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### **Accordion**

Accordion Solitaire is simple to play, but the odds of winning are slim. The object is to deal all the cards into 1 pile. You can move a card on top of the card one to the left or three to the left only if the two cards are of the same suit or the same value. You can deal out as many cards as you wish. In this computer versus, you can run the game in a compressed or non-compressed mode. In the non-compressed mode, only a maximum of 26 piles can be displayed. This is due to the lack of screen real estate with resolutions of 640 x 480. 26 piles should be plenty. Click on the deck to start the game. Use the mouse to drag cards on top other cards to gain points. Since this is a very difficult game to win, higher points are given for ending with less than 7 piles. If you have the skill and would like to see all of the cards on the screen at once, you must run it in compressed mode. In compressed mode, the mouse buttons are deactivated, and the keyboard must be used. To move the cards, place the mouse pointer over the card you want to move, and press the number 1 to move the card one to the left and three for three to the left. This mode can be played fasted than the other mode. To change the mode, click on the Change Game icon, and set the mode by pressing button 1, 2 or 3. Press the Accordion icon and away you go. GOOD LUCK.

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## **Aces Up**

Aces Up Solitaire (also known as Idiots Delight) is simple and fast game to play, but it can be difficult to win. First, deal a row of cards by clicking on the deck. If you have two cards with the same suit, double click on the lowest card (Aces are high.) Instead of double clicking with the mouse, you can put the mouse pointer over the card to remove and press the letter "D" on your keyboard. When all moves are made, fill the empty slots with any top card from another pile, and repeat the method of removing cards. Click on the deck again to fill the slots or deal four more cards overlapping the ones already there. Go through the entire deck until no more moves can be made. Higher points are given for ending with less than 8 cards on the board. GOOD LUCK.

## **Matrimony**

Matrimony Solitaire (also known as Nestor) is a very quick solitaire game to play and one that is relatively easy to win. The difficult part is winning with a high score. Six rows of eight cards are dealt making sure that none of the columns have more than one card of the same value. The four cards left are the stock. Remove cards of the same value by twos from the exposed cards at the end of the columns. When you can't make any more moves, turn up a card in the stock. You can go through the stock as many time as you want, but your score will suffer by 75 points each time. Every time a card is turned up, the number of cards left is subtracted from your score (so don't turn up cards too soon.) Higher points are given for having less than eight cards left. GOOD LUCK.

#### **Patience**

Patience Solitaire (also known as Auld Lang Syne) is the one of the quickest game to play and very, very difficult to win. The four aces are dealt as the foundation. The object is to build the aces up to kings, regardless of suit. First, deal a row of cards by clicking on the deck. If you deal a two of any suit, double click on it to move it to the foundation. Instead of double clicking with the mouse, you can put the mouse pointer over the card to move and press the letter "D" on your keyboard. Keep building on the foundation until no more moves can be made. When all moves are made, click on the deck again to deal four more cards overlapping the ones already there. You can only play the top card of each pile. Go through the entire deck until no more moves can be made. Higher points are given for playing cards with a higher value. GOOD LUCK.

### **Thirteen**

Thirteen Solitaire (also known as Baroness or Five Piles) is simple and very fast game to play, and not that difficult to win. Deal a row of cards by clicking on the deck. If you have two cards with a total value of 13, drag one card to the other to remove them. When all moves are made, deal another row of cards. Go through the entire deck until no more moves can be made. Kings are 13 points and can be removed right away. Queens are worth 12 and jacks are worth 11. Other cards are worth their face value. Only the top cards can be removed. For example; you can remove a jack and a 2 by dragging either card on top of the other if they both are on top of different piles. Higher points are given for ending with less than 8 cards. GOOD LUCK.
