD. Tiny Toons disk,' placed them around the Clock face Numbers and One for the Centre picture then printed it out onto a plain sheet of A4 paper.

\textdegree{}Step Two.

Photocopy the Clock Face onto another piece of A4 Card about 160/170~gsm. and fix/glue it to a further piece of stiffer Cardboard or Hardboard for a more permanent hard backing.

Drill or pierce are a hole through the small centre circle of the clock face all the way through the cardboard or hardboard for the clock mechanism and hands to be fitted.

\textdegree{}Step Three.

The Clock mechanisms can be purchased from a local Hobbies or model shop and start from a price range anything from about £4-£5 up to £10 or £14 pound or more, and are exceedingly easy to fit.

'I have found that if you can get the sticky double sided foam strips from B&Q or HomeBase that's used to stick glass mirrors up' It will enable you to also get the correct thickness for the actual Clock mechanism to fit.

Hints & Tips.

\textdegree{} Clock Face. Let your imagination run wild, with the amount of
 endless Graphics and free PD. Clip-Art Black & White
 also Colour, if you can photocopy it onto a hard enough
 back ground, you can create endless amount of Clock Faces

Try different types of Fonts for your Numbers. e.g. Roman Numerals, or just leave them out all together and replace them with Dot's, Dashes, or just Pictures. Get some luminous tape from B&Q or your local Cycle shop.

Other than graphics you could write your favourite poem, verse, or just a message to a special person or couple as a gift.

Try framing it with a picture frame. Look-out for old Pictures and frames at car boot sales

\textdegree{} The Cost. This depends on many factors, But for just under \leftarrow £7 I

 $$\operatorname{don'} t$$ think you could get one cheaper and have as much fun in creating your own.

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I found an old kitchen clock that I salvaged the mechanism from.
 Printed a clock face. Photocopied it down at my local library onto a
 sheet of 170gsm card that I brought from WH Smiths and all for under £3
