Introduction

The Multimedia Changer (MC) allows you to keep up to 100 MIDI or WAVE songs per file in an easy-to-use "CD-Changer" format. You can organize each file in up to ten collections of up to ten songs. You can give each song and collection your own title (no more filenames). You can also use multiple files for unlimited numbers of songs.

The real fun starts when you select one or more songs and have them continuously played in sequential or random order. Other options make it easy to run MC in the background while you work (or play) with other Windows applications.

It's like having your own jukebox or a 10-disc CD-Changer on your computer!

Quick Start

Included is a sample collection of a few MIDI and WAVE files. Simply press the **PLAY** button at the bottom of the screen. Kick back and listen to some tunes while you read more of this section.

Notice that the **MC** plays only the selected songs (those highlighted in **green**). Songs may appear in any one of these ways:

6 (Empty)

Untitled or invalid file name

7 My Song

Titled with a valid file name, but not selected to play

8 Your Song

Selected, but already played in the current pass

9 Our Song

Selected to play

You can select or unselect any song (even while music is playing) by clicking once with the left mouse button. You cannot, however, change the current song in this fashion -- you must press the **SKIP** or **STOP** buttons first.

To change a song's information, double-click the song and fill-in the dialog with your own title and browse for the filename (if the song was "(Empty)", a single click works).

Flip through the scroll bar at the top-right of the window to see the other collections. Double-click the title to change it (if the title is "(Untitled)", a single click works).

That should be enough to get going. Check out other help topics as you need them; but don't be afraid to plow through the program unaided -- the interface is simple, and besides -- **MC** isn't exactly a "mission-critical" application. **Enjoy!**

Adding New Tracks

This is simple -- just click on any song labeled "(Empty)". A dialog will appear that allows you to enter a title and filename ... super-simple. You can use the Browse button to more easily find a file. When you're done, click **OK**. Viola! your new song is added.

Play Options



Options

In Order

Tells **MC** to play the selected songs in sequential order. When you click **PLAY**, **MC** starts with the first song of the first collection and proceeds in order until the last selected song.

Random

Tells **MC** to play the selected songs in random order. This feature is similar to "shuffle" play modes on newer CD players. In this mode, **MC** picks the next song from the list of selected and unplayed songs.

Track

Tells **MC** that you are only going to play a single song. In this mode, clicking a song will highlight it and the other songs will dim (but remain selected). When you press **PLAY**, the song you clicked will be played only.

Loop

When this option is checked, all selected songs will be played over-and-over again. This is great for multiple songs, but can get old with just one song!

Controls

PLAY

Play the selected songs in the fashion defined by the options above. After clicked, the options listed above (except for **Loop**) will disappear and be replaced by status information for the entire time songs are playing.

SKIP

Skip the currently-playing track and proceed to the next as defined by the options above.

STOP

Stops all playing. The play options listed above will re-appear.

Adding Collections

This is easy -- just flip through the scroll bar at the top-right of the window. Find a collection titled "*(Untitled)*" and click on the title itself. A small dialog will ask you for a collection title. Type one in and click **OK**. Poof! your new title will appear.

If at any time you want to change a collection title, just double-click the title and change the text in the dialog that will appear. Simple!

Changing Tracks

Just double-click on a song and you will see a dialog that allows you to specify a title and filename for the song. You can use the **B**rowse button to find a song filename. If you want to clear-out the song information, click the **C**lear button.

When you're done, click **OK**. The new information will appear; and if the song is valid, **MC** will automatically select it for you.

Reviewer Information

Multimedia Changer (MC) is a small program for Windows 3.1 and requires a sound card or MIDI device that works with Windows Multimedia features (most sound cards do). The program allows you to easily create collections of MIDI (music) or WAVE (sampled) files in an easy and fun "CD-Changer" format.

Distinguishing features include:

- Keep up to ten collections of up to 10 songs per file; unlimited number of files
- Make your own titles for songs and collections (no more filenames)
- Select and play single or multiple songs in sequential or random (shuffled) order
- Skip tracks during play
- Auto-repeat songs for continuous music
- Transparent "auto-memory" feature remembers the selected songs for each file and pulls up the last file automatically
- Auto-play option to start playing the last selected songs of the last file used
- Auto-minimize option hides the MC during play

The real fun starts when you select one or more songs and have them continuously played in sequential or random order. MC makes it easy to play music in the background while you work (or play) with other Windows applications.

