1.3 Introduction

BlockEd is a device level disk partition block editor.

It should allow you to visually edit any 512 byte block structured virtual or physical disk partition i.e. it should work with any device that allows you to do any random CMD_READ/CMD_WRITE of 512 bytes at multiples of 512 byte Offsets - this includes devices like PC MFM floppy disk devices as well.

BlockEd takes no specific notice of the FileSystem running on the device.

I actually first wrote this program because I didn't like any of the similar programs around at the time. Hopefully you too will find it useful.

Currently it can only be run from the CLI because it needs a parameter to specify the device level name of the partition e.g. DF0: (and it doesn't work with WorkBench specified parameters with a Shift click)

1.4 Starting BlockEd

You can run BlockEd on any disk (or partition) simply by typing:

```
BlockEd disk:
```

However, disk must be the Dos internal name for the partition
e.g. DF0: may be valid but Workbench1.3: is not if that is DF0:'s name.

BlockEd has a number of options available at runtime. The options do not work in the standard way as yet (it's just a library function - that can and should be changed in the future) You specify options by typing at least the unique letters for that option (shown in uppercase further down) after a '/' and if it is a value option using an '=' followed by the value e.g. to run blocked with a different font you would type any of the following:

```
blocked /Fname=other.font/fsIZE=7 hd0:
blocked /f=other.font hd0:
blocked /f=other.font /fs=7 hd0:
```

This does bring about the following problem (feature) you cannot do:

```
blocked /d0: (if the device name starts with a '/')
```

The following is the output if you specify an invalid command line:

Def is the default value

Min & Max are the minimum and maximum for numbers

Numbers can be entered in Hex, (with a leading '0x'), Octal
(with a leading '0') or Decimal

The options are as follows:

QUIET

if set true don't display startup message at runtime.
/QUIET or /!QUIET

DATAPEN

SELECTPEN

BACKPEN

OTHERPEN

the gfx pens to use to draw the screen e.g. /DATAPEN=1

C3

the 12 bit colours to use for the Hires-Interlace Screen
e.g. /C2=9

FNAME

font to use (use the full name.font) e.g. /FNAME=topaz.font

FSIZE

font size to use. Under 3.0 (I don't know much about 2.0)
you can rescale any font to any size you like - it's built in to
the diskfont library. e.g. /FSIZE=8

NULLCHAR

character to use when the current character would probably display
nothing (see the source for how it works this out) e.g. /NULLCHAR=.

HEX

mode to start the program up in. /HEX or /!HEX

LEFTJUST

initial justification for Decimal numbers. /LEFTJUST or /!LEFTJUST

BYTEMOVE

initial display mode and movement - either a byte at a time or a
long at a time. /BYTEMOVE or /!BYTEMOVE

INHIBIT

specifies if the partition should be inhibited while using blocked
i.e. unavailable to any other process. /INHIBIT or /!INHIBIT

1.5 BlockEd Commands

Once the screen comes up (assuming enough memory, fonts found, libraries found and device found etc.) the program will attempt to read and display the Root Block according to the standard File System. This should of course work with any File System, it just may not be the 'Root Block'. If it could not read the block then it will display an error and a zeroed block. The window border normally contains a Copyright message and a version number etc. which gets written over by such error messages. To restore the border use the Restore menu item.

All the commands (except to change the byte offset in the block) are shown on the screen with a highlighted character in their name.

To move the highlighted cursor around use the arrow keys. If you press the SHIFT key with the arrow keys, it will jump to the top, bottom, left or right. If you use the ALT key with the left/right arrow key, it will jump to the previous/next non-zero Byte or Long (or not move if all zero)

To select a different block by value either click in the Offset

gadget or press the 'O' key and then type in the new block offset into the gadget and press return. Without pressing return, what you typed will be ignored.

The first seven commands on the top right of the screen are values calculated from the current block or partition. Press the key matching the highlighted letter to go to the block specified next to its name. Some of the names have no meaning or a different meaning depending on the type of block you are looking at. If the block value is zero, pressing the key will have no effect. If it is invalid, an error message will be displayed.