It's like having your own jukebox or a 10-disc CD-Changer on your computer!

Troubleshooting

This section contains some commonly-asked questions and lists some possible solutions. If you are having problems, try some of these suggestions before you give up.

"I don't hear any sound"

Check your sound card options (volume, etc). The MC uses standard Windows Multimedia system calls; so if it doesn't work, your system is *probably* not set-up correctly. If you have any doubt, try the Windows MPLAYER program -- if it doesn't work either, you've got problems. Contact your sound-card manufacturer.

"I get a Device in Use error when I try to play"

Another Windows application is using the multimedia device. Find it and stop it before you try to play MC.

"I hear music, but it doesn't sound that good"

Well, this part is tricky. Some sound boards just can't product good quality sound. If yours does, then the MIDI file itself may not be 100% Windows MPC-compliant. While this won't prevent the song from playing, the instruments may be different enough to make a dreadful noise! If you acquire PD or Shareware MIDI files, make sure they were recorded with your device in mind. If you get really daring, you *could* try to adjust the Windows "MIDI Mapper" (check you Windows manual in the Control Panel section).

"The music plays, but it sounds jumpy"

Your system may be overloaded. Also, music will sound bad in DOS windows or screens. Sorry, but life can be rough sometimes!

"MC says it can't find my song file"

Well, if MC allowed you to enter it the first time, it existed at one point. Maybe you moved the file and forgot about it -- or accidentally erased it. If it has moved, just **Browse** for it again. Also, if you hand-entered a music file without a path, MC may not be able to find it later. The sample files included do not have a path specified (because we don't know where you will put the program and it's files).

"I tried to give a copy to a friend, and it won't play any of my songs on their machine"

The MC remembers the directory and the filename for each song. When you copy an "MC" file to another machine, the song files in question need to reside in the same drive and directory as in your machine. However -- if you keep all your song files in the same directory as MC, it will be able to find the files on another machine (as long as they are in the MC directory of that machine, too).

"I get this window that pops-up once in-a-while to nag me"

Well, this message appears after you have run the program more than 30 times. It appears after each play-loop in **Random** or **In Order** modes. We apologize for the inconvenience, but this particular program can so easily be put in the startup group, put on "auto-play" and forgotten about. We don't mean to nag, but by the time you see these messages your 30-day trial period is probably up, anyway. If you like the program enough to be annoyed by the message, why not register? <grin>

"I gave a copy to a friend, and they get a nag message even though they haven't had it for 30 days"

The usage counter is in the file itself; so if you've used it twenty times before giving a copy to your friend, their copy of MC will think they've had it for a while, too. Why don't you *both* register? <grin>

What the Heck is Shareware, Anyway?

"Shareware" refers to software that, while it is copyrighted material, the author grants users the legal ability to make and freely-distribute copies. What's the catch? The author usually expects that after a specified evaluation period, you will do one of two things:

- "Register" your copy by sending in the amount specified by the author
- Or, stop using the program

This system gives you the chance that no retail package could -- you can take a copy, put it on *your* machine and try it out for a while ... *before* you pay for it. Even if a commercial package has a "money-back" guarantee, *you* had to put your chips on the table before you even knew exactly what you were getting.

As a consumer myself, I have a *pile* of programs that I paid good money for; only to have them turn out to be junk. I am a careful shopper -- I read reviews, ask questions and scour the box before I open my wallet. But you never can tell when you're buying a "pig in a poke".

That's why I starting writing Shareware. I produce quality programs and distribute them with the hope that you will find them useful. If you have ever been on the "retail-treadmill" yourself, you should cast your "consumer vote" by finding software that makes it easy for you to buy. Shareware has a lot to offer -- the better you support it, the better the programs will get!

Thank you for taking the time to read this. I hope you find this program to be fun and of enough quality to be worthy of your purchase.