The Checksum command displays next to it the current value of the checksum long-word in the current block. Pressing the 'C' key will re-calculate the value for the checksum and change the memory copy of the block. You will have to Update the block to actually save this change to disk. N.B. this assumes that the checksum is at long word 5 (which is not correct on a bitmap block - and FFS datablocks do NOT have a checksum - so don't use it on them either)

The next four commands (+/= Advance One, -/_ Retreat One, Goto Current & Zero Goto) are to move around the disk. The first two allow you to step forward and backward through the disk by pressing the plus and minus keys (with or without a shift) The Zero Goto command takes you to block Zero. The Goto Current command takes you to the block number specified under the highlighted cursor: If zero, it is ignored, if invalid you will get an error message in the window border.

ALT-ReRead lets you re-read the current block even if it hasn't changed. (You must also hold down either ALT key)

ALT-Update lets you save any changes you have made back to the disk block. (You must also hold down either ALT key) N.B. if you do not do this before moving to any other block, any changes you have made will be lost!

The Ascii/Number Edit command lets you edit the values in the block directly depending upon the 'Byte/Long Move' mode. If you are in Byte Move mode an '*' will appear next to the 'Ascii/Number Edit' command and all following keys you type will be typed into the block data at the highlighted cursor and advance the cursor until you press the 'ESC' key (and the '*' will disappear) If you are in Long Move mode a gadget will appear on top of the highlighted long and let you edit it till you press return. If what you entered was valid (or the value was already zero), the cursor will advance. You must press 'A' again to edit the next value.

The Spread Current command fills the entire block with the current highlighted Byte or Long.

Byte/Long Move switches back and forth between Byte and Long mode. You can tell what mode you are currently in by looking at the Ascii section of the display. If only one byte is highlighted, you are in Byte mode. If four bytes are highlighted, you are in Long mode.

Mode Hex/Dec switches the display between Hex and Decimal.

Justify Left/Right switches the justification in Decimal mode.

Directory/Filename lets you type in a string to hash to the

appropriate Long offset in the current block (assuming it was a Directory block) If you do not press return the value will be ignored (but not lost) You can just press return to go to the value matching the string already typed in the gadget. You can of course activate the gadget by just clicking on it.

The section above the Directory/Filename command just displays what DOS thinks the device is (the driver name has had ".device" removed from the end if it was there)

1.6 Problems

I have not tried this program on many different device types. Below is the list which I have tried (and all have worked)

- Standard 880K low density drives
- Standard 720K PC disks with MFM device drivers
- A Meager Mega Ram Card with WD1002-05 and hard disks (on A1000)
- A590 SCSI hard-disk devices (on A1000)
- A1200 internal IDE device

I know you cannot use this program on the RAM: device or other same devices.

I have been using this program for a few years now so I would be very suprised if anyone found any nasty bugs in it, so it should be pretty reliable. (Of course on the above devices only I can vouch for)

If you attempt to update a device that is write protected, and you do not deprotect it and allow it to be written, you must diskchange the disk before you will be able to read other areas of the disk that are not buffered in memory by the File System (even if you use another program) This happens (in two slightly different ways) under both 1.3 and 3.0

I probably need to add some sort of 'Cancel Update' Menu option to get around this problem.

1.7 Things To Do

Any suggestions would be very welcome.

I have tried to keep the program 1.3 compatible (especially since my main hard-disk is actually connected to an A1000) so don't suggest anything that is above 1.3 that cannot be optional (e.g. screen mode requester could be optionally available on the appropriate machines)

Obviously a few things need to be done to make the program a bit more user-friendly

The way you use the options should be standardised (extended to allow that)

A screen-mode requester would also be useful.

Also need to tidy up and release a whole collection of disk utilities I have written (in times of dire need and have used to solve the problems.)
Look out for a few more, hopefully in the near future.

I have absolutely no idea what would be necessary to make this program work with disk blocks that were not 512 bytes in size (assuming that a full Root/Directory/FileHeader/etc. block is not just 512 bytes on this type of device spread over multiple blocks if <512 bytes or part of a block if >512)
